Mission Bay DUI Checkpoint Nets 5 Arrests

San Diego – The San Diego Police Department Traffic Division conducted a DUI/Driver License checkpoint on November 10, 2021, at 4200 Mission Bay Drive, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 3:00 a.m. Checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence and provide the greatest safety for officers and the public. The checkpoint resulted in the following:

660 Total vehicles through checkpoint

502 Vehicles screened

24 Drivers evaluated

3 DUI-Alcohol suspect arrested in or near the checkpoint

2 DUI-Drug impaired drivers arrested

0 Suspect arrested for illegal drugs (possession/transportation/sales)

0 Arrested on other Criminal Charges

0 Driver cited/arrested for operating a vehicle unlicensed or while suspended/revoked

0 Citations issued

5 Vehicle impounds conducted

DUI/Driver License checkpoints have been shown to lower DUI deaths and injuries. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any of the DUI enforcement strategies, while also yielding considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent. Ninety percent of California drivers approve of checkpoints.

Drivers caught driving impaired can expect the impact of a DUI arrest to include jail time, fines, fees, DUI classes, other expenses that can exceed \$10,000 not to mention the embarrassment when friends and family find out.

The San Diego Police Department will be conducting another DUI/Driver License Checkpoint or DUI saturation patrol on November 12, 2021, in our ongoing commitment to lowering deaths and injuries upon our streets and highways.

The checkpoint was funded by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, reminding everyone to “Report Drunk Drivers – Call 9-1-1”.
