## San Diego Central Library Hosts Book Talk on Defender Dolphins and the U.S. Navy's Marine Mammal Swimmer Defense System

Local Writer was U.S. Navy's First Marine Mammal Officer, Features Military Themes in His Work

**San Diego**, **CA** - As part of Cal Humanities' statewide initiative *War Comes Home*, the San Diego Public Library will present the 4th Annual *Writing from the Ranks* military writers' program in honor of the Veterans Day holiday on Monday, November 10 at 6:30 p.m. in the 9<sup>th</sup> Floor Shiley Special Events Suite at the new San Diego Central Library @ Joan Λ Irwin Jacobs Common, located at 330 Park Blvd in downtown San Diego. The featured writer, local author and retired **Navy Captain Harold W. Goforth, Jr.**, will discuss and sign his book *Defender Dolphins: The Story of Project Short Time*. This program is free and open to the public.

Defender Dolphins documents the Navy's never-before-told eyewitness account of a unique and daring secret project involving the first-ever military use of dolphins, its conception, development, and 12-month deployment to Vietnam. Learn how five dolphins were trained and defended a critical ammunition pier in Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam against enemy swimmers.

Harold W. Goforth is a retired Navy EOD Officer and Captain with 26 years of service. He was the Navy's first marine mammal officer and a Navy research physiologist for twenty-five years and an adjunct college professor for 18 years. Many of his students went on to become mammal trainers, researchers and curators at Sea World, Ocean Park, Hong Kong, UC Santa Cruz and contractors for the Navy at Point Loma.
