his brochure highlights the City of San Diego's 21st annual report on the status of the Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP) Subarea Plan. The report is produced in accordance with Section 5.9.1 of the MSCP Plan and Section 14.2 of the City's MSCP Implementing Agreement.

In addition to tracking habitat gain and losses, the MSCP Annual Report includes Multi-Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) preserve management and monitoring, restoration projects conducted within MHPA lands and preparation of Natural Resource Management Plans.

This year the **City celebrates** the first data reporting year for the Vernal Pool Habitat Conservation Plan (VPHCP); which provides coverage for seven species and will add 275 acres to the existing MHPA.

Marron Valley was conserved as Phase One of the Bank Agreement with 2,600 acres placed in a conservation easement and 1,000 mitigation

- Upon adoption of the VPHCP in 2018, the City's MHPA acreage was expanded to include an additional **275 acres** supporting vernal pool habitats.
- The City of San Diego's MSCP Implementing Agreement requires conservation of 52,012 acres within the (MHPA). With adoption of Brush Management Regulations in 2005, the City's conservation obligation was increased by 715 acres. Therefore, the City of San Diego is obligated to conserve 52,717 acres by 2023.
