Art of Indonesia: Pusaka (1998) edited by Haryati Soebadio-Noto Soebagio. 709.598/ART Exploration of the importance of "pusaka"—objects venerated and passed down through generations. Features items from Indonesia's National Museum.

<u>The Art of Tonga</u> (1997) by Keith St. Cartmail. 709.961/ST.

Comprehensive illustrated overview of the material culture of the Polynesian islands of Tonga, featuring sculpture, body adornment, and other types of art.

<u>Arts of the Pacific Islands</u> (1998) by Anne D'Alleva. 709.95/D'ALLEVA

Exploration of the art traditions and cultures of the Pacific Islands, with color photos of sculpture, paintings, architecture, textiles, jewelry, and dance.

The Continuum Encyclopedia of Native Art: Worldview, Symbolism, and Culture in Africa, Oceania, and Native North America (2000) by Hope Werness. 704.03/WERNESS

Wide-ranging reference on the symbols, meaning, and significance of art in indigenous cultures. Includes hundreds of entries and illustrations.

<u>Elemental Art from the Indonesian Archipelago:</u> <u>Selections from the Collection of Mingei International</u> <u>Museum</u> (2005) edited by Martha Longenecker. 745.09598/MINGEI

Catalog for an exhibition of a broad variety of Indonesian art, such as puppets, textiles, ritual dance masks, and jewelry. Includes 162 color illustrations.

Emblems of Passage: Art of Africa, Oceania, and the Americas: Selections from Friends of Ethnic Art Members' Collections, January 16–April 7, 2002 (2002) by Gregory Ghent. 709.01/EMBLEMS Exhibition catalog documenting 125 emblems of passage, which are artworks created to commemorate major stages or turning points such as birth, marriage, and death.

Island Ancestors: Oceania Art from the Masco Collection (1994) by Allen Wardwell.

Survey of Oceanic art, with 144 color images of the most stunning objects from the collection of the Masco Corporation.

Mythology of Oceania, particularly Polynesia and Australia, with background information on the people of the region.

Exploration of the myth and reality of life in Oceania focusing on its costume, including clothing, masks, and jewelry.
