Public Comments and Staff Responses

Following are the questions and comments received on the Draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 CAPER and the responses provided by staff, where warranted. The Draft FY 2023 CAPER was made available for public review from September 1, 2023, and September 16, 2023. During the public review period, the Draft FY 2023 CAPER was posted online for viewing at the City of San Diego's CDBG Program website: (www.sandiego.gov/cdbg). The CAPER was also available through the City of San Diego's website and notices of the public comment period were posted in the following publications: Daily Transcript, Voice and Viewpoint and El Latino.

The public was provided the opportunity to send comments via email to cdbg@sandiego.gov, and to make public comments during one of the three public meetings: September 6, 2023, Economic Development and Intergovernmental Relations Committee (ED&IR) meeting; September 13, 2023, Consolidated Plan Advisory Board meeting and the September 19, 2023, City Council hearing.

<u>September 6, 2023, Economic Development and Intergovernmental Relations</u> Committee

Councilmember Monica Montgomery Steppe, District 4

Councilmember Montgomery Steppe thanked Economic Development Department (EDD) staff, Angela Nazareno-Clark and Michele Marano for their presentation. Councilmember Montgomery Steppe asked why in the previous fiscal year the number of people served was 19,000 and for fiscal year 2023 there were 56,000 individuals served. The numbers were unduplicated individuals so what was the reason for this year's number of people served?

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that this was due to a few projects that were closed after a multi-year implementation period such as the Access Youth Academy project. Even though that project had a grand opening in 2021, it could not be closed in IDIS until FY 2023 its project outcomes were reported during this fiscal year 2023 CAPER. This is part of the reason why the numbers were different.

Councilmember Montgomery Steppe thanked Access Youth Academy for the work that they do.

Councilmember Raul Campillo, District 7

Councilmember Campillo thanked staff for the impactful set of programs that deeply need this funding to support many of the City'sr vulnerable communities. Councilmember Campillo also gave a special thanks to all EDD staff for what they do for the community and the entire City of San Diego.



Public Comments

Public comment received from Blair Beakman, September 6, 2023

Blair Beakman stated that this HUD report gives a good feeling. Thank you. Blair stated that he has a comment regarding the low-income housing issues. Staff should be working on developing affordable housing for extremely low-income people. What staff described as low income was between \$70,000 - \$90,000 income level. That's not earth shaking. He said we have to be working on providing housing for much lower household income levels. It is virtually important. He asked staff to consider working on that.

Public comment received from The Original, September 6, 2023

Commentator stated that staff must do these presentations so that they can receive more funding. Staff talks about giving it to nonprofits to do the work that needs to be done but the problem is that most people are not getting help. It takes about 10-15 years to get anything done. It doesn't go to the people that need it. It goes to these other entities then nothing really happens, but staff have to project that you are doing all these wonderful things. If we don't say we have all these wonderful things, we won't get funded. Giving people paraphernalia to use drugs is interesting. Why would giving paraphernalia going to help people on drugs? It's a good way to keep people on drugs.

September 13, 2023 Consolidated Plan Advisory Board Meeting

Yegin Chen, CPAB Member

Mr. Chen thanked Michele Marano for her presentation followed by great examples. Mr. Chen asked what percentage of the people served was represented by HOME funds?

STAFF RESPONSE: Jennifer Kreutter, San Diego Housing Commission, shared that for example, the St. Teresa of Calcutta Villa development by Father Joe's Village used 6.7 of HOME funding. Other funding sources such as State funding, Federal tax credit and loans were also used.

Mr. Chen asked if individuals served per program fiscal year were unduplicated clients?



STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that individuals served were unduplicated clients that may only be counted once per fiscal year regardless of how many times the individual participated in the program.

Mr. Chen asked the difference between a desk and remote monitoring review audit under Compliance and Administration was.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that there were two types of reports that subrecipients submitted on the monthly basis. The first is an MPR (Monthly Program Report) that includes information on the services performed during the month and how many individuals were served. They are assigned to their Program Managers to review. The Program Manager reviews the performance outcomes, monitors the program trends to identify if the program is performing adequately or not meeting their desired goal objectives. The next is a fiscal desk audit which the subrecipients submit monthly as a Request for Reimbursement (RFR). The subrecipients submit receipts, expenditures, invoices and proof of payment to receive a reimbursement. Lastly, the Monitoring and Performance Management team reviews the systems that the nonprofit organizations have in place. The Monthly Programmatic Reports (MPR's) and Request for Reimbursement (RFR's) reports are reviewed. The monitoring team reviews the program's intake forms, their supporting documents, verification of participants income level, reports of unduplicated clients and their database used for the program. For the fiscal audit, they compare their accounting reports with their expenditures that were used for the program.

Abena Bradford, CPAB Member

Ms. Bradford thanked Michele Marano for her presentation. Ms. Bradford asked if CDBG funding was used for affordable rental units and not for home-ownership programs.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that affordable housing projects shared in the presentation were funded by HOME funds and not by CDBG grants. In FY 2023, HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds were dedicated to establishing affordable rental housing for low-income households and financial assistance programs for homeownership The City of San Diego's program, Bridge to Home, uses CDBG funds for property acquisition and rehabilitation.

Ms. Bradford asked if there was a report that named the organizations that provided the services to individuals.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that once the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) was finalized, the Economic Development Department posts on the City website documents that identify activity tables. For example, for homelessness, there is a table that identifies the number of participants



served, the name of the service provider and the outcomes achieved by the project. It also includes the expenditures that were made during the fiscal year.

Ms. Bradford asked if the percentage pertaining to Goal 5: Public Facilities/Critical Infrastructure served 8% individuals was correct.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that the Consolidated Plan was an estimated goal. When establishing goals in a Consolidated Plan the following are considered; the amount of funding, the category and how many people may be impacted. Ultimately each project is based on the NOFA (Notice of Funding Availability). If a project does not complete its goals, it is explained to HUD the reasons why the project outcomes were not achieved during the planning cycle. HUD recognizes that the Consolidated Plan is a planning tool and that there are opportunities to amend the goals and outcomes.

Rich Thesing, CPAB Member

Mr. Thesing thanked Michele Marano for the detailed presentation presented today. Rich commended the Economic Development Department for all the work they do.

Public comment received from an Anonymous Participant

Commenter asked if the expenditure of 20% admin funds is still expected? When applying for affordable housing funds do staff check with communities before authorizing funds from neighborhood councils and community partner groups such as parks and recreation? Do staff provide low-income communities of concern with a climate equity index and action plan with an ETA?

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that there is a 20% cap in CDBG funds that may be invested in administration funds that includes items like: rent, staff salary, supplies, trainings, the Fair Housing program and consultants paid during the Consolidated Plan or fiscal studies. The affordable housing funds are determined by the Consolidated Plan budget and goals. The funds are deployed based on budget priorities and various agreements. For example, the HOME funds are deployed through the San Diego Housing Commission which has a full program to submit affordable housing projects. Other questions posed by the Commentator were not related to the Draft FY 2023 CAPER and did not receive a response.

Public comment received from Anonymous Participant

Commenter asked why Paving Great Futures is receiving such a large amount under two categories?



STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that she did not have the information with her at this moment. Michele provided her email, mmarano@sandiego,gov. Michele will be following up with this question. Follow-up: Paving Great Futures submitted two responses to the FY 2024 Request for Proposals, qualified for scoring, and received scores high-enough to receive both grant awards upon City Council approval.

Public comment received from Anonymous Participant

Public comment stated that public notices should be sent out.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that public notices are sent to everyone on the CDBG email distribution list. If someone is interested in receiving updates on the CDBG program, they are encouraged to sign-up for the interest list at www.sandiego.gov/cdbg/apps. Interested parties receive emails with information on the public notices, notices of Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA), Request for Qualification (RFQ), Request for Proposal (RFP's), and agendas/meeting dates for the monthly CPAB meeting.

September 19, 2023 City Council Hearing

Councilmember Whitburn, District 3

Councilmember Whitburn expressed appreciation to City staff. He highlighted and thanked staff for addressing the needs of the homelessness and housing crisis that so many people are experiencing. He also thanked the Economic Development Department, the San Diego Housing Commission and the Consolidated Planning Advisory Board.

Councilmember von Wilpert, District 5

Councilmember von Wilpert thanked staff for their presentation and especially focusing on critical issues like homelessness and affordable housing. Councilmember von Wilpert also praised the Bridge to Home program for providing affordable housing to the city. She asked if there was an update on the Homelessness Response Center.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Christina Bibler, Director of the Economic Development Department, responded that there will be an action item with the Council Committee in October led by the Department of Real Estate and Airport Management related to that site. The Land Use and Housing Committee will be addressing this item.

Councilmember LaCava, District 1



Councilmember LaCava thanked Ms. Marano for the good work. He recognized that the pandemic during 2020-21 may have impacted the outcomes of many programs. He asked Ms. Marano to share more about how the programs were affected.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that there were several categories that were impacted, one of them is single family housing rehabilitation. There were stretches of time when service providers were not permitted to go into single family homes to perform work or provide job training programs for solar installation. Those programs were definitely impacted. Due to Mayoral and Council priorities of addressing homelessness, some public service dollars were invested in homelessness programs rather than the general public service projects and that's another reason why there is a higher percentage in services for individuals experiencing homelessness and a lesser percentage of the target being reached for general public projects. Infrastructure projects and nonprofit facility improvement projects experienced delays due to an increase in the cost of materials, delayed deliveries and labor shortages – these are all issues that have contributed to delays.

Councilmember LaCava, District 1

Councilmember LaCava mentioned that he appreciated the information presented in the CAPER report. He asked if there will be a different report that will include the entire term of the programs.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that the City is currently embarking on the FY 2025-29 Consolidated Plan process. A survey has been released that is looking to assess the needs and priorities of the community.. This feedback will guide the goals in the five-year Consolidated Plan. Additionally, staff submit an Annual Action Plan to HUD every year that lists objective goals. The CAPER then demonstrates how those goals were accomplished.

Councilmember LaCava, District 1

Councilmember LaCava thanked Ms. Marano for her work and asked if the City received additional funding from other sources with additional goals and achievements.

STAFF RESPONSE: Ms. Michele Marano, Community Development Coordinator, responded that the City receives funds from many types of HUD programs. CDBG, HOME and ESG are the three entitlement programs administered by the Community Development Division.

Public Comments

Public comment through in-person received from Joyce Cenata

I'm Joyce Cenata from District 3. Thank you for this CAPER agenda item. It's a lot of work and a lot of outreach. I want to focus on the ESG grant portion. This helps individuals from becoming homeless. When I look at that pie chart and look at the ESG it's basically a sliver



of the pie. And most of you know about my three "P's" which I love so much and focus on. Prevention, preservation and powering. Powering comes from empowering meaning we help individuals to improve their quality of their lives and their homes. What are we doing about prevention? We can't let the people be homeless and it's really so much better to go that route then start fresh with the people that are having so much trouble with their homeless issues and it's so complicated. When they are in their homes and are so scared about losing them we have so much data already and we can start from that point. I want to increase that pie slice. Hopefully, we will do that in the future. I like the highlights for FY23 on Fair Housing. There were 152 unduplicated fair housing investigations and that's a lot. Years ago we had some trouble with fair housing involving HUD with our work with fair housing. That was a long time ago. You've done better I know. I hope that the response on that will be very active in reference to what happened in the investigation. Thank you.

STAFF RESPONSE: The ESG Program allocation from HUD is much smaller in relation to the HOME and CDBG programs, which is why it appears smaller in the pie chart. These program allocations are subject to federal appropriation and are not determined by the City.

Public comment through webform received from Lori Saldana on 9/19/23

Thank you for the presentation. It gives a very clear outline of where things are succeeding and where things are not meeting the mark. For the Councilmembers that are staying in the Chamber, I might add questions about the affordable housing draft outcomes - why do they not seem to be meeting the mark for FY23? We have households for rental units, single family housing that have been rehabilitated under the affordable housing goals and some of those numbers are up higher in the 1-4 years but single family housing is well below the goals. More concerning is that in terms of assisting in stable housing you are only 1/3 in the way of meeting the goals for Rapid Re-Housing and out of 1000 households only 77 households this year and 330 households over 4 years have met these Rapid Re-Housing goals. I really encourage councilmembers to follow up with these issues. On the other hand, shelters are well over the estimates. Supportive services over 200% beyond what you had anticipated, but supportive services do not equal housing and that's the whole purpose of the lawsuit you were trying to encourage the Supreme Court of the United States to overturn. We simply do not have the housing or the shelters to provide for people, so this is an interesting report. I hope that Council Members will dive into it and ask some questions related to homelessness especially in San Diego.

Public comment through webform received from Blair Beakman

Thanks a lot for this item. I think we always take a bit of comfort in HUD reports that come in. Good luck that there is a public comment time ending September 16th for this item. Good luck to try to extend that a bit. We are all just returning to the public process. Hopefully more people can add public comments before the deadline of September 28, 2023, when you have to submit reports. Thank you for the report from June in the



Homeless Ordinance measures for downtown. You had a really important discussion about where we are with current shelter issues, and how affordable housing is going. We have to work towards a comprehensive future, and you are trying to do that with this sort of item. Thank you. It is important to be added to that comprehensive process now and you come the public meeting agenda with these items and the process. Thank you for continuing to do that. I think we can trust the federal level with HUD issues. How about we learn to talk to the State level more? They have a real problem with inflexibility. They are just starting to address ideas like RHNA and how RHNA can be more flexible in our community's future. Good luck to bring in the State level and talking to them about the importance of affordable housing. We have to talk about extremely low- and very low- affordable housing in our future. We can't be afraid to discuss these subjects and make them an open conversation. Mixed income really helps with this. Good luck in introducing that conversation and overall help with a better affordable housing future. Thank you.

Public comment through webform received from The Original

It projects in this report what you guys are going to be doing. Things that you are doing are great things. The problem is that we see the fruits of your labor and things are not getting better. As you are sitting here and getting ready to raise these water rates and everything else that keeps going up, we are really not doing anything for anyone and continue to make things unaffordable. It literally meaning for people to own nothing and be happy.
