

#### **Golf Tourney Raises Funds for Elementary School**



When students at Angier Elementary School play on their new and improved playground equipment, they will never know how many bad golf shots went into making that equipment a reality.

Thanks to the many duffers and hackers at the City of San Diego Water Department, \$8,000 was raised at the department's Fourth Annual Golf Tournament. Water Department Director Frank Belock recently presented the proceeds from the tournament to the school's administrators during a morning school assembly. The school is located at 8450 Hurlbut Street in Serra Mesa.

"It's nice to know that something good can happen from so much bad golf," joked Belock. "But, seriously, I'd like to thank all those who participated in the tournament. We had Water Department employees, employees from other City departments, as well as folks who do work with our department."

The tournament featured 130 players as well as 40 sponsors who generously helped support the event with in-kind and financial contributions.

"The great thing about the tournament is that it gives us the exciting opportunity to give back to the community by helping out a local school," said Mark Stone, Deputy Director for the Water Department's Operations Division. "We are fortunate that our Water Department employees and friends took the time to support this fundraising event which benefits educational partnership opportunities like this one."

#### **Water Department Earns National Honor**

Quality service, protecting the environment and operating cost-effectively have always been top priorities for the City of San Diego Water Department. Past successes in these areas, as well as a commitment to them in the future, is why the Department was recently one of two water agencies in the U.S. honored by the Association of Metropolitan Water Agencies with a 2004 Gold Award for Competitiveness Achievement.

The Water Department's Operations Division was recognized for its Bid-To-Goal Program (in which Divisions within the Department sign binding contracts ensuring cost-effective business practices) and ISO 14001 Environmental Management System Programs, which is a set of policies and procedures designed to manage environmental issues.

"This award was validation of all the hard work we've done, as well as an inspiration to keep improving our service to our customers," said Frank Belock, Water Department Director. "We're constantly seeking ways to improve performance in a cost-effective and an environmentally sensitive manner." Some benefits of the programs include improving performance efficiency, reducing operations costs, creating a new process to document, check and correct courses of action, improving service quality, measuring performance and improving environmental sustainability.

In addition to receiving the prestigious national award, the Water Department was also recognized for being the first utility in the nation to combine Bid-to-Goal with the ISO 14001 Environmental Management System.

#### **Don't Forget to Recycle Your Christmas Tree**

The City of San Diego Environmental Services Department is hosting the 31st Annual Christmas Tree Residential Recycling Program from Dec. 29, 2004 through Jan. 24, 2005.

Trees collected as fundraising projects or commercial loads will not be accepted at the drop-off locations. These trees can be dropped off free of charge at the Miramar Greenery.

Residents participating in the Christmas Tree Recycling Program should drop off clean trees during daylight hours. Before trees can be dropped off, all tree stands, nails, staples, ornaments and other tree decorations must be removed.

In addition to clean trees, flocked trees (fake snow) are also accepted. All trees will be recycled into high quality mulch and compost which is available throughout the year to city residents for free at the Miramar Greenery.

Residents who currently receive curbside greenery recycling collection can also recycle their trees through the curbside collection program by placing trees at the curb with the regular greenery recycling. Residents who wish to recycle trees through the curbside recycling program are required to remove all non-recyclable materials before placing trees on the curb.
