History of the Project

The City of San Diego Planning Department circulated an NOP for the De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan from June 11, 2018 to July 11, 2018. The proposed land use plan described in the 2018 NOP included guest housing, regional parkland, natural recreation, expanded marshland/habitat, upland/developed areas, coastal landscape, potential lease areas, boat rental/water areas, a water lease, athletic fields and tennis courts, open beach, the Mission Bay Golf Course, a ranger station, water quality design features, and a multi-use path and pedestrian access.

Based on the feedback heard on the plan since the original NOP was released in 2018, the modified project – De Anza Natural – envisions a balanced land use plan that serves the local and regional recreation needs of the public while preserving the natural resources of the De Anza Cove area. De Anza Natural includes expanded wetlands which will help restore and enhance the existing natural wetland habitat while providing a nature-based solution to protect the City against the risks of climate change, in line with its Climate Resilient SD Plan. The expanded wetland area will include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; ovster beds; and open water. The diversity of wetland habitat types will increase biodiversity, provide increased opportunities for recreational enjoyment and education, as well as future research opportunities into the carbon sequestration potential of wetlands and increased climate resiliency. De Anza Natural will enhance the existing regional parkland through new facilities that will allow for a variety of recreational uses as well as low-cost visitor accommodations that will be accessible to all visitors of Mission Bay Park. De Anza Natural will also recognize the history and ancestral homelands of the Iipay-Tipay Kumeyaay people, providing opportunities to partner and collaborate on the planning and restoration of the area. This NOP is for a draft PEIR that will evaluate the modified project – De Anza Natural.

Project Area

The proposed project area is in the northeast corner of Mission Bay Park in the City of San Diego; see Figure 1, Regional Location Map and Figure 2, Vicinity Map. The proposed project area includes existing land uses including the Kendall–Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve (Preserve), guest housing, athletic fields and tennis courts, a golf course, regional parkland, and the De Anza Cove Area, which is identified as the De Anza Special Study Area in the Mission Bay Park Master Plan (Master Plan).

The Preserve is bordered on the west and north by residential development and roadways, on the east by existing guest housing, and on the south by Mission Bay. The Preserve consists mostly of vegetated wetland. The guest housing is located on City-owned land currently leased and operated privately and consists of recreational vehicle (RV) and tent camping areas. The De Anza Cove Area is located directly to the east of the guest housing and Rose Creek, and south of North Mission Bay Drive. The De Anza Cove Area consists of a vacant mobile home park and supporting infrastructure (e.g., roads, utilities, parking lots, driveways), an existing campground of approximately 200 RV sites, Mission Bay Regional Park, and a public beach and parking area. North Mission Bay Drive bisects the De Anza Cove Area and recreational areas to the north. The current recreational areas include the tennis club, athletic fields, and golf course.

Project Components

The Master Plan recommends that the revitalization of De Anza Cove should serve regional recreation needs, including guest housing (recreational vehicles and other low cost camping facilities); contribute to the park's water quality, including creating additional wetlands; facilitate hydrologic improvements to safeguard the viability of marsh areas; provide a waterfront trail, viewing areas, and other passive recreational features to enhance public use of the area; and ensure leaseholds support the Mission Bay recreation use. The proposed project seeks to implement the recommendations of the Master Plan, and the proposed land uses are summarized below.

<u>Climate Resiliency</u>

De Anza Natural would also include updates to the Master Plan to ensure consistency with the Climate Resilient SD Plan, and to plan for sea level rise, emphasizing nature-based solutions to

climate change.

Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve

The proposed project would expand the existing Preserve to the east where guest housing currently exists and would replace the existing guest housing area with expanded marshland/habitat area as recommended in the adopted Master Plan; see Figure 3, Site Plan. The existing University of California San Diego (UCSD) Bio Research Field Station facility would remain, and the proposed project would allow a future environmental education and nature interpretation facility along Pacific Beach Drive within the Preserve.

<u> De Anza Cove Area – North</u>

The northern and eastern portions of the proposed project area, which currently contain active recreational facilities, would continue to allow for these types of active recreational uses, which could include tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, soccer, and/or golf facilities. Specific active recreation uses at this site would be determined during future site planning efforts as part of a General Development Plan through a public process.

The proposed active recreation and aquatics facilities would be in the north section of the De Anza Cove Area, well-buffered from habitat. It is anticipated that the active recreation area would be home to existing uses, and a new potential use could include a City aquatics facility. Aquatics facilities typically include a 25-meter pool, outdoor decks, shade trellises, changing facilities/locker rooms, storage and vehicular areas and possibly a children's pool. Surface parking and access drives would serve both the Regional Parkland and Active Recreation areas. The specific recreation elements would be the subject of a future General Development Plan process.

<u>De Anza Cove Area - South</u>

The De Anza Cove Area is located south of North Mission Bay Drive and east of the Rose Creek Channel. The land uses proposed within this area include low-cost visitor accommodations, regional parkland, wetland/marshland, upland areas, a potential non-motorized boat lease, and open beach and water quality features, which are further described below. See Figure 3, Site Plan.

Low-Cost Visitor Accommodations

The proposed project would replace the existing RV campground and vacant De Anza Mobile Home Park with new low-cost guest housing. The low-cost guest housing would allow for up to approximately 600 camping sites for RVs, cabins or other eco-friendly accommodations and associated open space and facilities consistent with camping accommodations. Campingoriented ancillary facilities and amenities, such as food services/concessions, would also be provided on site. The lease area would include open beach and vegetated buffers at its periphery, in accordance with water quality Best Management Practices (BMPs) and the Master Plan. The guest housing leasehold would include public access to the multi-use bike/path.

Regional Parkland and Open Beach

The existing regional parkland area would be enhanced by new recreational amenities and opportunities. A supervised swimming beach area would be located at the open beach on the north shore north of De Anza Cove. The swimming area would be protected by buffers/safety measures that would separate the swimmers from the boat users. A non-motorized boat rental facility/dock potential lease would be publicly accessible from the regional parkland (east) side and from the guest housing (west) side. In the upper part of the area, recreational amenities would include a passive, open green area, and program elements such as sand volleyball, seating/picnicking areas, an "adventure play" area, and environmental education displays/kiosk along multi-use pathways. The regional parkland areas would also provide a natural setting for compatible bicycling, hiking, and passive recreational uses. A portion of the regional parkland

area along Pacific Beach Drive could serve as a nature-based ranger station or other interpretive area. Vegetation adjacent to upland and marsh habitats would buffer those habitats and the Preserve through the use of landform (berms) and native plantings. Surface parking would be provided for the regional parkland and open beach areas.

Wetlands

The proposed project would expand the existing wetland habitat to include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; oyster beds; and open water. The new marshes would be located along the edges of and at the outfall of Rose Creek and would be located to accept existing storm drain water outfalls on the east side of De Anza Cove. Storm drain outfalls could also be located along Rose Creek to direct stormwaters to the marshlands, potentially improving the water quality. It is anticipated that natural and nature-based erosion control measures would be incorporated for controlling sediments and creating habitat niches. Design features such as oyster reef creation could serve as barriers to storms and tides, preventing erosion and protecting productive estuary waters. The expanded wetland habitat would create a natural interface with the De Anza Cove and nearby park areas in the proposed project area and would enhance water quality in Rose Creek and Mission Bay.

Uplands and Buffers

The upland areas would include a multi-use path with educational signage and, in some instances, mounded landforms. The mounded landforms would feature native coastal sage, dune and other native plants that would be seen and experienced from the waterfront multi-use path. This area would also include passive recreation amenities such as overlooks, pathways, picnic areas, and interpretive signs, which would complement the natural setting of the guest housing and the expanded beach areas on the cove. The upland plantings would serve as a buffer to the wetland habitats.

Water Quality Design Features

Water quality design features are proposed along the eastern edge of the proposed active recreation area, along the west side of West Mission Bay Drive. The proposed water quality zone would capture and treat storm water before flowing into Mission Bay. Additional water quality basins would be located to treat the entire proposed project area in accordance with local and state requirements. Additional water quality enhancing features would include vegetated areas bordering development areas to further reduce storm water contamination, including debris and sediment, from reaching Mission Bay. In addition to water quality detention basins, the proposed project would incorporate site-specific BMPs to enhance water quality and would incorporate storm drainage signage. As a further water quality-enhancing feature, the edges and outfall zones of Rose Creek would be revegetated with marshes, and the east side of De Anza Cove is proposed to be revegetated with marsh, wetland, and upland native plants.

Surface Parking

Surface parking areas would be located in conjunction with the athletic areas and within the footprint of the guest housing area. Additionally, surface parking lots accessible from North Mission Bay Drive and De Anza Road would serve the proposed recreation and aquatics areas and the regional parkland areas at De Anza Cove.

Circulation and Access

Vehicular Access

A new northern extension of De Anza Road would yield two vehicular access points for regional parkland and the south access to the active recreation area. Two additional vehicular access points are planned along a reconfigured western terminus of North Mission Bay Drive; at the terminus of North Mission Bay Drive, a south-bound driveway would provide vehicular access to the guest housing area's north entrance and a north-bound driveway would provide access to the

regional parkland. From the end of the terminus of North Mission Bay Drive, the multi-use/bike pathway would continue westward to connect with the Mike Gotch Memorial Bridge and the Rose Creek Bikeway. Athletic Fields Driveway, located on the southern leg of the Grand Avenue and Bond Street intersection and the northern point of entry for vehicles, would continue to provide direct access to De Anza Cove. This intersection is currently unsignalized but is planned to be signalized and reconfigured as part of the project to improve access. Three existing parking lots on North Mission Bay Drive east of De Anza Road, as well as De Anza Road, would provide access to the guest housing lease area, the open beach area, and regional parkland areas.

Vehicular access to the proposed project site would be provided by eight vehicular access points. Four of the vehicular access points are currently in operation. As part of redevelopment of the southern portion of the project site, the existing De Anza Cove recreational area/Mission Bay RV Resort driveway would be removed. The driveways that exist on the De Anza "boot" and within existing guest housing area would be removed. The existing parking lots/drives at the Mission Bay Golf course and the San Diego Mission Bay Boat and Ski Club would be removed.

Watercraft Access

Watercraft access is currently provided immediately east of the project area at the De Anza Boat Launch. In De Anza Cove, a small non-motorized boat lease area is proposed. The existing boat ramp in De Anza Cove would be removed, and nonmotorized personal watercraft would have access in De Anza Cove from the new potential boat lease, while motorized boats would have access to De Anza Cove near the boat ramp east of the project area.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Circulation and Access

Pedestrians and bicyclists can access the proposed project area via the Rose Creek Trail from the north. In addition, bicycles and pedestrians can use the Mike Gotch Memorial Bridge over Rose Creek and traverse the proposed project area completely in the east-west direction. The proposed waterfront trail would run along the perimeter of the proposed project area at De Anza Cove and would increase bike and pedestrian access throughout the park. On the east side of Rose Creek, an existing pedestrian pathway would be enhanced to allow for pedestrian and bicycle circulation and access. Due to school district fencing and perimeter control, there is no pedestrian or bicycle access to and from Mission Bay High School. Fencing also prevents access to the reserve.

An enhanced pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would be located within the "100-foot buffer/public use zone" along the east side of Rose Creek frontage, with the tennis courts and ball fields located east of the creek by other land uses and buffers. A proposed pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would enhance connectivity to the adjacent community, the Balboa Avenue Trolley Station, and to the greater Mission Bay Park. The pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would parallel the perimeter of the low-cost visitor accommodation area, offering viewing areas and overlooks of Rose Creek, the adjacent proposed/expanded habitat area and Mission Bay. The waterfront trail would connect the guest housing area with the regional park facilities, boat rental facilities and other neighborhoods east and west of De Anza, as well other parks uses to the south. In addition, water quality features would be located along the waterfront trail.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) is writing in response to the City of San Diego's (City) Notice of Preparation (NOP) of a *Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) for the De Anza Natural (Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan)* (Amendment). The Service provided comments to the City concerning the Amendment or other similar projects in the same area with different names (i.e., De Anza Revitalization Plan; De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan) in letters dated December 7, 2016, August 10, 2017, and July 11, 2018.

The mission of the Service is working with others to conserve, protect, and enhance fish, wildlife, plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people. Consistent with our mission, we have been working with partners to improve conditions for habitat, wildlife, and the human community in northeast Mission Bay. Within the project area, we provided funding and technical assistance to San Diego Audubon for the ReWild Mission Bay Project (ReWild) and to San Diego Earth Works and University of California Reserve System for their Transition Zone Habitat Restoration Project at the Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve. The Service also has legal responsibility for the welfare of migratory birds, anadromous fish, and threatened and endangered animals and plants occurring in the United States, and is responsible for administering the Federal Endangered Species Act of 1973 (Act), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*) Our comments are based on our assistance to partners, our knowledge of sensitive and declining vegetation communities in Mission Bay, and the City's *Mission Bay Park Master Plan Update* (Adopted August 2, 1994. Amended July 9, 2002; Master Plan).

The Amendment area is at the northeast corner of Mission Bay Park in the City. Land uses in the Amendment area include Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve (Preserve), guest housing, athletic fields and tennis courts, and the De Anza Cove Area, which includes the De Anza Special Study Area identified in the Master Plan. The Preserve consists mostly of

saltmarsh wetland in the far west corner of the Amendment area and is bordered on the west and north by residential development and roadways, on the east by existing guest housing, and on the south by Mission Bay. The guest housing (Campland by the Bay) is between the Preserve and Rose Creek and is on City-owned land currently leased to a private resort operation for recreational vehicle (RV) and tent camping. The De Anza Cove Area is located east of Rose Creek, and south of North Mission Bay Drive. The De Anza Cove Area consists of a vacant mobile home park and supporting infrastructure (e.g., roads, utilities, parking lots, and driveways), an existing campground of approximately 200 RV sites, Mission Bay Regional Parkland, and a public beach and parking area. North Mission Bay Drive bisects the De Anza Cove Area and active recreational areas to the north. Current active recreational areas include the tennis club, athletic fields, and golf course.

The Amendment includes the following components: updates to the Master Plan to ensure consistency with the *Climate Resilient SD* [*San Diego*] *Plan*; restoration of 103.8 acres of wetland and 43.5 acres of upland habitat both west and east of Rose Creek; an education and nature interpretation facility; 45 acres of active recreational facilities (e.g., tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, soccer, golf, aquatics facilities, parking) east of Rose Creek and north of North Mission Bay Drive; a 50.1 acre leased campground on De Anza Point both east of Rose Creek and south of North Mission Bay Drive consisting of 600 camping sites for RV's, cabins, or eco-friendly accommodations and associated amenities such as food services/concessions, a beach, and portions of the public multi-use bike path; 46.5 acres of Regional Parkland east of Rose Creek, sand volleyball, seating/picnicking, "adventure play," and the public multi-bike path; wetlands and uplands along Rose Creek and within and adjacent to existing open water areas in De Anza Cove and southwest of De Anza Point; water quality BMPs; and vehicular, bicycle and pedestrian access routes and parking lots accessible from North Mission Bay Drive and De Anza Road.

The Service appreciates, consistent with our previous recommendations, that the Amendment includes restoration of a combination of wetland and upland habitat within existing developed area west of Rose Creek (i.e., Campland by the Bay) and the southeast end of De Anza Point, contiguous with existing habitat at the Preserve and Rose Creek, and within De Anza Cove. The habitat restoration in the Amendment area, along with the wetland restoration now proposed on north Fiesta Island, will help achieve the goals of the Master Plan.

Our major concerns on the Amendment include: (1) clarifying the proposed modifications to the Master Plan and describing the process for subsequent public review for projects that will tier off of the PEIR; (2) the need for details concerning location and acreages of Amendment components; (3) inconsistency with the Master Plan for the distribution of proposed habitat and guest housing on De Anza Point; (4) inclusion of additional alternatives to maximize restoration of habitat, sustainability of wetlands as sea level rises, carbon sequestration, and improvements to water quality consistent with the California Regional Water Quality Control Board (CRWQCB) and City of San Diego Supplemental Environmental Project per the Settlement Agreement and Stipulation for Entry of Administrative Civil Liability Order No. R9-2020-0150 (SEP) and ReWild; (5) planning and implementation of restoration of habitats before or concurrent with new development; (6) specific recommendations for Amendment design elements to enhance

habitat and improve water quality; (7) potential impacts to federally and state listed, sensitive or migratory bird species and their habitats; and (8) how future uses and activities in Mission Bay may impact proposed wetland restoration in the Amendment area and on Fiesta Island.

The NOP indicates that the Amendment seeks to implement recommendations from the Master Plan while at the same time amending the Master Plan. However, the NOP does not identify how the Master Plan will be amended. We are also concerned that the Amendment could reduce or eliminate existing Master Plan recommendations to restore habitats and improve water quality. Therefore, the PEIR should identify the full scope of the proposed amendments to the Master Plan and provide a table comparing the differences between the existing Master Plan and the Amendment. We recommend the PEIR also include tables and figures specifying the acreage and distribution of different habitat types (i.e., open water, mudflats, low-elevation salt marsh (cordgrass), mid- and high-elevation salt marsh, wetland-upland ecotone, dunes, coastal sage scrub, and maritime succulent scrub), hardened shorelines, impervious surfaces for camping, RV camping areas, tent camping areas, camp amenities, parking, and circulation elements. Because the narrative and Figure 3 in the NOP define wetlands to include open water to high elevation vegetated marsh, it is unclear whether the areas identified as wetlands (south of Campland by the Bay, adjacent to Rose Creek, and within De Anza Cove) in all but existing filled and developed lands (i.e., Campland by the Bay and De Anza Point) will be restored to vegetated wetlands or will remain open water and mudflat as they are today. If the latter, we are concerned that the Amendment will not meet the wetland restoration goals in the Master Plan and that a predominance of subtidal open water and mudflat habitat will not be sustainable with sea level rise. If sufficient information is not provided in the PEIR, additional environmental review would be needed when project level planning is conducted, and the Amendment should describe the process for subsequent review of projects that tier off of the PEIR.

The NOP identifies only one alternative (i.e., De Anza Natural). However, the 103.8 acres of wetland and 43.5 acres of upland habitat restoration proposed by the De Anza Natural alternative does not appear adequate to meet the City's goal of 80 new acres of wetlands at the mouth of Rose Creek resilient to sea level rise identified in both the Master Plan (Master Plan, p. 21) and SEP. The City's Our Climate Our Future Climate Resilience San Diego website states "By 2100, San Diego could experience another 3.6 to 10.2 feet of sea level rise. Sea level rise will mean more flooding and faster rates of erosion along the coastline." This is further documented using the website's link to U.S. Geological Survey's Our Coast Our Future Hazard Map, which shows the existing wetlands and areas proposed for wetland restoration flooded with just 6.5 feet of sea level rise, thus existing and restored intertidal wetlands will be lost with sea level rise through conversion to subtidal habitat. The PEIR should include a thorough analysis of the potential effects of sea level rise on the existing and proposed habitats areas for the project area and all of Mission Bay and the effects of human measures to address sea level rise. The PEIR should include tables and figures documenting the distribution and acreage of different habitat types (open water, mudflats, low-elevation salt marsh (cordgrass), mid- and high-elevation salt marsh, wetland-upland ecotone, dunes, coastal sage scrub and maritime succulent scrub) at the start of the project and with projected sea-level-rise in years 2050, 2075, and 2100. We recommend that this analysis build off preliminary analysis by ReWild which indicates that the distribution of existing wetlands will decline significantly with sea level rise and that there will be little to no

wetlands in northeast Mission Bay by 2100 unless new wetlands are created. Per the SEP, the PEIR must analyze an alternative that retains at least "80 acres of additional functional wetlands (low-mid-high wetland/salt marsh and mudflats), in addition to the Kendall-Frost Marsh/Northern Wildlife Preserve, at the Year 2100." Based on this criteria, the analyzed alternative should sustain 168.2 acres of wetlands in 2100 (i.e., sum of the 80 new acres with the 88.2 acres of wetlands that the NOP identified at the Kendall-Frost Marsh/Northern Wildlife Reserve).

The De Anza Natural alternative also includes RV camping down the entire peninsula and heel of the 'foot' of De Anza Point, which appears inconsistent with the Master Plan. In contrast, the Master Plan only designates RV camping north of and off the peninsula of De Anza Point (see Figure 15 of the Master Plan), and expansion of an upland habitat preserve on De Anza Point (Master Plan, p. 83). The Master Plan's designation of Habitat Oriented Recreation/Preservation on the entire foot of De Anza Point (see Figure 1 of the Master Plan) requires wetland and upland habitats serving passive activities, such as trails for hiking or jogging, or wetland areas for rowing and canoeing (Master Plan, p. 33). RV camping on the peninsula and foot of De Anza Point would also include impervious surfaces, trash, gas and oil that could pollute Mission Bay. This is inconsistent with Master Plan's statement that "The SSA [Special Study Area; De Anza Point] shall not be developed to the detriment of existing and/or future adjacent habitat areas. Foremost in consideration should be the extent to which the SSA can contribute to the Park's water quality. In fact, additional wetlands creation must be considered as part of the SAA" (Master Plan, p. 53). We do not agree with the Amendment removing or dismissing these aspects of the Master Plan.

We recommend that all Amendment alternatives include restoration of habitat across the peninsula and entire 'foot' of De Anza Point consistent with the Master Plan to create contiguous habitat that will provide improvements to water quality and increase carbon sequestration. Habitat preservation and restoration should include large contiguous areas to offset their historic loss and current underrepresentation compared to recreation and commercial development in Mission Bay. Water quality currently is problematic at De Anza Cove (Master Plan, Appendix B-3) and maximizing restoration of wetlands would work towards improving water quality. Wetlands across the De Anza peninsula would increase the interface of fluvial flows with wetlands and thus improve water quality. Maximizing wetlands will meet the public's desire for better water quality benefits, which the public rates as the key issue facing the future of Mission Bay (Master Plan, p. 81), and address the statement in the Master Plan that, "Mission Bay Park's success or failure hinges on clean water" and all measures that can "improve the vitality and health of the Bay waters should be explored and implemented as a priority" (Master Plan, p. 84). Salt marshes are very effective at sequestering carbon that would otherwise contribute to climate change. Maximizing wetland restoration also will help the City meet the *draft City of San Diego Climate* Action Plan, Our Climate, Our Future targets of 347 acres of salt marsh restoration by 2030 and 693 acres of salt marsh by 2035 for carbon sequestration.

In light of the deficiencies in the De Anza Natural alternative, as stated in our previous letters, we recommend that the PEIR include and analyze additional alternatives developed by ReWild that maximize habitat restoration in conformance with the objectives of the Master Plan and SEP. Inclusion and analysis of an additional alternative that maximizes habitat restoration is

required by the SEP. The City's application to the CRWQCB for the SEP states that the "expanded restoration alternative would increase the acres of wetlands and associated transitional zones and uplands to be created and restored in Northeastern Mission Bay, converting the southern portion of the De Anza 'boot' and the De Anza Bay to wetlands. The expanded wetland alternative would maximize implementable wetland restoration reflective of existing feasibility studies for Mission Bay and will provide diverse beneficial uses. This alternative would result in the establishment of 80 acres of additional functional wetlands (low-mid-high wetland/salt marsh and mudflats), in addition to the Kendall-Frost Marsh/Northern Wildlife Preserve, at the Year 2100" (City of San Diego, California Regional Water Quality Control Board San Diego Region Revised Project Application Form for Northeast Mission Bay Wetlands Restoration, dated June 25, 2020). The PEIR should fully analyze an alternative that meets these criteria.

ReWild is comprehensively planning for habitat restoration in northeast Mission Bay, and ReWild alternatives reflect input from a Scientific and Technical Advisory Committee consisting of scientists, regulators, and City resource planners and managers, as well as the public. All of the ReWild alternatives would restore more wetlands that the De Anza Natural alternative and are feasible as required by the SEP. Therefore, using the ReWild alternatives will assist the City in realizing the Master Plan and SEP objectives in Mission Bay in a cost-effective, non-duplicative manner. Specifically, the PEIR should analyze the ReWild's Wildest Alternative as part of the PEIR because it proposes the most wetlands and will retain the most acreage of wetlands with sea-level-rise. The PEIR also should analyze ReWild's Wilder Alternative because it represents the minimum distribution of habitat designated by the Master Plan. ReWild's Wilder Alternative puts wetlands onto the entire 'foot' of De Anza Point where the Master Plan designates Habitat Oriented Recreation/Preservation (shown in Figure 1 of the Master Plan). In addition, ReWild is likely the referenced feasibility study in the SEP because it is the only one that exists.

The phasing and timing for planning and implementing each project components (and associated elements) in relation to each other should be clearly documented in the PEIR. There is an ecological, economic, and habitat-based public access benefit to coupling habitat restoration with other project components. If the planning and implementation of restoration is not done ahead or concurrent with other project components, the potential for reducing restoration costs associated with removing infrastructure/asphalt and balancing cut and fill on site will be limited. Therefore, we recommend that planning and implementing habitat restoration be done before or concurrent with other project components (e.g., active recreation). Such prioritization of habitat restoration as a part of the project will, consistent with the Master Plan, demonstrate the City's "decisive commitment to environmental health" (Master Plan, p. 3) and efforts towards "a balanced provision of public recreation, the sustainable management of environmental resources, and the operation of economically successful commercial leisure enterprises" in all of Mission Bay (Master Plan, p. 2).

Overall, we recommend that the Amendment prioritize the preservation and health of the natural environment and select the ReWild Wildest alternative as the preferred alternative in the PEIR.

We offer the following specific recommendations for the Amendment components consistent with the ReWild Wildest alternative:

- Eliminate or minimize sources of pollution (Master Plan, p 84) by reducing non 1. waterfront-dependent uses that negatively affect water quality downstream and locating them away from the interface with Mission Bay waters. Mission Bay is already surrounded by parking lots and large areas of active lawn, which produce fertilizer laden run-off that contribute to the poor water quality of Mission Bay. Amenities (e.g., concessions, dump stations, hook ups) for camping and RVs should be set back as far as possible from Mission Bay and habitat to minimize associated trash and pollutants from entering the bay and artificial night lighting, noise, and attraction of pests that can negatively affect wildlife (e.g., rats, crows, and gulls) from entering habitats. Only non-RV elements or camping restricted to tents or eco-friendly accommodations with earth and native vegetation ground cover should be located within the SSA to minimize edge effects associated with impervious surfaces and lights. The PEIR should include details concerning the location, design, ground cover, and lighting associated with each element of camping (i.e., recreational vehicles (RV), cabins, eco-friendly accommodations, camping facilities, and open space).
- 2. Establishment of native habitat across the peninsula of De Anza Point to establish contiguous habitat both east and west of Rose Creek. One option for this would be to swap the camping within the SSA in the De Anza Natural Alternative with some of the Regional Parkland. The Regional Parkland on the peninsula of De Anza Point could be designated Habitat Oriented Recreation/Preservation consisting of native habitat and passive recreation and be designed such that wetlands can migrate to this area with sea level rise. Wetland restoration is water dependent and this is the best location for wetland restoration in Mission Bay because it receives fluvial flows and is close to other existing and to-be-restored wetlands. We can support trails and overlooks in this area if we have the opportunity to review and provide input on the design.
- 3. Modify the distribution of the proposed uplands west of Rose Creek to facilitate freshwater flows from Rose Creek to the Kendal-Frost Marsh Reserve. The proposed southern peninsula or spit associated with the proposed upland would effectively block freshwater flows from Rose Creek to the Preserve and should be reduced.
- 4. Minimize access within all existing and restored habitats west of Rose Creek to minimize human disturbance to wildlife. The Potential Nature Interpretive Area should be relocated east of Rose Creek.
- 5. Removal of fill to create wetlands west and east of Rose Creek could be reused to fill relatively deeper subtidal areas, such as in De Anza Cove, to create intertidal habitat (e.g., mudflats, coastal salt marsh). Such beneficial reuse of fill material within the project area also will reduce project costs associated with a net export of fill.

- 6. Minimal active restoration within existing vegetated wetlands, salt panne, and mudflats. Acceptable restoration activities within existing habitat may include reestablishment of a fluvial connection or creeks from Rose Creek to the Preserve.
- 7. Remove the proposed channel across the De Anza Point from any alternative that retains camping on most of De Anza Point because it appears to have no utility and we anticipate it would require fortification and maintenance. Channel cuts could result in high water flows that are erosive to the landforms and necessitate artificial shoreline hardening. Erosion has been problematic at the Huntington Beach Wetlands within Talbot Marsh where similar land formations (i.e., islands that create narrow channels within an embayment) were constructed as part of a habitat restoration project. ReWild found that a channel across the peninsula of De Anza Point does not improve water quality in De Anza Cove. Preliminary analysis by ReWild indicates that creating shallower depths and intertidal habitats would be the most effective way to improve water quality in De Anza Cove by eliminating the persistent stratified water column with reduced oxygen at deeper depths and in the underlying sediment.
- 8. Restrict motorized boats from De Anza Cove. We appreciate that the proposed lease is non-motorized. However, we are concerned that as stated in the NOP motorized boats would have access to De Anza Cove near the boat ramp east of the project area. Motorized boats can pollute water and disturb wildlife and should be restricted from wetland areas. Further, motorized activity in the bay (e.g., jet skis, motor boats) would likely lead to rapid erosion of the wetlands based on known erosion rates at the Preserve.
- 9. Use a native landscape palette for all landscaping to benefit wildlife and limit the cost of long term irrigation (established native vegetation does not require regular irrigation). The PEIR should identify the plant palette that will be used for each type of element proposed.
- 10. Upland buffers to wetlands should be a minimum of 100 feet wide and adjacent to all wetlands within the Coastal Overlay Zone per the City's Biology Guidelines. The Master Plan specifically calls for expansion of habitat areas for sensitive species and adequate buffers to protect sensitive environmental resources from incompatible land uses (Master Plan, Appendix 1). We recommend that these buffers not include trails or other infrastructure.
- 11. Include storm water or water quality Best Management Practices (BMPs) to minimize water quality impacts from upland uses to existing and proposed marshes. The PEIR should detail the design and distribution of the BMPs.
- 12. All lighted facilities, such as the lighted ball/sports field, should be located away from Rose Creek and/or habitat areas to reduce light pollution.

Amendment activities may impact federally and state listed, sensitive or migratory bird species and/or their habitats in the Preserve and Mission Bay. The federally and state listed endangered light-footed Ridgway's (=clapper) rail [*Rallus obsoletus* (=*longirostris*) *levipes*; Ridgway's rail]

and California least tern [*Sternula antillarum browni* (*Sterna a. b.*); least tern], and the state listed endangered Belding's savannah sparrow (*Passerculus sandwichensis beldingi*), as well as numerous migratory birds, use the Preserve and Mission Bay for nesting, and/or roosting, and foraging. We recommend that surveys be done to determine the number and distribution of listed/sensitive species within the Amendment area. The PEIR should evaluate potential impacts, and identify conservation measures to avoid and minimize impacts, to these species. Potential conservation measures are appended (Appendix) and the Service is available to work with the City to develop conservation measures for Amendment activities. If potential impacts to federally listed species cannot be avoided, we recommend consultation with the Service pursuant section 7 of the Act.

We are concerned how future uses and activities in Mission Bay may impact the proposed wetland restoration in the Amendment area and on Fiesta Island. Therefore, the PEIR should address this concern. For example, the PEIR should analyze the potential impacts of future dredging on the hydrology, erosion, and long-term stability of restored wetlands in the Amendment area and on Fiesta Island.

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APPENDIX

SUGGESTED CONSERVATION MEASURES

General Conservation Measures (CM)

- CM 1. The City will temporarily fence (with silt barriers) the limits of project construction staging areas and access routes and mark (e.g., flag) the limits of dredging/excavation to prevent additional impacts and the spread of silt from the construction zone into adjacent avoided habitats. Fencing/marking will be installed in a manner that does not impact avoided habitats. The City will submit to the Service for approval, at least 2 days prior to initiating project impacts, photographs that show the fenced/marked limits of impact. If work occurs beyond the fenced/marked limits of impact. If work occurs beyond the fenced/marked limits of impact, all work will cease until the problem has been remedied to the satisfaction of the Service. Any riparian/wetland or upland habitat impacts that occur beyond the approved fenced area will be offset as determined by the Service. Temporary construction fencing/marking will be removed upon project completion.
- CM 2. The City will implement the following conditions during project construction:
 - a. Employees will strictly limit their activities, vehicles, equipment, and construction materials to the fenced project footprint.
 - b. To avoid attracting predators, the project site will be kept as clean of debris as possible. All food related trash items will be enclosed in sealed containers and regularly removed from the site.
 - c. Pets of project personnel will not be allowed on the project site.
 - d. Other than fill used to restore habitat, disposal or temporary placement of excess fill, brush, or other debris will not be allowed in waters of the United States or their banks.
 - e. All equipment maintenance, staging, and dispensing of fuel, oil, coolant, or any other such activities will occur in designated areas outside of waters of the United States within the fenced project impact limits. These designated areas will be located in previously compacted and disturbed areas to the maximum extent practicable in such a manner as to prevent any runoff from entering waters of the United States, and will be shown on the construction plans. Fueling of equipment will take place within existing paved areas greater than 100 feet from waters of the United States. Contractor equipment will be checked for leaks prior to operation and repaired as necessary. "No-fueling zones" will be designated on construction plans.
 - f. Impacts from fugitive dust will be avoided and minimized through watering and other appropriate measures.
 - g. No work will occur at night.

California least tern

- CM 3. In-water construction will occur from September 15 to March 31 to avoid the least tern nesting season.
- CM 4. If in-water construction must occur during the least tern nesting season (April 1 to September 15), the City will implement the following measures:
 - a. Beginning April 1, the City will have a least tern biologist to monitor daily for the arrival of least terns into Mission Bay, and immediately notify the Service upon their arrival. The City will coordinate with other least tern monitors in Mission Bay. The City will notify the Service via email on a daily basis as to the presence or absence of least terns in Mission Bay. The least tern biologist will be present throughout the period of in-water construction and will note the presence of least terns in Mission Bay and the work area.
 - b. The City will provide a biological monitor with least tern experience on all days when in-water work is conducted after least terns arrive in Mission Bay. The biological monitor will be present throughout the period of in-water construction and will note the presence of least terns in Mission Bay and the work area, and any project-generated surface turbidity. Surface turbidity is defined as an obvious discoloration of the top 10 feet of the water column visible to the human eye. Project-generated surface turbidity will not exceed 500 feet in length or width, or persist longer than 1 hour.
 - c. In the event surface turbidity exceeds 500 feet in length or width or persists longer than 1 hour), the biological monitor will be empowered to stop project activity to allow the plume to dissipate. The biological monitor will contact the City and Service immediately after construction has been stopped. Construction will not resume until approved by the City and the Service.
 - d. The biological monitor will provide daily field reports to the City and Service within 24 hours of each monitoring date. The daily field reports will include photographs showing the best management practices surrounding the work area taken during in-water work, and any incidences of plume escape or expansion outside of the silt curtain. The biological monitor will also submit a final summary report of monitoring to the City and Service within 30 days of completion of in-water work.

Light-footed Ridgway's Rail

CM 5. All work in or within 500 feet of marsh habitat will occur between September 16 and March 14 to avoid the Ridgway's rail nesting season.

- CM 6. The City will staff a biologist knowledgeable of Ridgway's rail biology and ecology (rail biologist) who will be responsible for overseeing compliance with conservation measures for the Ridgway's rail. The rail biologist will be approved by the Service. The City will submit the biologist's name, address, telephone number, and work schedule on the project to the Service at least 14 days prior to initiating project impacts. The rail biologist will perform the following duties:
 - a. Perform a minimum of three focused pre-construction surveys, on separate days, to determine the presence of Ridgway's rails in the project impact footprint outside the rail breeding season. Surveys will begin a maximum of 7 days prior to performing project construction and one survey will be conducted the day immediately prior to performing project construction. The City will notify the Service at least 7 days prior to project construction to allow the Service to coordinate with the rail biologist on the surveys, and within 24 hours of detecting any Ridgway's rails in the project impact footprint.
 - b. Before each workday begins, check to see if Ridgway's rails have entered the project impact footprint.
 - c. Oversee installation of and inspect the exclusionary fencing required in CM 1 a minimum of once per day to help ensure any breaks in the fence are repaired immediately.
 - d. If any Ridgway's rails are found within the project impact footprint, the rail biologist will direct construction personnel to begin in an area away from the Ridgway's rails. In addition, the rail biologist will walk ahead of clearing/dredging equipment to flush birds towards channel areas to be avoided. It will be the responsibility of the rail biologist to ensure that Ridgway's rails will not be injured or killed by project implementation. The biologist will also record the number and location of Ridgway's rails disturbed by project construction;
 - e. Be on site during work to ensure compliance with all CMs.
 - f. Train all contractors and construction personnel on the biological resources associated with this project and ensure that training is implemented by construction personnel. At a minimum, training will include: (i) the purpose for resource protection; (ii) a description of the Ridgway's rail and its habitat; (iii) the CMs that should be implemented during project construction to avoid and/or minimize impacts to the Ridgway's rail and its habitat, including strictly limiting activities, vehicles, equipment, and construction materials to the project footprint to avoid sensitive resource areas in the field (i.e., access roads, and the construction/staging areas); (iv) environmentally responsible construction practices; and (v) the protocol to resolve conflicts that may arise at any time during the construction process.

- g. Halt work, if necessary, for any project activities that are not in compliance with the CMs. The rail biologist will report any non-compliance issues to the Service within 24 hours of its occurrence and confer with the Service to ensure the proper implementation of Ridgway's rail and habitat protection measures.
- h. Submit weekly compliance reports (including photographs of impact areas) to the Service to show that authorized impacts were not exceeded and general compliance with all CMs. A separate report will be prepared and submitted to the Service immediately if an impact occurs outside of the approved project limits.
- i. Submit a final report to the Service within 60 days of project completion that includes as-built construction drawings with an overlay of areas that were impacted or preserved and other relevant information documenting that authorized impacts were not exceeded and that general compliance with the CMs was achieved.

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) received a notice of preparation (NOP) of a draft program environmental impact report (PEIR) from the City of San Diego (City) for the Project pursuant the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and CEQA Guidelines.¹ CDFW previously submitted comments in response to the De Anza Revitalization Plan in 2016, and the De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan NOP in 2018.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments and recommendations regarding those activities involved in the Project that may affect California fish and wildlife. Likewise, we appreciate the opportunity to provide comments regarding those aspects of the Project that CDFW, by law, may be required to carry out or approve through the exercise of its own regulatory authority under the Fish and Game Code.

CDFW ROLE

CDFW is California's **Trustee Agency** for fish and wildlife resources and holds those resources in trust by statute for all the people of the State. (Fish & G. Code, §§ 711.7, subd. (a) & 1802; Pub. Resources Code, § 21070; CEQA Guidelines § 15386, subd. (a).) CDFW, in its trustee capacity, has jurisdiction over the conservation, protection, and management of fish, wildlife, native plants, and habitat necessary for biologically sustainable populations of those species. (*Id.*, § 1802.) Similarly, for purposes of CEQA, CDFW is charged by law to provide, as available, biological expertise during public agency environmental review efforts, focusing specifically on Projects and related activities that have the potential to adversely affect fish and wildlife resources. CDFW also oversees implementation of the Natural Community Conservation Planning (NCCP) program. The City of San Diego participates in the NCCP program by implementing its approved Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP) Subarea Plan (SAP).

CDFW is also submitting comments as a **Responsible Agency** under CEQA (Pub. Resources Code, § 21069; CEQA Guidelines, § 15381). CDFW expects that it may need to exercise regulatory authority as provided by the Fish and Game Code. As proposed, for example, the Project may be subject to CDFW's lake and streambed alteration regulatory authority. (Fish & G. Code, § 1600 *et seq.*) Likewise, to the extent implementation of the Project as proposed may result in "take" as defined by State law of any species protected under the California Endangered Species Act (CESA) (Fish & G. Code, § 2050 *et seq.*) that is not a covered species under the City's SAP, the Project proponent may seek related take authorization as provided by the Fish and Game Code.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION SUMMARY

Proponent: City of San Diego (City)

Objective: The objective of the Project is to revitalize De Anza Cove in accordance with the Mission Bay Park Master Plan (MBPMP). The MBPMP recommends that the revitalization should serve regional recreation needs, including providing guest housing, contributing to the improvement of the park's water quality, including creating additional wetlands, facilitating hydrological improvements to support marsh areas, providing a waterfront trail, viewing areas, and other recreational features for public use, and ensuring leaseholds support the Mission Bay recreation use. The Project will update the MBPMP to ensure consistency with the Climate Resilient SD Plan and account for sea level rise and climate change.

Key project components are outlined below:

Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve

The Project proposes to expand the existing 88.2 acres of wetland at Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve, through creation of an additional 29.0 acres of wetlands at the former Campland site, as well as an additional 103.8 acres of wetlands around De Anza Cove and along the outfall of Rose Creek.

De Anza Cove Area - North

Existing recreational facilities in the northern and eastern portions of the Project area will remain. The Project proposes an active recreation and aquatics facility in the north section of De Anza Cove, and states that additional opportunities for expanded recreational uses will be analyzed under a General Development Plan in the future.

De Anza Cove Area – South

Land uses proposed in this area include: replacement of the existing RV campground and mobile home park with low-cost visitor accommodations consisting of RV camping sites, cabins or other accommodations, and ancillary facilities; enhancement of existing regional parkland with new recreational amenities; creation of a supervised swimming beach; potential lease of a nonmotorized boat rental facility/dock; expansion of existing wetland habitat to include marshes, mudflats, oyster beds, and open water; creation of upland areas to serve as a buffer zone to wetland habitat; parking; and a multi-use path with interpretive signage.

Location: Mission Bay Park (Bay) is a 4,660-acre park within the City of San Diego. The proposed Project area is located in the northeast corner of Mission Bay and includes the following existing land uses: the Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve (Preserve), guest housing, athletic fields and tennis courts, a golf course, regional parkland, and the De Anza Cove Area, which is identified as the De Anza Special Study Area in the MBPMP.

Biological Setting: Mission Bay supports a wide variety of biological resources and habitats including diverse marine habitats, coastal salt marsh, and three terrestrial habitats: salt pan, coastal strand, and disturbed habitat (City, 1990). Special-status species include the CESA- and federal Endangered Species Act (ESA)- listed endangered light-footed Ridgway's rail (Rallus obsoletus levipes), which is also a California Fully Protected Species (FPS); the CESA-listed endangered Belding's savannah sparrow (Passerculus sandwichensis beldingii); and the CESAand ESA-listed endangered California least tern (Sterna antillarum browni; FPS). hosts diverse avifauna, small mammals, reptiles, and habitat for avian feeding, resting, and breeding. The coastal salt marsh habitats improve the Bay's water quality through bioremediation and filtering of pollutants and wastewater discharge.

Marine Biological Setting: Mission Bay is locally known for its bay, estuary, eelgrass and shallow bay habitats important for fish and wildlife habitat. The Bay is also important fish nursery habitat for fish spawning, shelter, and foraging. The Bay includes large areas (i.e., 'beds') of eelgrass (*Zostera marina*, *Z. pacifica*), which is a sensitive marine habitat type and is important to many aquatic and nearshore species.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CDFW offers the comments and recommendations below to assist the City in adequately identifying and/or mitigating the Project's significant, or potentially significant, direct and indirect impacts on fish and wildlife (biological) resources. Editorial comments or other suggestions may also be included to improve the document.

To enable CDFW to adequately review and comment on the proposed Project from the standpoint of the protection of plants, fish, wildlife, and natural habitats, we recommend the following information be included in the PEIR:

General Comments

1) **Biological Resource Inventory:** The document should contain a complete description of the Project, including purpose and need, that describes all terrestrial and marine habitats within or adjacent to the Project area, all staging areas and access routes to the construction and staging areas. The Project area is described as the area in which potential effects may occur.

The document should also provide a complete assessment of the flora and fauna within and adjacent to the Project area, with particular emphasis upon identifying endangered, threatened, sensitive, and locally unique species and sensitive habitats. This should include a complete floral and faunal species compendium of the entire Project site, undertaken at the appropriate time of year. Species to be addressed should include all those which meet the CEQA definition (see CEQA Guidelines, § 15380). This should include sensitive fish and wildlife species. Seasonal variations in use of the Project area by wildlife should also be addressed. Focused species-specific surveys, conducted at the appropriate time of year and time of day when the sensitive species are active or otherwise identifiable, are required. Acceptable species-specific survey procedures should be developed in consultation with CDFW and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

- Biological Impacts: To provide a thorough discussion of direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts expected to adversely affect biological resources, with specific measures to offset such impacts, the following should be addressed in the PEIR:
 - a) a discussion of potential adverse impacts from lighting, noise, human activity, exotic species, recreational uses, and drainage. The latter subject should address: Project-related changes to drainage patterns on, and downstream of, the Project site; the volume, velocity, and frequency of existing and post-Project surface flows; polluted runoff; soil erosion and/or sedimentation in streams and water bodies; and post-Project fate of runoff from the Project site. Mitigation measures proposed to alleviate such impacts should be included.
 - b) discussion regarding indirect Project impacts on biological resources, including resources in nearby public lands, open space, adjacent natural habitats, riparian ecosystems, and any designated and/or proposed or existing reserve lands (e.g., existing preserve lands or lands designated as Multi-Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) associated with the City's SAP).
 - c) the zoning of areas for development projects or other uses that are nearby or adjacent to natural areas may inadvertently contribute to wildlife-human interactions. A discussion of possible wildlife conflicts and mitigation measures to reduce these conflicts should be included in the environmental document.
 - d) CDFW also recommends that a habitat gain/loss table be included, which calculates the expected net habitat losses and gains of each type of habitat area lost, restored, enhanced, and created.
- 3) **Marine Species and Habitats:** To better understand potential effects and impacts from the proposed Project, baseline surveys should be conducted, and the results included in the PEIR. Baseline surveys of native and artificial marine habitats, and native and non-marine species

> should include all marine areas within the Project area footprint such as the existing open water bay and estuary habitats of De Anza cove and Rose Creek outfall, mudflats, eelgrass beds, oyster beds, and sandy beach intertidal habitat. Invasive marine Caulerpa spp. should also be included in marine baseline surveys. All excavations and placement of sediment in Project areas within, and adjacent to, all existing natural wetland or eelgrass habitat should be included in a site-specific baseline marine resources survey and Project impacts/benefits assessment. This should be performed to accurately assess wetland restoration benefits and impacts to marine species and habitats. Historical marine biological species and habitats for the Project area may also be found in the Marine BIOS database on the CDFW's website (https://wildlife.ca.gov/Conservation/Marine/GIS/MarineBIOS).

> CDFW recommends the marine biological survey and impact assessment reports include a listing of each Project component and the habitat that will be impacted, the total area of habitat impacted, and proposed mitigation measures for avoiding, and minimizing impacts. Additionally, the baseline assessment should include a habitat loss/gain summary indicating the total net gain or loss of each habitat impacted verses habitat restored. If impacts or net losses to sensitive, native marine habitats are unavoidable, additional mitigation plans should be developed to compensate for lost existing habitats.

4) Special-status Species: The PEIR should thoroughly analyze direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts to any special-status species likely to occur in the Project area. Impacts to species designated as Fully Protected must be completely avoided; FPS may not be taken or possessed at any time per § 3511 of the Fish and Game Code. Avoidance measures for avian species may include phasing construction to occur outside of nesting season, conducting species-specific surveys when construction will occur within 500' of a nesting site, retaining a qualified biological monitor on-site during construction, and implementation of no-activity buffers around active nests.

CDFW also considers adverse impacts to a species protected by the California Endangered Species Act (CESA), for the purposes of CEQA, to be significant without mitigation. As to CESA, take of any endangered, threatened, or candidate species not already covered by the City's SAP that results from the Project is prohibited, except as authorized by state law (Fish & G. Code, §§ 2080, 2085). Consequently, if the Project, Project construction, or any Projectrelated activity during the life of the Project will result in take of a species designated as endangered or threatened, or a candidate for listing under CESA, unless covered by the City's SAP permit, CDFW recommends that the Project proponent seek appropriate take authorization under CESA prior to implementing the Project. Appropriate authorization from CDFW may include an incidental take permit (ITP) or a consistency determination in certain circumstances, among other options (Fish and G. Code §§ 2080.1, 2081, subds. (b),(c)). Early consultation is encouraged, as significant modification to a project and mitigation measures may be required to obtain a CESA Permit. Revisions to the Fish and Game Code, effective January 1998, may require that CDFW issue a separate CEQA document for the issuance of an ITP unless the Project CEQA document addresses all Project impacts to CESA-listed species and specifies a mitigation monitoring and reporting program that will meet the requirements of an ITP. For these reasons, biological mitigation monitoring and reporting proposals should be of sufficient detail and resolution to satisfy the requirements for a CESA ITP.

- 5) **Marine Impacts:** The wetlands restoration Project activities may have direct and indirect impacts to marine species and habitats:
 - a. direct loss or conversion of native marine habitats due to fill of open Bay waters;
 - b. burial or excavations/dredging of native eelgrass habitat and oyster beds;
 - c. turbidity and sedimentation, scouring, and reduced water quality; and,
 - d. significant impacts to sensitive and/or special-status resources including eelgrass beds, and associated eelgrass ecological communities such as benthic and epibenthic invertebrates, fish, and marine birds.

Contaminated or high silt and organic content sediments should not be placed in the marine environment that are not compatible with existing native sediment. High silt content sediments may cause marine soft substrates to be compacted and unsuitable for sustained growth of eelgrass, intertidal and subtidal benthic and epibenthic invertebrates. Compatible sediments are required for healthy marine invertebrate habitat needed for forage of the higher trophic levels such as fish and shorebirds.

- 6) **Indirect Marine Impacts:** The Draft PEIR should include and address potential adverse indirect Bay water and marine habitat impacts from increased human and boat facilities (overwater structures) such as Bay water shading, lighting, underwater noise, increased non-native, invasive species, and proposed mitigation measures to alleviate such impacts.
- 7) Sensitive Marine Species and Habitats: Many important commercial and recreational fish species use the Project area for breeding, shelter, spawning, and foraging. Potential impacts to marine fish, including both commercially and recreationally important species, should be identified and any significant impacts should be avoided and minimized to below a level of significance. A list and description of fish and wildlife species and habitat in the Bay may be found on Marine Bios (<u>https://wildlife.ca.gov/Conservation/Marine/GIS/MarineBIOS</u>). Species and habitats which should be addressed include but are not limited to:
 - a. the California spiny lobster (*Panulirus interruptus*) may utilize the open subtidal Bay habitats within or adjacent to the proposed Project. Spiny lobster use eelgrass for shelter which is present throughout the shallow area of the Bay. This species and their habitat are vulnerable to direct and indirect dredging, excavation, fill, burial, turbidity, and sedimentation impacts; and,
 - b. marine plant species which grow in extensive beds within shallow Bay waters are considered sensitive habitat types. In the vicinity of the proposed Project, this may include, but is not limited to, eelgrass (*Zostera marina*, Z. *pacifica*).

An eelgrass mitigation site is located just south of the Project footprint. The mitigation site was created to mitigate for eelgrass impacts related to the Mission Bay Navigational Channel Dredging Project completed three years ago. This eelgrass mitigation site should be identified and addressed in the PEIR. Avoidance and minimization measures should be proposed for the eelgrass mitigation site.

8) Invasive Species: Disturbance of the bottom sediments from dredging construction may redistribute non-native species that compete with native species. This could cause widespread adverse impacts to the marine ecosystem. The invasive algae *Caulerpa taxifolia* is listed as a federal noxious weed under the U.S. Plant Protection Act and while deemed eradicated in 2006 is monitored for potential future emergence. Another invasive algae species found recently in Southern California (Newport Bay) is *Caulerpa prolifera*, which is also a potential threat to the native marine ecosystem.

CDFW recommends including a mitigation measure detailing a pre-construction *Caulerpa* spp. survey to identify potential existence of invasive Caulerpa spp. as described in the Caulerpa Control Protocol https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/west- coast/habitat-conservation/aquatic-invasive-species-west-coast. If Caulerpa spp. are found, do not disturb the species and contact CDFW and National Marine Fisheries Service within 24 hours as described in the Caulerpa Control Protocol.

- 9) Mitigation for Project-related Biological Impacts: The PEIR should include mitigation measures for adverse project-related impacts to sensitive plants, animals, and habitats. Mitigation measures should emphasize avoidance and reduction of project impacts. For unavoidable impacts, on-site habitat restoration or enhancement should be discussed in detail. If on-site mitigation is not feasible, or would not be biologically viable and therefore not adequately mitigate the loss of biological functions and values, off-site mitigation through habitat creation and/or acquisition and preservation in perpetuity should be discussed.
- 10) Cumulative Effects Analysis: A cumulative effects analysis should be developed as described under CEQA Guidelines, section 15130. General and specific plans, as well as past, present, and anticipated future projects, should be analyzed relative to their impacts on similar plant communities and wildlife habitats. The PEIR should evaluate the full scope of potential actions germane to the MBPMP as part of the cumulative impact analysis and discussion of related actions.
- 11) Range of Project Alternatives: The PEIR should include a range of Project alternatives that complement existing and proposed habitat restoration efforts including: the De Anza Special Study Area, the existing KFMR/NWP including the potential habitat restoration associated with the Campland lease site, and the San Diego Audubon's ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study. We continue to encourage the City to maximize incorporation of Project design elements identified by the San Diego Audubon's ReWild Mission Bay, as discussed in CDFW's 2017 and 2018 comment letters (CDFW 2017, CDFW 2018). The PEIR should fully consider and evaluate a range of alternatives that avoid or otherwise minimize impacts to marine and terrestrial biological resources.

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12) Project Phasing: As indicated in our 2018 comment letter in response to the De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan NOP (CDFW 2018), CDFW recommends that the PEIR analyze opportunities to maximize the footprint of native habitats in conformance with the environmental objectives in the MBPMP. Critical Project components such as specific design elements, timing, and phasing of implementation are not detailed within the NOP. Implementation of Project components, specifically the Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve, wetland expansion, and upland and buffer creation, should precede other Project components to ensure consistency with the MBPMP, and to safeguard Mission Bay's water quality for the biological resources, natural habitats, leasehold interests, and recreational uses. Implementing the habitat components of the proposed Project prior to other construction components fulfills a longstanding goal of the MBPMP-Recommendation 26: Relocation of Campland, by protecting Mission Bay's water quality for biological resources and recreationalists alike during construction and operation of the future leaseholds. Additionally, where the information is available, the PEIR should detail the success criteria of the habitat creation/restoration components of the Project and indemnify its success through financial sureties. Where the information necessary to establish specific success criteria is not known, the PEIR should identify the Audubon's ReWild Mission Bay as the framework for developing future success criteria.

Specific Comments

- 13) Wetland Expansion: Although the De Anza Natural Project significantly improves focus on wetland expansion by comparison to the 2018 De Anza Cove Amendment to the MBPMP, we continue to encourage the City to analyze the possibility of incorporating native habitat along the entire De Anza peninsula. The marsh habitat associated with the Northern Wildlife Preserve (including the Kendall-Frost Reserve) serves an important regional resting, feeding, and migratory stop within the Pacific Flyway, and also acts as a significant bioremediation tool to improve water quality—a key focus of the MBPMP and the Mission Bay Natural Resources Management Plan (City of San Diego, 2002 and 1990 respectively). The City's planning documents have long recognized the mutual benefits that improved water quality offer public recreation and habitat values in specifically stating that the De Anza Special Study Area (SSA) "…shall not be developed to the detriment of existing and/or future adjacent habitat areas. Foremost in consideration should be the extent to which the SSA can contribute to the Park's [Mission Bay Park] water quality. In fact, additional wetlands creation *must be considered* [emphasis added] as part of the SSA." (City, 2002, p. 53).
- 14) **Eelgrass and Wetland Type Conversion:** CDFW does not recommend any development or conversion that would result in a reduction of wetland and/or eelgrass acreage or habitat values. If conversion of these habitats is unavoidable, the City should provide appropriate mitigation measures and compensation for lost habitat. Project mitigation should ensure there will be "no net loss" of either wetland or eelgrass habitat values or acreage. Development and conversion includes, but is not limited to, conversion to subsurface drains, placement of fill or building of structures within the wetland, eelgrass and channelization or removal of substrate materials from the wetland or eelgrass bed. All eelgrass habitat and potential eelgrass habitat, whether ephemeral, intermittent, or perennial, should be retained and provided with substantial setbacks that preserve the aquatic values and maintain their value to on-site and off-site wildlife populations. Mitigation measures to compensate for impacts to these aquatic resources should be included in the PEIR.
- 15) **Climate Change Resiliency:** The PEIR should address climate resiliency with both planning and design aspects of the Project. Several climate change models illustrate that areas of De Anza will be subject to sea level rise, which may jeopardize the redevelopment of De Anza, absent major structural infrastructure. The PEIR should clearly analyze how sea level rise will affect the plan, particularly the created wetlands. Project Alternatives should consider the effects of potential sea level rise and climate change on marine habitat modifications. Analysis should include discussion of infrastructure and long-term maintenance, as well as congruency with the Climate Resilient SD Plan.

16) Recreational Use:

a) Camping: The NOP indicates that,

"...the existing RV campground and vacant De Anza Mobile Home Park would be replaced with low-cost guest housing, allowing for approximately 600 camping sites for RV's, cabins or other eco-friendly accommodations and associated open space and facilities consistent with camping accommodations. Camping-oriented ancillary facilities and amenities, such as food services/concessions, would also be provided on site." Jordan Moore City of San Diego February 10, 2022 Page 7 of 9

> CDFW does not consider RV camping to be a passive recreational use; the PEIR should analyze the proposed low-cost guest housing on the De Anza peninsula as an active recreational use and discuss how surrounding natural habitat will be impacted. To maximize habitat values and improve water quality, we recommend that commercial and other land use developments be strategically located farthest away from sensitive resources to include wetlands and open waters of the bay.

- b) <u>Watercraft</u>: The NOP states that a small non-motorized boat lease area is proposed as part of the Project, and an existing boat ramp in De Anza Cove would be removed. Motorized watercraft access currently exists just east of the Project boundary at the De Anza Boat Launch. The NOP goes on to state that nonmotorized personal watercraft would have access in De Anza Cove from the new potential boat lease, while motorized boats could access De Anza Cove from the existing boat ramp east of the Project area. CDFW recommends that De Anza Cove be limited to non-motorized watercraft and swimming uses only. Allowing motorized watercraft activities in De Anza Cove risks damage to the proposed eastern wetlands, resulting from boats operating close to, or directly in, wetland areas. Noise from motors may also disturb nesting or foraging avian species. Indirect impacts to the wetlands could occur from pollution and increased turbidity caused by motorized watercraft.
- 17) **CEQA Document Tiering:** The NOP indicates that specific active recreation uses at the north section of De Anza Cove will be determined during future site planning efforts as part of a General Development Plan through a public process. While we appreciate additional public involvement in the future, the PEIR should specify what mechanisms under CEQA will be employed. As expressed in our 2018 comment letter (CFDW 2018), the City should indicate whether it anticipates subsequent Project-specific CEQA documents, or if a consistency determination process will be followed when tiering from the PEIR.

CEQA Lead Agencies may elect to prepare a Program EIR as a high-level CEQA document addressing "...a series of actions that can be characterized as one large Project..." (CEQA Guidelines § 15168). Absent a clear understanding of how the PEIR is intended to be used, CDFW is unable to comment on the full breadth of environmental concerns and potential avoidance, minimization, or mitigation measures. Given the nature of a programmatic environmental document, CDFW acknowledges that the CEQA Lead Agency is not obligated to fully analyze subsequent activities for which insufficient data exists. However, CEQA findings of significance should only be made when those findings are supported by substantial evidence in the record (CEQA § 15091(b)). For those aspects of the proposed Project that have not been fully studied, findings of significance should be set aside when certifying the PEIR until those aspects can be fully studied in a subsequent or supplemental CEQA document (see CEQA Guidelines §§ 15162 and 15163).

18) Jurisdictional Delineation and 1600 Notification:

- a) The Project area supports aquatic, riparian, and wetland habitats; therefore, a jurisdictional delineation of the wetlands, Rose Creek, and associated riparian habitats should be included in the PEIR. Please note that some wetland and riparian habitats subject to CDFW's authority may extend beyond the jurisdictional limits of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.
- b) The CDFW has regulatory authority over activities in streams and/or lakes that will divert or obstruct the natural flow, or change the bed, channel, or bank (which may include associated riparian resources) of any river, stream, or lake or use material from a river, stream, or lake. For any such activities, the Project applicant (or "entity") must provide written notification to CDFW pursuant to section 1600 *et seq.* of the Fish and Game Code. Based on this notification and other information, CDFW determines whether a Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement (LSAA) with the applicant is required prior to conducting the proposed activities. CDFW's issuance of a LSAA for a Project that is subject to CEQA will require CEQA compliance actions by CDFW as a Responsible Agency. CDFW as a Responsible Agency under CEQA may consider the City's PEIR for the Project. To minimize additional requirements by CDFW pursuant to section 1600 *et seq.* and/or under CEQA, the document should fully identify the potential impacts to the stream or riparian resources and provide adequate avoidance, mitigation, monitoring and reporting commitments for issuance of the LSAA.

19) Marine Mitigation Measures:

At a minimum, the following marine mitigation measures should be incorporated into a Marine Impact Avoidance, Minimization and Monitoring plan for any proposed sediment placement cut and fill work within or adjacent to the marine habitats of Mission Bay.

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- a) Avoidance Measures: Equipment, vehicle routes, dump trucks, bulldozers, and workers should travel, set up and operate outside the Bay habitat boundaries to the extent feasible to avoid significant Project impacts to marine habitat, species, and water quality. All driving, dumping, bulldozing routes and locations should be referenced on maps and diagrams in relation to the marine habitat boundaries showing potential areas of impact.
- b) Avoidance Measures: The CDFW recommends avoidance of eelgrass and marine habitat impacts. Project alternatives and designs should include construction methods designed to fully avoid impacts to existing sensitive marine fish and wildlife and associated marine habitats.
- c) Minimization Measure: For Bay sandy beach and mudflat protection or creation, dredged or excavated sediments to be used as fill should be sampled under an approved sediment analysis plan, and only clean, beach or mudflat compatible sand should be placed on receiver beaches. Dredged sediments should be similar to receiver beach sediments in grain size, color, and percent silt content.
- d) Minimization Measure: Hydrological modeling should be done to identify appropriate sediment placement volumes and locations to minimize significant marine habitat and creek mouth impacts.
- e) Minimization Measure: Silt curtains and coffer dams should be used to the extent feasible to minimize turbidity and sedimentation impacts for all sensitive marine habitats and species.

Eelgrass and Shallow Water Habitat Mitigation Measures: Eelgrass is a sensitive habitat that is highly productive as a juvenile fish nursery, and used by adult fish and invertebrates for foraging, spawning, and shelter. Eelgrass beds are also considered a "special aquatic site" and given protections by the Clean Water Act. Additionally, the importance of eelgrass protection and restoration, as well as the ecological benefits of eelgrass, is identified in the California Public Resources Code (PRC§35630). Guidance for eelgrass habitat impact avoidance, minimization, and compensatory mitigation as well as guidance for eelgrass mitigation banking is provided by the California Eelgrass Mitigation Policy (CEMP), (NOAA, 2014). (<u>https://media.fisheries.noaa.gov/dam-migration/cemp_oct_2014_final.pdf</u>).

If transplanting of eelgrass is required for eelgrass compensatory mitigation, a Scientific Collecting Permit (SCP) from CDFW will be required prior to harvest and transplanting activities. The SCP may include conditions such as donor bed surveys, limits on number and density of turions collected, methods for collection and transplanting, notification of activities, and reporting requirements. The State Coastal Conservancy (Conservancy) is writing in general support of the City of San Diego's plan for wetland restoration and public access in Mission Bay in the De Anza Natural Plan described in the City's recent Notice of Preparation (NOP) of a Programmatic Environmental Impact Report (PEIR). The Conservancy has been involved with the restoration of Lower Rose Creek and North Mission Bay Wetlands since 2003, and has also provided over \$500,000 towards the ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study that was completed in 2018. The ReWild study included three alternatives—Wild, Wilder, and Wildest. The Wildest scenario included restoration of ~256 acres of wetlands, including transition zone and mudflats. The study also included an analysis of restored habitats with sea level rise, and projected that this scenario would result in ~109 acres of wetlands that would be resilient to 5.5 ft. of sea-level rise around 2100.

The Conservancy understands that the City's PEIR is required to satisfy the Water Board's approved SEP requirements, and that one of those requirements is to analyze a Mission Bay restoration project that would result in 80 acres of resilient wetlands in 2100. The SCC supports the City's planning for increased wetland restoration acreage (133 acres) in the current NOP compared to the 2018 NOP. However, the Conservancy would like to see the City include more extensive wetland restoration as one of the alternatives to be analyzed in its PEIR. Specifically, the Conservancy would support the City including the Wildest scenario from the ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study as one of the alternatives and carrying forward with this analysis. Including the Wildest scenario as an alternative in the PEIR would also ensure that the City would meet its SEP requirements, which may not be the case with the current project description in the NOP.

In addition, the Conservancy encourages the City to engage with tribal entities early and often in this planning process, and to consider tribal resources and partnerships, and is pleased to see that the NOP prioritizes tribal collaboration. The Conservancy also supports low-cost visitor accommodations and encourages equitable access and recreation for all, and is pleased to see those elements called out in the NOP.

The Conservancy has invested in habitat restoration and public access in Mission Bay over the years and sees the State's continued involvement as a high priority. Mission Bay wetlands restoration would also further regional efforts and goals of the Southern California Wetland Recovery Project's 2018 Regional Strategy, providing another reason for the Conservancy's support. The Conservancy anticipates being able to support Mission Bay wetland restoration with grant funding, and also facilitate wetland restoration grants to the City from other state and federal agencies. We look forward to continuing to work with the City on this effort.

The San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board (San Diego Water Board) appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on the Notice of Preparation (NOP) for the De Anza Natural Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan.

The San Diego Water Board is charged with the protection of Waters of the State of California in the San Diego Region. Our mission is to preserve, enhance, and restore the quality of California's water resources for the protection of the environment, public health, and all beneficial uses. The San Diego Water Board is a responsible agency under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and administers regulations established by the Federal Clean Water Act and the California Water Code (Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act). The San Diego Water Board also administers regulations, plans, and policies established by the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Diego Region and the State Water Resources Control Board to protect watersheds and their resources. The San Diego Water Board administers these regulations, in part, through issuance of water quality certifications under Clean Water Act (CWA) section 401. Implementation of the Project would result in the discharge of dredged or fill materials within Waters of the United States and Waters of the State and would require CWA section 401 water quality certification.

One of the focus areas of the San Diego Water Board's 2021 <u>Practical Vision</u> is to increase wetland areas in the Region and regulate projects that alter wetland, stream, and riparian areas considering the affects to Tribal and underserved communities as well as Climate Change mitigation and adaptation. Chapter 3 of the Practical Vision: *Recover Stream, Wetland and Riparian Areas*, seeks to support and encourage wetland restoration to achieve a meaningful net gain of wetlands. The restoration of Mission Bay wetlands is specifically called out in the chapter, as well as in San Diego Water Board <u>Resolution R9-2015-0041</u>, *Resolution to Support Restoration of Aquatic Ecosystems in the San Diego Region.*

The San Diego Water Board strongly supports the City's planning efforts to develop a De Anza Natural alternative for the Draft Program Environmental Impact Report (Draft PEIR) that studies an expanded wetlands alternative to the same level of detail as the City's initially proposed preferred project alternative, and seeks to maximize the wetland acreage created in this unique area of Mission Bay. Due to the unique restoration opportunity available in this planning area of Mission Bay, and considering the uncertainty of sea level rise predictions, the San Diego Water Board urges the City to prioritize opportunities that maximize wetland creation both among, and within, each of the alternatives considered.

The San Diego Water Board has the following specific comments on the De Anza Natural Amendment NOP:

Biological Resources

- 1. Figure 3 provided with the NOP lacks sufficient detail to determine the amount of the various wetland types (low-mid-high wetland/salt marsh and mudflats) and their associated acreage. The Draft PEIR should:
 - a. Clearly map the location and extent of upland transition zones.
 - b. Clearly map the various wetland types and their associated acreages and demonstrate how the proposed alternative would maximize implementable wetland restoration with the establishment of a minimum of 80 acres of additional functional wetlands at the Year 2100, based on current models utilized by the City for sea level rise projections.
- 2. The Draft PEIR should also discuss maintenance and adaptation measures considered or required for each of the alternatives proposed. In so doing, the PEIR should prioritize low maintenance alternatives that maximize habitat function (e.g. living shorelines).

Climate Resiliency

- 3. The NOP indicates that the De Anza Natural alternative will rely upon the prediction of 3.6 to 6.5 feet of sea level rise within the City's *Climate Resilient SD Plan for Sea Level Rise Projections* as the basis for calculating functional wetland acreage at the year 2100. Considering the variability in projections, and the City's objective to create a specified amount of wetland acreage, the Draft PEIR should explain the sea level rise projections used to calculate the projected wetlands at 2100, and the expected confidence in meeting that target. The City should consider the Audubon Society's 2018 Wetlands Restoration Feasibility Study which goes into depth on expected restoration needed now to meet the target of 80 additional wetland acres in 2100.
- 4. The Draft PEIR should provide mapping to illustrate the high and low sea level rise projections, and the associated effect on wetlands in both the City's preferred alternative, and the De Anza Natural alternative.

Water Quality and Hydrology

- 5. The Clean Water Act Section 303(d) list of impaired water bodies identifies Mission Bay at the mouth of Rose Creek as being impaired for eutrophication and lead from upstream sources, and Mission Bay at De Anza Cove is listed as impaired for *Enterococcus*, fecal coliform, and total coliform. The NOP describes various water quality design features including a proposed water quality zone which would capture and treat storm water before flowing into Mission Bay, additional water quality basins located to treat the entire proposed project area in accordance with local and state requirements, sitespecific BMPs to enhance water quality, and storm drain signage. The Draft PEIR should:
 - a. Provide greater clarity about, and expand on, the pollutant loading to the project area from upstream sources and discuss the need for future City actions on a watershed-based level to address the reduction of these pollutants upstream.
 - b. Evaluate in detail the appropriate sizing of all water quality features to address these pollutants in accordance with State and Local regulations.
 - c. Discuss how the project will address 303(d) listed pollutants.
 - d. Discuss how the various water quality design features will ensure protection of the existing and created beneficial uses within the project area.

- 6. The NOP (Figure 3) proposes a cut channel through the boot to De Anza Cove creating a southern island. The Draft PEIR should:
 - a. Provide a detailed hydrologic analysis to show whether the proposed channel will provide added flushing and water circulation benefits and will not negatively affect the Kendall Frost reserve or impact its beneficial uses.
 - b. Provide a detailed discussion of the maintenance requirements this channel will require, as regular dredging and other activities could cause detrimental impacts to natural resources and water quality in the cove and potentially require additional permitting from the Water Board.
 - c. Provide an analysis of potential sedimentation to the cove from upstream sources, and the potential need to dredge the cove.
 - d. Provide a hydrologic evaluation of whether a reduction and/or relocation of the island could help improve circulation and access to water for all the areas.
 - e. Provide an evaluation of whether the southern island can be used in the future for managed retreat to provide additional wetlands.

Balancing Recreation and Maximized Wetland Creation

7. The De Anza Natural alternative seeks to find a balance in providing public recreation and the sustainable management of environmental resources. Mission Bay Park is the largest aquatic park of its kind in the country. It consists of over 4,235 acres in roughly equal parts land and water. Mission Bay boasts 27 miles of shoreline, 19 of which are sandy beaches with eight locations designated as official swimming areas. There are almost 14 miles of bike/walking paths along Mission Bay.

Mission Bay Park provides free public access and free parking year-round for many uses including picnicking, lawn and water sports, on-water activities like sailing, paddle boarding and kayaking, running, walking, cycling on paths and trails and bird watching. Uses are supported with maintained landscaping and lawns, trash removal, boat docks and launching facilities, restrooms, showers, developed play areas, natural areas, ranger services and lifeguards.

The San Diego Water Board believes the Draft PEIR should balance recreational needs and wetland creation opportunities on a scale that includes the entirety of Mission Bay Park. Opportunities for public recreation of all types are abundant throughout Mission Bay Park, whereas viable opportunities for substantial wetland creation are limited, with the vast majority occurring within the project area.

Comparison of the Alternatives

- 8. The City has stated that the preferred alternative and De Anza Natural alternative will be analyzed to the same level of detail. The Draft PEIR should provide a comparison of the various components of the alternatives including, but not limited to:
 - a. Acreage of wetlands created initially, and wetland acreage remaining in 2100 due to projected sea level rise;
 - b. The relative effectiveness of the alternatives in aiding in the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and carbon sequestration;
 - c. Pollutant removal potential;
 - d. Percentage of the study area devoted to various types of recreation; and
 - e. Required maintenance.

Thank you again for the opportunity to comment on the NOP for the De Anza alternative. The San Diego Water Board looks forward to working alongside the City of San Diego to restore vital wetlands to Mission Bay. History of the Project

The City of San Diego Planning Department circulated an NOP for the De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan from June 11, 2018 to July 11, 2018. The proposed land use plan described in the 2018 NOP included guest housing, regional parkland, natural recreation, expanded marshland/habitat, upland/developed areas, coastal landscape, potential lease areas, boat rental/water areas, a water lease, athletic fields and tennis courts, open beach, the Mission Bay Golf Course, a ranger station, water quality design features, and a multi-use path and pedestrian access.

Based on the feedback heard on the plan since the original NOP was released in 2018, the modified project – De Anza Natural – envisions a balanced land use plan that serves the local and regional recreation needs of the public while preserving the natural resources of the De Anza Cove area. De Anza Natural includes expanded wetlands which will help restore and enhance the existing natural wetland habitat while providing a nature-based solution to protect the City against the risks of climate change, in line with its Climate Resilient SD Plan. The expanded wetland area will include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; ovster beds; and open water. The diversity of wetland habitat types will increase biodiversity, provide increased opportunities for recreational enjoyment and education, as well as future research opportunities into the carbon sequestration potential of wetlands and increased climate resiliency. De Anza Natural will enhance the existing regional parkland through new facilities that will allow for a variety of recreational uses as well as low-cost visitor accommodations that will be accessible to all visitors of Mission Bay Park. De Anza Natural will also recognize the history and ancestral homelands of the Iipay-Tipay Kumeyaay people, providing opportunities to partner and collaborate on the planning and restoration of the area. This NOP is for a draft PEIR that will evaluate the modified project – De Anza Natural.

Project Area

The proposed project area is in the northeast corner of Mission Bay Park in the City of San Diego; see Figure 1, Regional Location Map and Figure 2, Vicinity Map. The proposed project area includes existing land uses including the Kendall–Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve (Preserve), guest housing, athletic fields and tennis courts, a golf course, regional parkland, and the De Anza Cove Area, which is identified as the De Anza Special Study Area in the Mission Bay Park Master Plan (Master Plan).

The Preserve is bordered on the west and north by residential development and roadways, on the east by existing guest housing, and on the south by Mission Bay. The Preserve consists mostly of vegetated wetland. The guest housing is located on City-owned land currently leased and operated privately and consists of recreational vehicle (RV) and tent camping areas. The De Anza Cove Area is located directly to the east of the guest housing and Rose Creek, and south of North Mission Bay Drive. The De Anza Cove Area consists of a vacant mobile home park and supporting infrastructure (e.g., roads, utilities, parking lots, driveways), an existing campground of approximately 200 RV sites, Mission Bay Regional Park, and a public beach and parking area. North Mission Bay Drive bisects the De Anza Cove Area and recreational areas to the north. The current recreational areas include the tennis club, athletic fields, and golf course.

Project Components

The Master Plan recommends that the revitalization of De Anza Cove should serve regional recreation needs, including guest housing (recreational vehicles and other low cost camping facilities); contribute to the park's water quality, including creating additional wetlands; facilitate hydrologic improvements to safeguard the viability of marsh areas; provide a waterfront trail, viewing areas, and other passive recreational features to enhance public use of the area; and ensure leaseholds support the Mission Bay recreation use. The proposed project seeks to implement the recommendations of the Master Plan, and the proposed land uses are summarized below.

<u>Climate Resiliency</u>

De Anza Natural would also include updates to the Master Plan to ensure consistency with the Climate Resilient SD Plan, and to plan for sea level rise, emphasizing nature-based solutions to

climate change.

Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve/Northern Wildlife Preserve

The proposed project would expand the existing Preserve to the east where guest housing currently exists and would replace the existing guest housing area with expanded marshland/habitat area as recommended in the adopted Master Plan; see Figure 3, Site Plan. The existing University of California San Diego (UCSD) Bio Research Field Station facility would remain, and the proposed project would allow a future environmental education and nature interpretation facility along Pacific Beach Drive within the Preserve.

<u> De Anza Cove Area – North</u>

The northern and eastern portions of the proposed project area, which currently contain active recreational facilities, would continue to allow for these types of active recreational uses, which could include tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, soccer, and/or golf facilities. Specific active recreation uses at this site would be determined during future site planning efforts as part of a General Development Plan through a public process.

The proposed active recreation and aquatics facilities would be in the north section of the De Anza Cove Area, well-buffered from habitat. It is anticipated that the active recreation area would be home to existing uses, and a new potential use could include a City aquatics facility. Aquatics facilities typically include a 25-meter pool, outdoor decks, shade trellises, changing facilities/locker rooms, storage and vehicular areas and possibly a children's pool. Surface parking and access drives would serve both the Regional Parkland and Active Recreation areas. The specific recreation elements would be the subject of a future General Development Plan process.

<u>De Anza Cove Area - South</u>

The De Anza Cove Area is located south of North Mission Bay Drive and east of the Rose Creek Channel. The land uses proposed within this area include low-cost visitor accommodations, regional parkland, wetland/marshland, upland areas, a potential non-motorized boat lease, and open beach and water quality features, which are further described below. See Figure 3, Site Plan.

Low-Cost Visitor Accommodations

The proposed project would replace the existing RV campground and vacant De Anza Mobile Home Park with new low-cost guest housing. The low-cost guest housing would allow for up to approximately 600 camping sites for RVs, cabins or other eco-friendly accommodations and associated open space and facilities consistent with camping accommodations. Campingoriented ancillary facilities and amenities, such as food services/concessions, would also be provided on site. The lease area would include open beach and vegetated buffers at its periphery, in accordance with water quality Best Management Practices (BMPs) and the Master Plan. The guest housing leasehold would include public access to the multi-use bike/path.

Regional Parkland and Open Beach

The existing regional parkland area would be enhanced by new recreational amenities and opportunities. A supervised swimming beach area would be located at the open beach on the north shore north of De Anza Cove. The swimming area would be protected by buffers/safety measures that would separate the swimmers from the boat users. A non-motorized boat rental facility/dock potential lease would be publicly accessible from the regional parkland (east) side and from the guest housing (west) side. In the upper part of the area, recreational amenities would include a passive, open green area, and program elements such as sand volleyball, seating/picnicking areas, an "adventure play" area, and environmental education displays/kiosk along multi-use pathways. The regional parkland areas would also provide a natural setting for compatible bicycling, hiking, and passive recreational uses. A portion of the regional parkland

area along Pacific Beach Drive could serve as a nature-based ranger station or other interpretive area. Vegetation adjacent to upland and marsh habitats would buffer those habitats and the Preserve through the use of landform (berms) and native plantings. Surface parking would be provided for the regional parkland and open beach areas.

Wetlands

The proposed project would expand the existing wetland habitat to include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; oyster beds; and open water. The new marshes would be located along the edges of and at the outfall of Rose Creek and would be located to accept existing storm drain water outfalls on the east side of De Anza Cove. Storm drain outfalls could also be located along Rose Creek to direct stormwaters to the marshlands, potentially improving the water quality. It is anticipated that natural and nature-based erosion control measures would be incorporated for controlling sediments and creating habitat niches. Design features such as oyster reef creation could serve as barriers to storms and tides, preventing erosion and protecting productive estuary waters. The expanded wetland habitat would create a natural interface with the De Anza Cove and nearby park areas in the proposed project area and would enhance water quality in Rose Creek and Mission Bay.

Uplands and Buffers

The upland areas would include a multi-use path with educational signage and, in some instances, mounded landforms. The mounded landforms would feature native coastal sage, dune and other native plants that would be seen and experienced from the waterfront multi-use path. This area would also include passive recreation amenities such as overlooks, pathways, picnic areas, and interpretive signs, which would complement the natural setting of the guest housing and the expanded beach areas on the cove. The upland plantings would serve as a buffer to the wetland habitats.

Water Quality Design Features

Water quality design features are proposed along the eastern edge of the proposed active recreation area, along the west side of West Mission Bay Drive. The proposed water quality zone would capture and treat storm water before flowing into Mission Bay. Additional water quality basins would be located to treat the entire proposed project area in accordance with local and state requirements. Additional water quality enhancing features would include vegetated areas bordering development areas to further reduce storm water contamination, including debris and sediment, from reaching Mission Bay. In addition to water quality detention basins, the proposed project would incorporate site-specific BMPs to enhance water quality and would incorporate storm drainage signage. As a further water quality-enhancing feature, the edges and outfall zones of Rose Creek would be revegetated with marshes, and the east side of De Anza Cove is proposed to be revegetated with marsh, wetland, and upland native plants.

Surface Parking

Surface parking areas would be located in conjunction with the athletic areas and within the footprint of the guest housing area. Additionally, surface parking lots accessible from North Mission Bay Drive and De Anza Road would serve the proposed recreation and aquatics areas and the regional parkland areas at De Anza Cove.

Circulation and Access

Vehicular Access

A new northern extension of De Anza Road would yield two vehicular access points for regional parkland and the south access to the active recreation area. Two additional vehicular access points are planned along a reconfigured western terminus of North Mission Bay Drive; at the terminus of North Mission Bay Drive, a south-bound driveway would provide vehicular access to the guest housing area's north entrance and a north-bound driveway would provide access to the

regional parkland. From the end of the terminus of North Mission Bay Drive, the multi-use/bike pathway would continue westward to connect with the Mike Gotch Memorial Bridge and the Rose Creek Bikeway. Athletic Fields Driveway, located on the southern leg of the Grand Avenue and Bond Street intersection and the northern point of entry for vehicles, would continue to provide direct access to De Anza Cove. This intersection is currently unsignalized but is planned to be signalized and reconfigured as part of the project to improve access. Three existing parking lots on North Mission Bay Drive east of De Anza Road, as well as De Anza Road, would provide access to the guest housing lease area, the open beach area, and regional parkland areas.

Vehicular access to the proposed project site would be provided by eight vehicular access points. Four of the vehicular access points are currently in operation. As part of redevelopment of the southern portion of the project site, the existing De Anza Cove recreational area/Mission Bay RV Resort driveway would be removed. The driveways that exist on the De Anza "boot" and within existing guest housing area would be removed. The existing parking lots/drives at the Mission Bay Golf course and the San Diego Mission Bay Boat and Ski Club would be removed.

Watercraft Access

Watercraft access is currently provided immediately east of the project area at the De Anza Boat Launch. In De Anza Cove, a small non-motorized boat lease area is proposed. The existing boat ramp in De Anza Cove would be removed, and nonmotorized personal watercraft would have access in De Anza Cove from the new potential boat lease, while motorized boats would have access to De Anza Cove near the boat ramp east of the project area.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Circulation and Access

Pedestrians and bicyclists can access the proposed project area via the Rose Creek Trail from the north. In addition, bicycles and pedestrians can use the Mike Gotch Memorial Bridge over Rose Creek and traverse the proposed project area completely in the east-west direction. The proposed waterfront trail would run along the perimeter of the proposed project area at De Anza Cove and would increase bike and pedestrian access throughout the park. On the east side of Rose Creek, an existing pedestrian pathway would be enhanced to allow for pedestrian and bicycle circulation and access. Due to school district fencing and perimeter control, there is no pedestrian or bicycle access to and from Mission Bay High School. Fencing also prevents access to the reserve.

An enhanced pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would be located within the "100-foot buffer/public use zone" along the east side of Rose Creek frontage, with the tennis courts and ball fields located east of the creek by other land uses and buffers. A proposed pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would enhance connectivity to the adjacent community, the Balboa Avenue Trolley Station, and to the greater Mission Bay Park. The pedestrian and bike waterfront trail would parallel the perimeter of the low-cost visitor accommodation area, offering viewing areas and overlooks of Rose Creek, the adjacent proposed/expanded habitat area and Mission Bay. The waterfront trail would connect the guest housing area with the regional park facilities, boat rental facilities and other neighborhoods east and west of De Anza, as well other parks uses to the south. In addition, water quality features would be located along the waterfront trail.

Please preserve our much beloved, locally-used Pacific Beach Tennis Club (PBTC) in this redevelopment plan!

As you may be aware, the club has a long history in Pacific Beach. It serves hundreds of PB and nearby residents. Many are young children, learning the sport for the first time. Others are youth becoming serious about the game. Then there are scores of adults. Lastly, there are a large number of seniors who have played at the club for decades, many are in their 80s.

If you visit, especially on weekends and evenings, you'll see the crowds (families, children, teens, seniors, etc.) and packed parking lots at the tennis courts and youth fields. As a 30+ year Aquatic Biologist and having seen Mission Bay change over 70 years, I have a few comments.

1) Mission Bay is polluted, mostly from urban run off, discharge from Rose and Tecolote Creeks, lack of wetlands, and poor circulation in the "back bay" by De Anza. Adding additional wetlands is a good start. But, without addressing the other factors, the Plan will do little to improve MB water quality.

2) Wetlands need to be added to the Tecolote Creek mouth area. This is currently a stinking cess pool that adds significant pollutants to MB.

3) Restore and permanently clean up Rose and Tecolote Creeks so polluted water doesn't reach the bay.

4) Without cleaning up Rose Creek water quality, the addition of a channel into De Anza Cove will only add to a very polluted area where people will be recreating. There is very little circulation in De Anza Cove and dumping very polluted water into it will only make matters worse. Rose Creek needs to be permanently cleaned up before this channel is added.

There are other issues to address the continued pollution and degradation of MB water quality, but I'll leave that for another time.

We write on behalf of the City of San Diego Municipal Golf Committee (MGC), for which we serve as committee members. Our Committee is appointed by the Mayor and City Council to serve as a citizens' advisory group to the City's Golf Division with respect to the public golf courses directly operated by the City, which are Torrey Pines, Balboa and Mission Bay.

Mission Bay Golf Course (MBGC) has been part of our golfing and recreation community for over 63 years. It is a public, 18-hole, 2700-yard golf course operated by the Golf Division.

In fiscal year 2021, MBGC contributed rent payments of \$301,082 to the General Fund which would be reduced proportionately by a reduction in acreage for the course. The use of this area for parkland instead of the golf course would increase General Fund expenses per acre by \$15,206 per year if it was turned into general parkland. There were 102,025 rounds played at MGBC in the 2021 fiscal year plus thousands of users of the range and practice facilities.

MBGC represents about 25% of the area covered by the De Anza Revitalization Plan (Plan). We write to voice our strong support for Mission Bay Golf Course's ongoing inclusion in the Plan and remain as an 18-hole public golf course.

We want to convey to you the unique role which MBGC plays in affordable and accessible public golf throughout the City. MBGC is A LOCAL TREASURE because of its practice facilities, unique layout, and holes which enable a complete golfing experience. Its importance to younger and older golfers because of its length and walkability cannot be ignored as a healthy recreational activity. It provides a significant habitat supportive of bird life and we hope that it will soon be certified by Audubon International as environmentally well planned and operated.

MBGC is an "alternative golf course" meaning that it is composed of many par 3s, a few par 4s, and can be played in only a couple of hours. The golf industry has learned over the years that a large percentage of golf courses are so long and hard,

that people had to be professionals to enjoy the round. Alternative golf courses are more enjoyable to many levels of golfers. MBGC is user friendly in that you don't have to own an expensive set of clubs to play the course, pay outrageous green fees for access, and be an expert golfer to enjoy your round of golf. Alternative golf courses are on the rise throughout the country and are being built by more municipalities because of their unique social and recreational opportunities. They are less intimidating, welcome more casual golfers, are an excellent place to network and introduce new golfers to the game.

A new era in golf is being marked by the rise in popularity of alternative golf courses. Goat Hill Park in Oceanside, California, a par 65 course, has thrived based on a partnership with Linksoul and John Ashworth. Sweetens Cove Golf Club in Tennessee, a nine-hole course, has drawn national recognition and awards. Golf Digest is currently in the later stages of developing a list to rank the top alternative golf courses in the United States. MBGC is the perfect facility for this exciting time in golf. Limitless possibilities exist for improving, marketing and continuing to promote the virtues of MBGC.

MBGC has long served as a pipeline to the bigger public golf courses in San Diego like Balboa and Torrey Pines. If you talk to any regular at Torrey Pines Golf Course or Balboa Park Golf Course, they will know someone that first learned to golf at MBGC.

We encourage everyone to come out and see the 900 students from 12 high schools throughout the City who use MBGC as an essential part of their practice and high school competitions. We are optimistic that \$12,000,000 will soon be invested in MBGC, using allocated Golf Enterprise funds, to replace the aging clubhouse and associated infrastructure with a more up-to-date and attractive facility. These improvements are expected to further enhance the experience and revenues of MBGC.

We encourage you to come out to see the ladies club that regularly plays at MBGC on a weekly basis. Many of the members of the ladies' club are retirees who enjoy the relaxed layout and setup of this alternative course.

MBGC is the only night-lit course in the City where kids can practice after school in the winter. It also provides a unique recreational experience to the citizens of San Diego by providing a robust program for footgolf and disc golf. These are additional attractive and healthy recreational alternatives for kids after school.

Golf is currently thriving in the COVID world. It provides one of the only activities that can still go forward with proper social distancing. It's expected that most of the

people who took up the game of golf during the peak of COVID, will remain golf enthusiasts which translates into more people are playing golf than ever. The numbers support this. In July of 2021, there was an 89% increase in year over year revenue at Mission Bay. The first quarter of FY2021 year saw an increase of 8000 rounds of golf year over year. This was a 30% increase for the first quarter of FY2021 (July 1, 2020 was the start to the fiscal year). For the first quarter of FY2021 Mission Bay generated \$983,000 in revenue compared to \$632,800 in FY2020.

So, in conclusion when the time comes, the MGC urges everyone to voice their support of the Mission Bay Golf Course in the De Anza Revitalization Plan and help us express how vital it is in providing affordable and accessible public golf and recreation for the citizens of San Diego and continue to play a huge part of the Mission Bay Master Plan.

I attended tonight's De Anza scoping meeting and unfortunately was not able to participate at the time but I definitely want to share my comments on the De Anza plan.

Honestly, I am thrilled that this project is open for discussion with the community as I see many ways that the variety of groups represented tonight will benefit from the plan. First and foremost, the ReWild Mission Bay's wildest plan is far and away the most comprehensive and beneficial solution for this shared resource to continue thriving for all of us. It is absolutely vital that this plan maximizes wetland area as, as one participant pointed out, that is the specific designation of this section of Mission Bay. The community absolutely does need recreation access and opportunities for outdoor activities, but it must be balanced with robust natural areas that enhance water quality and the areas resiliency to climate change. These businesses cannot continue to thrive if the water is too toxic for human use or their infrastructures are submerged under water. As such, let's do away with the channel from Rose Creek and please please keep motorized boats out! In order for this wetland to be resilient it needs to attract as much biodiversity as possible, and even a motor at 5mph and under is a disturbance to the sensitive and highly necessary species. Please also think of the long term plan - what will this area look like as the sea level rises?? Will what we do today be compatible with the changes to come?

A HUGE priority for me and the community at large is to involve indigenous voices! Please seek their council. Not only in the approval phase, not as an afterthought, but throughout development. Restoring access to cultural heritage that has been absorbed by business and, to be frank, mismanaged public spaces, is a huge step in repatriating lands as well as deepening our collective bond with the land. People care for what they know and understand, and when we ignore indigenous perspectives we sacrifice our knowledge of what's possible here in our own backyards.

This project has the potential to be a landmark restoration site and model for other natural, educational and functionally recreational spaces in California, across the nation and across the world. We have the opportunity to take a bold stance that will benefit everyone involved and generations to come. Let's include camping, but keep RVs to a minimum and allow low impact and affordable options. De Anza Cove is another story of 30 years of neglect and lost opportunity. Nothing to do with Campland except they've tried to be good neighbors. Currently, they stepped in to manage the Mission Bay campground when operators left with little notice.

Kendall Marsh is just that – 20 acres of marsh owned by UC. It's fenced with no public access. Environmental groups help to keep it healthy.

Rose Creek has a bike path that runs for miles inland, crossing many boundaries. It tends to be trashy.

Then along comes deep-pocket, well-organized, powerful, environmental groups that think more marshland is needed. They use all the alarmist phrases – nature triumphs all, sea level rise, water quality, fish, birds, etc. Only there is no place to add marsh, so Campland becomes their target. They develop maps and besiege City Councils with grand plans. It's David vs Goliath. Campland, by its nature, can never hope to organize its base of campers who come and go from across the U.S., to this gem of a safe outdoor recreation place.

We've been RVing for 30+ years, coming to Campland 20+ years, have gone to City Council Meetings and met ReWilders and many others. Powerful special interest groups with unlimited funds are now running the show.

Here are some of my thoughts on the De Anza Natural project:

I would not put a channel through the De Anza Cove's southern peninsula, but instead I would keep it solid for the whole length. Cutting through would allow for the Rose Creek overflows to sent debris through the De Anza Cove beach area, lowering water quality. I think it is best to keep the Rose Creek flow to the west of De Anza Cove as it is now. The increased marshlands in the old Camperland space and along the current banks of Rose Creek would be better able to clean the water flowing into the bay. This would also save the expense of digging a channel and the necessity of adding two bridges for the bike and pedestrian path. It would also not travel through the middle of the RV and Camping sites causing disruption.

I would not add marshlands to the northeastern side of Mission Bay (east of De Anza Cove), but keep the marshlands contiguous on the west side of De Anza Cove. Any channeling of runoff water flows could be made to flow into Rosa Creek, upstream of the outlet. However, Marshlands could be added to the south side of De Anza Cove peninsula to help prevent erosion.

I would like to see a broad grass-lined area around the full perimeter of the De Anza Cove peninsula. Maybe 50 to 60 feet wide, this grass-line area would contain a paved bike path and possibly a separate decomposed granite walking path. Benches could be added along the route. With the greenbelt around the edges, the inside area would be for the RVs and Campers, who would also use this greenbelt area as well as their beach area. This "Regional Parklands" look would be similar to the area of Mission Bay to the south of De Anza Cove.

Improving the Rose Creek Bike Path (I'm assuming that the San Diego Mission Bay Boat & Ski facility will be going) to Mission Bay is a good idea as is making a multi-use path from the new Balboa Trolley Stop. I would also like to see a multi-use path from the Mike Gotch Bridge west to Crown Point.

Visitors to De Anza Cove mainly come by car, so leave ample parking spots not too far from the tables to where they will be carrying their coolers. It would also be environmentally favorable to have the parking spaces covered with solar cells and have a charging station, for when we switch to electrical vehicles.

Marshlands are nice and fortunately we have San Elijo Lagoon, Batiquitos Lagoon, Torrey Pines and other less populated areas where the marshlands have been preserved. Possibly some marshlands could be put in at the point where Tecolote Creek enters Mission Bay in order to improve water quality in that area. With 15 million visitors every year to Mission Bay, I think Regional Parklands is a better fit than marshlands. Whenever I've gone past Kendall-Frost existing marshlands, it has been fenced off and uninviting. Not what we need for Mission Bay. Every little bit helps. But it will not be *Nature-Based* solutions that will solve climate change but *Human-Based* solutions (Solar Panels, Windmills, and Electric Vehicles) that will solve climate change that we've created by burning fossil fuels.

1. Too much land on the east side of this project is devoted to marsh and uplands.

The new section of marsh closest to I-5 and the upland near that is prime accessible recreation space and is not very close to the actual need for marsh near Rose Creek.

SUBJECT: Comments for NOP on De Anza Natural Amendment to MBPMP

First, it still is not clear to me if this NOP for De Anza Natural is in addition to or instead of the De Anza Revitalization Plan developed by the De Anza Revitalization Ad Hoc Committee to the Mission Bay Park Committee in 2018. I understand that the Mayor supports De Anza Natural as the preferred alternative but what is happening – or has been done – with environmental review on the "Revitalization Plan"? That said, I agree with the Mayor that De Anza Revitalization should be the preferred, eventually approved, plan.

I expect the environmental review process to fully detail the many reasons that expanded wetlands in the De Anza/Northern Wildlife Preserve will be of great value and importance for mitigation for impacts of polluted runoff from the Rose Creek watershed, as well as from climate change and sea level rise, on water quality and habitat in the northeast quadrant of Mission Bay.

Water Quality is of the utmost importance in this area distant from the tidal waters from the ocean. To this point, City Charter Section 55.2 (c)(1)(B) "Wetland expansion and water quality improvements and the protection and expansion of eelgrass beds as identified in the *Mission Bay Park Master Plan*" makes clear that this is of the highest priority. Revenues from the Mission Bay Improvement Fund will serve as essential matching funds for projects related to wetland expansion and water quality improvements. The public needs to understand that there is funding available for these essential projects.

Please study in detail the ways in which expanded wetlands can serve as a recreational resource in ways similar to land-based, aquatic-oriented recreational activities. Isabelle Kaye of the UCSD Natural Reserve System addressed this in more detail during the January 24th NOP Zoom meeting.

Please address the question of human health hazards from avian fecal matter relative to impacts from human fecal matter. An epidemiological study of fecal matter in Mission Bay was conducted circa 2003 (sorry I don't have a copy); my recollection is that the vast majority if avian fecal matter. I don't recall conclusions relative to human health impacts but it's worth seeking out.

Please review and consider the attached countywide "Mission Bay Park Master Plan Update: Telephone Survey" summary with specific note of items 7 & 9.

A substantial number (96.7%) of those interviewed placed at the top (Item 7) "*preserving and enhancing the natural resources of the park*" and more than half surveyed supported taking areas out of active public use and dedicating those areas for natural resource enhancement.

Item 8 of the Survey highlights the general public agreement that the water relationship for activities in the park should influence land use. This is stated clearly in the MBPMP and is why, during the MBPMP Update process, the proposal to add formal soccer fields at South Shores was rejected. It also is why adding a skate park (there already is one at Robb Field) is inconsistent with the MBPMP. Section IV, Land Use, p.36: "AQUATIC ORIENTATION The uniqueness of Mission Bay Park lies in its aquatic setting. Fundamentally, the Park was shaped out of the water and it remains focused upon it. It is deemed essential, therefore that land use allocations in the Park be defined and arranged so as to maximize public access and enjoyment of the water. In other words, the zones with maximum exposure to the water should generally be reserved for those activities benefitting the most from such exposure, such as picnicking, strolling or bicycling."

As for proposals for an amphitheater at the De Anza area, the MBPMP includes approval for eventual construction of an amphitheater at South Shores. Page 40 of the Land Use chapter of the MBPMP includes "South Shores: About 34 acres of regional parkland are proposed in South Shores, all of it east of the embayment. This proposal is consistent with the current development plans for South Shores, although the configuration of roadways, paths, and shore revetments have been altered in an effort to improve access and circulation, enhance the water's exposure to the recreation areas, and accommodate a public, multipurpose amphitheater."

Mission Bay Park Master Plan Update: Telephone Survey

June 17, 1992

As part of the extensive efforts to reach out to the public in preparing the Mission Bay Master Plan Update, a telephone survey of San Diego County residents was conducted in April 1992. A total of 812 randomly selected households completed the interview. The text below summarizes key points raised by the survey and how they have influenced the Master Plan.

- 1. About 60 percent of the county population are non-users of Mission Bay Park; the Master Plan seeks to widen the appeal of the park to current non-users.
- 2. The heaviest use of Mission Bay Park is found in picnic areas and pedestrian/bike trails; the Master Plan increases the amount of picnic facilities and completes the network of trails.
- Water quality is a very important issue for park users; the Master Plan seeks to employ all means to improve water quality, including the creation of new marsh areas.
- 4. Safety and crime are important issues for park users; the Master Plan seeks to expand legitimate use of the park to discourage illegal activity and supports police and ranger activities. A 5,000seat public amphitheater is proposed on South Shores to bring evening use to this area of the Park.
- 5. Sewage on Fiesta Island is an important issue for park users; the Master Plan recommends replacement of the sludge drying beds with recreational amenities and dedicated lease area.
- Air pollution and odor are important issues for park users; the Master Plan recommends removal of the sludge drying beds and encourages reduction of automobile traffic.
- 7. 96.7 percent of the population believes that preserving and enhancing the natural resources of the park is important, and slightly more than half of the park's users favor taking areas of the park out of active public use and dedicating these areas for natural resource enhancement. The Master Plan dedicates 200 acres, (14%) of the Park land to natural recreation, 70 acres (5%) to wildlife habitat areas.
- 8. There is agreement among county residents that the unique water setting of the park should influence land use; the Master Plan stresses inclusion of land uses in Mission Bay which enjoy particular benefit from being located adjacent or near to water.
- 9. Park users perceive parking areas and streets as being particularly crowded. The Master Plan seeks to reduce parking and street congestion through use of remote parking at peak times, reducing the amount of on-street parking and encouraging the use of mass transit.
- 10. Park users perceive sidewalks as being crowded. The Master Plan recommends development of dual paths for separated bicycle and pedestrian use wherever possible.
- 11. There is a disagreement from county residents with proposals to ease certain height restrictions as well as increasing commercial land lease areas. The Master Plan does not concur with public sentiment on these points. The Master Plan recommends slight easing of the height restrictions for Quivira Basin and Dana Inn redevelopment projects in the belief that this will improve the visual quality of these projects.

I am a regular swimmer in the bay, and am concerned about the water quality, for everyone and everything who depends upon it. I also volunteer with San Diego Audubon to restore the California Least Tern nesting areas. I support the Re-Wild plan.

We have an opportunity to mitigate some of the vast environmental damage that Mission Bay's wetlands have suffered since they were drained and reconfigured largely for human recreational use. This type of damage would never be allowed now, knowing what we know about how everything is linked together. But we now have a situation where several known endangered species struggle to survive with the little acreage that is left to them. That acreage is regularly encroached upon by humans and dogs via land, air and water. Human activity is making it difficult for them to survive.

We have a responsibility to be stewards of this amazing environment, and can surely come up with solutions that can benefit the different species who rely on it for survival, in addition to making portions of it available for human recreation. I write as a former chair of the City of San Diego Municipal Golf Committee and personally as a San Diego golfer deeply concerned about the potential destruction of the Mission Bay Golf Course (MBGC). As I understand it, MBGC represents about 25% of the area covered by the De Anza Revitalization Plan (Plan) and thus its treatment in the Plan is critically important.

MBGC plays a unique role in providing affordable and accessible public golf for the entire San Diego region. I write first to object to the inclusion of MBGC in the Plan at all. It should be left completely intact and thus a discussion of "diluting" it in to other functions is simply wrong. Because of its practice facilities, its unique layout, and holes which enable a complete golfing experience in a mere two hours, it is a unique City course particularly for working people and younger and older golfers. It is the home course for 900 high school students and the first 18 hole course to almost everyone in San Diego taking up the game of golf if they do not have the resources to belong to a private golf club. Unless you have a facility like MBGC to learn the sport, you will never be capable of playing the iconic and challenging City golf facilities of Torrey Pines and Balboa—it is an essential part of the San Diego golf pipeline. MBGC is also the only night-lit course in the City where kids can practice after school in the winter. It also provides a unique recreational experience to the citizens of San Diego by providing a robust program for footgolf and disc golf. These are additional attractive and healthy recreational alternatives for kids after school. MBGC is every bit as important to City residents as soccer fields, baseball fields, swimming pools and other recreational resources.

MBGC is also an important element of the Mission Bay master plan which calls for recreational, environmental and commercial activities in the area. In fiscal year 2021, MBGC contributed rent payments of \$301,082 to the General Fund which would be reduced proportionately by a reduction in usage of the course. There were 102,025 rounds played at MGBC in the 2021 fiscal year plus thousands of users of the range and practice facilities. The City is about to invest thousands of dollars to construct club house facilities which will attract income from golfers and activities like weddings to its location. Its old shrubbery is home to bird life and other natural elements. MBGC should be clearly recognized as a facility which provides ALL of the values of the Mission Bay master plan—income, recreation and environmental. In a "dumbed down" version of a golf course, it will lose significant value to both users and City revenues.

In conclusion, I submit that the pending plans, which appear to do significant damage to the integrity of this 18 hole golf course where you can use every club in your bag, are a tragedy under construction. Please please please apply some conscience to your planning to resist popular calls for action and protect MBGC. Thank you for your consideration.

Please preserve and expand our much beloved, locally-used Pacific Beach Tennis Club (PBTC) in this redevelopment plan!

As you may be aware, the club has a long history in Pacific Beach. It serves hundreds of PB and nearby residents. Many are young children, learning the sport for the first time. Others are youth becoming serious about the game. Then there are scores of adults. Lastly, there are a large number of seniors who have played at the club for decades, many are in their 80s.

If you visit, especially on weekends and evenings, you'll see the crowds (families, children, teens, seniors, etc.) and packed parking lots at the tennis courts and youth fields. You'll see that PBTC is an active, affordable, and financially viable tennis facility that provides tennis and pickleball for kids, adults, and seniors. With a revitalized and hopefully expanded tennis facility, you'd see even more usage from locals, for many years to come.

Here are the major concerns shared by many other club and community members:

1. SURVIVAL

There must be a PB Tennis Club in the redevelopment plan AND it needs to be expanded and improved greatly.

2. NO DOWNTIME

If the club is moved and rebuilt, the old club is not closed until the new club opens. If the timing is done wrong and the old club is closed first, this would negatively impact membership, lessons, the youth activities, and the livelihood of the tennis clubs employees and teachers.

3. EXPANSION

As beloved as PBTC is, it has not been upgraded or expanded in it's 60+ years. Demand is such that it needs to have at least 12 courts, 2 real bathrooms (not porta-potties), and a real clubhouse above and beyond the current unheated 60-year-old tiny brick building. We also need to add Pickleball courts to satisfy the demand for that new sport.

4. PARKING

We currently share parking the ballfields next door. On many weekends, there is not enough parking. We need to be sure the amount of parking is expanded, or at least maintained. A dual or triple deck parking structure can free up land for expansion of tennis & other sports.

I am concerned that these decisions are being influenced by Environmentalist Planners who are not elected by this community. In addition, many of the proponents of the ReWild expansion don't even live here - many are from other cities & parts of California. That isn't fair. Comment regarding the PEIR's scope and alternatives to the De Anza Cove Plan:

The proposed site plan would affect existing active recreational facilities at Bob McEvoy Baseball fields, and the City golf course. The fields are also used for youth softball, soccer leagues, and adult recreational sports leagues. There is also a basketball court and bike path that would be affected by the proposed site plan.

These are the only public use soccer/ball fields in the area and are heavily used by children from 4 elementary schools.

With the increased residential density approved along the East Mission Bay Drive corridor, we expect the demand for these existing fields to proportionally increase, along with General Plan population growth estimates.

I would suggest any alternative for this area INCREASE the active recreation opportunities in the area, and congruently, the ancillary facilities including parking and lighting.

While I understand the need for a buffer along Rose Creek for climate change resiliency, this should not replace the necessity of these existing facilities. This plan does have the ability to redesign the existing space, increase the area along the frontage

SANDAG estimates an additional 1 million people in our County by 2050. Our existing active recreational facilities need to INCREASE congruently with the increased residential density in the General Plan, particularly along the Mission Bay Road corridor in this heavily impacted infill area.

The Site Plan includes 50.1 acres of "Low Cost Visitor Accommodations" which actually reserves more acreage than the "Active Recreation" area (45.4 acres), meaning it would provide non-residents with more publically available active use land than the local residents. There is a private campground across the I-5, north of the Grand/Garnet exit that can provide those transient/visitor accommodations, there is no need to remove existing active recreation facilities that are well established in our community with cheap bay-front housing. For those of us who live and pay property taxes in this area, we deal with the increased density, traffic, and noise of city life and seek out these wide open spaces as refuge from the urban spaces. Please preserve active recreation, and look for opportunities to increase the youth fields and facilities as we consider population growth in this next General Plan planning period. The tennis lessons were a modest \$5 an hour — but that was more than the eager teenager could afford.

"I'll make you a deal," said Powell Blankenship. the tall, sunburned instructor. "For every basket of balls you find me, I'll give vou a lesson."

The year was 1954. For a summer of instruction, the student searched alleys, climbed into gullies, scoured weed patches and parking lots, and came away with enough balls to develop a useful forehand.

Blankenship, his lower lip pasted white with his signature sun block, was true to his word.

Powell Blankenship's trademark was loyalty.

When Blankenship passed away in August (2005), more evidence emerged of his loyal nature.

The San Diego Union-Tribune reported that Blankenship had been offered a tennis scholarship to UCLA in the 1950s, but turned it down, loyally choosing to stay in Pacific Beach to care for his widowed mother, an invalid.

In 1960, studying at San Diego State for a teaching credential, Blankenship loyally joined the Aztec men's

tennis team at the invitation of Coach Al Olsen. A talented lefthander, Blankenship helped the Aztecs win the California Collegiate Athletic Association title in the final match of the season against Los Angeles State.

But there was a problem. The losing coach challenged Blankenship's eligibility, citing his work as a Recreation Department tennis instructor. (He had, after all, supported himself and his mother with his modest fees).

After a review of records, the conference title was with-

drawn.

"Powell was such a gentleman," said Bill Jack, the team's top player. "I doubt that he realized his participation would jeopardize the outcome of the match."

Blankenship shrugged Blankenship off the incident and began

teaching math at Pacific Beach Junior High School. For years, he gave his students tennis lessons for free.

Fred Kinne, a newspaperman and tennis patron, said that at his request, Blankenship once took a needy Mexican boy into his home so the deserving player could attend school — and play tennis.

In 1962, Blankenship became a full-time teaching pro at the Pacific Beach Tennis Club. (In 1998, he was honored as San Diego's outstanding tennis teacher).

Dear Planning Department,

Prior to the establishment of current day Mission Bay in the 1940s-1960s, that area was a mix of wetlands, marsh and salt water - a resource for the natives peoples, birds, sea life and plants. Those 4,000 plus acres of biological diversity and richness were drained and sculpted into a traditional, limited-purpose park, leaving only five percent of its most important component - wetlands.

The Department of Interior's National Park Service has developed a framework which should inform the planning of the De Anza Cove Amendment and indeed the greater planning and use of Mission Bay's future. In its Resist-Accept-Direct framework, NPS responds to the pressure of climate change by **resisting** change (working to maintain or restore current ecosystem conditions), **accepting** that an ecosystem will change without intervening, or **directing** change by actively shaping ecosystem change toward preferred new conditions.

In this case, the best alternative is to resist change by enlarging the amount of wetlands, to increasing the flow of water, connecting islands of habitat and reconfiguring park usage as detailed below:

Increase the wetland acreage by removing the channel from Rose Creek to De Anza and shrinking the island, moving more of these land uses into the Regional Parkland use

Shrink the spit west of Rose Creek and create an island farther south in the bay for high tide use by birds and protection of the marsh from Bay traffic De Anza Cove should be for non-motorized boats only.

Increase the wetland acreage! More tidal wetlands mean more carbon sequestration to help the City meet its Climate Action Plan goals.

Show us how sea level rise affects the plan!

The interpretive center should be moved to the east side of Rose Creek and should include a cultural focus.

Low-Cost Visitor Accommodation needs to specifically allow group and tent camping and the lease should not "include open beach" as the beach must remain a public, shared shoreline.

Additional wetlands are so important to the health of the people of San Diego wetlands provide recreation, fish hatcheries, plant biodiversity, bird habitat, a place close to the city to be alone with nature, to hear the sounds of nature, and to watch the birds.

I'm emailing in regards to the pending update to the DeAnza Cove/Mission Bay Master Plan. Looking at what is planned, it appears that recreation in this area of the city will be all but eliminated if the current plan is approved. There are several points that I'd like to bring to your attention, in regards to recreation in the area:

1. The McEvoy Ballfields are on land that was donated to the city, and should be kept as a recreation area, specific to the land donation. This is basically the only area for kids and adults to play baseball, softball and other sports. There is very limited green space in the Pacific beach area...this must be preserved, or rebuilt as part of any final plan. Otherwise, youth softball, little league baseball, youth soccer as well as adult softball will all be eliminated in the beach area, with no space to be rebuilt.

2. The Golf course is an area that has frequent use by all ages, and it is used by many within the community. Same with the Pacific Beach Tennis Club, which counts pickle ball players as one of its major user groups.

As a former Vice-President for the Mission Beach Town Council and resident of our beach and bay communities, I am writing to request that the City's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the De Anza Revitalization plan include an alternative that preserves RV camping access as well as recreational opportunities and amenities at current levels. Additionally, per the guiding principles presented to the public at the onset of the planning process, I request a thorough economic study be prepared on all proposals under consideration so that the full range of impacts can be understood by the City and its residents prior to adoption

As drafted, the City's preferred alternative would significantly reduce the 838 available affordable accommodations in the study area and coastal zone. Since the City of San Diego already lacks an abundance of lower cost overnight accommodations with direct access to the coast, it is imperative that the social and economic impacts any further reductions would have on the community be thoroughly analyzed and understood.

San Diego cannot afford further reductions to its already scarce supply of affordable overnight options, especially when waterfront RV camping is in more demand than ever amid the challenges of the pandemic. In 2021 alone, Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Resort hosted an estimated more than 435,000 visitors, about half of whom were residents. Both parks accommodate a wide array of RV and tent camping, and visitors enjoy an average daily rate of \$76 and space for up to six people per campsite, a huge value when compared to the many costly hotels lining the coast, which at times can average \$350 or more per night.

Per section 15131 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the Project's guiding principles presented to the public for feedback, I am also writing to request that the EIR study social effects any physical changes to the study area would have on the community's current access to affordable overnight accommodations in Mission Bay, as well as any economic impacts that would result from a reduction of the number existing waterfront RV and tent campsites, as well as publicly-available, low-cost amenities and recreation.

Since the study area's existing campsites are located within the Coastal Zone, they are of regional and statewide significance. Access to the coast is a right guaranteed to the people of California under the Coastal Act. In fact, Section 30213 of the Coastal Act requires that lower cost visitor and recreational facilities be protected and retained, encouraged and where feasible, provided. Even California's Parks Forward Commission has emphasized the need to expand such access in parks throughout California to ensure all residents and visitors to the state, including those from low-income and underserved communities, are able to benefit from outdoor experiences and aquatic recreation. Unfortunately, the City's preferred plan would dramatically reduce such access, and for that reason, the social impacts must be meaningfully assessed.

Any removal or reduction of waterfront campsites is also likely to reduce tourism and visitor spending in Mission Bay Park and the surrounding communities, triggering a host of negative economic impacts for San Diego businesses and residents. Furthermore, the City's preferred plan would presumably generate less lease revenue for the City, which is used to fund priority environmental projects and maintenance for Mission Bay Park. Given this, I recommend that the EIR also analyze the economic impacts these changes would have under the City's preferred plan.

For the reasons cited above, I strongly urge you to include in the EIR an analysis of all potential social and economic impacts associated with reducing RV accommodations that exist today in Mission Bay. Whether through modifications to the preferred plan or included alternatives, it would be in the best interest of the City and the public if the EIR studied a land use plan that preserved access to RV camping, as well as existing recreational opportunities and amenities.

Mr Moore,

I feel it would be fiscally irresponsible and culturally detrimental to millions of San Diegians and Californians to destroy existing recreational improvements at Mission Bay Park in order to attempt the accommodation of wildlife in the middle of an intensely urbanized area.

Cultural and economic impacts of the proposed alternative plans need to be identified as EIR Issues then quantified, analyzed and mitigations proposed.

The claims of the advocates for returning this area to wetlands are exaggerated. They would not benefit public access - quite the contrary. For 10s of thousands of hours annually people enjoy these existing park facilities on the shores of Mission Bay. How many bird-watchers can you expect in comparison? The loss of use, if affected, would need to be mitigated - where are you going to accomplish that?

The benefits to absorbing sea level rise by destroying these acres of parkland are less than negligible.

If the wetlands were expanded into the golf course, there would be no golf course. The game has 18 holes - you cant just take away two holes. This is also the only night-lighted golf course in the County - mitigate that.

The California State Constitution Article I, Section 25 says the public has access to the shoreline. However the Kendal-Frost Preserve is fenced off - a telling president. So if more of Mission Bay Park becomes wetlands, what additional limitations will be imposed? No golf course lights? No power boats within 1000 feet? No boat races? No night football games at the High School?

No track meets with starting guns? This is the wrong place for extensive wetlands because it is already intensely urbanized. There is an alternative location - the mouth of Tecolote Creek, which happens to be the least-used area of Mission Bay. Use some of the spoils of removing Campland to build up wetlands by Fiesta Island where they are really needed - because Tecolote Creek are, "Impaired waters."

Everyone has known since 1995 that Campland was to be eventually evacuated and excavated for additional wetlands. Don't get too carried away and destroy much needed cultural assets around the DeAnza Point area.

Greetings,

As the son of a wetlands biologist, I've seen more marshes, streams, lakes, swamps, tide pools, estuaries, and sloughs than most people who are not themselves wetland biologists. I've seen what good and bad land management can do for the health of wetlands. I've seen degradation of drainage systems without proper buffers lead to silting in of lakes and bays. I've seen flooding in areas with poor wetland health, and neighboring areas with healthy wetlands spared the worst of the flooding along the Atlantic coastal plane.

We have a critical window right now to try to reverse some of the worst effects of coastal degradation, and restore the health of our wetlands that serve as buffer zones. Implementing the ReWild Mission Bay's Wildest plan, would do the most for short term and long term gains for our Mission Bay ecosystem, and our society with indirect effects. In the near term, through habitat restoration we can increase the filtering capacity of this buffer to help clean polluted runoff leading to the bay. This in turn will help increase the vegetation in this area, which can help act as a buffer for flooding in the near to intermediate future as we deal with sea levels rise. This increase in coastal vegetation will further increase the amount of carbon that the habitat can store, thus helping move us in a better direction in terms of atmospheric carbon pollution and our climate action goals.

I'm a marine biologist in my own right now, studying the effects of sounds on marine wildlife. Wetlands are not exactly my field of study, but I know that all the species of mammals I work with now are ultimately influenced by the health of our coastal buffer zones. And they are all in desperate need of help right now.

Please do the right thing for our environment and for future generations of all the lifeforms that might enjoy this area and call it home.

I am writing in regards to Mission Bay Resort/Campland/Wetlands

Urgent: This is a public safety warning!

We lived at De Anza Mobile Home Park aka Mission Bay Resort in Mission Bay for a decade. We saw, heard, and experienced the toxic, polluted and dangerous water, air, soil, and contamination that exists there. We witnessed and experienced the many and often rare cancers and neurological illnesses that happened to many people from living there. PLEASE take the following info seriously and investigate. Please prevent current and future generations from developing the pain and suffering many others received because they weren't told of the toxic wastes. Interview former residents and employees. Most have A LOT to tell. Research these issues, please. To the best of our knowledge everything you are about to read is factually true or we believe to be true. Thank you.

BACKGROUND

1. Michael Gelfand (Owner/Manager) and his father Herbert(same): It was a common conversation among the residents of De Anza Mobile Home Park at Mission Bay to talk about and try to solve the latest problems in the park caused by the Gelfand family. Michael Gelfand was a very well known drug addict and dealer in De Anza Park. He was known throughout the former De Anza mobile home park as a huge troublemaker with his father bailing him out of trouble over and over. Michael was known as a drug addict/dealer that would "rent" his vacant mobile homes/trailers to other drug addicts and they would hold drug parties all the time. Neighborhood Watch would call the police on them as would other residents. According to another resident, the police tried to arrest Michael, but his father used his connections to make sure Michael was never prosecuted. But it wasn't just a little white lie. It was HUGE. We found an environmental report on the soil and water done by the City of San Diego that showed EXTREME contamination of the soil and water at ALL of the following: De Anza Mobile Home Park/Mission Bay Resort, Campland, Fiesta Island, Mission Bay Park, and Sea World! It was extreme and huge! It showed the many, many chemicals/toxins and what was safe levels and what was considered safe levels! It was shocking! The report was called FIVE POINTS environmental report for all five places. We went downtown to the City offices to get copies because we couldn't get it to print from the internet and they were "missing" when we asked for them. We tried to get it again from the internet and it had been quickly removed! WHY?

3. We met City construction workers at De Anza that told us they uncovered toxic waste at Sea World and almost died. Doing past research, we discovered that in the early 1980's a hotel was going to be built in the Mission Bay Park near Sea World, the plans for that hotel were stopped after other workers uncovered more drums.

4. Despite an Order from a Sitting Superior Court judge (Charles Hayes) for the park to remain unchanged during litigation, The City and park mgmt. told their workers they wanted NOTHING living at De Anza. Nothing. No plants, trees, etc. They (city agents) fed the baby animals and birds into the woodchippers. We witnessed it. There was a rare yellow bird that lived there, and it "disappeared", too. They wanted nothing living there that could designate it a protected area or preserve. There used to be thousands of ducks, raccoons, possums, birds etc... but The City is more toxic than the land and soil. It wanted everything out or dead. Violating State law and The Endangered Species Act; it got it's wish. After they were done most of the wildlife in the park, the native flora and fauna were killed. Cruelly and without mercy.

5. De Anza and almost all of the surrounding area (Five Points) is man made from the leftover toxic sludge that was dumped there during and after WWII. It is the waste from all the industrial materials that were used to build the ships, planes, etc. They dumped it in the wetlands and marsh that existed at that time. Furthermore, there was a dump in Mission Bay where they burned garbage and toxic materials and used some of the remnants to build De Anza Cove and the surrounding areas being dredged at the time. Only problem is they kept the dangers of this secret from the public and the future residents and tourists. They decided to drudge this contaminated mess up in the 1950's and call it "land". Now it was to be used for commercial purposes and recreational activities to bring income in for the city and its developers and investors. Even if innocent people died (including children), for that money, they thought this was fine. It was deemed acceptable and "usable". So, make money they did.

6. We talked to a man named Alexander at the California Coastal Commission in S.D. about the dangers and he said it didn't matter to him. He said it didn't matter what ANYONE said and The

City of San Diego was going to get whatever they wanted and nothing could stop them. He said it was already decided. This was a few years ago.

7. Again, Michael Gelfand made political contributions to Kevin Faulconer who in return advocated for the De Anza public "land" to be returned to Gelfand. The contributions were NEVER disclosed to the public or City Council until the City Council voted to lease the "land" to Gelfand for a future Campland. Faulconer was fined but the "land" was already GIVEN to Gelfand! Faulconer got his money. Gelfand got the public's property.

8. And Again, Michael Gelfand used The City of San Diego taxpayers to pay for the closing of the De Anza Mobile Home Park. In 2003, Gelfand's lease expired with the City of San Diego. According to the California Mobile home Residency Law, Gelfand was responsible for conducting a "tenant impact report" required by law. He would be financially responsible for what relocation benefits the report determined was necessary to mitigate the adverse effects of closing the park would have on the residents. He would have to pay for the removal of the homes. He would be responsible for all costs. He managed (with some help?) to get the taxpayers to cover almost all of it instead.

ARGUMENT

9. How is it the City which claims to "care" about people and the housing crisis can throw 1000 elderly, poor, war vets, children, disabled, etc. out of their homes at De Anza claiming that The City is going to use the land for TIDELANDS, WETLANDS, MARSH, but then put 400-600 "units" or cabins and parking spaces and restaurants/stores in its place? IF the land is TOXIC as it appears to be, why injure, and kill more people? For money? Horrible! IF it isn't unsafe, why did they throw the most vulnerable in society out into the streets? For MONEY? Again, horrible! Some of the residents got very little or no money at all! Are any homeless now? The City claimed it wanted everyone out to turn the "land " back to nature. Was that a lie? A lie to the public and to the courts? They said they didn't want anyone to live their "permanently". But don't some people at Campland and at Mission Bay Resort live there yearround including workers and residents? Why claim you care about the residents of San Diego but spend millions and millions of taxpayer dollars to throw them out onto the street? Why give that same "land" to a known drug addict that caused harm to the park and its residents? And again, if it is toxic, why injure and let people die for money? To avoid the "land" being closed down like 3mile Island? To avoid massive class action lawsuits? To make developers, bankers, investors, businesses, and politicians richer than they already are?

10. This we feel is the most critical part of the story. It's bad enough that there appears to be corruption, bribery, and collusion. Even abuses of taxpayer money. But to know that the lies and cover-up were done to make money at the expense of human and animal lives is unforgivable. Cancer was prevalent at De Anza. So were other illnesses and diseases. Pesticides and weed killers were used with no protection done for the residents, workers or animals. Asbestos, molds, metals, etc would be everywhere as homes were taken down and destroyed by The City and as residents lived next door. This too, was added to the soil. Natural gas leaks were everywhere said SDG&E. Water pipes broke and were contaminating the drinking water in the park and in the City lines themselves said City workers to us. We were told to never eat the fish from Mission Bay/De Anza area because it was contaminated. The Bay, too. Told not to swim in it, either. Unsafe they said. But the leaders of The City didn't care. Families, tourists, residents, ...it didn't matter who. As long as THE CITY made money, it didn't care who lived or died. Children playing in the soil, water, and sand where the construction City workers told us it was deadly. No one came to help or address the extremely important issues concerning the safety and protection of the residents, workers, citizens, tourists, plants, trees, animals, birds, fish, etc. If people lost their homes and

were homeless it didn't matter. None of them mattered. Only the money and the people who hungered for it mattered.

This is: San Diego's "Dark Waters".

The Gelfands, and Kevin Faulconer are not the only parties riding on the backs of the San Diego taxpayers and public. The two lead firms in the case Gordon, Rees, Scully, & Mansukhani LLP (GRSM), and Tatro and Zamoyski LLP 9T&Z) actively worked together to bilk the public out of tens of millions of dollars in legal fees. Because De Anza is man-made coastal land, made after 1945, it is not subject to the terms and conditions of the original 1945 deed of trust from the State of California to The City of San Diego. GRSM and T&Z knew that because residents told them that they (the residents) were grandfathered in and had done their own research. The lawyers didn't care. This is relevant because the City used the terms of that deed as their reasoning for closing the park. This is not the first time that these firms worked (we believe) together to bilk their clients out of money that was unearned or unnecessarily charged. T & Z LLP represented another park at the time (Mission Valley Village). GRSM rolled on their client and did not fight the 8x in legal fees T&Z charged GRSM client Archstone when settling that case. Tatro and Zamoyski boasted at a HOA meeting of the lies and con they pulled on Archstone! Perhaps not coincidentally, the Judge for that case was Judith Hayes, who is the wife of Charles Hayes, the judge overseeing the De Anza Mobile Home Park case. We believe that by this time GRSM and T&Z were actively working together to enrich themselves at the expense of their clients. In 2017 a request was anonymously made for the public records into the costs of litigating the De Anza Mobile Home Park cases to The City. That request is San Diego Next Request 17-2073. In order to thwart the public from finding out about the tens of millions of taxpayer dollars paid by the City to GRSM, tens of millions of dollars in legal fees were moved from the GRSM records into the spreadsheets of a company called Overland Pacific and Cutler. The reason for this is to protect the firm and the people working in that firm's best interests, but in the employ of the City of San Diego from being exposed to a scandal. The strange and unusual relationship that the City of San Diego and the City attorneys have with the law firm of Gordon and Rees especially needs investigating. The extreme amounts of taxpayer dollars that go to this PRIVATE law firm which has grown leaps and bounds because of this is a very suspect connection. Especially since the City itself has ITS OWN attorneys. Why does The City repeatedly go and hire this firm in particular? Why pay them millions and millions in taxpayer dollars?

Do former Mayors, City attorneys, etc have a hand in this? Who is profiting from all of this? Has anyone been following the money trails? Who gets to buy the public lands and/or 99 yearlong leases for almost nothing? Why do the same legal firms, investors, politicians, and businessmen seem tied to one another in acquiring the public lands? Without the publics knowledge or input?

CONCLUSION

The City of San Diego made a commitment to its citizens in 2003. It said they the land would be returned to "tidelands". The City has acted repeatedly with unclean hands and the very worst of intentions. If Mayor Todd Gloria wishes to continue that legacy, he will let the Gelfands keep Campland and/or De Anza and let the developers have their way. IF he is honest and trustworthy, he will honor the City's commitments to its citizens and environmentalists and restore the land to the tidelands/wetlands that was promised almost 20 years ago. Most of all he will not follow in the footsteps of many of his corrupt and devious predecessors. He will be transparent and reveal all the hidden secrets behind the toxic waters and soil and let the public and the media know what really went on and what was spent involving all housing and legal issues/payments. We hope that this is not a political stunt, and that the public comment on this matter is not misused as an excuse

to further renew Campland's very lucrative lease with the City of San Diego. It is interesting that Faulconer endorsed Gloria for Mayor. Many of Mayor Gloria's decisions as a councilmember and Mayor shaped the mess that the public has had to endure today. Perhaps he wasn't aware, perhaps he was. His decisions regarding Campland and Mission Bay RV Resort now and in the future will tell you if he works for the public, or he works for the Gelfands. Will the Gelfands and their employees bombard the public and the politicians with ads, interviews, comments, and a PR bonanza to acquire what Michael Gelfand wants? Probably, as they've done in the past. All of that and more; the public has the right to know and has the right to be protected by its leaders. Please investigate and research the history of these very important cases and issues and bring them to the attention of the public as soon as possible. Thank you very much,

My name is Greg Daunoras and as a resident and homeowner in Pacific Beach and having served for 14 years straight on local community organizations and City boards and commissions, I am writing to request that the City's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the De Anza Revitalization plan include an alternative that preserves RV camping access as well as recreational opportunities and amenities at current levels. Additionally, per the guiding principles presented to the public at the onset of the planning process, I request an economic study be prepared on all proposals under consideration.

Per section 15131 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), I am also writing to request that the EIR study social effects any physical changes to the study area would have on the community's current access to affordable overnight accommodations in Mission Bay, as well as any economic impacts that would result from a reduction of the number existing waterfront RV and tent campsites, as well as publicly-available, low-cost amenities and recreation.

As drafted, the City's preferred alternative would significantly reduce the 838 available affordable RV and tent accommodations in the study area and coastal zone, which have an average daily rate of \$76 and space for up to 6 people. Since the City of San Diego already lacks an abundance of lower-cost overnight accommodations with direct access to the coast, it is important that the social and economic impacts any further reductions would have on the community be thoroughly analyzed and understood.

Reductions to waterfront RV camping would have the biggest impact on access since, unlike other types of accommodations in Mission Bay Park, RV campsites hold far more people at a much lower rate per person. At the same time, they offer similar comforts as costlier hotels lining the Bay. Because of these advantages, they are in-demand accommodations for large groups and families seeking access to Mission Bay's coastline at a price they otherwise could not afford.

For the reasons cited above, I request that you to include in the EIR an analysis of all potential social and economic impacts associated with reducing RV accommodations that exist today in Mission Bay. Whether through modifications to the preferred plan or included alternatives, it would be in the best interest of the City and the public if the EIR studied a land use plan that preserved access to RV camping, as well as existing recreational opportunities and amenities.

As a Mission Beach Town Council member, resident and businessowner, I am writing to request that the City's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the De Anza Revitalization plan include an alternative that preserves RV camping access as well as recreational opportunities and amenities at current levels. Additionally, per the guiding principles presented to the public at the onset of the planning process, I request a thorough economic study be prepared on all proposals under consideration so that the full range of impacts can be understood by the City and its residents prior to adoption.

As you know, waterfront RV and tent camping in northeast Mission Bay is a beloved recreational pastime for hundreds of thousands of residents and visitors each year. San Diego's Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Resort in Mission Bay Park stand apart as the City's sole recreational vehicle (RV) and tent campgrounds offering affordable, direct beachfront access for families.

Each year, these campgrounds host hundreds of thousands of visitors, many of whom are local residents, accommodating a wide array of RV and tent camping and aquatic recreation. Most notably, visitors enjoy an average daily rate of \$76 for and space for up to six people per campsite, a tremendous value compared to the waterfront hotels in Mission Bay, which can average \$350 or more per night. In fact, throughout this planning process, more community feedback was submitted in favor of preserved or expanded waterfront camping than any other use under consideration. The City of San Diego has a critical need for affordable coastal accommodations, and the Mission Bay Park Master Plan recommends that up to 60 acres of the De Anza peninsula be set aside for waterfront RV camping for this very reason.

Despite this, the City's preferred plan limits campsites to 600 spaces or less, a drastic and unnecessary reduction to San Diego's already scarce supply of affordable coastal accommodations. It is also well worth noting that these campsites host a unique opportunity for ecological education and appreciation while Campland serves as an ecological ambassador for Mission Bay. I ask that the draft EIR study an alternative that goes further to reflect community input and market demand for waterfront RV camping and recreation, both of which are identified as priorities in the Master Plan. Doing so would simply allow the City to have a more complete range of options when the issue comes before the Council for a vote.

The De Anza Natural Plan deserves credit for its efforts to improve the ecological aspects of northeast Mission Bay. However, such measures are still possible without reducing or removing existing recreational resources and infrastructure for affordable waterfront RV camping that has been faithfully serving the public for generations.

In addition to being an affordable, low-impact recreational use, camping creates a strong source of income for Mission Bay Park and the City at-large. To fulfill the promises of a final De Anza General Development Plan, there will need to be significant ongoing funding sources.

In 2021 alone, Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Park are estimated to have had more than 435,00 visitors and generated nearly \$5 million in tax and lease revenues for City, and this figure does not even include the tourism dollars generated from campers visiting nearby businesses. To better understand the impacts of the alternatives under consideration, and ensure consistency with the project's guiding principles, please ensure all alternatives undergo a robust economic analysis that quantifies:

- The current revenue generated by Campland on the Bay and other leaseholds currently in the study area.
- The anticipated effects of the City's preferred alternative, including a 40% (or greater) reduction in current camping, and the resulting economic impacts this would have on:
 - o Local businesses
 - o TOT monies
 - o The Mission Bay Park Improvement Fund
- The cost and funding sources of the amenities that the City is proposing in its preferred alternative.
- Per <u>Section 15131</u> of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the EIR should also study the social effects any physical changes to the study area would have on the community's current access to affordable overnight accommodations in Mission Bay, as well as any economic impacts that would result from a reduction of the number existing campsites.

I write these comments at the request of my neighbors (identified below) who share my serious concerns for the direction the City Staff and Mayor's office seem to have recently taken regarding the 're-wilding' of the north east corner of Mission Bay Park.

The De Anza peninsula acreage was vacated by the De Anza trailer parks illegal squatters, several years ago. They left dozens of uninhabitable trailers, walls and fences making the publically owned property unsafe for use. Three years ago large citizen groups attended three City sponsored community meeting to define plans for enlarging the public space in De Anza Park. The over whelming majority voted (at least twice in the three meetings) to maintain Mission Bay golf course, **AS IS** and to enlarge the existing recreational sports fields. The same majority voiced strong preference to keep the beautiful grass areas along Interstate 5 for volleyball, picnics and family gatherings as well maintaining the look of this beautiful entrance into San Diego via Interstate 5 South. Very few wanted any serious changes made to the park area. The City Council honored the public's preferences, so we thought.

Now, we understand the City Staff has come to agreement with the LA Audubon Society's claims that the north east corner of the World Famous Mission Bay Aquatic Park would be better utilized if:

- the recreational and sports fields are reduced in size
- the beach and shoreline access, park and picnic space is reduced
- the number of overnight camping spaces are reduced
- and the very popular Mission Bay Golf course is reduced in size (currently only 2700 yards verses a standard 5000-7000 yds. golf course)
- All of this done by removing thousands of cubic yards of grass,

trees and landscaped park to create a marsh and 'natural' sand dunes.

Back in the 1950-60's there were sand dunes along what was then, Pacific Coast Highway and they **smelled** at every low tide. There were **mosquitos** from the stagnant water in the area and DDT was sprayed down our street, Thomas St. in Pacific Beach. The City residents loved what their City government created when they removed the smelly dunes.

There are over 15 million visitors to Mission Beach every year. During the CoVid pandemic, once the beaches were re-opened, even more residents and visitors escaped to beautiful Mission Bay Aquatic Park, to get outdoors, without spending a fortune. It appears CoVid may be here to stay, in one format or another. Going to the beach will be one of the few affordable ways to keep the family healthy enjoying the outdoors.

The Mission Bay Golf course is the most popular and frequented location with 102,025 rounds of golf played in 2021 and 60,441 rounds during OPEN months in 2020. Second is the sports fields and tennis. It is very affordable (\$17 for S.D. residents). See the chart below defining the recorded hours and participants usage (City Golf Course records and Scheduled baseball, soccer, and tennis records for 2021). The additional space left by the trailer park, is enough space to fit everything and add more, not less!!

Make it better, not worse for people!!!

The Audubon Society claims digging up the existing grass, trees and park will help reduce the carbon foot print. That is just not accurate. Yes, marsh helps absorb carbon, but so does grass, trees and shrubbery which currently exist 3-4 feet above the projected marsh and dunes levels?

- What is the carbon footprint of destroying the existing park?
- What is the carbon footprint of digging up the existing peninsula, possibly destabilizing the whole north east end of Mission Bay?

• Balboa Dr. at Mission Bay is one of only two main exits to leave Mission and Pacific Beach. What happens when the land is lowered 3 feet to create a MARSH? Is it still an exit for Tsunami emergency, or sea level rise?

• The cost and time required to turn the existing PARADISE into a MARSH is not desirable when any conscience is applied or voted on by the

vast majority of San Diegans.

Please, please, please do not cause significant damage to a wonderful park to satisfy unfounded 'ecological benefits' over people's daily needs. Healthy people need to get out doors by enjoying our beautiful Mission Bay Park, not be tortured with a re-established mosquitos problem and very smelly "natural sand dunes" **created for birds and animals, not people.**

Oh yes, I forgot to mention, the current bacterial contamination in Mission Bay is 67% avian waste, 9% canine waste, 5% human, 5% marine mammal, 4% other mammal waste plus 10% unknown. What will it increase to when additional avian and animal waste is added from the enlarged MARSH?

Please consider our position and do not go forward with Marsh on the east side of Rose Creek or reducing existing recreational facilities. Move Campland to the peninsula and enlarge the marsh on the east side of Rose Creek. Make NO earth moving changes. Please!

As we adjusted you our new community, we discovered a baseball and softball league in our neighborhood. These leagues are located on McEvoy, the land proposed in the DeAnza Cove. Many of children playing in the leagues are military dependents and long time residents of Mission Bay, Pacific Beach, Claremont, North Park, just to name a few.

Along with softball and baseball we also have the soccer league. McEvoy Park is a blessing. It gives our children a place to participate in various sports. These leagues are affordable to many families. It's a place various communities are able to gather to provide healthy activities for our youth. Sports help with the struggles we have inherited due to the pandemic. Mental health has become a common disturbance not only our children, but adults as well. This park continues to give us the opportunity to give our children the means to help release whatever anxiety and stresses they may not be able to verbalize. It's a safe place to develop self-esteem, social skills, sharing and a common joy of playing. As a parent, sports provide a place our older children can be safe and stay out of trouble. It is also a good opportunity for the parents to bond with their children as they help out with practice. A good number of volunteer coaches, past and present, have played on the same fields as children. Some have sat on the league Boards and some have donated equipment and money to help out.

We have many areas for water sports but not for the ones requiring fields. The school fields are costly for private use. The recreation sports can also impede on school teams. Not all parents can afford clubs or travel ball. Besides our youth, McEvoy fields are used by other teams. The adult softball teams play games at night, since that is the only field with lights. The elderly team have games during the day, as schools are in session. During Covid restrictions all school fields were closed for practice. McEvoy was open for use, if Covid Rules were kept. College, travel, Mission Bay High School teams utilized the fields until their school fields opened up. Games were not allowed, but training was. With the gyms closed for indoor use, people also came with their own equipments and worked out on the fields.

The location of McEvoy is prime. It's close to the high school, freeways and bike path. It is away from the busy congested streets, that are also lined with bars as you drive further west. The older youth are able to commute on bikes and walking while not running into intoxicated adults. The military housing is within walking distance and the majority of the households have families. Within a mile there are two elementary schools. There is a good size amount of families that will benefit from having sports available nearby. With the bike path running along side the fields, it helps the kids who bike to practice commute safely. The bike path and the fields, help both pedestrians and athletes have more eyes for safety in numbers. I have utilized the bike path with my children and I feel much safer when I see someone along the path. I avoided the lights and crazy drivers that run red lights, yes, there are many. It's the safest way for a pedestrian to cross from Balboa Avenue to Grand Avenue.

I do beg of you to reconsider destroying McEvoy. You maybe saving the environment, but to the cost of our community, especially our children, is monumental. Our community needs a place that is affordable, safe and able to utilize. If you take this sports field away, there is no space available to relocate. There are no fields nearby that could accommodate three different leagues. Yes, it's crowded but we share it respectfully. Skating in skateparks can be dangerous because when a skateboarder falls off their board it becomes a projectile that is dangerous to skaters. We need our own area similar in size to the Liberty Station area or larger. The surface should be level court grade concrete with minimal expansion joints. The size should be 80'x200', it should also have an exemption to the sound ordinance so we can play music loud enough to cover the area at a comfortable volume.

As a Mission Beach Town Council member, small business owner and resident, I am writing to request that the City's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the De Anza Revitalization plan include an alternative that preserves RV camping access as well as recreational opportunities and amenities at current levels. Additionally, per the guiding principles presented to the public at the onset of the planning process, I request a thorough economic study be prepared on all proposals under consideration so that the full range of impacts can be understood by the City and its residents prior to adoption.

As you know, waterfront RV and tent camping in northeast Mission Bay is a beloved recreational pastime for hundreds of thousands of residents and visitors each year. San Diego's Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Resort in Mission Bay Park stand apart as the City's sole recreational vehicle (RV) and tent campgrounds offering affordable, direct beachfront access for families.

Each year, these campgrounds host hundreds of thousands of visitors, many of whom are local residents, accommodating a wide array of RV and tent camping and aquatic recreation. Most notably, visitors enjoy an average daily rate of \$76 for and space for up to six people per campsite, a tremendous value compared to the waterfront hotels in Mission Bay, which can average \$350 or more per night. In fact, throughout this planning process, more community feedback was submitted in favor of preserved or expanded waterfront camping than any other use under consideration. The City of San Diego has a critical need for affordable coastal accommodations, and the Mission Bay Park Master Plan recommends that up to 60 acres of the De Anza peninsula be set aside for waterfront RV camping for this very reason.

Despite this, the City's preferred plan limits campsites to 600 spaces or less, a drastic and unnecessary reduction to San Diego's already scarce supply of affordable coastal accommodations. I ask that the draft EIR study an alternative that goes further to reflect community input and market demand for waterfront RV camping and recreation, both of which are identified as priorities in the Master Plan.. Doing so would simply allow the City to have a more complete range of options when the issue comes before the Council for a vote.

The De Anza Natural Plan deserves credit for its efforts to improve the ecological aspects of northeast Mission Bay. However, such measures are still possible without reducing or removing

existing recreational resources and infrastructure for affordable waterfront RV camping that has been faithfully serving the public for generations.

In addition to being an affordable, low-impact recreational use, camping creates a strong source of income for Mission Bay Park and the City at-large. To fulfill the promises of a final De Anza General Development Plan, there will need to be significant ongoing funding sources.

In 2021 alone, Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Park are estimated to have had more than 435,00 visitors and generated nearly \$5 million in tax and lease revenues for City, and this figure does not even include the tourism dollars generated from campers visiting nearby businesses. To better understand the impacts of the alternatives under consideration, and ensure consistency with the project's guiding principles, please ensure all alternatives undergo a robust economic analysis that quantifies:

- The current revenue generated by Campland on the Bay and other leaseholds currently in the study area.
- The anticipated effects of the City's preferred alternative, including a 40% (or greater) reduction in current camping, and the resulting economic impacts this would have on:
 - o Local businesses
 - o TOT monies
 - o The Mission Bay Park Improvement Fund
- The cost and funding sources of the amenities that the City is proposing in its preferred alternative.
- Per <u>Section 15131</u> of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the EIR should also study the social effects any physical changes to the study area would have on the community's current access to affordable overnight accommodations in Mission Bay, as well as any economic impacts that would result from a reduction of the number existing campsites.

For the reasons cited above, I strongly urge you to include in the EIR an analysis of all potential social and economic impacts associated with reducing RV accommodations that exist today in Mission Bay. Whether through modifications to the preferred plan or included alternatives, it would be in the best interest of the City and the public if the EIR studied a land use plan that preserved access RV camping, as well as existing recreational opportunities and amenities.

I fully support the current plan. It is a good balance between current uses (golf, low cost camping, and recreation) and new uses (increased wetlands, bike / walk paths and viewing areas).

I do not believe any additional space should be allocated to camping: the designated acreage is sufficient and a fair portion of the total area. In addition, I believe we should not prioritize rental usage (fee based camping) over space & access for all residents and visitors. Any increased space for camping reduces space and amenities for residents and visitors.

In addition, I strongly recommend that the camping area contract be awarded via an open RFP process. And that all companies who submit proposals have a "clean record" regarding current operations and litigation vs the city of San Diego. We cannot allow any of the leasehold operations to be contracted to entities who have a history of bad relationships with the city.

SCH No.: 2018061024. This part of Mission Bay has such critical resources to the region's wildlife and recreational and educational opportunities for the public. The expansion of Kendall Frost Marsh for increased wetland restoration is extremely important as it is the last refuge of the historical ecosystem of Mission Bay. Wetland restoration allows for increased habitat to state and federally protected endangered species, protect biodiversity and functionally wildlife corridors upstream of Rose creek, and improves water quality in Deanza Cove. Increasing wetland habitat can be accomplished by reducing the size of the island and removing the channel from Rose Creek to De Anza. Wetland restoration is coastal dependent and this allows for a prime opportunity to address overlooked priorities. Sea Level Rise has increasingly revealed how fast our shorelines can change in the near future. The EIR should analyze the most recent SLR scenarios and how the Plan will accommodate for 80 acres of additional functional wetlands creating a total of 120 acres of wetlands will remain after 2100 SLR projections. The EIR will need to show flexibility and resiliency to reckon with SLR as future predictions could be arriving on shorter timescales.

The EIR should analyze a smaller island with low impact camping with no permanent structures and no roads allowing motorized vehicles. This will allow for SLR to slowly reclaim this land without damaging infrastructure. Visitor accommodations should allow group and tent camping and the beach must remain a public accessible shoreline through multi use trails. Habitat restoration should include only native plants and the ability to migrate inland with transitional habitat as the shoreline changes. The interpretive center should be relocated to the east side of Rose Creek and should include a cultural focus with historical and ancestral ties to the Lipay-Tipay Kumeyaay Tribal heritage and current Native American cultural leadership.

Identity of Commenter

The Southern California Golf Association (SCGA) is a 122-year-old non-charitable nonprofit corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of California to provide certain public benefits to 446 golf courses, 1,250 member clubs and 185,000 individual members. While the Association's offices are in Los Angeles, the SCGA is very much a region-wide organization. The Association's President resides in San Diego County. The following comments are submitted on behalf of the entire organization.

Requested Action

That per the "De Anza Cove Area – North" description of the "Project Components" as described in the Notice of Preparation, the Mission Bay Golf Course remain an integral component of the proposed De Anza Natural Plan, particularly now that the Parks Department has begun construction of an \$11 million capital improvement plan that includes a new irrigation system, new electrical system, new golf shop building, and new Food/beverage building, all paid out of proceeds from the city's golf enterprise fund.

Comments

Mission Bay is an 18-hole, par 58 executive golf course and practice facility, the only such facility with night lighting in San Diego. It has served the community for 66 years and provided San Diego residents with precisely the kind of accessible and affordable golf experience conducive of introducing young persons and young adults to the game so that the ranks of those capable of playing and enjoying the city's regulation 18-hole facilities (Torrey Pines and Balboa Park) continue to be replenished. It is also conducive of keeping seniors in a recreational activity that they might otherwise be forced to withdraw from, were their only choices very long and difficult courses such as Torrey Pines. The course has always played host to at least 60,000 + rounds over those 66 years and is playing host to roughly 50% more in the COVID era (102,000 rounds last year), which is indicative of the facility's strong market position, a position that promises to become considerably stronger once the facility is refurbished per extant plans of the city's Parks Department. The driving range alone brought in over \$1.1 million in revenue last year.

Given that the Golf Division is ready to execute those refurbishments cum income generation plans, a De Anza Natural Plan that incorporates them into its greater plan for the entire Mission Bay recreational complex would allow for a newly renovated Mission Bay Golf Club to become one of the first anchors of a greater De Anza recreational complex.

Golf is an important component of San Diego's economy, particularly that portion of it related to tourism. While Torrey Pines and the city's many resort and daily fee courses are the facilities that most come to mind when tallying up the dollars generated thereby, one must not forget that courses such as Mission Bay are the ones that provide the front-end portal for those back-end dollars --- the non-glamorous boiler room of the industry's economic engine, albeit a "boiler room" that generates real dollars while providing recreation to thousands of San Diego residents.

The SCGA would also add the following points concerning the many environmental benefits of golf properties, including but certainly not limited to the following:

- Turf grass acts as a filter that traps pollutants before they reach groundwater supplies;
- Turf grass reduces greenhouse emissions;
- Golf courses act as fire breaks;
- Golf courses prevent erosion and thus mitigate flooding during heavy storms; and
- Golf courses provide habitat for migrating birds and other wildlife.

Conclusion

Mission Bay Golf Club is a valuable recreational and financial asset as is. It promises to become a considerably more valuable recreational and financial asset as soon as the city completes all of the improvements envisaged by the \$11 million project now underway. This would be consistent with every iteration of the various De Anza Revitalization and/or Master Plans that have come under consideration to date, including this latest one.

The City Planners' decision to keep the De Anza Cove North Area as an active recreation amenity replete with golf and other active recreational activities is in keeping with the balanced approach the project's planners have taken with respect to this revitalization effort from day one, and a balanced approached heartily endorsed by the Southern California Golf Association and its members and member clubs in San Diego.

On behalf of the SCGA and its 185,000 members in general and San Diego members in particular, I want to thank you for considering our views.

Our overarching comment is support of the general thrust of the NOP. We particularly note the proposal's:

• Extensive restoration of marsh adjacent to the Kendall-Frost Mission Bay Marsh.

- Intent to conduct marsh restoration and redevelopment of the Mission
- Bay Park lands within the NOP in one effort, rather than in piecemeal fashion.
 Incorporation of a wetlands interpretive center as part of the plan. This

• Incorporation of a wettands interpretive center as part of the plan. This center can serve multiple public needs as a tourist venue, education hub, and site for the Kumeyaay to share their culture and history.

• Placement of camping and recreation features upslope of the restored wetlands, where the latter can act as a "green sponge" or "living shoreline" to protect City infrastructure from coastal flooding.

We also applaud the general principle that coastal infrastructure should be resilient to flooding either because structures can be moved prior to flooding (like yurts, willow houses, and tents), or are relatively undamaged by flooding (such as walking paths, native gardens, and boat launches).

We hope that the plan follows the recommendations in the RWQCB SEP. It is difficult to assess the NOP fully at this stage given the broad definition used for wetlands (*"The expanded wetland area will include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; oyster beds; and open water"*) and without an analysis of the impact of predicted sea-level rise.

Below we comment on how to maximize ecosystem services from the restored wetlands. Some of these services are of considerable dollar value-more than \$1 million per year in the case of enhancements to the recreational and commercial fisheries-while others, such as carbon sequestration for the City's Climate Action Plan, pollution abatement, and public access are important for different parts of the City's responsibilities to its citizens.

Our Recommendations:

1. Most of the dollar value of ecosystem services that San Diego can get from marsh restoration depend upon a vibrantly growing marsh; those values include carbon storage, sea-level rise protection, coastal property values, fisheries enhancements, habitat value for wildlife, human health benefits, tourism and public access, and pollution reduction. Both the existing and restored marsh need water and sediment to grow well and to balance decomposition, erosion, and sea-level rise. Channelization of Rose Creek has diverted fresh water and sediment directly into the bay where it creates problems with water pollution and the need for periodic dredging. To correct this situation, Rose Creek should be de-channelized and restored to a system of distributary channels that deliver fresh water and sediment throughout the marsh. Recommendations: (a) Shrink the island and replace that area with wetlands, dechannelizing the eastern leg of Rose Creek; (b) Eliminate the upland peninsula in the former Campland site to create contiguous marsh across the northern shore of Mission Bay (c) reconnect to Rose Creek to the western part of the marsh in the Northern Wildlife Preserve and Kendall Frost Reserve via a western distributary channel.

2. It is critical that the redesign of the wetlands is done in a unified fashion, so that distributary channels can be designed to work across all the parcels slated for marsh restoration. A unified planning process and implementation program is critical to obtain a healthy wetlands system that can maximize ecosystem services to the people of San Diego. Recommendation: (a) conduct the planning, hydrodynamic modeling, and restoration effort in one project designed to maximize circulation of water through the entire wetland.

3. The ReWild project did an engineering study that concluded that a de-channelized creek would blow out in heavy rains and flow directly into Mission Bay. Embracing a coastal habitat design that allows Rose Creek and its distributary creeks to change shape in response to rain and storm events will add resilience to the system. Recommendations: (a) The solution is to design the creek bed with the initial bends upstream within the existing Golf Course and Park land to avoid hard turns in the channel close to the Mission Bay shoreline; (b) Construction of the distributary channels should avoid the use of hard infrastructure to lock channels into place.

4. The NOP suggests creating a new DeAnza basin with surrounding beaches. This design continues the current problem with building beaches in areas where water

circulation will be slow on a seasonal basis, and pollution loads could be high. Recommendations: (a) Beaches should fringe part of the marsh on Mission Bay, seaward of the marsh. The beaches will help protect the marsh from erosion created by the wakes of boat traffic on the bay; (b) A boardwalk or bridges should be constructed to connect the uplands to the beach in areas where public beach access is desired so that people can walk over the marsh to the beach; (c) The beaches fringing the marsh should not border the entire span of the wetlands along the northern shore of Mission Bay but should leave part of the marsh near the Kendall-Frost Mission Bay Marsh Reserve with mudflat habitat between the marsh and the bay.

5. Camping is compatible with marsh restoration and retreat from sea-level rise since the infrastructure costs are low and campers could retreat during forecast storm or flooding events. However, the NOP places camping within the marsh rather than concentrating it inland of the uplands bordering the marsh. The NOP design minimizes most ecosystem services that could be provided by restored marsh by creating a marsh fringe rather than continuous wetland. The design also exposes the camping area to flooding since there is insufficient space to create a system of upland, high marsh, and transition zone into regularly flooded marsh. This gradient of coastal habitats is critical for high-tide refugia of birds and other animals. For the same reason, the cost associated with updating and maintaining the pavement, electrical, water, and sewage infrastructure to support RVs in this area will become a literal sunk cost from sea-level rise occurring this century. Recommendations: (a) Move camping behind the uplands in what is now DeAnza parkland next to the golf course; (b) Create gradually sloping topography from native uplands to high marsh, a transition to high salinity habitat in the mid marsh, and continued transition into low marsh and bay mudflats. Camping with non-permanent infrastructure could be available initially in the native uplands until future sea-level rise causes each wetlands habitat to shift inland.

6. A primary value of marsh restoration is to increase free public access to a shoreline habitat that most of us do not see. The actual coastline should not be a fee-based area, as it is in current use with fee-based camping right up to the water. Recommendations: (a) The NOP should include an extensive system of wide boardwalks and bird hides that allow the public to see the marsh habitats and create a walking trail between Pacific Beach and Fiesta Island along the coast–one leg of a trail network that could go completely around Mission Bay and link to the trolley; (b) The boardwalks should start and end in areas with direct public access, so that walkers do not have to pass through fee-based camping to get to the trail network; (c) Move fee-based camping northward to ensure free public access to the coast.

7. One or more of the main distributary channels should be partly open to nonmotorized watercraft and accessed either upstream at a boat launch in Rose Creek, or at a floating dock on Mission Bay (such as the existing boat launch off N. Mission Bay Drive). Recommendations: (a) At least one of the distributary channels of Rose Creek should be open to non-motorized watercraft; (b) Distributary channels to other parts of the wetland, particularly those feeding Kendall Frost Mission Bay Marsh Reserve should be designated for seasonal closures to protect nesting habitat of endangered or threatened species; (c) To make the marsh a more interesting place for non-motorized personal watercraft, the shoreline that is not fringed with beaches should have re-entrants and islands.

8. As noted above, we applaud the idea of an interpretive center associated with marsh restoration (a "Wetlands Education Center"). Landscaping for the placement of the interpretive center should not prevent Rose Creek from flowing freely into the wetlands, however. While we are not prescriptive of the location, it is possible that the Interpretive Center may be best placed on the east shore of Rose Creek to maximize access from the roads and public transportation and minimize interference with the distributary channel system of Rose Creek. Recommendations: (a) A location within walking distance of Mission Bay High School and associated parking is ideal so that the interpretive center could be used by MBHS students and other SD Unified classes and afterschool programs; (b) The location should also be served by paths/sidewalks to the Trolly Station; (c) The interpretive center should have indoor and outdoor lab spaces for use by SD Unified schools as well as aquarium spaces for public interpretation; (d) The center should be located to feed visitors onto the boardwalks that lead into the marsh; (e) The center could also be a location for a docent program of guided tours of the wetland and for community engagement.

9. Wetlands also figure in Kumeyaay heritage where wetland access can help tell a story of Native American cultural history and land use. The cultural and educational value of this coastal access project would be greatly enhanced by giving Kumeyaay knowledge and priorities a central place in its planning and ongoing evolution. Recommendations: (a) Kumeyaay culture should be a major element of all educational exhibits in a "Wetlands Education Center" or informational panels next to walkways; (b) Access for their on-site practices, including horticulture, fishing, structures, and ceremonial sites should be built directly in the plan, not just as a tourist attraction.

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We also applaud the general principle that coastal infrastructure should be resilient to flooding either because structures can be moved prior to flooding (like yurts, willow houses, and tents), or are relatively undamaged by flooding (such as walking paths, native gardens, and boat launches).

We hope that the plan follows the recommendations in the RWQCB SEP. It is difficult to assess the NOP fully at this stage given the broad definition used for wetlands ("*The expanded wetland area will include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; oyster beds; and open water*") and without an analysis of the impact of predicted sea-level rise.

Below we comment on how to maximize ecosystem services from the restored wetlands. Some of these services are of considerable dollar value–more than \$1 million per year in the case of enhancements to the recreational and commercial fisheries–while others, such as carbon sequestration for the City's Climate Action Plan, pollution abatement, and public access are important for different parts of the City's responsibilities to its citizens.

Our Recommendations:

1. Most of the dollar value of ecosystem services that San Diego can get from marsh restoration depend upon a vibrantly growing marsh; those values include carbon storage, sea-level rise protection, coastal property values, fisheries enhancements, habitat value for wildlife, human health benefits, tourism and public access, and pollution reduction. Both the existing and restored marsh need water and sediment to grow well and to balance decomposition, erosion, and sea-level rise. Channelization of Rose Creek has diverted fresh water and sediment directly into the bay where it creates problems with water pollution and the need for periodic dredging. To correct this situation, Rose Creek should be de-channelized and restored to a system of distributary channels that deliver fresh water and sediment throughout the marsh.

Recommendations: (a) Shrink the island and replace that area with wetlands, de-channelizing the eastern leg of Rose Creek; (b) Eliminate the upland peninsula in the former Campland site to create contiguous marsh across the northern shore of Mission Bay (c) reconnect to Rose Creek to the western part of the marsh in the Northern Wildlife Preserve and Kendall Frost Reserve via a western distributary channel.

2. It is critical that the redesign of the wetlands is done in a unified fashion, so that distributary channels can be designed to work across all the parcels slated for marsh restoration. A unified planning process and implementation program is critical to obtain a healthy wetlands system that can maximize ecosystem services to the people of San Diego. Recommendation: (a) conduct the planning, hydrodynamic modeling, and restoration effort in one project designed to maximize circulation of water through the entire wetland.

3. The ReWild project did an engineering study that concluded that a de-channelized creek would blow out in heavy rains and flow directly into Mission Bay. Embracing a coastal habitat design that allows Rose Creek and its distributary creeks to change shape in response to rain and storm events will add resilience to the system. Recommendations: (a) The solution is to design the creek bed with the initial bends upstream within the existing Golf Course and Park land to avoid hard turns in the channel close to the Mission Bay shoreline; (b) Construction of the distributary channels should avoid the use of hard infrastructure to lock channels into place.

4. The NOP suggests creating a new DeAnza basin with surrounding beaches. This design continues the current problem with building beaches in areas where water circulation will be slow on a seasonal basis, and pollution loads could be high. Recommendations: (a) Beaches should fringe part of the marsh on Mission Bay, seaward of the marsh. The beaches will help protect the marsh from erosion created by the wakes of boat traffic on the bay; (b) A boardwalk or bridges should be constructed to connect the uplands to the beach in areas where public beach access is desired so that people can walk over the marsh to the beach; (c) The beaches fringing the marsh should not border the entire span of the wetlands along the northern shore of Mission Bay but should leave part of the marsh near the Kendall-Frost Mission Bay Marsh Reserve with mudflat habitat between the marsh and the bay.

5. Camping is compatible with marsh restoration and retreat from sea-level rise since the infrastructure costs are low and campers could retreat during forecast storm or flooding events. However, the NOP places camping within the marsh rather than concentrating it inland of the uplands bordering the marsh. The NOP design minimizes most ecosystem services that could be provided by restored marsh by creating a marsh fringe rather than continuous wetland. The design also exposes the camping area to flooding since there is insufficient space to create a system of upland, high marsh, and transition zone into regularly flooded marsh. This gradient of coastal habitats is critical for high-tide refugia of birds and other animals. For the same reason, the cost associated with updating and maintaining the pavement, electrical, water, and sewage infrastructure to support RVs in this area will become a literal sunk cost from sea-level rise occurring this century. Recommendations: (a) Move camping behind the uplands in what is now DeAnza parkland next to the golf course; (b) Create gradually sloping topography from native

uplands to high marsh, a transition to high salinity habitat in the mid marsh, and continued transition into low marsh and bay mudflats. Camping with non-permanent infrastructure could be available initially in the native uplands until future sea-level rise causes each wetlands habitat to shift inland.

6. A primary value of marsh restoration is to increase free public access to a shoreline habitat that most of us do not see. The actual coastline should not be a fee-based area, as it is in current use with fee-based camping right up to the water. Recommendations: (a) The NOP should include an extensive system of wide boardwalks and bird hides that allow the public to see the marsh habitats and create a walking trail between Pacific Beach and Fiesta Island along the coast–one leg of a trail network that could go completely around Mission Bay and link to the trolley; (b) The boardwalks should start and end in areas with direct public access, so that walkers do not have to pass through fee-based camping to get to the trail network; (c) Move fee-based camping northward to ensure free public access to the coast.

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8. As noted above, we applaud the idea of an interpretive center associated with marsh restoration (a "Wetlands Education Center"). Landscaping for the placement of the interpretive center should not prevent Rose Creek from flowing freely into the wetlands, however. While we are not prescriptive of the location, it is possible that the Interpretive Center may be best placed on the east shore of Rose Creek to maximize access from the roads and public transportation and minimize interference with the distributary channel system of Rose Creek. Recommendations: (a) A location within walking distance of Mission Bay High School and associated parking is ideal so that the interpretive center could be used by MBHS students and other SD Unified classes and afterschool programs; (b) The location should also be served by paths/sidewalks to the Trolly Station; (c) The interpretive center should have indoor and outdoor lab spaces for use by SD Unified schools as well as aquarium spaces for public interpretation; (d) The center should be located to feed visitors onto the boardwalks that lead into the marsh; (e) The center could also be a location for a docent program of guided tours of the wetland and for community engagement.

9. Wetlands also figure in Kumeyaay heritage where wetland access can help tell a story of Native American cultural history and land use. The cultural and educational value of this coastal access project would be greatly enhanced by giving Kumeyaay knowledge and priorities a central place in its planning and ongoing evolution. Recommendations: (a) Kumeyaay culture
should be a major element of all educational exhibits in a "Wetlands Education Center" or informational panels next to walkways; (b) Access for their on-site practices, including horticulture, fishing, structures, and ceremonial sites should be built directly in the plan, not just as a tourist attraction.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Notice of Preparation for De Anza Natural.

We believe that this plan does not meet the requirements set forth in the Mission Bay Park Master Plan, specifically, the MBPMP says, "The SSA shall not be developed to the detriment of existing and/or future adjacent habitat areas. Foremost in consideration should be the extent to which the SSA can contribute to the Park's water quality... The SSA should facilitate the implementation of hydrologic improvements aimed at safeguarding the viability of marsh areas in its vicinity".

The plan has several features that will be detrimental to the long-term viability of the surrounding marsh lands. The island, designated for low-cost visitor accommodations, will be vulnerable to the prevailing winds and wave action that is increased by the constant boat traffic in the bay. This is best illustrated by the hardened shoreline of the existing trailer park. Although it has been rebuilt and rehardened more than once in its short history (since 1945) it is crumbling away and sinking into the mud that it was built on. Any infrastructure, placed on this island, will soon be threatened. Obviously, sea level rise will exacerbate these conditions. If we do not plan for a managed retreat now, we could pay dearly for it later.

But the island itself is detrimental to the surrounding marsh. This is because it channelizes the flow of fresh water from Rose Creek. The fresh water needs to be diffused into the marsh along the shoreline, to sustain the marsh and to provide bioremediation of the pollutants before they reach the bay. This plan (De Anza Natural) directs the pollution directly into De Anza Cove and the deeper waters of the bay. This island should be spread out and moved south to provide smaller barrier islands that would protect the marsh from the prevailing wind, waves and boat traffic.

This land spit is comprised of filldirt, brought in from off-site and placed in the marsh by the current lessee (Campland). They should be compelled to remove it. In any case, this fill-dirt needs to be moved or, preferably, removed. Rose Creek, historically, emptied into the bay next to Crown Point at the Kendal Frost Reserve, but since the channelization of the creek and the placement of this fill-dirt, the marsh at Kendal Frost has been slowly dying from the lack of fresh water. It does not speak well of your efforts to create new wetlands if you fail to protect and nurture the last remaining 1% of the bay's natural wetlands.

Back on the island, the pink area that is designated low-cost visitor accommodations, seems to extend all the way to the water. This seems to imply that the area is not open to the public or that public access may be restricted. Please keep in mind that the current operator (Campland) has been blocking public access for years. The California Coastal Commission, just recently, levied fines against Campland in the neighborhood of a million dollars, (depending on how you add it up) for blocking public access. Any attempts to privatize the beach will be met with strong opposition. It should also be pointed out that the city was responsible for the enforcement of the terms of its lease with Campland. In light of that, the city, must uphold the public trust, by making every effort to provide equity and transparency in the planning, design and execution of this plan.

So far however, that has not been done. At the ad hoc Committee for the Revitalization of De Anza Cove, the meetings were run by a public relations firm (Katz and Associates), paid for by the city, to direct the conversation and to restrict public opinion. But public opinion is well known and well documented in the MBPMP. The majority are in favor of salt marsh restoration, even at the expense of existing commercial development. The city's plans do not reflect that. The city is ignoring public opinion just as it is ignoring the admonition in the MBPMP to "facilitate the implementation of hydrologic improvements aimed at safeguarding the viability of marsh areas in (the) vicinity". The city must show in the EIR how this plan fulfils these goals and how it contributes to the bay's water quality.

The city is also ignoring this: "Foremost in consideration should be the extent to which the SSA can contribute to the park's water quality". It is easy to show what is "foremost in consideration" in this plan (De Anza Natural), because in all of the city's plans that have come forward so far, two major elements have never changed or moved. These are the RV park and the golf course. While everything else changes around them, these two leaseholds remain exactly where they are today. This shows that "foremost in consideration" is the protection of the revenue that the city receives from these leases. This dogged protection of the status quo is making the city lose sight of the goals set forth in the MBPMP and the Climate Action Plan. Furthermore, it keeps us from righting the wrongs of the past, and moving into a more prosperous and equitable future.

The city must also show why it has rejected, arbitrarily, the Audubon Society's ReWild, Wildest Plan. This plan is supported by, among others, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, California Fish and Wildlife Service, the California Coastal Conservancy, The University of California, the Regional Water Quality Control Board and a large coalition of local environmental and civic organizations. WWW.ECOSANDIEGO.ORG CONTACTECOSD@GMAIL. 805-835-1833 joined by churches, businesses and individuals all over San Diego in full support of ReWild Mission Bay. Furthermore, The ReWild, Wildest Plan will fulfill the requirements of the MBPMP while the city's plan will not. To reject Audubon's plan simply because it does not meet the city's short-term financial goals is another attempt to control the dialogue and side-step public opinion. The city must fully analyze the Wildest Plan, and provide both environmental and long-term economic analyses of both plans.

There is another troubling aspect of this planning process. During this process, the golf course and the RV facility have been upgrading their infrastructure. The golf course has installed new lighting and the RV facility is rebuilding the pool and clubhouse. Has the city, or anyone, assured these entities that they will retain their leases after the planning process is done? The current lease with Campland was negotiated behind closed doors, without any public input or scrutiny. Now, we are left to guess what was said or agreed to in secret. We believe that it would be prudent for the city to settle any legal disputes before entering into another agreement with the party that is suing you.

The city's plan (De Anza Natural) is rather vague as presented, but here are some questions, in no particular order, about some of the details.

Will the channel be spanned by two bridges as depicted in the site plan?

Are these pedestrian bridges or for motor vehicles?

How much will the bridges cost?

Is any infrastructure planned on the island?

Will the shores of the island be hardened?

Will the shores of the channel be hardened?

Will the shores of Rose Creek be hardened?

How much will it cost to maintain these shorelines?

Where is the parking?

Define low-cost visitor accommodations

In conclusion, the city should, adopt and implement Audubon's Wildest Plan because it meets the goals of the MBPMP and the CAP and satisfies the demands of the RWQCB, while the city's plan does not.

Thanks for sharing, Dick. In general, I think the comments look good. However, I would put the recommendations at the beginning of each paragraph, instead of at the end, and I would bold them. This should make it more clear and easier to skim. For example:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft of the De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan ("Project") and the Notice of Preparation ("NOP") for the associated Programmatic Environmental Impact Report ("PEIR"). CNPS promotes sound plant science as the backbone of effective natural areas protection. We work closely with decisionmakers, scientists, and local planners to advocate for well informed and environmentally friendly policies, regulations, and land management practices. Our focus is on California's native plants, the vegetation they form, and climate change as it affects both.

We appreciate the City restarting this CEQA process, and we appreciate the new proposed project design. That said, there is much that needs to be done. The comments below are aimed at coming to a highly functional design.

This letter contains two sections. The first contains comments made on behalf of CNPS about the CEQA process, project design, native plant issues, and climate change. The second section contains personal comments made by the author (Landis) on geology and soil contamination hazards, as these are areas outside of CNPS' expertise.

CEQA Process

These comments are made on the assumption that the resulting CEQA document will be a Programmatic EIR covering numerous projects within the area. The language of the NOP made it unclear by only using project instead of program. If this is for a normal, project-level EIR, please clarify that immediately.

Second, please use the PEIR to analyze all program-wide and site-wide issues. These include climate change, sea level rise, carbon sequestration, earthquake hazards, and soil hazards, as well as issues like hydrology that other groups have worked on. While this initially places a burden on the City to do these analyses, it rapidly pays dividends. Site-wide analyses means that the site plan can be modified to avoid impacts. This cannot be done once the site is

piecemealed into a number of different project areas, each with their separate process. Second, it avoids the unfortunately common San Diego problem of the City having to resolve endless arguments created by design shortfalls that situate projects with incompatible uses next to each other. Considering how much time, money, and resources existing conflicts already consume in San Diego, it seems wise to front-load every municipal CEQA process to avoid needlessly adding to them.

Project Design

What is the timeline and lifespan of the Program? This and the next two questions are critical for understanding the effects of climate change on the Project site. At some point in the future, most or all of the area will be underwater, and at some point before that storm surge from 100 year and greater storms will cause massive damage to both the natural and built environment in the Project area. Being explicit about the timeline (events and changes each year) and lifespan of the Project from the beginning will help with analysis of impacts from the Project.

Second, what is the proposed model for climate change embodied in the Project? Specifically, what model(s) of sea level rise are used to analyze impacts? What models of changing storm severity will be used? These all feed into an analysis of Project impacts to both built and natural Project infrastructure. This model needs to be listed with annual sea level increases.

Third, please create and use an elevational map of the Project site as it currently stands and as will exist in all Project alternatives. This, combined with the timeline and the sea level rise and storm hazard models, will clarify which areas are at risk and when they are at risk. This is essential for risk and impact analysis. It will also simplify discussing the Project. If, for example, Kendall Frost will be largely gone by 2100 due to sea level rise and storm damage, that gives everyone a framework for discussing impacts and solutions.

Fourth, create maps of the changes over time under the main, no project, and environmentally superior alternatives. These maps need to show critical information such as extent of mudflats, wetlands, transition vegetation, supporting upland vegetation, buffer distance between wetlands and sensitive habitats and planned development or active recreation areas over time, including the present conditions, when construction is completed, and at critical points (at least every decade) over the lifespan of the Project.

Fifth, we strongly urge the City to include the ReWild "Wildest" scenario as an alternative. To be clear, we appreciate the updated map, although there are significant quibbles with it, as described below. The point here is that, once the analyses are done, it may turn out that Wildest is a better option than the footprint proposed in the NOP. Or it may not. Regardless, it needs to be part of the mix.

Sixth, the Rewild coalition has done a large amount of work already, especially research on the hydrology of that corner of Mission Bay. We suggest you build off their work, especially on the hydrology. So far as we know, their work was done objectively, and using it as a basis to build from will give the City better results with less expense. We focus on hydrology because the City's proposed design shows a channel cutting across the De Anza boot at more-or-less right angles to the flow of Rose Creek. In our experience, water turning 90 degree corners tends to heavily erode the outer bank, and the City's proposed program sites a (foot?) bridge right at the point of maximum erosion. This appears problematic, and using the existing hydrology model may suggest a better alternative that can be easily swapped-in early in the design process.

Native Plant Issues

First, the Program needs to increase wetland acreage. The City of San Diego is missing its greenhouse gas reduction targets and the City's own Vulnerability Assessment (pg 40) shows that "43% of our salt marsh acres may be inundated under 0.25m (1ft) of sea level rise." More tidal wetlands mean more carbon sequestration to help the City meet its Climate Action Plan goals.

Second, and building on the previous section, please show how the habitats and land uses change as sea levels rise. This is needed because of the funding requirements and because it is critical way to know if any alternative is successful. It is impossible to understand the resilience of the marsh in this plan without understanding how sea level rise changes the habitats and shoreline. Show us how sea level rise affects the plan.

Third, the Upland and Buffer land uses will be a valuable component of the coastal habitat complex. In the program design and the PEIR, the Upland and Buffer land uses should be clearly defined and should augment the habitat, educational, and connection value of the restored wetland. The EIR must define these land uses and must show how marsh migration as sea levels rise is facilitated.

Fourth, as a potential mitigation, evaluate using wetland restoration within the Project site as a mitigation bank for wetland damage within lower Rose Creek and other Mission Bay wetlands. The reasoning is that the Stormwater Department has to periodically clean out drainage channels in the Golf Course, and these impacts to wetland vegetation are currently being mitigated in western Peñasquitos Canyon. I (Landis) am currently the chair of the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve Citizens' Advisory Committee. We are consulted on mitigation work in the canyon, and that mitigation bank is running out of space for wetlands projects. It might therefore be useful to determine if the Project site can be used as a mitigation bank for wetland takes in the watershed.

Climate Change

As noted above, the City of San Diego is falling short of its Climate Action Plan goals. Mission Bay marshland is one compact are where carbon might be sequestered, assuming it is not all eroded away.

First, in the PEIR please analyze how the storage and sequestration value of the restoration changes as sea levels rise. The City needs to show how 80 acres of "additional functional wetlands" remain after 2100 sea level rise predictions, as required by the Regional Water Quality Control Board funding Mission Bay SEP.

Second, quantify greenhouse gas emissions from the Project site, including from the wetlands. Wetland soils only retain carbon if left undisturbed, so measuring their carbon storage and greenhouse gas emissions necessarily includes disturbance, from wave and stream erosion, from drying out, and from exposure of soil carbon in the fill under Campland and the Golf Course.

The following comments are made purely on a personal basis, not on behalf of CNPS.

Occasionally during a CEQA process, I (Landis) turn up something that is important to public health or safety, but which is outside of CNPS interests. That is what happened here. The following comments are about geologic hazards and soil contamination. I am not a geologist, but I did receive a bachelor's degree in Environmental Science, and minored in soil science as part of my PhD in Botany.

Specific Comments on Geologic Hazards:

There is potentially significant risk of directly or indirectly cause potential substantial adverse effects, including the risk of loss, injury, or death involving strong seismic shaking in De Anza cove as a result of a major earthquake on the Rose Canyon Fault.

The project site is between approximately 450 and 7,700 feet from the Rose Canyon Fault, from De Anza park to the west side of Kendall Frost and the Northern Preserve. On January 24, 2022, City Development services sent out a press release with updated Alquist-Priolo maps that include Mission Bay (https://www.conservation.ca.gov/

cgs/Documents/Publications/EZRIM/LA_JOLLA_EZRIM_a11y.pdf). From the map, it was obvious that the Rose Canyon fault runs parallel to and just east of I-5 near the project site. A little more research turned up the 2014 San Diego Earthquake Planning Scenario (https://sandiego.eeri.org/2014-eq-scenario/), which is for a magnitude 6.9 quake on the Rose Canyon Fault.

Reading that scenario made it obvious that it is critical to analyze geologic hazards in planning the future northern Mission Bay. It projects shaking of a severity VIII, with moderate to heavy damage to structures within the project area, and risk of injury or death to humans.

What is unclear is what will be damaged. Given the range of proposed structures, from buildings and bridges to fill or utility hookups and infrastructure for recreational vehicles, it is unclear what is most at risk. For example, would a camper be a safe structure or an unsafe structure? How about the light poles at a golf course? These risks need to be analyzed, as they are non-standard structures that are covered by this PEIR.

In analyzing the earthquake hazard, the easiest way to mitigate any earthquake risk is through site design within the overall Project landscape, determining what uses are appropriate where to minimize the risk. Where there are substantial risks to human life, proper mitigation may involve limiting building, favoring temporary use (daytime recreation versus camping or longer-term occupancy), or leaving the riskiest areas for wildlife, which are not considered in this section of CEQA.

Soil liquefaction during an earthquake

A major earthquake on the Rose Canyon fault may cause soil liquefaction on the Project site. This potentially significant impact needs to be analyzed and avoided or mitigated.

Soil liquefaction occurs in some soils as the result of earthquake shaking. Most commonly, sediments (mud, silt, sandy soils) liquefy during major earthquakes. The situation in the project site is more complicated, because even the 1903 topographic map (e.g. https://www.johnfry.com/pages/PhotoSanDiego039.html) shows that the site was filled near the modern golf course, and purportedly Campland is built on fill as well. Whether these fills are more or less safe remains to be determined.

The 2014 earthquake scenario lists all of the Mission Bay shoreline, including the entire project site, as having "Very High Liquefaction Potential." This may be a substantial risk, not just to structures, but to people who are standing on sand or mud when the shaking starts. The problem is compounded by land uses, such as camping, that put people on dangerous ground throughout the day and night.

This potentially significant impact needs to be analyzed, both for salt marsh, beach, vegetated areas, and areas of fill. I was in the Bay Area during the 1989 Loma Prieta Quake. I was witness to the effects of soil liquefaction. Please take it quite seriously.

Finally, to note the obvious, any major Rose Canyon Earthquake will be a regional, multi-billion dollar disaster for San Diego. Roads including I-5, Morena Boulevard, and Mission Bay Drive are likely to be damaged. Thus, aid to the project site will likely be very, very slow in coming. If an RV is rendered uninhabitable, under normal circumstances the occupants can stay in a hotel until it is fixed. If all the hotels are damaged and there is no one to provide rescue, this becomes a serious problem. Please perform any hazard analysis with the understanding that impacts will be a minor part of a regional disaster, so normal first response will not be available to help.

Hazardous materials

Do the soils under the Campland Site, the golf course, and the De Anza Boot contain hazardous materials? If so, the hazards need to be described and quantified, so that the best way to remediate them may be determined. The De Anza boot is known to have surface asbestos contamination. It is unclear what, if anything, entered the soil. Similarly, the fill under Campland and the Mission Bay Golf Course may contain hazardous materials, either as a result of the fill material or as the result of operations over the decades. Therefore, soil analyses are needed, to quantify the hazard.

This is a routine but important question: what is in the soils of sites where substantial earth movement is contemplated? Will soil movement exacerbate the hazard, or mitigate it?

This may also play into site design. For example, if the soils of the De Anza boot are substantially contaminated, but leaving them in place and undisturbed is the best option for mitigating the hazard, then digging a channel across the boot, as shown in the NOP plan, is counterproductive. This is not just due to digging, but to the inevitable issues of erosion, soil leaching, and resulting exposures.

Ideally proper studies will be done, soil samples will be analyzed, and nothing significant will be found. That is a perfectly reasonable, even hoped-for, outcome. Conversely, as the City has learned at 101 Ash Street, unmitigated contamination is a costly problem. Quantifying soil contamination on the Project site, and modifying the project design as necessary to avoid serious problems, is probably the most cost-effective and safest approach going forward.

Good afternoon,

On behalf of Citizens Coordinate for Century 3 ("C-3"), I submit the following comments on the City's NOP for the De Anza Natural plan.

1. Assess the types and ratios of low-cost visitor accommodations (LCVA) in the pink-colored area of the plan (i.e., expected Campland lease) for GHG emissions. In order to understand the greenhouse gas emissions of the camping/LCVA, you should analyze and compare the environmental impacts of RV use, tent camping, yurts/cabins, hostels, etc. RV camping GHG assessment should incorporate the total VMT of RV campers (i.e., estimate average VMT for RV users from origin to destination).

2. The actual expected costs for users should be analyzed for each potential type of LCVA. Analyze historical data of what Campland charges for RV spots, compare to area hotels data, and estimate actual costs of other types of LCVA. There should be a balanced, diverse mix of types of LCVA.

3. Public access to all shoreline areas should be protected by limiting the appearance of private areas in the pink-colored area. As currently depicted, the southernmost beach would likely be construed by park users as a private beach for the lessee of the pink-colored area. The pink-colored leasehold should not run to the edge of the water, as it currently does.

4. The De Anza Cove and the entire De Anza Natural area should be off-limits to motorized watercraft. This is for both water quality and habitat protection reasons.

5. Uses of coastal land should be coastal-dependent or coastal-related. Leases should clearly state that other uses, such as long-term RV/boat storage, are not allowed.

6. Do actual outreach to indigenous groups and incorporate their feedback in the plan. I have reason to believe that meaningful outreach has been lacking or nonexistent so far.

7. The education or nature interpretive center should be located on the East side of Rose Creek, on or near the wetlands.

8. Analyze the effects of sea level rise by 2050 and by 2100. Analyze the climate change adaptation (i.e., protection of property from storm surge, high tides, and sea level rise) benefits of the project in addition to the climate change mitigation (i.e., carbon sequestration) effects of the project.

Please accept these comments on behalf of the Coastal Environmental Rights Foundation (CERF), a nonprofit environmental organization founded by surfers in 2008 for the protection and enhancement of California's coastal resources. The purposes of CERF are to aid the enforcement of environmental laws, raise public awareness about coastal environmental issues, encourage environmental and political activism, and generally act to defend natural resources in coastal areas.

CERF echoes the concerns and comments made by the ReWild Coalition and San Diego Audubon. In particular, CERF urges the City to fully analyze the ReWild Wildest Plan. The City made a commitment to the Regional Water Quality Control Board to maximize implementation of wetland restoration. The ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study has already demonstrated the feasibility of converting the De Anza boot to wetlands.

Maximizing wetland restoration and increasing wetland acreage also achieves compliance with the City Charter, Mission Bay Park Master Plan, and Natural Resource Management Plan (NRMP). The City Charter prioritizes wetland expansion and water quality improvements:

(c) Funds in the Mission Bay Park Improvement Fund may be expended only in the Mission Bay Park Improvement Zone, to restore wetlands, wildlife habitat, and other environmental assets within the Mission Bay Park Improvement Zone; to preserve the beneficial uses of the Mission Bay Park Improvement Zone including, but not limited to, water quality, boating, swimming, fishing, and picnicking by maintaining navigable waters and eliminating navigational hazards; to restore embankments and other erosion control features; and to improve the conditions of the Mission Bay Park Improvement Zone for the benefit and enjoyment of residents and visitors, consistent with the Mission Bay Park Master Plan.

(1) To achieve these goals, all of the following identified priorities are intended to be authorized, have a funding plan adopted by City Council, and proceed to completion <u>in the order provided below</u>, subject to section (c)(2) below authorizing projects to proceed concurrently:

(A) Restoration of navigable waters within Mission Bay Park and elimination of navigational hazards. When depth conditions no longer support and ensure safe navigation, those areas that pose a danger or impede the passage of watercraft shall be dredged in accordance with the Mission Bay Baseline Chart.

(B) Wetland expansion and water quality improvements and the protection and expansion of eelgrass beds as identified in the Mission Bay Park Master Plan.¹

Similarly, the Mission Bay NRMP emphasizes that continuous efforts should "be made to improve water quality for preserve areas and the Bay."² In addition, future changes to stream flows (including Rose Creek) should consider the natural resource management policies in Mission Bay Park.³

The Charter and NRMP focus on water quality and wetlands for good reason. Water quality in Mission Bay is impaired in numerous locations, including the Rose Creek outfall, De Anza Cove, and at the Campland shoreline.⁴ Notably, bacteria is the highest priority water quality condition in the Mission Bay Watershed Management Area and is especially problematic for the eastern portion of Mission Bay.⁵ By introducing development into Mission Bay, the Project has the potential to exacerbate these impairments.

Notably, wetlands are particularly effective in treating bacteria and sediment, another pollutant of concern.⁶ The NRMP also stresses the importance of an expanded preserve system to "counterbalance the negative impact of a progressively urban influence and future threat of rising sea levels."⁷ Because the Project has the potential to negatively impact existing preserve areas and exacerbate existing Mission Bay water quality issues, future wetlands at De Anza Cove and within the Reserve/Campland area have the potential to mitigate such impacts.

For these reasons, as well as those articulated by the ReWild Coalition and San Diego Audubon, CERF urges the City to focus on and fully analyze the ReWild Wildest Plan and maximize wetland restoration at the De Anza boot.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide scoping comments on the De Anza Natural Plan. The Friends of Rose Creek cares for, enhances, and advocates for the protection of Rose Creek and the entire Rose Creek Watershed, which provides critical park services to a diverse community of local residents and visitors, as well as bird watchers and bicyclists from around the county. Our vision is for lower Rose Creek to be an open space park providing recreational and learning opportunities and a clean, healthy, aesthetically pleasing environment for residents, visitors, businesses, and native plants and animals, while serving as an accessible link for bicyclists, pedestrians, and wildlife to move between Rose Canyon Park, Marian Bear Park, Mission Bay Park, and surrounding communities.

We feel the De Anza Natural project is heading in a positive direction but would like to see the City of San Diego fully restore naturally functioning wetlands on both s ides of the mouth of Rose Creek to

- 1. better protect the surrounding community from sea-level rise,
- 2. reduce maintenance costs over the long term,
- 3. ensure continuous wetland habitat that is more likely to thrive than smaller separated parcels.

We also feel that including the acreage of Kendall-Frost and the Robin Stribley salt marshes in this plan to show over 200 acres of wetlands is disingenuous as those are existing marshes. The analysis should be broken out to list separately the proposed new acres of wetlands and should include breakdowns of how much upper, middle, and lower salt marsh will be created and how much will still be in existence in the year 2100.

In the City's SEP agreement with the Regional Water Quality Control Board (<u>Mission Bay SEP</u>), the City agreed to restore "the southern portion of the De Anza 'boot' and the De Anza Bay to wetlands." In the City's De Anza Natural plan however, the southern portion of the existing De Anza boot has been converted to an island for low-cost visitor accommodations rather than wetlands.

The SEP also requires that the City "maximize implementable wetland restoration reflective of existing feasibility studies..." and the ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study shows that wetland restoration of De Anza peninsula is feasible. Wetland restoration is coastal dependent and this is the best location for wetland restoration in the whole bay because Rose Creek is the single largest source of fresh water inflows into Mission Bay.

In general, we feel it is unconscionable to allow recreational vehicle storage on public parkland and should not take priority over additional wetlands acreage. Therefore, we believe that allocating 50 acres to low-cost visitor accommodations is excessive if we remove vehicle storage from the plan.

The <u>City plans for recreation at the Bay-wide scale</u>. Therefore, this EIR needs to analyze the changes in beach and boat access in the De Anza Natural planning area compared to where these opportunities may be located elsewhere in Mission Bay and identify the percentage of loss under a maximum wetlands restoration as depicted in the ReWild Mission Bay Feasibility Study.

Please compare the proposed increase of accessible nature-based tidal-wetland and cultural center access acres in this project compared to the total available acreage for these opportunities in the rest of the Mission Bay. We believe that maximizing the wetlands restoration in this portion of the bay still provides the majority of swimming beach, picnic areas, active recreation space and other uses available in Mission Bay overall including in the east bay.

We feel strongly that as part of this planning effort, the name of "De Anza" should be retired from use due to Juan Bautista de Anza's active participation in genocide of indigenous communities. A more equitable solution would be to have a public naming process that includes indigenous communities as well as historically underserved communities to provide a new name that is reflective of future visions for this area.

We strongly encourage the City to include watershed management best management practices upstream in the Rose Creek watershed to improve the water quality, biodiversity and wildlife corridor functions of Rose Creek from the southern terminus of Marian Bear Natural Park to the restored wetlands in Mission Bay Park that will ultimately benefit this area of Mission Bay and improve water quality in the cove area.

16	In the analysis of 80 acres of additional wetlands remaining in 2100, please provide alternative scenarios that show how much of that would be lower, middle, and upper salt-marsh.
17	What will be the impact of sea-level rise to low-cost visitor accommodations on the island? How would creating an island of upland habitat naturally convert to wetlands by 2100? How would a strategy of managed retreat maintain salt marsh acreage by 2100?
18	Please analyze the carbon sequestration benefits of the proposed lower, middle and upper wetlands under build-out and 2100 conditions
19	Please identify the projected maintenance costs for natural versus hardened shorelines in the PEIR.
20	Please conduct a Traditional Cultural Properties review and identify Tribal Cultural Resources in the EIR and identify project elements that will enhance tribal access to these cultural resources?
21	Please clarify the project goals and specifically the goal of creating open water areas as open water acreage should not be counted as new wetland. The NOP specifies "The proposed project would expand the existing wetland habitat to include many habitats, such as lower, middle, and upper marshes; mudflats; oyster beds; and open water." Mission Bay already has plenty of open water.
