New Review Service Offered

The Single-Discipline Preliminary Review is a service that will help customers clarify complex regulations that may apply to projects, such as means of egress, disabled accessibility, hazardous material, and historic determination. Single-Discipline Review is a voluntary, fee-based service (see information bulletin 513, Preliminary Review).

Customers can request a Single-Discipline Review by submitting the completed questionnaire attached to information bulletin 513 to the submittal counter. The reviewers will prepare a written response to questions within five working days. The Development Services Department's goal is to give the public the advice and information needed to successfully plan and design projects. Project design alternatives and complex permit requirements can be evaluated and interpreted.

The Department will continue offering Multi-Discipline Preliminary Review, which is a coordinated preliminary review process and managed by a development project manager. The completeness and depth of the response to customers' specific information requests depends largely on the amount and detail of the information provided. Preliminary review will benefit from careful consideration of the information desired and adjustment of the documents submitted to support the inquiry. 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Adoption of New Construction Codes Pending

The Building Standards Commission of the State of California (CBSC) met on March 20, 2002, to complete the adoption process for the 2001 California family of construction codes. The goal is to publish the codes in time for adoption by local jurisdictions prior to the end of the year. Issues raised in adopting the California Plumbing Code have delayed the overall adoption process by three months, and as a result the City of San Diego expects to be enforcing the new codes sometime in the fall of 2002.

As part of its triennial code development process the State of California has decided not to adopt the family of codes published by the International Code Council (ICC) which includes the 2000 International Building Code (IBC), the 2000 International Residential Code (IRC), etc. The State decided to adopt a new fire code and mechanical code, to retain the current building code and to adopt newer editions of the plumbing and electrical codes.

The California construction codes are a part of Title 24 of the State Code of Regulations. The 2001 edition of the California Construction Codes will include amended versions of the 1997 edition of the Uniform Building Code published by ICBO, the 2000 edition of the Uniform Fire Code published by the Western Fire Chiefs Association, the 1999 National Electrical Code published by NFPA, as well as the 2000 editions of the Uniform Plumbing Code and Uniform Mechanical Codes published by IAPMO. Numerous state amendments will be published to correlate the selected and unrelated codes and to update the fire protection

standards referenced in the outdated 1997 UBC.

The California Building Standards Commission is a body appointed by the governor. It is charged with selecting and adopting construction codes that are enforced by local jurisdictions and considers amendments by various state agencies to the selected model code documents. The selected model code plus the approved state amendments are published as the 2001 California Construction Codes. The selection, amendment and adoption process typically follows a three-year cycle.

Local jurisdictions such as the City of San Diego are required by state law to adopt and enforce the California construction codes within 180 days of publication by the State of California. Additionally, local jurisdictions may only amend the California construction codes due to unique local conditions if the appropriate findings can be made and approved by the State of California. These amendments will be reviewed by the City Council later this year.

The Department will determine which code applies by the date of the permit application. Those received prior to adoption will be processed under the existing codes. The Department will determine the applicable codes based on acceptance date of the submitted permit application and associated plans. Permit applications submitted prior to the effective date of the new construction codes will be processed under the existing codes. Assistant Director Haase earns key San Jose position

Stephen M. Haase, Assistant Director



of the Development Services Department has accepted an offer to lead the City of San Jose's Department of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement. His last day with the City of San Diego was March 15,

and a replacement is expected to be selected by July.

The City is conducting an open recruitment for the position. The Acting Assistant Director through April 30 will be Kelly Broughton, and Marcella Escobar-Ecke will assume these duties through May and June. During this time, Building Development Review, Information and Application Services and Field Inspection Services will report to Development Services Manager Ed Oliva. Land Development Review, Project Management and Support Services will report to the Acting Assistant Director.

"Stephen will be an asset to the management team in San Jose," said Director Tina Christiansen. "He is a proven leader in our organization, creating changes that resulted in customer service improvements."

Haase served as the Assistant Director of the Development Services Department since December 1995, overseeing the operations of development issues from concept to completion. Haase also lead the implementation of a project management system.

Lack of State Funding Closes the San Diego Regional Permit Assistance Center

The San Diego Regional Permit Assistance Center, a state program located on the fourth floor of the City's Development Services Center, provided a central resource for information and permit assistance for the past eight years. However, the current California budget crisis forced the San Diego Regional Permit Assistance Center to close in March 2002.

The California Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Permit Assistance Center (PAC) Program funding was severely cut with the 2001/02 state budget. During the past six months there was

hope that the program would be fully funded in the 2002/03 budget. However, as the budget deficit grew, a reduced program became more inevitable. As a result, California EPA Secretary Winston H. Hickox ordered 11 of the 13 PACs statewide to close. Sacramento and Riverside PACs will be the only two to remain open.

The San Diego Regional PAC was established in 1994 to provide a more accommodating business environment for the San Diego community. The California EPA/PAC's mission is to maintain California's high environmental stan-

dards while helping businesses with permit and compliance information from all levels of government. During the past year more than 3,000 soon-to-be entrepreneurs utilized the San Diego Regional PAC for convenient access and support. General information about permit/license requirements for businesses can be found by visiting the Calgold permit asresource website www.calgold.ca.gov. The site includes regulations, permitting and licensing policies of state, local, regional and federal agencies, overlaid with requirements for particular industries.
