 - 1. Mike Gerber has been a resident in the College Area community for nearly 7 years living on 5131 Dorothy Drive. He is a senior citizen and a disabled veteran. He recently received a notice from his landlord that his rent will increase by \$170.30, and feels that the notice was not given in proper time and that the rent increase was excessive. Mr. Gerber was appealing to the College Area community for help. Kuhlman explained that the board had no authority in this regard, and asked Mr. Gerber to speak to Roberto Torres, District 9 representative for the College Area, who was present at the meeting.
 - 2. John Hartley from the Neighborhood for Fair Elections spoke about the potential power of San Diego neighborhoods to influence public elections through public funding of elections. He advocated for "clean elections" for San Diego residents with a commitment to improving neighborhoods. The goal of public funding of elections is to counter the lobbyist and big city developers who often have deeper pockets and more political clout to influence decisions about

neighborhood expansion/improvements, but not always with the best interest of the community residents at heart. Mr. Hartley also requested 10-15 minutes in a future CACC meeting to demonstrate how fair elections work.

- i) Dedicated turn light signals for Montezuma and Catoctin
- ii) sidewalks on the south side of Montezuma from just past Collwood to 54th street
- iii) Street lights on Montezuma from 55th to Collwood
- iv) Additional street lights on Reservoir Drive from Montezuma to Alvarado
- c) There will be a second public hearing at the July 12 meeting, with an opportunity for the public to suggest other needed capital improvements in the College Area, after which the board will vote on the highest priority projects to be submitted to the City.
