Meet Janice Luna Reynoso

Janice Luna Reynoso is the Executive Director of Mundo Gardens, a non-profit community garden and social justice organization that has been empowering youth and families in San Diego and beyond since 2010.

Janice is also a member of several important committees and groups, including the San Diego Portside Steering Committee, the Carbon Emission Reduction Plan (CERP), the San Diego County Behavioral Health Board & Stakeholder Engagement Workgroup, and the Leadership Council of the San Diego Food System Alliance. She is also involved with the San Diego Council on Literacy and is a RISE San Diego Urban Leadership Fellow and a Resident Leadership Academy Facilitator.





Janice played a crucial role in securing the Caltrans Reconnecting Communities: Highways to Boulevards grant. This funding will be used in Southeastern San Diego (SESD) and National City to improve transportation options and convert underused highways into vibrant public spaces.

The communities of SESD and National City were deeply affected by the construction of Interstate 805 and the history of redlining and dividing infrastructure. In line with the Promise Zone initiative, this project aims to empower residents of SESD and National City by identifying priority projects that meet the needs of the communities. These projects may include bicycle and pedestrian connections, light rail enhancements, bus shelters, and the creation of parks, green spaces, and communal areas.

Active Transportation Program

The Active Transportation Program includes, but is not limited to, increasing the proportion of trips accomplished by walking and biking, increasing the safety and mobility of nonmotorized users, advancing efforts of regional agencies to achieve greenhouse gas reduction goals, enhancing public health, and providing a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of users including disadvantaged communities. **Application Deadline: Ongoing**

Disability Inclusion Fund

The Disability Inclusion Fund (DIF), a donor collaborative housed at Borealis Philanthropy, is accepting applications from organizations in the United States working to strengthen disability inclusion, rights, and justice. DIF grants support organizations whose work is rooted in social movements (especially intersectional cross-movement work), is collaborative, and helps to build a more vibrant, just, and joyful world for people with disabilities-from arts and culture to policy and advocacy. Supported areas of work include grassroots movement-building, advocacy, the performing arts/cultural change, mutual aid, and policy change. Funding prioritizes organizations that are disability-led, with priority towards Black, Indigenous, and people of color; queer and gender non-conforming; and women-led organizations. U.Sbased or U.S. territory-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations and fiscally sponsored organizations that have annual budgets with committed revenue of less than \$1 million are eligible. (Applications are also being accepted through the DIF x Tech Fund, which seeks proposals working to bring about transformational change at the intersections of disability, justice, and technology).

KFC Foundation: Kentucky Fried Wishes

Through the Kentucky Fried Wishes program, the KFC Foundation will award up to \$1 million total to 100 nonprofit organizations in the United States. Twenty-five grants will be awarded per quarterly cycle. The remaining quarterly cycles for 2024 focus on the following areas: improving health and well-being, including efforts such as mobile health clinic creation, playground improvements, domestic violence shelter upgrades, and accommodations for individuals with disabilities; expanding access to food and shelter (open for application in July 2024), including efforts such as food pantry remodels, community garden creation, building repairs and renovations, and beautification of community space, and caring for the environment and animals (open for application in September 2024), including efforts such as permanent wildlife conservation exhibits, a new vehicle for a mobile vet clinic, and park improvements. Eligible nonprofit organizations must operate on the local level (or be an affiliate or chapter of a larger organization that operates locally) and directly benefit their surrounding community.

Application deadline: Applications are accepted quarterly. The upcoming application window, focused on health and well-being, is open from May 1 to 31, 2024.



<u>California Urban and Community Forestry</u> <u>Inflation Reduction Act</u>

To help create sustainable urban forests across the state, \$30.8 million in funding will be available to support urban and community forestry projects in historically disinvested urban communities throughout California. Application Deadline: May 30, 2024

Preservation and Reinvestment Initiative for Community Enhancement (PRICE) Competition

- PRICE Main (\$200 million) focuses on affordable housing preservation by encouraging revitalization and enhancement activities to preserve existing manufactured housing communities and manufactured housing units, including the repair, rehabilitation, and replacement of existing manufactured homes; infrastructure improvements; and planning and resilience activities.
- PRICE Replacement Pilot (\$25 million) focuses on the redevelopment of manufactured housing communities as replacement housing to benefit households living in substandard housing or in disaster-prone areas, and includes activities such as construction of replacement housing, relocation assistance, buy-outs, and down payment assistance.

Arts Education Exposure

The purpose of the Exposure program is to support attendance at high-quality performances and exhibits for students who would particularly benefit from these experiences. Students may be identified as priority communities for participation due to socio-economic status, geographic region, or other aspects of students' life experiences that elevate the impact of having opportunities to engage with these cultural assets. Application Deadline: June 6, 2024

Impact Projects

The Impact Projects grant program intends to support collaborative projects that center artists and artistic practice in responding to issues experienced by historically and systemically under-resourced communities in California at this time, including, but not limited to, social, political, and economic inequalities. Application Deadline: June 6, 2024

ABOUT THE PROMISE ZONE

In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most underresourced communities. Through the Promise Zone initiative, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Since 2016, the unemployment rate has decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate has fallen from 38.3% to now 22.1% (ACS, 2016, 2021). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 7 years since the designation, targeted efforts based organizations have supported some improvement in these areas, however, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue improving the lives of our Promise Zone residents.
