Welcome, Agenda Review

- The Promise Zone is looking for new Research and Grants and Communications VISTA Associates. For further information <u>click here.</u>
- **South Bay Community Services** is currently enrolling youth into its workforce development program. Click <u>here</u> for more details.
- **Second Chance**'s program <u>STRIVE</u> began enrollment on January 3rd. The program provides four weeks of job readiness training to court-involved youth between the ages of 18 24. To enroll, participants must reside within the city of San Diego.

Review Working Group Priorities and Activities for 2022

- Co-Chairs discussed with the group what the focus on increasing educational opportunities should be amid the planning for the job fair.
 - A Partner stated the importance of youth-centered education, as youth need spaces to explore and develop skills for the future. The Partner cited examples of student suggestions, such as opportunities for entrepreneurship training and project-based learning. Other Partners agreed that student voices should be brought to the forefront to inform school curricula.
 - Staff asked how we can infuse a student-led vision throughout this working group.
 Suggested implementation strategies included: hosting student-led and student planned events, creating a youth subcommittee, or appointing student representatives to participate in working group meetings.
- A Partner suggested that we recruit student ambassadors to become involved in planning for the upcoming job fair. The Mayor's Office will facilitate an introduction to the chair of the Youth Commission, as the City is working to have more intergenerational policy conversations with the Youth Commission.



- A Partner also pointed out the importance of reaching out to the most vulnerable populations of youth who may not actively pursue civic engagement opportunities despite their interest.
- Another Partner pointed out the importance of maintaining a live year-round job board to share employment opportunities available within the Promise Zone.

Spring Career Expo Planning Progress Update

- A live employer registration link for the job fair was shared and will be reviewed and finalized by the Promise Zone team. It will be shared with vendors within the next couple of weeks. Employer registration will have a soft deadline of one week before the job fair.
- The group settled on 30 employers and at least 100 attendees as ideal numbers for attendance after the shifting the job fair to a virtual setting.
- The structure of the job fair will simulate a traditional, informal job fair. Rather than presentations, job seekers will speak with employers briefly, and network in breakout rooms that rotate every 20 minutes.
- Partners discussed which time of day would be optimal to hold the virtual job fair for students, accounting for their school schedule.
 - There was a consensus that we should have students attend the job fair during class-time with teachers present, as contacting students through their school may be more effective than contacting students directly.
 - Another Partner suggested holding two sessions: one from 10:00am 11:30am for school groups, and another from 11:30am - 1:00pm for non-school affiliated youth.
 - The Co-Chairs asked partners with connections to local schools and at-risk youth to contact them regarding the job fair to increase engagement.
- A Partner encouraged advertising public service opportunities and the exciting opportunities available for youth at the Mayor's Office.
- Staff asked Partners to reach out to youth and ask about the services they would like to see aside from the types of services that are traditionally provided. Please contact Robin Graham of SBCS at rgraham@csbcs.org or Promise Zone staff with relevant findings.
- Leslie McNabb from The City of San Diego's Department of Human Resources Department will reach out to an intern who does coaching to host a workshop.
