## San Diego City Council to Consider Changes to Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) Budget Process to Fund Arts and Culture

Councilmembers Campillo (D7) and Moreno (D8) lead charge in asking City Council to prioritize arts and culture and fulfill Penny for the Arts promise

- WHAT: Councilmembers Raul Campillo (D7) and Vivian Moreno (D8) will join advocates to take a photo and gather briefly in advance of the City Council's afternoon session. At the 2pm City Council meeting, the two Councilmembers will be proposing a revision to the City's budget process that would recommend the use of 9.52% of the City's annual TOT (hotel tax) revenue for Arts and Culture.

WHY: In 2012, the San Diego City Council voted unanimously to approve a "Penny for the Arts" plan that would increase arts and culture funding from the city's TOT. The plan's recommendation included restoring arts and culture funding levels to 9.52% of annual TOT revenue by 2017. However, this has not happened; most recently, the Council's FY24 adopted arts and culture budget was only 4.67% of TOT revenue. The policy proposed by Councilmembers Campillo and Moreno would establish a legislative process for the City Council to recommend that 1 cent of the 10.5 cents collected on each eligible dollar, or 9.52% of TOT revenue, would be used in each budget in order to meet the Penny for the Arts goal.
