# **Events Honor 10th Anniversary of the Cedar Fire in Scripps Ranch**

Ten years ago, the Scripps Ranch community was devastated by the Cedar Fire which burned 280,000 acres and more than 2,800 structures.

Within the City, 335 structures were lost and another 71 damaged. It's still considered the largest wildland fire in California history. Since 2003, the City developed a fire safety and brush management guide, adopted new roof covering requirements and established a new



community based program called Community Emergency Response Team, which trains citizen volunteers to become a vital link to safety in a disaster. Each of these actions has helped to make all of San Diego more prepared for fires and other major emergencies. And as a commu-

nity, we are stronger and more united after pulling together to recover and rebuild. This month, we'll recognize the Cedar Fire anniversary

## **Construction to Begin on Poway Road Bike Path**



By this time next year, bicyclists in District Five will have a new bike path to enjoy. Construction is set to begin this winter on a bicycle path in **Sabre Springs**. The path will run east along the south side of Poway Road from the I-15/Poway Road interchange to Sabre Springs Parkway. In total, it will be approximately 1,950 feet in length.

This path will enhance safety for pedestrians and bicyclists. The project will also feature a new sidewalk, retaining wall, curb and gutter, metal beam guardrail, drainage facilities, landscape and irrigation and street striping/markings.

There will be temporary inconveniences during construction, but the completed project will provide a safer environment for all residents. If you have questions or concerns, please contact my office.

## Community Input Leads to New Sidewalks in Rancho Bernardo

Earlier this year, residents in Rancho Bernardo requested new sidewalks for their community. I am happy to report we successfully secured funding for these priority projects and recently completed two projects. Approximately 3,000 feet of new sidewalks are on Rancho Bernardo Road between Via del Campo to Matinal Road and on the east side of Bernardo Center Drive between Fairhope Road and Bernardo Center Court.

The sidewalks were requested through Rancho Bernardo's annual planning process, something communities city-wide go through each year. Right now, community planning groups are meeting to develop their list of priority projects for the next fiscal year. Because of work that my office did, community input is now a permanent part of this process. The Neighborhood Input Policy makes certain that communities have their voices heard when it comes to infrastructure improvements and new construction in their area.

I urge you to get involved with the community planning group in your area and speak up about projects important to you.
