The City's De Anza Natural plan continues the illegal privatization of our Public Trust Tidelands by giving guest accommodations a monopoly on the proposed shoreline. There needs to be publicly-accessible Regional Parkland between the wetland or beach and the leased areas in the park.  The City must commit to low-impact, transitional infrastructure, including low-cost visitor accommodation options, on the De Anza "island," and plan for these facilities to evolve over time into additional acres of wetlands as sea levels rise.  The City's own Design Guidelines call for a 150-ft minimum public use zone along beach areas and 100-ft minimum public use zone along bulkhead/rip-rap areas of the shore. The De Anza Natural land use plan does not meet these minimum criteria.

Deborah	Gostin	12/7/2023	1	As you consider how to build and improve upon the De Anza Natural wetland restoration plan for the northeast corner of Mission Bay, I'd like to ask you to prioritize the need for maximum wetland restoration in order to truly make the city's wetland restoration effort successful.  The city's final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for this project must prioritize water quality by adding a specific project objective to improve the water quality of the study area and the bay through natural, resilient infrastructure. As you're aware, water quality is a crucial component of the 1994 Mission Bay Park Master Plan, and water quality can best be guaranteed by the kind of green infrastructure restored wetlands will provide.  The city's draft EIR for the De Anza plan is also missing details on the foreseeable impacts from sea level rise. How can the city determine the best land-use plan without knowing how climate change will affect our park? While the city's Climate Action Plan calls for 700 acres of restored tidal marsh by 2035, only the ReWild Mission Bay Wildest plan provides the most direct way to achieve this goal with maximum wetland restoration. Unfortunately, the draft EIR for the De Anza Natural plan fails to consider the ReWild Mission Bay Wildest proposal against the city's own Climate Action Plan goals.  The ecological implications are critical and time is wasting. Kendall-Frost Marsh Preserve in Mission Bay provides the best habitat for endangered Ridgway's Rails. Yet these birds – original members of the 1973 Endangered Species Act – will lose their habitat over the next several decades as sea levels rise and their habitat is inundated. Unless we begin the ReWilding process now, these and other threatened and endangered native species will be lost, when they could've readily been saved.  The city's proposal also fails to analyze the recreational and cultural opportunities of connecting Mission Bay Park	
				to a restored tidal ecosystem. Doing so would better balance and expand the park's recreational offerings. This will ensure that everyone, especially the Kumeyaay and those in underserved communities, will benefit from access to a vibrant tidal marsh with expanded recreation opportunities.  Thank you for your kind consideration of our recommendations on how to improve the De Anza Natural plan.

### **Dear Planning Commissioners:**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) is writing in response to the City of San Diego's (City) Final Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan (Amendment) and Final Program Environmental Impact Report (FPEIR) for the De Anza Natural Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan. Our comments and recommendations are based on our knowledge of sensitive and declining vegetation communities and species in Mission Bay, the Mission Bay Master Plan Update (Master Plan), the City's Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP) Subarea Plan (SAP), the Mission Bay Park Natural Resource Management Plan (NRMP), and our participation on the Wetlands Working Group and Scientific and Technical Advisory Committee for the ReWild Mission Bay Project.

The mission of the Service is working with others to conserve, protect, and enhance fish, wildlife, plants, and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people. Consistent with our mission, we have been working with partners to improve conditions for habitat, wildlife, and the human community in northeast Mission Bay. The Service also has legal responsibility for the welfare of migratory birds, anadromous fish, and threatened and endangered animals and plants occurring in the United State and is responsible for administering the Federal Endangered Species Act of 1973 (Act), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*), including habitat conservation plans (HCP) developed under section 10(a)(1) of the Act. The City participates in the HCP program by implementing its approved MSCP SAP.

Within the project area, the Service has provided funding and technical assistance to San Diego Audubon for the ReWild Mission Bay: Wetlands Restoration Feasibility Study Report (ReWild Feasibility Study) and to San Diego Earth Works and University of California Reserve System for their Transition Zone Habitat Restoration Project at the Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve.

The Service previously provided comments to the City in letters dated December 7, 2016, August 10, 2017, July 11, 2018, February 16, 2022, and most recently in our letter dated May 9, 2023, on the draft Amendment and Program Environmental Impact Report (DPEIR). We also met with the City on July 28, 2023, to discuss our comments and recommendations on the Amendment. Most of our previous recommendations were not accepted in the Amendment and FPEIR.

As stated in our previous comments, De Anza Cove is the best location to maximize wetland restoration to help achieve the water quality improvement goals of the Master Plan which will benefit wildlife and recreational uses throughout Mission Bay. In addition, the City's 2022 Climate Action Plan (CAP) includes the goals of restoring 350 acres of "salt marsh and other associated tidal wetland and riparian habitats" by 2030 and 700 acres by 2035. Considering these more recent CAP goals, the 1995 Master Plan was visionary in prioritizing wetland restoration in north Mission Bay, including De Anza Cove, and we know of no better place to help achieve these significant CAP goals.

In addition, of all the assets identified in the City's Climate Resilient SD, conservation areas/open space/source water land assets, such as De Anza Cove, face the greatest number of coastal hazards. Furthermore, Climate Resilient SD identifies De Anza Cove as an area vulnerable to sea level rise and flooding and identifies wetland restoration as natural infrastructure to meet the City's Thriving Natural Environments (TNE) policies. Prioritizing/maximizing wetland restoration at De Anza Cove would specifically address policies TNE-2: Protect and improve the integrity of open space, habitat and parks; and TNE-3: Prioritize the implementation of nature-based climate change solutions wherever feasible.

To facilitate synergistic implementation of the Master Plan, the CAP, and Climate Resilient SD, wetland restoration should be prioritized/maximized in the Amendment while allowing for other uses that will avoid and minimize impacts to existing or restored wetlands. To that end, we continue to recommend that the City adopt either the "ReWild Wildest" or "Wetlands Optimized" alternative as the preferred alternative for the Amendment. The ReWild Wildest and Wetland Optimized Alternatives are environmentally superior to the De Anza Natural Alternative because they would restore more contiguous wetland across the De Anza peninsula, thus maximizing habitat for wildlife, benefitting water quality, and increasing carbon sequestration. Implementation of either of these alternatives would also go further than the De Anza Natural Alternative in achieving the CAP goals and Climate Resilient SD policies, especially with the sea level rise and flooding projections identified in these documents. We understand that the City wishes to provide recreational uses in Mission Bay, and we support the Park and Recreation Board recommendation (July 20, 2023, meeting) for an analysis of the feasibility of utilizing the South Shores as a viable replacement for recreation activities at De Anza Cove.

The federally listed endangered light-footed Ridgway's rail (*Rallus obsoletus levipes*) and California least tern [*Sternula antillarum browni* (*Sterna a. b.*)], and federally threatened western snowy plover [*Charadrius nivosus nivosus* (*C. alexandrinus n.*)] use Mission Bay for nesting, roosting, and/or foraging, and potential impacts to these species within U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) jurisdiction are not covered under the City's SAP. If potential impacts to

federally listed species cannot be avoided, consultation with the Service pursuant section 7 or permitting pursuant to section 10 of the Act will be required. In our comments on the DPEIR, we recommended several conservation measures to avoid, minimize and mitigate potential impacts to these species that were not included in the Amendment and FPEIR. The Service continues to recommend that these conservation measures be included in the Amendment and FPEIR, which will help expedite any future consultation or permitting process. In addition to consultation or permitting pursuant to the Act, the project will likely require permitting by the Corps, the California Coastal Commission, and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. Prior to approving the project, we recommend that the City coordinate with these agencies to ensure that the project can be implemented consistent with applicable laws and regulations.

The Amendment proposes to fill portions of Mission Bay to create uplands at De Anza Cove. As stated in our previous comments, while the Service does not support fill to create uplands, we may support fill to restore eelgrass or intertidal habitat (i.e., mudflat, low-, mid-, or high-elevation salt marsh) if it is shown to have a net environmental benefit and help make Mission Bay more resilient to sea level rise.

Based on the Amendment and FPEIR, the City intends to adopt De Anza Natural Alternative. However, the sea level rise analysis that was added to the FPEIR since the DPEIR was out for public review shows that significantly more fill in Mission Bay will be needed than is currently shown in the in the Amendment and FEIR for the De Anza Natural Alternative to achieve a minimum of 80 acres of wetland by 2100. If the City adopts the De Anza Natural Alternative, we continue to recommend that the following be included in the Amendment and FPEIR to achieve a minimum 80 acres of wetland in light of sea level rise while avoiding additional fill in Mission Bay and still allowing other uses that avoid and minimize impacts to existing or restored wetlands (e.g., primitive/tent camping and passive recreation):

- 1. Language that allows only soft, unarmored, gently sloped (e.g., 20:1), living shorelines around the De Anza peninsula/boot and island/foot.
- 2. Language that allows only habitat restoration, primitive/tent camping, passive recreation (e.g., pedestrian trails and educational features) on the De Anza peninsula (e.g., no RV camping).
- 3. Language that allows only infrastructure on the De Anza peninsula that can be removed and will not be protected to allow managed retreat/wetland establishment as sea level rises (e.g., no pavement, utilities).
- 4. Language that commits to implementing a habitat restoration design by 2030 that has undergone sea level rise modeling demonstrating that, with sea level rise projections, upland buffers, and at least 80 acres of contiguous low-, mid-, and high-elevation salt marsh will remain at the mouth of Rose Creek in 2100.

Given the importance of the decisions made during this planning process to the future of wetlands in Mission Bay and our concerns regarding the De Anza Natural Alternative, we recommend the Planning Commission not approve of the Amendment and FPEIR until further

Dear Planning Commissioners and members of the public:

This final PEIR does not allay my fears for the future of the natural environment in the vicinity of the terminus of Rose Creek at Mission Bay if the city pursues the DeAnza Natural Plan. In spite of decades of advancement in the understanding of how ecosystems function, much research at institutions of higher learning in the city of San Diego, and studies at the Kendall-Frost Marsh Reserve itself, this plan remains an obviously flawed pursuit of poorly conceived goals. The PEIR responses to objections regarding the lack of explicit purpose and clarity of the stated goals are repeatedly that this degree of specificity is not appropriate until later, during the project-level analyses:

"This comment states that the DEIR doesn't give any specific goals for wetland restoration west of Rose Creek, and should include specific population goals for the endangered species within the MHPA, acres of critical habitat, and specific adjacency rules to protect existing and future populations of these species. As discussed in PEIR Chapter 3.0, Project Description, no development is currently being proposed; therefore, specific details regarding schedule, construction activities, and implementation of the project are not currently available" (p. RTC-S3-8).

Needless to say, the objections go far beyond not knowing the schedule, construction activities, and implementation details.

In spite of these protestations about not being able to provide specifics, the entire PEIR analysis turns on comparisons of acreages calculated to a 1/10 of an acre. But for what <u>purpose</u> are we trying to save (at least) 80 acres in 2100? Theoretically, for the functionality of those acres, their ability to preserve the habitat that supports listed endangered species, such as the Lightfooted Ridgway's rail, as well as the ecosystem services of water quality improvement, migratory bird foraging, and fish nurseries. So it makes a very big difference whether the acres that the city is counting as wetlands, are actually covered in verdant vegetation (i.e. salt marsh) or mudflats, which do not support rails, nor water quality improvement, nor many of the other functions of wetland ecosystems.

The fact that the sea level rise (SLR) analysis does <u>not</u> combine the two habitats is a jarring revelation of how bad the city's plans are, and that they are essentially indefensible: Tidal inundation is the primary focus of the SLR analysis as it is the ultimate factor in determining whether the planned land uses will be above or below water, which plants grow where in the marsh, and whether marsh plants can survive at all (i.e. those areas inundated for longer than cordgrass can tolerate become mudflats, which is exactly what is occurring in the NWP.)

The "solution" that the SLR analysis provides (somewhat apologetically, to give GHD credit) is to fill the entire open water area to a height that allows for saltmarsh to grow, something that is not proposed anywhere. See figure 17 and figure 18 of Appendix N, in which the starting condition (current sea level) is saltmarsh surrounding the lower mudflats of the Kendall-Frost Marsh, which would require fill to depths of up to 7.4 feet (see table 4). Even this is not enough to prevent the inundation of the majority of these areas by 2100, leaving only 43 acres of vegetated salt marsh in the DeAnza Natural scenario and 52.6 acres under the "Wetlands optimized" scenario -- see figures 12 and 16, respectively.

Unfortunately, the SLR analysis appears to be intentionally disingenuous in the presentation of the hypothetical cross-sections of fill. Why else would the cross-section B be shown for the "Wetlands Optimized" plan, but not in the same location for DeAnza Natural? It seems that this is because figure 18 makes it glaringly obvious that up to 10 feet of fill would be necessary to rescue or maintain the proposed remaining wetlands as well as the developed areas.

The Mission Bay Master Plan argued for the <u>expansion</u> of the wetlands by 80 acres, for a total of 120 acres of wetlands. Otherwise, there would be no improvement to the current situation of 80 acres of wetlands (approx. 40 acres) plus mudflats. I do not believe that the additional 80 acres were envisioned to be majority mudflat. The fact that the SLR analysis doesn't include the existing wetlands may be justified because, yes, the point was to find a way to make 80 acres of "wetlands" above water possible, and the answer would probably have been no different if they had been included, because they will be 100% under water with 7 feet of sea level rise. Figures 12 and 16 <u>should</u> show that inundation for the existing wetlands and mudflats, and the danger it poses to the Bay Villas condominiums specifically, as well as to Crown Point Drive, and to Mission Bay High School, and other low-lying areas.

Therefore, the letter from the UC Natural Reserve System commenting that the goals for the plan should have included the functionality of the wetlands (ie. supporting specific population goals for endangered species and other functions of the areas to be restored) remains valid: there is no use in the entire so-called wetland being mudflat. Counting mudflats as habitat will not suffice to support endangered rails; they don't/can't use mudflats for foraging or nesting or escaping recurrent high tides.

#### Other minor points:

- why does the Final SLR report include the UC upland property within the "DeAnza Cove Redevelopment Site" (fig. 1)?
- Why isn't the Mission Bay tide gauge used for the calculations?

In conclusion, the responses to comment letters and the additional analyses presented at this stage do not provide confidence in the city's plan development and environmental impact analysis processes: essentially, the city wishes to proceed with a poor design, and to analyze the component projects, and then to carry out mitigation piecemeal for these faulty components to the extent practicable...potentially leaving the whole of this area of Mission Bay Park a patched-up wreck.

Therefore, and for the many other reasons to oppose this Plan that you have read or heard, please do not approve the PEIR.

# **COMMENT LETTER**

Subject: Motorized Boat Use in De Anza Cove

Great Ecology, on behalf of Terra Vista Management (operator of Campland), recommends studies be conducted to assess: 1) the impacts of motorized boat use on wetland structure and function; and 2) boat wake attenuation strategies in shallow water environments, *prior to* fully excluding motorized watercraft from the De Anza Cove (the Cove) under the City's proposed De Anza Cove Amendment to the Mission Bay Park Master Plan.

Great Ecology is well known in San Diego and across the country as a habitat restoration firm. We have worked with the Port of San Diego on Pond 20 and with the Del Mar Fairgrounds on the San Dieguito Lagoon restoration. We have built projects throughout the country including several in New York City and Denver. Our principles are based on bringing people to nature and bringing nature to people in urban settings. We have never felt it necessary to exclude people from experiencing nature – and for wetlands that means allowing people to come close to a wetland in a boat.

We request the City modify the De Anza Cove Amendment and Programmatic Environmental Impact Report to include explicit language requiring investigation of motorized boat use impacts and attenuation strategies.

## **INTRODUCTION AND POSITION**

Currently, De Anza Cove allows for motorized watercraft access with a five mile per hour speed limit. Great Ecology strongly recommends an evaluation of the potential impacts of motorized watercraft on wetlands prior to disallowing this activity in the Cove. Existing research suggests impacts from boat wakes can be mitigated through placement and design of marsh vegetation, floating wake attenuators, shoreline improvements, and other design and/or policy choices.

It is easy to confuse a habitat restoration project in an urban setting with a remote and pristine habitat. Our company is rooted in creating habitats in such settings and our firm has consulted on and built dozens of projects in highly altered environments. They will never become pristine and coveted wetlands, although many elements of wetlands can be created or restored in the urban context. In this case, we are talking about postage stamp sized habitats, in the single largest recreational waterbody, in the tenth largest city in the United States. If the goal is to create a completely remote and pristine habitat that cannot be designed to handle modest boat wake, then it is already destined to fail.



## **SUPPORTING INFORMATION**

Existing studies have evaluated the impacts of motorized watercraft on wetlands, both natural and constructed. The amount of boat wake energy affecting a given shoreline is a function of size, speed, and frequency of vessel traffic. Highly traveled waterways are more likely to experience boat wake-induced shoreline erosion than less frequently traveled waterways (Bilkovic et al. 2017).

In another study, the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) assessed the function of fringe wetlands and found that any marsh of a given size and roughness may be highly effective at attenuating short-period, low-energy waves such as those resulting from wind chop or boat traffic surges (Shafer and Yozzo 1998). The USACE report recommended conducting a functional assessment prior to implementation of a project and modeling post-project conditions to inform project design. The report advised that with the proper technical inputs and effective post-condition modeling, an effective wetland can be designed to attenuate wake and support the required rates of sediment deposition (Shafer and Yozzo 1998).

Wetlands both natural and created can attenuate waves under certain settings, as also demonstrated in Chesapeake Bay. Research in the Chesapeake Bay culminated in the following recommendations to manage potential boat wake and impacts to sensitive natural resources (Bilkovic et al. 2017):

- Develop predictive models to quantify the relative contribution of boat wakeinduced erosion to overall shoreline erosion, which informs water quality, habitat restoration, and shoreline protection management strategies;
- Collect data necessary to identify shorelines vulnerable to erosion from boating, and to calibrate and validate predictive models. Data considerations include recreational boating usage patterns, boat generated wave energy and currents, shallow water bathymetry, shoreline slope and vegetation characteristics, suspended sediment concentration as a measure of potential erosion, and shoreline erosion rates; and
- Consider boat wake-induced turbidity and erosion when siting restoration activities (e.g., restoration of wetlands or submerged aquatic vegetation).

A third study evaluated the effects of boat wakes and maintained that cumulative erosion accelerated as the number of vessels passing through the study area increased (El Safty and Marsooli 2020). The cumulative erosion after the passage of five vessels was two to three times less than that after the passage of ten vessels. Importantly, the study also showed that regardless of vessel size, slow moving vessels caused negligible changes in bed elevation, while vessels that move with a higher speed caused a cumulative bed elevation change, specifically erosion in shallow areas in the vicinity of deep shipping channels.



### **RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSION**

Great Ecology recommends the De Anza Cove Amendment be revised to state:

"Motorized boating in De Anza Cove should be studied further and only be considered if studies determine impacts to the wetlands can be avoided or mitigated."

Potential future studies examining boat length, displacement, noise, and speed would inform the relationships among wake size, wake frequency, and impacts such as erosion within Mission Bay, and the resulting potential impacts on wetlands and wetland species. A thorough analysis is necessary to identify appropriate minimization and mitigation measures to reduce impacts and create a sustainable and resilient wetland design.

Great Ecology has seen over and over that the best intentions of environmental projects succeed when they are designed for the actual urban setting in which they will be built – not restricted for a mythical but never-to-be-achieved perfect ecological outcome. Boats and wetlands successfully co-exist and with appropriate engineering controls, signage, and speed restrictions we strongly believe, based on our more than 2 decades of experience, that there is no value in attempting to keep the public from using boats near the small, planned wetlands in the cove.

Great Ecology has never witnessed regulators or other authorities exclude the public and create no boating zones in our coastal wetland projects – and some of our projects have been in existence for nearly two decades with no adverse effects. Furthermore, in no case have we ever seen regulators try to remove the livelihood of a local business. In our experience, waterfront campgrounds such as Campland on the Bay and Mission Bay RV Resort serve as important environmental advocates within a community. The visitors that patronize Campland, and utilize their boats, are the exact people we want to encourage to access the wetlands, operate boats near the wetlands, and teach their children the value of habitats and their restoration. Great Ecology seeks further study and improved design to ensure the co-existence of wetlands and boats can continue.

Dear Planning Commissioners,

The family-friendly, affordable camping and recreation opportunities in northeast Mission Bay today should be preserved to ensure a more equitable coastline for future generations.

While the De Anza Natural Plan is the best option of those studied, all of the alternatives under consideration would significantly reduce the site's existing 970+ campsites at a time when affordable coastal access is needed more than ever. Please do not allow any further camping reductions beyond what has already been proposed. As an environmentally friendly use, camping complements wetlands and fosters a love of nature and the outdoors, and we cannot afford to make our coastline less accessible.

To further ensure coastal equity, the City should study best practices for motorized boating that protect the environment instead of limiting this use. Public recreational areas should be inclusive, providing equal access to all types of visitors, regardless of the level of accommodation they can afford. The City needs to study the issue further, and continued discussion is necessary to ensure the community is fully informed and can provide input on potential impacts.

For these reasons, we continue to call on the City to adopt the alternative that preserves the most outdoor camping and recreational opportunities, and studies boating impacts before limiting this use in Northeast Mission Bay.
