Overview

- The Grand Jury filed this report, directed to the City Council, on March 13, 2014.
- The report examines the City Charter in comparison to other CA cities as to reasons for removal of an elected official.
- The report includes 2 findings and 4 recommendations.



Overview

- City Council required to provide response to Presiding Judge by June 11, 2014.
- IBA developed proposed Council response collaboratively with the City Attorney's Office.



Overview

Prescribed Grand Jury responses include:

- For each Finding:
 - Agree
 - Disagree wholly or partially
- For each Recommendation:
 - Has been implemented
 - Has not yet been implemented, but will be
 - Requires further analysis
 - Will not be implemented because it is not warranted or is not reasonable

Summary of Proposed Response

- 2 Findings, both Agrees
- 4 Recommendations
 - 1 Has been implemented
 - 3 Require further analysis



Highlights of Findings

- 1. Removal of an elected official for reasons other than as presently listed in the City Charter requires the Charter to be amended.
 - Agree
- 2. The San Diego City Council as a governing body can propose charter revisions which would be presented to San Diego voters for approval or rejection.
 - Agree

- 14-1 Identify additional reasons (other than death, resignation, or recall) for removing elected officials and place them on the ballot for an upcoming election. Requires further analysis
 - Proposed response indicates this can be addressed as part of a comprehensive Charter review process or as a single ballot measure to amend the Charter.
 - The Mayor and City Council can establish an independent Charter review committee to study issues and make recommendations as relates to a potential ballot measure.

- 14-2 Actively seek citizens' recommendations for Charter amendments and hold hearings to ensure the process is transparent to the public. Has been implemented
 - City has an open and transparent process for review of citizens' recommendations for Charter amendments.
 - Council Policy 000-21, "Submission of Ballot Proposals," establishes procedures for "submittal of ballot proposals to the City Council, by members of the public, Councilmembers, the Mayor or mayoral departments, independent department directors, or a public agency."

14-3 Amend the City Charter to provide that a City Council supermajority vote – at least six of the current nine members – is authorized to remove an elected official. – Requires further analysis

14-4 Consider the following possible reasons for removing an elected official. – Requires further analysis

Grand Jury suggestions include:

- Official pleads guilty or no contest to any felony
- Official is adjudged insane
- Official ceases to be a registered voter or resident
- Official ceases to discharge the duties of the office for 90 consecutive days, unless excused

Previous Action & Next Steps

- The proposed response was presented to the ED&IR Committee on April 30, 2014.
 - ED&IR unanimously voted to move the item forward to the full Council with a recommendation for approval.
 - There were no changes to this item.
- We request Council approval of the proposed response, and authorization for delivery to the Presiding Judge.
