#### **Summary**

#### Icebreaker

Participants introduced themselves to continue to get familiarized with group members.

#### **Review of Engagement Scope**

An overview of the purpose and goal of the engagement plan was provided to inform engagement activities.

#### Activities to help inform Draft Engagement Plans

Activity 1 - The group worked on building a shared language to share why it is important to address environmental justice issues in San Diego. The language was refined, and a poster was developed to share with community members at future events (see Appendix A).

Activity 2 – Participants indicated each topic the organization has touched on during past engagement to inform expertise and opportunities for further engagement.

Activity 3 – Discussed types of questions that can be asked during the engagement process to gather information on each of the environmental justice issues required to be addressed by SB 1000. Together, the group developed draft questions that (1) help inform the EJ Element, (2) are understandable to people who aren't heavily immersed in the topics, and (3) are relevant to community members. Questions were refined and expanded upon for each topic and those used throughout this process are provided by topic in Appendix B.

Activity 4 - Different Engagement Strategies were discussed and participants selected which activities they would like to carry out to support the Environmental Justice Element engagement process.

Activity 5 - Organizations shared upcoming events where engagement activities could possibly be carried out to begin to develop an events timeline.

#### **Next Steps**

Participants aligned on content to be included in the draft engagement plans for each organization and agreed to meet with KDI for one-on-one meetings to discuss. As part of this effort, KDI shared a template to facilitate the process.
