Equitable Coastal Access & Active Transportation Advocacy

Randy Torres-Van Vleck, City Heights CDC

- Co-chair introduced Randy Torres-Van Vleck, the Director of Policy & Planning at <u>City Heights Community Development Corporation</u>, to share its equitable coastal access project as well as its history of advocating for transportation and urban planning.
- The mission of City Heights CDC is to enhance the quality of life in City Heights by working with the community to create and sustain affordable housing, livable neighborhoods, and economic self-sufficiency.
- City Heights CDC, founded in 1981, has multiple programs which include <u>Affordable Housing</u>, <u>Resident Services</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, and <u>Transportation & Planning</u>.
- The focus of the Transportation and Planning program is to popularize planning and to facilitate the implementation of policy systems and environmental change to achieve livable neighborhoods.
- Freeways have historically been used to displace and destabilize communities of color and low-income communities across the country. In San Diego, this was seen with the I-5, Coronado Bridge built over Barrio Logan, I-805 through City Heights, CA-94 through Golden Hill, and more.
- In the 1960s, <u>SR-252</u> was proposed to be built in Barrio Logan which would connect I-5 and I-805. However, this plan was nixed due to community organization and push back.
- City Heights CDC fought for Teralta Park, the first freeway cover park in California, as well as the Centerline transit stations to be included in the construction of the SR-15 corridor
- City Heights CDC also worked to get <u>AB 805</u> approved in order to shift the voting power in SANDAG. Now the City can call for a weighted vote based on the population of each city in San Diego County.
- City Heights CDC hosts events like the Silver Strand 4 All Campaign, Boulevard to Beach community rides, Transit and Tacos, and more to tie into policy systems and environmental change in order to raise the profile of changes that our community needs.

New Garden & Education Project in Logan Heights

Lauren Welch, Urban Corps of San Diego County

- Lauren Welch shared Urban Corps and CoPlace's involvement in San Diego Foundation and Environmental Health Coalition's grant application to the Transformative Climate Communities (TCC) grant program for the workforce plan requirement. For more information on what is included in the TCC grant application, see the fact sheet.
- Urban Corps is looking for youth to complete this <u>workforce needs survey</u> in order to gather information on work experience to assist in the creation of its workforce development program.
- Urban Corps is working with CoPlace to develop a community garden on 30th and Commercial Street in Logan Heights at a former brownfield site.
- This garden will have 30+ raised beds, as well as aquaponic gardening, a greenhouse, and composting area. This project's curriculum will include training on garden planning,



- soil health, composting, economics, plant propagation, irrigation, and lead to job placement.
- Urban Corps and CoPlace are hoping to connect with community-based organizations
 for potential job placement options as well as on other ways organizations can support

The TCC funding is meant to build resiliency against climate change in communities most vulnerable to its impacts.
