REDUCING OUTDOOR IRRIGATION

THE CITY OF SAN DIEGO

FACT SHEET

California's water supply is at historically low levels after four consecutive years of drought. In response, in April 2015, Governor Jerry Brown ordered a 25 percent statewide reduction in urban water use. Later in May, the State Water Resources Control Board adopted emergency statewide regulations that took into account previous citywide water conservation efforts. These regulations mandated the City of San Diego to conserve 16 percent between June 1, 2015, and February 13, 2016.

The quickest and most effective way to lower water use is to reduce outdoor irrigation. Historically up to 50 percent of residential water use in the city has been used to irrigate lawns and landscaping. As of July 1, 2015, the following irrigation schedule is mandatory for City of San Diego residents:

Water 2 Days Per Week, 5 Minutes Per Day*



* For systems with multiple stations, water 5 minutes per station. The 5-minutes-per-day time limit does NOT apply to landscape irrigation systems using water-efficient devices, including drip and micro-irrigation systems and stream rotor sprinklers. However, residents these systems are still required to follow the two-day-per-week schedule.

Water at the Right Time of Day

Water only after 6 p.m. and before 10 a.m., to reduce evaporation and get the most out of your watering.

Tree Care

It is critical that trees on your property are properly watered in times of drought to ensure environmental and public safety.

Rebate	Description
Rain Barrel	Rebates for barrels that catch and store rain water. For residential customers only.
Grass Replacement	Rebates for removal of grass (lawn) that is replaced with water wise plant material. For residential and commercial customers.
Micro-Irrigation	Rebates for converting an overhead spray sprinkler system to low application rate micro-irrigation (i.e. drip, micro-spray, etc.). For residential and commercial customers.
Mulch from Miramar Greenery	A maximum of two cubic yards of mulch for free with proof of residency in the City of San Diego. For residential and commercial customers.
