• A General Plan may

• not be a "wish list" or a vague view of the future but rather must provide a concrete direction(1).

In essence, the General Plan is a "<u>constitution for development</u>,
 (2)" the foundation upon which all land use decisions in a city or county are to be based.

• It expresses community development goals and embodies <u>public</u> policy relative to the distribution of future land use, both public and private.

California General Plan Requirements

Government Code Section 65300

Policy - Solid policy is based on solid information.

• The analysis of data collected during the planning process provides local officials with the knowledge about trends, existing conditions, and projections that they need to formulate policy.

• If projected community conditions are not in line with a general plan's objectives, local legislative bodies may adopt policies that will help bring about a more desirable future.

California General Plan Requirements

Government Code Section 65300

• Policy Examples

. <u>The city shall not approve</u> a parking ordinance variance unless the variance pertains to the rebuilding of an unintentionally destroyed non-conforming use.

. <u>The city shall not approve</u> plans for the downtown shopping center until an independently conducted market study indicates that the center would be economically feasible.

. <u>The city shall</u> give favorable consideration to conditional use permit proposals involving adaptive reuse of buildings that are designated as "architecturally significant" by the cultural resources element.

General Plan Comments California General Plan Requirements

Government Code Section 65300

Implementation Measure - an action, procedure, program, or technique that carries out general plan policy. Each policy must have at least one corresponding implementation measure..

Examples of implementation measures:

. The city shall use tax-increment financing to pay the costs of replacing old sidewalks in the redevelopment area.

. The city shall adopt a specific plan for the industrial park.

. Areas designated by the land use element for agriculture shall be placed in the agricultural zone.

- Does not appear to meet State Requirements
 - Is more of a wish list that a policies doc :
 - "A General Plan may not be a "wish list" or a vague view of the future but rather must provide a concrete direction."
 - Use the word 'shall'
 - Add traceability
 - Goals need to be numbered
 - Add who is responsible
 - Add Schedule

Do not send the reader to "outer space" by pointing to non-connected docs like the Stratigic Framework Element "Action Plan" and Public Facilities Financing Strategy, etc to find how a 'policy' is to be implemented.
