SUBJECT: 2022 Environment Committee Year-End Report

The 2022 Environment Committee Work Plan was presented at the February 2, 2022 committee meeting. The development of the Work Plan began with the request for Committee Member priorities on December 23, 2021 and the simultaneous release of a public input survey. The Committee Members issued their priority memoranda on January 4, 2022 and these were docketed and discussed at the January 20, 2022 Committee meeting. The public survey was available through February 4, 2022 and received a total of 339 responses. A summary of the survey results was published with the work plan.

The resulting work plan established the following core principles and foundational goals for the committee:

#### **Core Principles**

- Adopt and advance ambitious climate goals
- Lead with equity
- Acknowledge past harm and need for environmental justice
- Ensure transparency and promote inclusion
- Ensure high quality job standards while expanding a skilled and trained workforce for a green economy
- Partner with government agencies and community organizations to improve strategies and leverage resources

#### **Foundational Goals**

To be achieved in line with the Committee's core principles

- Update and implement the City's Climate Action Plan.
- Implement the City's Climate Resilient SD Plan
- Ensure a sustainable San Diego for future generations

The committee member and public input on the work plan shaped the Environment Committee's Priority Issues for 2022. The progress and action on these items are tracked below.
