The 1988 Golden Hill Community Plan Existing Vision

"The community's location, excellent regional access, view opportunities, and historical characteristics are resources that will encourage development and redevelopment within the community. The purpose of this plan is to ensure that this development will reflect the community's past and be sensitive to the older established character, scale, design and topographical features."

Residential Element

Goal

Preserve & enhance the quality of housing opportunities for all income levels





Residential Element

Objectives

- Protect single-family & low-density areas from encroachment by incompatible higher density uses
- Rehabilitate sound but deteriorating structures for the purpose of maintaining affordable housing
- Create new, affordable housing units through the use of all available public & private financing programs
- Increase percentage of homeownership
- Encourage higher densities in areas with direct access to major transportation arteries





Urban Design Element

Goal

Enhance the unique character and image of Golden Hill





Urban Design Element

Objectives

- Maintain existing open space edges & develop projects which create a sense of arrival at community gateways
- Ensure development is compatible with the existing character, scale and overall appearance of the surrounding neighborhoods, and visually reflects the 50-foot lot pattern
- Enhance the appearance of streets through the design of new development, coordinated streetscape improvements and landscaping
- Eliminate visual clutter, including nonconforming signs, billboards and overhead utility lines
- Preserve existing street trees and increase landscaping in the public rights-of-way, open spaces and front yard areas
- Establish development and design guidelines to assist in reducing crime in the community
- Preserve and enhance significant views of the bay, ocean, open space and Balboa Park

Planned District Element

Goal

Preserve and enhance the historical, architectural, cultural, aesthetic and economic value in Golden Hill





Historical / Architectural Preservation Element

Goal

To maintain the heritage of Golden Hill by preserving the historically and/or architecturally significant structures and to ensure that new development is in character and scale with existing significant structures and the neighborhood character





Historical / Architectural Preservation Element

Objectives

- Develop a strong community commitment to rehabilitation and preservation
- Limit future development through rezoning to reduce the economic incentive to demolish historic structures
- Require development to be complementary in scale and character to existing structures and to create continuity among architecturally and historically significant structures





Commercial Element

Goal

To enhance the commercial vitality of Golden Hill and provide a wide variety of goods and services



Commercial Element

Objectives

- Prohibit residential properties from being used for commercial uses
- Revitalize business districts by improving the appearance of commercial development and adjacent streetscapes
- Increase the level and quality of business activity by concentrating retail uses in existing commercially zoned areas
- Seek public or private resources to facilitate facade upgrading
- Provide adequate off-street parking for commercial areas and encourage development of additional parking spaces
- Require new commercial development to be complementary to historical/architectural heritage.
- Develop a variety of neighborhood commercial facilities and services of sufficient size to induce residents to shop in Golden Hill.

Transportation Element

Goal

To provide a safe, efficient transportation system for the community to allow maximum opportunity for access to goods, services and activities, both public and private, and minimize adverse environmental effects





Transportation Element

Objectives

- Protect residential areas by encouraging thru traffic to use major streets
- Improve the system to accommodate growth of locally-generated traffic while minimizing adverse effects on existing uses
- Reduce vehicular traffic by encouraging the use of alternative modes of transportation including public transit, bicycles and pedestrian travel
- Visually enhance transportation corridors to improve community image and identification
- **Reassess** the effectiveness of existing traffic control devices
- Enhance bus service by increasing frequency, adding express service and improving transit stops

Parks and Recreation Element

Goal

Ensure adequate park and recreational facilities and activities, based on the needs of residents





Parks and Recreation Element

Objectives

- Provide park and recreational facilities within the community consistent with General Plan standards
- Increase pedestrian and bicyclist access through the "Golden Hill Triangle" (southeast portion of Balboa Park) by maintaining and expanding the public right-of-way
- Provide annual review of community recreational facilities needs and remedy deficiencies when identified
- Provide increased maintenance of the "Golden Hill Triangle" grounds to improve park appearance and security
- Provide additional public parks to complement the "Triangle" area
- Support park design that allows total visibility of facilities from police patrol vehicles and easy accessibility by emergency vehicles
- Require the provision of private recreational facilities in conjunction with new larger scale residential projects

Open Space Element

Goal

To complete the public acquisition and preservation of the designated open space system





Open Space Element

Objectives

- Preserve the remaining undeveloped canyons and hillsides as important features of visual open space, community definition and environmental quality
- Acquire open space through open space easements, City ownership, or other mechanisms as part of project approvals
- Provide new open space throughout the community by requiring usable open space areas in new residential development
- Utilize publicly-controlled open space for passive recreation where feasible
- Ensure that public improvements are compatible with the goals and objectives of Community Plan
- Provide access and view corridors into canyons via unimproved street rights-of-way for fire prevention, maintenance and pedestrians.

Community Facilities Element

Goal

Establish and maintain a high level of public facilities and services to meet the needs of the community





Social Services Element

Goal

Maintain and enhance the cultural, ethnic, and economic balance in Golden Hill by ensuring the provision of a comprehensive social service system



Social Services Element

Objectives

- Improve the provision of health care service for the community
- Prevent the duplication and proliferation of social services in Golden Hill
- Develop a coalition of all agencies providing social services
- Require that the County of San Diego, and other appropriate agencies and private groups limit the addition and further concentration of those services now functioning in Golden Hill but serving the metropolitan area

Environmental Quality & Conservation Element

Goal

Provide a clean and healthy environment in which to live and work
