SUBJECT: Joint Use Program with School Districts: 2023 Annual Update

THIS IS AN INFORMATIONAL ITEM ONLY. NO ACTION IS REQUIRED.

SUMMARY

With the recent revision of Joint Use Council Policy 700-35, the Parks and Recreation Department provides the Board an annual report on the status of the City's joint use program. This report overviews the status of the program through calendar year 2023. Key information included in the report include the status of existing, recently opened, and future joint use areas; joint use agreements approved or planned in 2023 and 2024; planned new or expanded joint use facilities; recent and future financial contributions to the joint use program; communication meetings with participating school districts; and current issues, concerns, and challenges related to the overall joint use program related to maintenance, field use, and ongoing dog off leash activity. The Department is excited to see the continued expansion, betterment, and revitalization of the joint use program through ongoing collaborative efforts with the participating school districts.

BACKGROUND

In its efforts to provide additional recreation space and to leverage school resources, the City of San Diego partners with multiple school districts and one community college district to provide joint use facilities for the benefit of its residents in accordance with the Parks Master Plan, which defines joint use as "recreation areas or sports facilities available for public use through (a) long-term, joint use agreement with partners" (page 22).¹ San Diego's Joint Use Program with school districts is one of the oldest and largest programs in the country.

Calendar year 2023 marks the 75th anniversary of the City's joint use program. In 1948, the City entered into its first recreation agreement with the San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) for "the provision of adequate facilities for the recreation and physical well-being of the people of the City of San Diego" Attachment 1 provides a copy of the 1948 agreement as well as the current memorandum of understanding between the City and SDUSD.

Joint use provides for the shared use of the public facilities and resources. A joint use facility typically includes neighborhood park amenities such as multi-purpose turf field, walking track, hardcourts, and/or off-street parking. In some cases, joint use facilities incorporate playgrounds. Joint use facilities are utilized by the public when school is not in session (usually in the evenings, weekends, and vacation days) and are reserved for student use during school hours.

A joint use agreement is the formal agreement between the City and a school district defining the terms and conditions of shared use as well as the roles and responsibilities for maintenance and operations of the facility. Eight school districts currently participate in joint use agreements with the City. The Parks and Recreation Department (Department) administers the agreements.

As the population of the City continues to grow, San Diego neighborhoods must keep pace by increasing the number of parks and recreational facilities to provide recreational spaces for residents. One of the biggest challenges the City faces is the ability to acquire new parkland due to limited availability of land especially in some of the older, more urbanized communities. Joint use partnerships with school districts provide a crucial and unique opportunity to provide recreational spaces in some of the areas of the City that need recreation space the most.

The City's largest joint use partner is SDUSD, which is mostly located within City limits. SDUSD has facilities that serve significant sections of the City including most neighborhoods generally bracketed by Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve in the north and State Route 54 in the south.² This robust partnership saw expansion during the 2016 Play All Day Program. SDUSD has utilized portions of a series of voter-approved capital improvement bond measures to construct new turf fields at school sites throughout the City. The Play All Day Program is an exceptional opportunity to partner with SDUSD to expand the City's joint use program to meet park needs as identified in the Parks Master Plan.

DISCUSSION

This report of the Joint Use Program is intended to comply with the annual reporting requirements listed in Section D of Council Policy 700-35, Development of the City's Joint Use Program with School Districts. Attachment 2 provides a copy of Council Policy 700-35.

I. Number of existing joint use facilities

There are currently a total of 103 joint use facilities throughout the City that provide over 400 acres of recreational space to San Diego residents. The City currently has joint use

facilities with eight (8) school districts: Attachment 3 provides the tracking sheet of all joint use agreements.

- Del Mar Union School District
- Poway Unified School District
- San Diego Community College District
- San Diego Unified School District
- San Dieguito Union High School District
- San Ysidro School District
- Solana Beach School District
- South Bay Union School District

II. Recently opened joint use facilities

Two new or expanded joint use facilities have opened to the public since the last annual update:

- **Taft Middle Joint Use Facility** – This 5.9-acre facility is located at 9191 Gramercy Drive in the Serra Mesa Community, Council District 7. It includes a multi-purpose natural turf field, decomposed granite walking track, basketball court, pickleball court, exercise equipment stations, parking lot, shade trees, and associated infrastructure with San Diego Unified School District.
- **Marston Middle Joint Use Facility** – This expanded 5.6-acre facility is located at 3799 Clairemont Drive in the Clairemont Community, Council District 2. It includes a multi-purpose natural turf field, sports lighting, asphalt walking track, shade trees, and associated infrastructure with San Diego Unified School District. Prior to this improvement, the multipurpose field at Marston Middle School was decomposed granite.

III. Number of Joint Use Agreements recently approved by City Council

A total of 48 joint use agreements with SDUSD have been updated to the new approved template. In the past 12 months, six (6) joint use agreements have been updated or executed by City Council and another six (6) agreements are routing for City Council approval in December 2023. Attachment 4 provides a list of completed joint use agreements. IV. Planned Joint Use Agreements to be heard at City Council in the next year

The Department continues to update the remaining Joint Use Agreements with SDUSD to the new approved template in accordance with the audit requirements and has plans to update joint use agreements with other school districts as well. Attachment 5 provides a list of all agreements to be implemented. In calendar year 2024, the City and SDUSD need to update 68 additional joint use agreements to the new template; this remains a staff priority for the next several years.

V. Future planned new or expanded joint use facilities

San Diego Unified School District

The Play All Day Program is a 2016 initiative put forth by the City and SDUSD to provide over 45 new joint-use facilities and greatly expanding the City’s Joint Use Program with School Districts. SDUSD bond measures (Proposition S, Proposition Z, Measure YY, and Measure U)³ have created funding for capital improvement projects to repair, renovate, and revitalize school sites. San Diego Unified has utilized a portion of the bond funds to construct new turf playfields at school sites throughout the City. Attachment 6 provides the latest implementation schedule for Play All Day sites in partnership with SDUSD.

This very successful program provides a unique opportunity to pool public resources and partner with San Diego Unified School District to rapidly expand the City’s joint use program. Joint use facilities are particularly important in the City’s older, built out neighborhoods where there is little available land to build new parks and facilities. Parks Master Plan recommendations A6, P1, and F3 calls for expansion of joint use facilities, with a focus on historically disadvantaged neighborhoods. In addition, neighborhood schools serve as community hubs, they bring neighbors together and foster a sense of community. By expanding joint use recreational opportunities at neighborhood schools, the City and SDUSD are best able to further support the children and families that both agencies serve.

Since 2016, the City and District have constructed and opened 23 new or expanded Play All Day joint use facilities, including a joint use swimming pool, to the public under this program with SDUSD.

Finally, one joint use project, Jones Elementary School, will initiate the public input General Development Plan (GDP) phase in winter 2024.

Other School Districts

The Department is committed to working with other School Districts to identify new opportunities to expand the City's Joint Use Program. However, because other school districts do not have a campus improvement bond program comparable to the bond program for San Diego Unified School District, planned joint use improvements will require City capital investment to modify or enhance existing school campuses with additional fencing, separate irrigation systems, turf renovation projects, and public access routes to joint use facilities.

In reviewing potential options for future joint use opportunities, the Department has identified 35 potential sites with other school districts as shown in Attachment 7. The Department will continue to seek funding as it becomes available to construct joint use improvements at the selected locations.

VI. Recent City financial contributions to the joint use program

NOTES:

- a. Ongoing expenses include personnel expenses, supplies, contracts, and utilities.
- b. Onetime expenses are only for one fiscal year. Onetime expenses accommodate infrequent items such as the costs of vehicle acquisition for maintenance staff, turf renovation, asphalt resurfacing, playground maintenance, and other nonroutine maintenance efforts.
- c. The Fiscal Year 2025 estimate is based on the draft Five-Year Financial Outlook, which anticipates several new facilities coming on-line during the outlook period. The budget is subject to change during the upcoming annual budget development process.

VII. Future City financial contributions to the joint use program

Two of the active Play All Day Joint Use capital improvement joint use projects, Wangenheim Middle/ Walker Elementary (\$15007) and Salk Elementary (\$14,007), are being managed by the City’s Engineering and Capital Projects Department. They are both in the construction phase. Both projects are funded by City development impact fees and other funding sources.

The remaining 16 active Play All Day capital improvement joint use projects are being managed by San Diego Unified School District and funded by voter approved District bond measures.

The City will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the new joint use facilities per the terms of the Joint Use Agreements. The Department’s annual budget will include the operation and maintenance costs as new joint use facilities are completed and open to the

public. The costs to operate and maintain the existing joint use facilities is currently included in the Department's annual budget.

Costs for major maintenance projects at the existing joint use facilities such as asphalt resurfacing, decomposed granite walking track replenishment and synthetic turf replacement will also be included in the Department's upcoming fiscal year annual budgets and 5-year outlook forecasts.

VIII. Coordination of the Joint Use Program

The Department continues to refine its administration of the City's joint use program with school districts to manage the various aspects of the program.

The Department coordinates three sets of recurring meetings with SDUSD's Facilities Planning and Construction (FPC) Department, Real Estate Department, and Physical Plant Operations (PPO) Department as follows:

1. Biweekly meeting to coordinate the 18 active Play All Day capital improvement projects that are either in construction, design, and public input phases.
2. Monthly meeting to coordinate with other District-led projects that impact existing joint use facilities including security fencing projects, photovoltaic panel installation, stand-alone projects, and whole site modernization projects
3. Monthly meeting to discuss regular operation and maintenance issues at the existing 91 joint use facilities

Additional meetings are scheduled as needed, including onsite visits, to address maintenance, programming, or operational concerns. The Department recognizes that its joint use partnership requires a significant commitment of staff resources, reinforced lines of communication, and upper management support.

To improve lines of communications with the remaining school district partners, the Department is working to schedule regular, recurring meetings to improve the success of the joint use program.

IX. Current Overall Joint Use Program Issues, Concerns, and Challenges

Maintenance

Maintenance at joint use fields is a significant challenge. Joint use fields are highly programmed and used by hundreds of students during school hours as well as sports user groups and the general public in the afternoons, weekends, vacation days, non-instructional days, and school holidays. There is very little time when joint use fields are not being used.

For example, most City parks are not heavily used during the school day, and City staff have ample time during their regular work hours to complete maintenance tasks. However, at joint use fields, maintenance is limited to narrow windows of time to complete required

maintenance tasks. In most cases, the school districts prefer major maintenance tasks to occur outside instructional hours.

The Department is working with school sites to schedule maintenance periods or set aside blocks of time each week when students will not use the joint use fields for recess or physical education curriculum. At many schools, setting aside times when students cannot use a joint use field during the school day is a real inconvenience because school campuses are small and outdoor space is at a premium. However, set aside maintenance periods are critical for City staff to complete weekly regular maintenance activities including mowing, irrigation checks, minor repairs, weed whipping, trash removal, and blow surfaces on joint use fields.

Maintenance and repair issues can be further compounded by staffing shortages, staff turnover, training deficiencies, inadequate budgetary resources, miscommunication, or complicated joint use agreement terms. It is not uncommon for maintenance issues to remain unaddressed because they are assumed to be the other agency's responsibility.

A helpful tool for organizing the relationship between the City and SDUSD is the site use schedule, which clarifies staff contact information, agreed-upon maintenance periods, roles and responsibilities, school calendars, and any special scheduling needs. A template for a site use schedule is provided in Attachment 8. The Department currently has completed 25 site use schedules with SDUSD and is working on completing another 77 site use schedules. The Department recently met with Solana Beach School District and Del Mar Union School District. Six site visits were conducted which resulted in several follow up items and two (2) major maintenance projects. Major maintenance projects are renovations or repairs that require significant expenditures to extend the useful life of a facility. The costs for major maintenance projects are typically split evenly between the City and the school district or per the terms of the joint use agreement.

The Department is working with Solana Beach School District on a major maintenance project at Solana Highlands Elementary that will address heaving pavement and damaged drainage facilities that were caused by large tree roots. The Department is also working with the Del Mar Union School District on a collapsed section of storm drain in the joint use field at Carmel del Mar Elementary. The Department is working with Poway Unified School District on several major maintenance projects at the Black Mountain Middle School joint use gymnasium including replacement of the roof and heating ventilation air conditioning (HVAC) units.

Field Use

This year, due to popular demand San Diego Unified School District has expanded their middle school athletics program, a no cost sports program available to all middle school students who wish to participate in competitive sports. The program has been incredibly successful. There are three seasons: fall -basketball and track and field, winter -volleyball and soccer, and spring -flag football. The middle school joint use fields are used exclusively by the middle school athletic school program two (2) days per week starting after school until between 4:30 and 6:00 p.m. depending on the school dismissal time.

This change in joint use field availability has displaced many long-term user groups who have historically permitted joint use fields after school. All middle school joint use fields are located on District-owned property. Per the California Education Code, District property shall be used for school purposes, and where possible, community and public use can be accommodated through joint use agreements or rentals. The Department is working with displaced user groups to find alternative locations wherever possible and the Department is issuing a Middle School Athletics Program Frequently Asked Questions and Concerns flyer to help user groups to understand this change, which is provided in Attachment 9.

There is also on-going advocacy in some neighborhoods to better improve the balance between sports user groups who permit joint use fields for group athletic sporting activities, and community members who wish to use the joint use fields for passive park activities and Department-led programming that serves the students who attend the school. The Department is committed to working with communities through recognized Community Recreation Groups to address these issues and develop solutions that allow for a balance of community and organized group use. Several joint use facilities are designated as passive parks meaning that the Department elects not to issue athletic user group permits either on specific times or days, or at all times based on community input. A passive park designation is an operational action taken by the Department that can be rescinded or enacted at any time.

Designating a neighborhood joint use field as a passive park has benefits and drawbacks. A passive park designation can reduce the potential wear and tear on a joint use field, this is particularly helpful for very small natural turf fields. A passive park designation can also provide opportunities for community members to spend unstructured family time on a joint use field without being imposed by organized sporting activities. However, designating a joint use facility as a passive park sometimes results in an increase in off-leash dog activity and rogue sports groups who do not secure City use permits.

Off-leash dog activity

Off-leash dog activity at joint use facilities continues to be a significant concern for the Department and school districts. Dog excrement left on the fields is a particular concern for school sites because of health and safety issues as well as resources and staff time to clean up students who get dog excrement on their shoes or clothing. In some cases, impacted students are sent home resulting in a loss of learning.

Leash law enforcement at some joint use facilities has resulted in hostile encounters with enforcement staff. There are also encounters between youth sports leagues and off-leash dogs, with user groups sometimes having to clean up field damage caused by off-leash dogs. The Department is working with the Humane Society on a progressive warning signage system that may result in joint use facility closures.

The Department continues to coordinate leash law enforcement with San Diego Humane Society and has asked onsite City maintenance staff to remove dog excrement upon discovery.

ORIGINAL

A G R E E M E N T

WHEREAS, The City of San Diego, through its Park and Recreation Department and the San Diego Unified School District are mutually interested in and concerned with the provision of adequate facilities for the recreation and physical well-being of the people of The City of San Diego; and

WHEREAS, the San Diego Unified School District has certain play areas, toilets, auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other educational facilities under their jurisdiction, suitable for a community recreation program, and the City, in its Park and Recreation Department has in its employ certain employees well qualified to supervise, direct and conduct such a community recreation program; and

WHEREAS, for many years past, The City of San Diego and the San Diego Unified School District have maintained a cooperative working arrangement whereunder many school grounds and facilities have been and are being used by the two authorities for general recreational purposes, thus affording to the community greatly increased recreational opportunities at costs much below what would otherwise be necessary; NOW, THEREFORE,

In order to continue and improve the cooperative efforts of the San Diego Park and Recreation Department and the San Diego Unified School District,

IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED BETWEEN the said San Diego Unified School District hereinafter known as the "District" and The City of San Diego, for and on behalf of its Department of Parks and Recreation hereinafter designated as the "City", that:

The District will make available to the City for community recreation activities:

- a. All permanently operated playground areas which are suitable for community recreation activities; these areas

are to be selected by the Park and Recreation Director of The City of San Diego and approved by the Manager of the City and the Superintendent of the District.

The District further agrees to allow the City Park and Recreation Department to use other selected school facilities which are suitable for community recreation programs. These facilities are to be selected by the Park and Recreation Director, approved by the Manager of the City and the Superintendent of the District.

The use of such selected school facilities shall be in accordance with the regular procedures of the School District in granting permits for use of school facilities as provided for by the laws of California and the rules and regulations of the Board of Education.

Schedules shall be established for said use of selected school facilities by designated representatives of the Superintendent of Schools and the City Manager.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that when an admission charge is made to cover expenses only for a community recreation event in a selected school facility other than the Russ Auditorium, there shall be no rental fee charged to the City.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED that in the event the City shall schedule a community recreation event in the Russ Auditorium and an admission charge is made to cover expenses only, then the District shall charge the City the minimum rental fee as established by the District.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED that a schedule of dates for the use of the District school facilities will be worked out in advance; that this schedule will be so arranged as to avoid any conflict between the school and the Park and Recreation Department use; That in the scheduling of said facilities, school events and programs shall have the first priority and the recreation program established by the Park and Recreation Department shall have second priority and any other events by other groups or agencies shall have third priority.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that this schedule may be changed at the request of either party by the mutual consent of the other.

The City, through its employees in the City Park and Recreation Department agrees to provide adequate personnel to supervise the recreation activities which take place after school hours and during holiday and vacation periods at the above selected areas.

It shall be permissible where such activities are beneficial to both school and recreation programs to allow the working hours of the City personnel to be integrated with the School hours. In the event such activities are conducted during school hours with school children, the employee of the Park and Recreation Department shall be subject to the administrative authority and supervision of the principal of the school.

IT IS HEREBY UNDERSTOOD that the personnel employed by the City of San Diego in its Park and Recreation Department shall be under the supervision of the City Park and Recreation Department except as outlined above.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that school principals are expected to and will advise in the planning and administering of a recreation program to be conducted by the City Park and Recreation Department, on or in the facilities under said principals' jurisdiction.

IT IS RECOGNIZED that school properties and facilities are intended primarily for school purposes and for the benefit of children of school age. It is therefore agreed that, in planning programs and scheduling activities on school grounds, the recreational needs and opportunities of such children will be well provided for and adequately protected.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that in the event any dispute or difference arises as a result of the recreation program being conducted on the sites jointly used and selected as above outlined or as to the use of a school district facility, then, in that event, said dispute or dif-

ference shall be settled and arbitrated by appealing to the respective department heads of the school district and the City, in accordance with regular heretofore established procedures.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the City Park and Recreation Department will furnish and supply all expendable materials necessary for carrying on a community recreation program for all ages.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the school district will install and maintain all fences, play apparatus and facilities necessary for its school program and that said equipment, apparatus and facilities may be used by said Park and Recreation Department for community recreation purposes.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the City Park and Recreation Department with the approval of the school board will furnish and supply all the facilities and equipment necessary for the community recreation program which are not included as a requirement for the school program and that, in that event, the facilities and equipment so furnished may be used by the school district for school purposes.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the school district will provide all the custodial services for auditoriums, gymnasiums, toilets and other indoor facilities of any school plant used by the City Park and Recreation Department.

The school district further agrees that it will prepare and maintain the school play areas for regular school activities and that in the event said school play areas are used by the City Park and Recreation Department for a community recreation purpose, the City Park and Recreation Department will prepare and maintain said school play areas for said recreation activities.

IT IS HEREBY FURTHER AGREED that the City, for and on behalf of the Park and Recreation Department shall be responsible for any and all damages to school property which may be incurred as a proximate result of any recreation activity being conducted by the City Park and Recreation

Department.

The school district further agrees to inform the proper officers of the City whenever new school sites are to be selected so that the City may purchase adjoining property for the location of additional recreational facilities in event the City desires to do so.

RECREATION AGREEMENT

CITY OF SAN DIEGO -- SAN DIEGO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

The City of San Diego and the San Diego Unified School District have entered into a contractual agreement for operation of a Recreation program for the citizens of the community.

To clarify and expand policies pursuant to the agreement, the contract and comments on procedure are here presented. The procedures are an effort to state the position of the School Administration and the City Recreation Administration on important questions.

COMMENTS AND PROCEDURES

WHEREAS, The City of San Diego, through its Park and Recreation Department and the San Diego Unified School District are mutually interested in and concerned with the provision of adequate facilities for the recreation and physical well-being of the people of the City of San Diego; and

WHEREAS, the San Diego Unified School District has certain play areas, toilets, auditoriums, gymnasiums and other educational facilities under their jurisdiction, suitable for a community recreation program, and the City, in its Park and Recreation Department has in its employ certain employees well qualified to supervise, direct and conduct such a community recreation program; and

WHEREAS, for the many years past, The City of San Diego and the San Diego Unified School District have maintained a cooperative working arrangement whereunder many school grounds and facilities have been and are being used by the two authorities for general recreational purposes, thus affording to the community greatly increased recreational opportunities at costs much below what would otherwise be necessary; NOW THEREFORE,

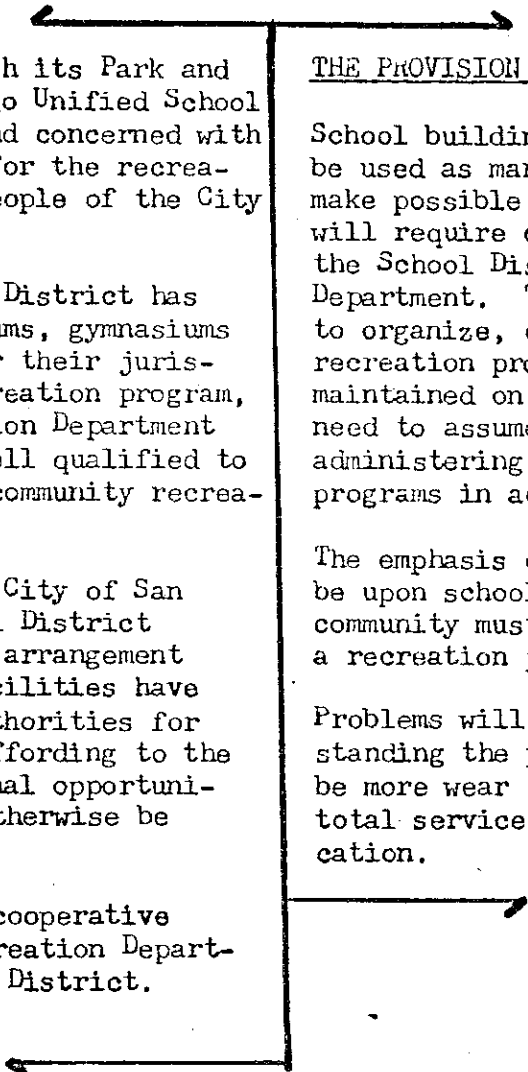
In order to continue and improve the cooperative efforts of the San Diego Park and Recreation Department and the San Diego Unified School District.

THE PROVISION OF SCHOOL FACILITIES FOR RECREATION

School buildings are community centers and should be used as many hours of the day as possible. To make possible the fullest use of the facilities will require cooperation and understanding of both the School District and the Park and Recreation Department. The Recreation Division will need to to organize, execute, and evaluate both the general recreation program and the specific activities maintained on each site. School Administrators will need to assume responsibility for the planning, administering and follow through of all community programs in accord with school objectives.

The emphasis on activities at school locations will be upon school centered programs but the whole community must be served to justify supervision for a recreation program.

Problems will arise but can be minimized by understanding the purpose of the agreement. There will be more wear on facilities by the use; however, the total service to the community will be the justification.

IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED BETWEEN the said San Diego Unified School District hereinafter known as the "District" and the City of San Diego, for and on behalf of its Department of Parks and Recreation hereinafter designated as the "City," that:

The District will make available to the City for community recreation activities:

- a. All permanently operated playground areas which are suitable for community recreation activities; these areas are to be selected by the Park and Recreation Director of the City of San Diego and approved by the Manager of the City and the Superintendent of the District.

KINDS OF SITES AVAILABLE FOR RECREATION

The City of San Diego operates after school and vacation time recreation programs on, or adjacent to selected elementary schools and secondary schools. Areas shall be selected and operated as: (1) need is determined, (2) funds become available to the City, and (3) approval of the Superintendent of Schools and the City Manager is given.

TYPES OF RECREATION PROGRAMS

Depending upon need and funds available, programs are operated on various schedules, such as regular school year and summer operation.

REQUEST FOR NEW SCHOOL SITE OPERATION INITIATED BY THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

If a new recreation operation is desired on a school area, the school principal should contact the office of the Supervisor of Physical Education and explain the need, the facilities available and suggest the type of program possible on the area. The school Supervisor of Physical Education will then contact the City Recreation Superintendent. Since the proposed budget of the Recreation Division is made by March of each year for operation the following July 1, all requests for new programs must be made prior to March 1.

REQUEST FOR NEW SCHOOL SITE OPERATION, INITIATED BY THE COMMUNITY

If a new recreation operation is desired on a school area by a community group, the community group should write a request to the Recreation Commission through the Park and Recreation Director. The Park and Recreation Director, through his representatives, will contact the school principal and the school Supervisor of Physical Education for recommendations. This request and these recommendations will be presented to the Park and Recreation Commission for action.

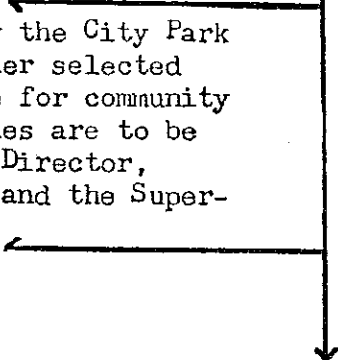
STORAGE SPACE

Adequate storage space (approximately 50 square feet) is to be made available by the school district for the storage of Park and Recreation Department equipment and supplies.

CLASSROOMS, AUDITORIUMS, CAFETERIAS, GYMNASIUMS, ETC.

Suitable school facilities are available to make possible a well-rounded community recreation program. School classrooms, restrooms, auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasiums, social rooms and other special facilities may be contracted for by the City Park and Recreation Department, when in keeping with school objectives, during the hours that these facilities are not used for school planned programs.

b. The District further agrees to allow the City Park and Recreation Department to use other selected school facilities which are suitable for community recreation programs. These facilities are to be selected by the Park and Recreation Director, approved by the Manager of the City and the Superintendent of the District.

BUILDINGS USED PRIMARILY FOR RECREATION

Separate unit buildings on school areas now used primarily for recreation purposes shall become the responsibility of the Park and Recreation Department to repair and maintain. The present policy of the School Board and the City of San Diego is to make use of regular school building facilities rather than to install separate recreation units on school areas.

c. The use of such selected school facilities shall be in accordance with the regular procedures of the School District in granting permits for use of school facilities as provided for by laws of California and the rules and regulations of the Board of Education.

d. Schedules shall be established for said use of selected school facilities by designated representatives of the Superintendent of Schools and the City Manager.

REQUEST FOR USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

All requests for community recreation use of School facilities shall be channelled through the Park and Recreation Department.

The contracts for use of school facilities by the City Park and Recreation Department will be made by the City Recreation Central Office through the School District Business Office. Use of permanently operated school facilities shall be contracted for on a semester, annual or summer vacation period basis. Occasional use shall be per individual contract. Both central offices must be notified if any changes in contracts are made.

Four copies of each contract are made. The original is retained in the School Business Office, one copy is sent to the school involved, one to the School Physical Education Office and one to the City Recreation Office.

School activities which are held during regular school hours with assistance of the City Park and Recreation leader do not require a contract for building use as they are the responsibility of the school. Scheduling and arrangements are to be made between the School Principal and the Recreation Leader of the area.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that when an admission charge is made to cover expenses only for a community recreation event in a selected school facility other than the Russ Auditorium, there shall be no rental fee charged to the City.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED that in the event the City shall schedule a community recreation event in the Russ Auditorium and an admission charge is made to cover expenses only, then the District shall charge the City the minimum rental fee as established by the District.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED that a schedule of dates for the use of the School District facilities will be worked out in advance; that this schedule will be so arranged as to avoid any conflict between the school and the Park and Recreation Department use; that in the scheduling of said facilities, school events and programs shall have the first priority and the recreation program established by the Park and Recreation Department shall have second priority and any other events by other groups or agencies shall have third priority.

CITY PLAYGROUNDS AND COMMUNITY CENTERS AVAILABLE FOR SCHOOL USE

City Recreation Division playground and community center facilities may be available for school activities when not in use for park and recreation programs. Such contracts shall originate with the school (Principals, Administrators or School Physical Education Supervisor responsible for the supervision of the activity) through the leader in charge of the facilities desired and approved by the City Recreation Central Office.

BALBOA PARK FACILITIES AVAILABLE FOR SCHOOL USE

Municipally operated facilities in Balboa Park for which a rental fee has been established will be available at no charge for school district sponsored activities provided the rental charges for said events would be paid out of tax funds (City Resolution No. 93275, April 5, 1949.) Student activities will pay the minimum fee for use of these facilities.

BALBOA STADIUM USE

Balboa Stadium is operated under a separate San Diego City and San Diego Unified School District contract.

MUNICIPAL SWIMMING POOLS AVAILABLE FOR SCHOOL USE

Municipal swimming pools and plunges may be available to the School District for instructional classes at no charge. Extra curricular activity groups will pay a minimum fee.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that this schedule may be changed at the request of either party by the mutual consent of the other.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPERVISION

The City Park and Recreation Department is responsible for the supervision of recreation activities on school areas after school hours and during vacation periods. All employees are under civil service regulations and are qualified by examination, both written and oral. Full responsibility for the conduct of such activities is assumed by the City Park and Recreation Department. Original program planning is the responsibility of the recreation leader, the district supervisor of the Recreation Division and the school principal.

The City through its employees in the City Park and Recreation Department agrees to provide adequate personnel to supervise the recreation activities which take place after school hours and during holiday and vacation periods at the above selected areas.

It shall be permissible where such activities are beneficial to both school and recreation programs to allow the working hours of the City personnel to be integrated with school hours. In the event such activities are conducted during school hours with school children, the employee of the Park and Recreation Department shall be subject to the administrative authority and supervision of the principal of the school.

IT IS HEREBY UNDERSTOOD that the personnel employed by the City of San Diego in its Park and Recreation Department shall be under the supervision of the City Park and Recreation Department except as outlined above.

SUCCESS OF CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT

The success of this contractual agreement lies in the words of this paragraph. THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR WHO FEELS A RELATIONSHIP WITH THE RECREATION LEADER IN HIS AREA SIMILAR TO THAT OF A TEACHER ON HIS STAFF CAN ASSIST MATERIALLY IN SERVING THE COMMUNITY IN THE RECREATION FIELD. The technicalities of authority may of necessity be with the City Park and Recreation Department but the responsibility for overall planning and administering of activities within the school facilities lies primarily with the person responsible for that facility -- be it Adult Education, Park and Recreation Department, Parent-Teachers Association or community group using the facilities.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that school principals are expected to and will advise in the planning and administering of a recreation program to be conducted by the City Park and Recreation Department, on or in the facilities under said principals' jurisdiction.

The contractual agreement is a means of assisting one governmental agency (the San Diego Park and Recreation Department) that is responsible for the program of leisure time activities of the entire community. Some cities have two agencies responsible for such a program, the schools for school areas and the municipality for municipal areas; usually one department not knowing what the other is doing, often duplicating program and facilities. In the interest of economy, full use of present facilities is the best saving of public monies. Building and maintaining separate facilities when, for the most part, use is heaviest at different times of the day and similar facilities are required is a waste of public money.

IT IS RECOGNIZED that school properties and facilities are intended primarily for school purposes and for the benefit of children of school age. It is therefore agreed that, in planning programs and scheduling activities on school grounds, the recreational needs and opportunities of such children will be well provided for and adequately protected.

CONTRACT

COMMENTS AND PROCEDURES

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that in the event any dispute or difference arises as a result of the recreation program being conducted on the sites jointly used and selected as above outlined or as to the use of school district facility, then, in that event, said dispute difference shall be settled and arbitrated by appealing to the respective department heads of the School District and the City, in accordance with regular heretofore established procedures.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the City Park and Recreation Department will furnish and supply all expendable materials necessary for carrying on a community recreation program for all ages.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the School District will install and maintain all fences, play apparatus and facilities necessary for its school program and that said equipment, apparatus and facilities may be used by said Park and Recreation Department for community recreation purposes.

PROCEDURE IN CASE OF PROBLEMS

In event that disputes or differences arise as a result of the recreation program being conducted on school facilities, the school teacher or principal should attempt to arrive at satisfactory settlement by working with the playground leader and the City Recreation Division's District Supervisor. If a settlement through these channels is not possible then the problem should be referred as follows:

1. Recreation--refer problem to Recreation Division's Central Office.
2. School
 - (a) If the problem is instructional, refer problem to the office of the Supervisor of Physical Education.
 - (b) If the problem is on use of facilities, refer problem to Business Office.

INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF EQUIPMENT

All school playground areas are to be master planned. Both school and Park and Recreation Department needs should be considered in such planning.

The school district will install and maintain as needed for the elementary school program various types of apparatus.

CONTRACT

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the City Park and Recreation Department with the approval of the school board will furnish and supply all the facilities and equipment necessary for the community recreation program which are not included as a requirement for the school program and that, in that event, the facilities and equipment so furnished may be used by the school district for school purposes.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the School District will provide all the custodial services for auditorium, gymnasiums, toilets and other indoor facilities of any school plant used by the City Park and Recreation Department.

COMMENTS AND PROCEDURES

The City Park and Recreation Department may, with approval of the Board of Education, install and maintain facilities on school areas if necessary for the community recreation program as funds are available. Such requests are to be channelled through the school district Physical Education Department.

A. Elementary Schools:

1. Large cage type backstops
2. Lights for fields and play areas.
3. Bleachers with protective fencing for softball and baseball fields.
4. Tennis courts
5. Regulation basketball courts and standards.
6. Any other facilities needed for a community recreation program and not necessary for an elementary school education program.

B. Junior High Schools:

1. Large cage type backstops
2. Bleachers with protective fencing for softball and baseball fields.
3. Lights for fields and play areas.
4. Any other equipment needed for a community recreation program and not necessary for a junior high school education program.

CUSTODIAL SERVICES

Custodial services, including regular cleaning, for indoor facilities are to be provided by the School District. These services will be arranged by the school principal.

The School District further agrees that it will prepare and maintain the school play areas for regular school activities and that in the event said school play areas are used by the City Park and Recreation Department for a community recreation purpose, the City Park and Recreation Department will prepare and maintain said school play areas for said recreation activities.

IT IS HEREBY FURTHER AGREED that the City, for and on behalf of the Park and Recreation Department shall be responsible for any and all damages to school property which may be incurred as a proximate result of any recreation activity being conducted by the City Park and Recreation Department.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
BETWEEN CITY OF SAN DIEGO AND
SAN DIEGO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT
FOR
DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF
JOINT USE FACILITIES**

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1. Background. On September 28, 1948, the City of San Diego (“CITY”) and San Diego Unified School District (“DISTRICT”) entered into a Recreation Agreement to improve and maximize the shared use of public facilities (“Joint Use Facilities”) and resources to meet the recreational and educational needs of the communities both public entities serve. Comprehensively, this program is currently known as the Joint Use Program (“Joint Use Program” or “Program”). CITY and DISTRICT (referred to individually as “Party” and collectively as “Parties”) entered into a Memorandum of Understanding for Development and Maintenance of Joint Use Facilities filed with the San Diego City Clerk as Document Number RR-297149 on October 7, 2002 (“2002 MOU”). To date, the Parties have provided over 90 Joint Use Facilities within the overall Joint Use Program that allows for shared public access to over 300 acres of fields and other amenities. It is one of the oldest and largest Programs in the country. The Parties continue to grow the Program with implementation of the Play All Day Parks Program initiative, which plans to add over 45 new joint use parks. As of May 2021, DISTRICT has contributed 329 acres and over \$159M in capital improvements to the Joint Use Program.

2. PURPOSE

- 2.1. Joint Use Program.** The Parties cooperate in the use of numerous shared recreational facilities. The partnership between the Parties fills an essential gap in addressing the CITY’s need for more parkland and additional recreational opportunities in our communities, particularly the older urbanized communities where there is little available land for new parks. The Program advances the DISTRICT’s goal to develop quality schools in every neighborhood of San Diego. Quality neighborhood schools provide resources and support the needs of the communities that they serve.
- 2.2. Mutual Benefits.** CITY desires to supplement park facilities to meet community recreational needs by using Joint Use Facilities for recreational purposes. DISTRICT desires to assist the CITY in meeting community recreational needs by permitting CITY to use Joint Use Facilities for CITY’s recreational programs. It is to the mutual benefit of the Parties to contribute jointly to provide the land, construction, operations, and maintenance of recreational facilities that can serve

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the needs of both the general public as well as DISTRICT students, families, and faculty. To this extent, the Parties desire to establish this mutually beneficial arrangement by entering into Joint Use Agreements (defined below) for each Joint Use Facility. The Program as a whole provides for the shared use of public land and facilities that best serve the educational and recreational needs of the residents of the City of San Diego.

- 2.3. **Consideration.** The Parties acknowledge that good, valuable, and adequate consideration exists in the mutual benefits enjoyed, respective financial contributions, commitments to maintenance, and the legal obligations incurred by the Parties in the use and maintenance of the Joint Use Facilities.
- 2.4. **2002 MOU and Debt Forgiveness.** The 2002 MOU will terminate, by the mutual consent of the Parties, upon the effective date of this Memorandum of Understanding (“MOU”) and this MOU will supersede the 2002 MOU. The 2002 MOU included financial parity calculations designed to verify that both Parties equally contributed to the development and operation of the Joint Use Facilities. Both Parties have expressed a desire to move away from the concept of financial parity as described in the 2002 MOU parity calculations. CITY and DISTRICT are satisfied with the contributions of the other Party and that, within the confines of the Joint Use Program, any and all monies that may be owed by one Party under the terms of the 2002 MOU are forgiven by the other Party. On the MOU effective date, CITY and DISTRICT are released from their respective rights and obligations under the terms and conditions of the 2002 MOU. Each Party has been made whole.

3. OBJECTIVES

- 3.1. **Joint Use Criteria.** New Joint Use Facilities should provide for typical recreational programs often found at neighborhood parks, which may include various sports offerings (such as fields for baseball, softball, soccer, and courts for basketball and tennis), playgrounds, and similar amenities.
- 3.2. **Joint Use of Elementary and Middle Schools.** The Parties will prioritize elementary schools and middle schools for proposed new Joint Use Facilities. Due to extensive after-school use, CITY will not pursue new Joint Use Facilities nor retain existing Joint Use Facilities at high schools unless otherwise agreed upon in the site specific Joint Use Agreements.
- 3.3. **Maintenance.** The CITY’s Parks and Recreation Department must be able to operate, program, and maintain the Joint Use Facilities consistent with the City’s park standards. Components of Joint Use Facilities that will be maintained by the City (such as irrigation and turf grass) must be built to City Standards as defined in the “Consultant’s Guide to Park Design and Development” except when mutually agreed upon by both CITY and DISTRICT. Joint Use Facility Amenities as defined in Section 3.6 that the CITY, in its sole and unfettered

discretion, determines are unusually costly or burdensome to maintain should either be excluded from or not become part of the Joint Use Program.

- 3.4. Passive Use Designation.** CITY may designate a Joint Use Facility as a passive use facility (which means CITY will not issue permits for any active use, defined as sports programs and leagues) based on multiple factors, including feedback received from the recognized community recreation advisory group (“CRG”) or appropriate community planning group (“CPG”). This would typically apply to Joint Use Facilities under two (2) acres in size but may be appropriate for certain larger Joint Use Facilities. No such designation by City shall effect any use by the District of a Joint Use Facility located on District property.
- 3.5. Public Input.** The community will be able to provide its input via public workshops in accordance with City Council Policy 600-33. The CRG or CPG that has advisory input over a proposed Joint Use Facility should provide community input as to the proposed site selection, uses for new sites, available amenities, potential impacts to adjacent development, and preparation of General Development Plan (“GDP”). CRGs and/or CPGs may also provide input for renewing and modifying Agreements for existing Joint Use Facilities, especially if the proposed change results in an update to the GDP.
- 3.6. Typical Joint Use Amenities.** Typical Joint Use Facility Amenities include multi-purpose turfed ballfields, walking track, parking lots, blacktop play areas including basketball courts, adjacent trees, and related components. Certain sites may have other shared recreational components, such as backstops, bleacher seating areas, picnic areas, sports lighting, swimming pools, playgrounds, tennis courts, gymnasiums, and similar amenities. Collectively, these Joint Use Facility amenities are known as “Amenities.”

4. EXECUTION

- 4.1. Consistency between MOU and Joint Use Agreements.** The Parties acknowledge that each Joint Use Facility is unique and will have site specific Amenities and terms that will need to be negotiated on a site by site basis. The Parties will enter into an agreement for each Joint Use Facility (“Joint Use Agreement”) and in the event of an inconsistency or conflict, nothing in this MOU will take precedence over executed individual Joint Use Agreements.
- 4.2. Joint Use Agreement Template.** The Parties will utilize a template for Joint Use Agreements, which includes a description of the property and joint use area, term of the agreement, allowed uses by each Party, DISTRICT and CITY responsibilities regarding construction, operations, and maintenance, terms for potential reimbursement to either Party for design and construction costs, indemnification provisions, and termination clauses. The Parties will use the template when feasible for any Joint Use but reserve the right to modify the terms as mutually agreed to fit the specific needs of each Joint Use Facility.

- 4.3. Expiring Joint Use Agreements.** The Parties will honor the terms of expired Joint Use Agreements until the Parties agree to either discontinue joint use at the Facility or renew the Joint Use Agreement for another term.

5. AGENCY COMMUNICATION

- 5.1. Communication.** The Parties will implement regular lines of communication between staff and management during pre-design, design, construction and maintenance of Joint Use Facilities.
- 5.2. Tracking System.** The Parties will implement a shared tracking system for the Program. This tracking system shall include the following: School Name, Joint Use Facility Name, Address, Community Planning Area, Council District, City Acres, District Acres, Total Acres, Term, Agreement Start Date, Expiration Date, Proposed Action (if any), Joint Use Amenities, and Notes. It may include other information, such as costs for yearly operations and maintenance, site development costs, and/or any major repairs or capital improvements to the site.
- 5.3. Standing Meetings.** The Parties will hold regular meetings to discuss matters of joint use operations and maintenance. Disputes of any nature should be addressed at these meetings.
- 5.4. Expansion of the Program.** The Parties may collaborate to expand the Joint Use Program by adding new or improving Joint Use Facilities and Amenities as funding and resources are available, and as mutually desired.







A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN DIEGO AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ENTER INTO A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH SAN DIEGO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF JOINT USE FACILITIES AND RENAMING AND AMENDING COUNCIL POLICY 700-35 REGARDING DEVELOPMENT OF THE CITY'S JOINT USE PROGRAM WITH SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

WHEREAS, the City of San Diego (City) partners with multiple school districts to maximize the shared use of public facilities for recreational purposes using one or more joint use agreements (Joint Use Program); and

WHEREAS, joint use facilities are open to the public when school is not in session, filling an essential gap in addressing the City's need for more park land and additional recreational opportunities in our communities; and

WHEREAS, San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) has been a key partner in the City's Joint Use Program since 1948; and

WHEREAS, the City and SDUSD entered into a Memorandum of Understanding for Development and Maintenance of Joint Use Facilities filed with the Office of the City Clerk as Document No. RR-297149 on October 7, 2002 (2002 MOU); and

WHEREAS, the 2002 MOU did not accurately capture the benefits and goals of the Joint Use Program and the parties' desire to establish a mutually beneficial arrangement that provides for the shared use of public land and facilities to best maximize public use; and

WHEREAS, the 2002 MOU contained financial parity terms that were complex and problematic to implement because parity calculations were done on a site-by-site basis and did not consider the overall contributions from the City and SDUSD at all joint use locations; and

WHEREAS, the City and SDUSD have each made significant financial contributions to the Joint Use Program, but as the primary landowner and capital funding source, SDUSD has outpaced the City for overall financial contributions to the Joint Use Program; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the City Auditor (Auditor) issued Audit Report #19-016 in April 2019, in which the Auditor recommended that the City revise the 2002 MOU to more accurately reflect the shared benefits of the Joint Use Program and amend Council Policy 700-35; and

WHEREAS, the City and SDUSD negotiated a Memorandum of Understanding for Development and Maintenance of Joint Use Facilities (MOU) intended to replace the 2002 MOU and provide a foundation for joint use agreements between the parties; and

WHEREAS, under the MOU, the City and SDUSD acknowledge that both parties are satisfied with the consideration provided by the other party and that, within the scope of the Joint Use Program, any and all monies that may be owed by one party under the terms of the 2002 MOU are forgiven by the other party; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 1977, the Council of the City of San Diego (Council) adopted Resolution No. R-218460 adding Council Policy 700-35 titled "City Participation in School Turfed Areas" into the City Council's Policy Manual; and

WHEREAS, on August 24, 1981, the Council amended and renamed Council Policy 700-35 to "City Development of School Sites for Park Purposes;" and

WHEREAS, Council Policy 700-35 establishes guidelines for the Joint Use Program; and

WHEREAS, in response to the Auditor's recommendation, City staff proposed certain amendments to Council Policy 700-35 to include guidelines for the strategic vision,

objectives, authority, responsibility, and accountability for the development, administration, and ongoing operations of the Joint Use Program; and

WHEREAS, the amended Council Policy 700-35 will work in conjunction with the MOU and will guide the City's joint use endeavors with school districts; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the City of San Diego (Council), that the Mayor, or designee, is authorized to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding between the City and SDUSD for Development and Maintenance of Joint Use Facilities on file with the Office of the City Clerk as Document No. RR-313767-1 (MOU).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Memorandum of Understanding between the City and SDUSD for Development and Maintenance of Joint Use Facilities, on file in the Office of the City Clerk as Document No. RR-297149, is terminated upon the effective date of the MOU authorized by this Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Council Policy 700-35 titled "City Development of School Sites for Park Purposes" is renamed "Development of the City's Joint Use Program with School Districts" and is amended as set forth in the Council Policy filed in the Office of the City Clerk as Document No. RR-313767-2

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Clerk is instructed to update the Council Policy Manual to include the amendments to Council Policy 700-35.



POLICY NO.: 700-35
EFFECTIVE DATE: November 8, 2021

BACKGROUND:

The City of San Diego (City) partners with multiple School Districts to maximize the shared use of public facilities for recreational purposes. In particular, the City and San Diego Unified School District have been cooperating in the joint use of numerous recreational facilities since 1948 and have one of the largest Joint Use Programs in the country.

PURPOSE:

To establish guidelines for the strategic vision, objectives, authority, responsibility, and accountability for the development, administration, and operations of the City's Joint Use Program.

DEFINITIONS:

Joint Use Agreement: Joint Use Agreements are the written agreements between the City and a School District setting forth the terms and conditions for the shared use of recreational facilities.

Joint Use Amenity: Recreational amenities including multi-purpose turf fields, walking tracks, parking lots, trees, backstops, bleacher seating areas, picnic areas, sports lighting, swimming pools, playgrounds, tennis courts, gymnasiums, blacktop play areas including basketball courts, and similar amenities.

Joint Use Area: The geographic boundary of School District or City real property, or a combination of both, that comprises the Joint Use Facility. Typically, a Joint Use Area is shown as a boundary line on an exhibit to the Joint Use Agreement.

Joint Use Facility: A facility intended to facilitate the shared use of Joint Use Amenities for the benefit of the School District and the public when school is not in session.

Joint Use Program: A comprehensive program developed by the City with a School District that consists of one or more Joint Use Agreements for the use of one or more Joint Use Facilities with the goal of meeting the recreational and educational needs of the communities both public agencies serve.

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School District: As defined in California Education Code section 17070.15, as may be amended from time to time, and within the City's jurisdictional boundaries.

POLICY:

A. Strategic Vision of the Joint Use Program:

- a. The City's Joint Use Program with School Districts allows for the shared use of public facilities and resources. The Joint Use Program addresses the City's need for more parkland and recreational opportunities in our communities, particularly in the older urbanized communities where there is limited land available for new parks. The Joint Use Program also advances the School Districts' goals to support the needs of the communities they serve.
- b. It is to the mutual benefit of the City and the School Districts to pool resources to provide the land, construction, operations, and maintenance of recreational facilities that can serve the needs of the general public as well as School Districts' students, families, and faculty. The City's Joint Use Program provides for the shared use of public land and facilities that best serve the educational and recreational needs of the residents of the City.
- c. The City may enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with School Districts as necessary to establish roles and responsibilities, to define the partnership, to set consideration for joint use, and to describe each party's responsibilities.
- d. The City will enter into individual Joint Use Agreements for each Joint Use Facility because each Joint Use Facility will have site specific Joint Use Amenities and terms that will be negotiated on an individual site basis.

B. Joint Use Program Objectives:

- a. The City will continue to pursue expansion of existing Joint Use Programs and emphasize expansion with other School Districts to provide joint use opportunities in all communities of the City.
- b. The City will prioritize to the extent reasonable the development of Joint Use Facilities in communities where City staff determines park deficiencies exist, in communities of concern, and where additional park space is desired by the community.

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- c. Because the duration of the Joint Use Agreement will extend over multiple fiscal years, the City and the School District must acknowledge and agree that the City is not obligated to provide any money, funding, financial commitment, in-kind contribution, and work not duly budgeted, appropriated, and authorized by City Council in the respective fiscal year.
- d. In order for the City to program, operate, and maintain the Joint Use Facilities, Joint Use Amenities should be built to City Standards as defined in the “Consultant’s Guide to Park Design and Development.”
- e. City participation in the development of Joint Use Facilities will be in accordance with to the following criteria:
 - i. The City or School District will notify the other party of park and/or physical education needs and establish feasibility of a new Joint Use Facility.
 - ii. The City and School District will collaboratively identify funding sources and implementation schedules for a Joint Use Facility.
 - iii. The Joint Use Area should accommodate the recreational needs of the community and the General Development Plan (GDP) should be designed according to City Council Policy 600-33 as well as the School District’s public input process.
 - iv. The City and School District must approve the contract plans and specifications for the Joint Use Facility prior to the beginning of construction.
 - v. The Joint Use Agreement(s) will outline the community’s use during non-school hours and School District’s use during school hours.

C. City Department Responsibilities:

- a. The Parks and Recreation Department (P&R) is the lead City Department responsible for the operation and management of the Joint Use Program.
- b. P&R shall implement regular lines of communication between the School District and P&R staff and management during pre-design, design, construction, and maintenance of Joint Use Facilities.
- c. P&R and the School Districts shall hold periodic meetings to discuss Joint Use Facility operations and maintenance. Disputes of any nature should be addressed at these meetings.

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- d. The P&R Asset Management Section is responsible for managing the Joint Use Program which includes the following duties:
 - i. Maintaining and regularly updating a tracking sheet to compile information related to Joint Use Agreements, including Joint Use Agreement expiration dates, Joint Use Facility acreage, planning area, locations, and related information;
 - ii. Negotiating and requesting City Council approval of proposed Joint Use Agreements;
 - iii. Coordinating standing meetings with School Districts and acting as a liaison during the GDP public input process;
 - iv. Reviewing and approving contract plans and specifications; and
 - v. Conducting site inspections during construction.
- e. The P&R Community Parks I and II Divisions are responsible for the City's daily operations and maintenance obligations related to the Joint Use Facilities.
- f. The Facility Services Division of the Department of General Services is responsible for any installation, maintenance, and repairs involving specialized trade work at the Joint Use Facilities.
- g. The Engineering and Capital Projects Department is responsible for executing City Capital Improvements Program projects related to Joint Use Facilities.

D. Annual Reporting Requirements

- a. P&R will prepare an annual report to City Council or the applicable Council Committee. The annual report will contain the following information:
 - i. Number and description of Joint Use Facilities with School Districts;
 - ii. Number and description of new Joint Use Facilities opened since the last annual report;
 - iii. Number and description of Joint Use Agreements approved by City Council since the last annual report;
 - iv. Financial contributions by the City to the Joint Use Program since the last annual report;

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- v. Financial contributions by the City to the Joint Use Program planned for the upcoming year;
- vi. Future planned Joint Use Facilities and status; and
- vii. Proposed Joint Use Agreements anticipated to be heard by the City Council in the next year.

MIDDLE SCHOOL JOINT USE FIELD PROGRAMMING
FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS

November 1, 2023

Purpose of Joint Use:

Since 1948, San Diego Unified School District has participated in a Joint Use Program with the City providing for the shared use of public facilities and resources to meet the educational and recreational needs of the communities that both public agencies serve. This joint use partnership fills an essential gap in addressing the City's need for more parkland and additional recreational opportunities particularly in some of the older built out communities where there is little available land for new parks.

Working together, SDUSD and the City provide over 340 acres of recreation space after school hours spread across 91 joint use locations.

How does Joint Use work?

Most Joint Use Fields in the City are District owned property. Per California Education Code, District property must be used for school purposes. Where possible, community or public use can be accommodated upon mutual agreement by the District and City if there are no negative impacts on District curricular programming.

Generally, the District provides land and construction funding for joint use fields and the City contributes to the maintenance of the joint use fields. Joint use fields are exclusively used by students and school sites during the school day but become available for public use after school hours, on weekends, and on school breaks.

Joint Use Facilities differ from other public parks in that the primary function is for school purposes (a school first). The shared or joint use must accommodate the District's primary mission to provide curricular programming which includes the newly formed Middle School Athletics programs.

The City and District work to balance the shared use of joint use facilities to the maximum extent feasible; however, the District's curricular needs for their students shall prevail in the event of scheduling conflicts. In other words, the District always has the right to use District property for school purposes.

What is the Middle School Athletics program?

San Diego Unified School District is committed to excellence in athletics as part of a larger commitment to excellence in education. That excellence includes a commitment to the physical and emotional well-being of students and the social development of student-athletes. As part of this mission, San Diego Unified has announced one of the biggest expansions of its athletics program with the launch of middle school athletics.

This no cost sports program provides an incredible opportunity for middle school students in every San Diego Unified School to participate in competitive sports programs at the middle school level that directly feed into the high school CIF sports program. Due to popular demand, the District plans to expand the Middle School Athletics Program in the upcoming 2023-24 school year with additional teams and potentially new sports to accommodate the overwhelming number of students interested in participating in the program.

The 2023-24 Middle School Athletics sports program dates are as follows:

Fall Season August 28- November 3 (Basketball, and Track and Field)

Winter Season December 4- March 8 (Volleyball and Soccer)

Spring Season March 11- May 17 (Flag Football)

How will Middle School Athletics impact the Joint Use Program?

Parks and Recreation (P&R) permits for impacted JU fields will not be issued in advance to allow for the Middle School Athletics Fall, Winter and Spring Season practice schedules to be finalized. Practice schedules are typically finalized the week before the seasons start. Impacted permit times are Monday through Friday starting after school until 6:00pm (up to 4 days per week). There are no plans at this time for District use of middle school joint use fields on Saturdays and Sundays.

We recognize that this is a change for many long-term user groups who have historically enjoyed the use of joint use fields 30 minutes after the school dismissal bell.

P&R Recreation staff will work with any displaced user groups to find alternative locations wherever possible.

The City continues to increase park and recreation field space in our communities. Please contact your City Council representative or get involved with your local community planning group or community recreation group to advocate for more funding and resources to provide better and more recreational field spaces in your community.

Which joint use facilities have Middle School Athletics Programs?

Every San Diego Unified middle school is eligible to form teams based on student interest. For example, a school may not have enough students signed up for the fall season, but they could have interest for the winter season sports or the springs season sports.

The following JU Fields could be participating in the program:

Audubon K-8, Challenger Middle, Clark Middle, CPMA Middle, Dana Middle, DePortola Middle, Farb Middle, Innovation Middle, Language Academy Middle, Longfellow K-8, Mann Middle, Marshall Middle, Marston Middle, Montgomery Middle, Pershing Middle, Roosevelt MS, SCPA Middle (Penn Athletic Area), Standley Middle, Taft Middle, Wangenheim Middle (currently practicing at Walker Elementary), and Wilson Middle (currently practicing at Edison Elementary).
