## Parks, Libraries, and Roads



#### Kelly Street Neighborhood Park

In March, the Linda Vista Community Recreation Council voted in support of one of the proposed design alternatives for Kelly Park. The project is now undergoing environmental review, and City staff is preparing to bring the updated plans to the full Park & Recreation Board in spring of 2024. I have requested design funding for this project in the upcoming fiscal year.

#### Alvarado Canyon Rd Realignment

In April, the City's consultant provided an update to the Navajo Planning Group on the planning phase of this project. At this time, feasible design alternatives have been narrowed down to include different variations of realigning Alvarado Canyon Rd to the intersection of Mission Gorge Rd/Fairmount Ave. The environmental review will be completed in spring 2024, and will then move into the design phase, which is fully funded.





#### San Carlos Library

In August, Mayor Gloria, Congresswoman Jacobs and over 100 members of the community joined me in celebrating the historic step of buying the lot next to the current library. Partial design will be finalized by the end of 2023, and the City is planning to put the design/construction contract out to bid in 2024. A large funding gap persists, and with the help of \$5 million allocated through Navajo-collected developer fees, the City is pursuing state and federal grant funding to move this project into the next phase.

#### Allied Gardens Off-Leash Dog Park

Earlier this year, the City's Park & Recreation Board unanimously approved the design of my proposed off-leash dog park, and I worked to fund this project in this year's budget. The City's fencing contractor started work on December 8, and City crews will now coordinate to install a concrete walkway, entry patio, logs and site furnishings, as well as retrofitting the irrigation system. We are expecting to open this up to the community in early 2024.





#### Ruffin Canyon Trail

In 2023, the Ruffin Canyon Trail, linking Serra Mesa to Mission Valley, moved toward completion. This year, my staff focused on working with the San Diego Mountain Biking Association, the Escala HOA, and others to cut through red tape and get this project closer to the finish line. During the last Council meeting of the year, I cast my vote to allocate the final \$150,000 for the Ruffin Trail construction. Now that the easement and funding are in place, residents of Serra Mesa and Mission Valley will soon have a completed trail to enjoy in fall 2024.

## IN THE COMMUNITY Allied Gardens

#### **KEY EVENTS**

March 9, 2023: It was my pleasure to present a proclamation declaring March 9th, 2023 "Gary Blume Total Altruism Project Day" in the City of San Diego. Gary was the architect behind a trash picker upper program at the Allied Gardens Rec Center. See top left. March 14, 2023: I was proud to host a bulk trash drop off event for Allied Gardens residents. See middle left. December 2023: After many months of advocacy, we broke ground on the new dog park! The dog park, located next to the Allied Gardens Pool, will be the first ever dog park in District 7. More info on page 7. See bottom left.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Keep an eye out for a new public works project in Allied Gardens, the Improv 3 project. This project will be upgrading the water and sewer infrastructure in Allied Gardens as well as putting in curb ramps and resurfacing streets. Construction work is anticipated to begin in the summer of 2024 and take approximately 18 months. Waring Road, College Avenue, Navajo Road, and the surrounding streets will all be affected by construction.

## IN THE COMMUNITY

#### Del Cerro

#### **KEY EVENTS**

July 6, 2023: I joined SDFD staff to do a tour of Del Cerro Open Space and discuss fire prevention and abatement. I asked them to ensure that we are doing everything possible to promote fire safety. *See top right*. <u>September 7, 2023</u>: In the wake of several rounds of anti-Semitic flyering incidents in Del Cerro and other communities, I invited Jewish community leaders, anti-hate activists, and first responders to join me in calling for harsher penalties for hateful flyering. *See middle right*.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Since taking office, I have advocated on behalf of District 7 residents for more work to be done on our roads. Good news: College Avenue will receive an asphalt overlay! Keep an eye out for this project to begin in summer 2024.

## IN THE COMMUNITY Grantville

#### **KEY EVENTS**

August 11, 2023: I was on hand to celebrate the grand opening of the Union Grantville housing development at the Grantville Transit Center. The housing complex has 250 units and houses more than 600 residents, mostly SDSU students. *See top left*.

October 17, 2023: In August, following my office's outreach to City staff, a curb cut was completed at Kaiser Vandever. A nurse contacted us in October to follow up and let us know how meaningful our work was to her and her patients. *See middle left.* 

#### LOOKING AHEAD

In early 2024, the transit-focused ShoreLINE affordable housing project will open its doors to future residents. The five-story development next to the trolley will include over 120 apartment units, offer onsite after-school programs, and broader, skills and career-building programs. *See bottom left.* 

## IN THE COMMUNITY Linda Vista

#### **KEY EVENTS**

<u>April 29, 2023:</u> I was proud to declare April 29th

"Linda Vista 38th Annual Multi-Cultural Fair Day" in the City of San Diego. *See top right*.

November 15, 2023: I partnered with the Carpenters Union and Bayside Community Center to give low-income Linda Vistans turkey, pie, and fresh produce for Thanksgiving. *See middle right.* 

<u>December 16, 2023</u>: Linda Vista Community Garden will be the first community garden in a City of San Diego park. I was honored to attend its groundbreaking. *See bottom right*.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

An updated plan for John Baca Park was approved by the City's Park & Recreation Board in mid-2021, and this year I was able to secure the funding needed to move the project into the next phase. During 2024, this project will undergo design and final review, which once completed makes it a great candidate for grant funding to finally upgrade the park in 2025 and beyond.













## IN THE COMMUNITY Mission Valley

#### **KEY EVENTS**

<u>April 27, 2023:</u> I joined Global Gals, a women's group, at a Mission Valley resident's home to talk about District 7 issues. *See top left.* 

September 6, 2023: Though the Riverwalk Project, which I have championed, is no longer in my District post-redistricting, my staff and I toured the development to learn about the progress being made on the project. We learned about the incredible amenities, pedestrian-friendly infrastructure, and housing that Riverwalk will bring to Mission Valley. *See middle left.* 

September 21, 2023: I joined the San Diego River Park Foundation, whose mission includes protecting and enhancing the San Diego River, for its 22nd Anniversary event. *See bottom left*.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Keep an eye out for more updates on the Enhanced Infrastructure Financing District (EIFD), which the City and County are partnering on to complete the San Diego River Park Trail. This will bring us closer to making the San Diego River a cultural and recreational hub in our region.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

It is finally happening: Navajo Road between Camino Estrellado and Park Ridge Blvd will begin repaving in January 2024. I've advocated for this street to be repaved since day one in office. To ensure the longevity of this key District 7 corridor, the treatment will be full overlay.

September 16, 2023: Mayor Gloria and I were proud to join Serra Mesans to celebrate 92123 Day (a few days early). See bottom left.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Now that the easement and funding are in place for Ruffin Trail, residents of Serra Mesa and Mission Valley will soon have a completed trail to enjoy once crews complete construction in fall 2024.

#### Why I Voted for the **Unsafe Camping Ordinance**

One of the most notable actions the City Council took this year was the passage of the Unsafe Camping Ordinance, which prohibits encampments at all times within two blocks of certain sensitive areas, like schools, parks, and transit stations, and prohibits camping on city streets if appropriate shelter for an individual is available. I voted for the Unsafe Camping Ordinance because the status quo that has existed in San Diego for years is a public health and safety risk. The situation on our streets is unacceptable, and we must take swift action. So far, the Ordinance has been a success. I will continue to fight for more shelter space, affordable housing, and fully staffing our first responders and mental health providers to help us combat homelessness.

There are about 3,200 family child care providers in Sam Diego County, according to a 2022 Uni-versity of San Diego report. About 1,400 are in the city proper. Some family child care pro-viders have been evicted or denied erntal housing because landlords

viders have been evicted or denied rental housing because landlords don't want their properties used for a child care business. Land-lords may worry about potential noise or property damage from having several children in a home, experts say.

#### Standing Up for San Diego Families: Access to Quality and Affordable Childcare

It's far too expensive and difficult to get highquality childcare in San Diego, and since being elected to the Council, I have prioritized improving access to quality and affordable childcare for San Diegans and working families. This year, I fought for and won a doubling of parental leave from 4 weeks to 8 weeks for the over 12,000 City of San Diego employees. We also made it easier to access those benefits. Additionally, I passed a policy at Council that ensures that in every rental agreement in San Diego, tenants know that they have the right to operate a family childcare facility out of their home. Finally, this year we opened a childcare facility for SDPD officers so that more people can join the police force and help fully staff our police department.

#### Fighting Hate in Our Communities

Let me be clear: hate is absolutely unacceptable in San Diego. In response to the multiple anti-Semitic and anti-LGBTQ+ hate-flyering incidents that have occurred in District 7, I am working on a new law that will increase the penalty for littering that threatens, harasses, and instigates violence. In collaboration with civil rights leaders, I'm also bringing forth a policy to improve our city's hate incident and hate crime reporting system that will also connect people targeted for hate with legal resources and community support. Look for more updates in early 2024. I am committed to making San Diego a safer and more inclusive place for all; I refuse to sit back and do nothing to stop the hate we're seeing.



### **FY24 Budget Wins**

Each July, the budget is adopted for the upcoming year. Here are just a few of the major items in the FY24 budget that I helped secure:

#### **\$5 million for the** San Carlos Library

#### \$1.5 million for John Baca Park

- \$138 million for Street Paving
- \$1.5 million to fix the City's most dangerous intersections
- \$500,000 for traffic calming
- 509 acres of brush maintenance
- 45 additional public safety positions

- Key positions added for Get it Done support, sidewalk ramping, litter abatement, water billing customer service, and more
- \$225,000 to recruit more police officers

#### Smart Streetlights: Keeping San Diegans Safe

Smart Streetlights are a crucial element in enhancing the safety of San Diego by addressing the prevalent threats from drug and human traffickers that have inflicted considerable harm on our community. Today's criminals are not only more determined, but also more sophisticated than ever. To confront these evolving challenges and promote safety and justice, we must employ the latest technology. The Smart Streetlights Ordinance empowers law enforcement to use technology in apprehending criminals and delivering justice for crimes that have occurred. This approach contributes to a safer and more secure community, and I was proud to support our law enforcement with my vote in support of this technology.





#### Leading on Behavioral Health

San Diego is facing an unacceptable Behavioral Health Bed Crisis. Improving this situation will decrease levels of homelessness, reduce hospital wait times, ease pressures on our first responders, and most importantly, provide San Diegans with the proper care they need. Though health and human services fall under the responsibility of the County government, I am working with the Mayor's office to ensure City policies support providing more facilities and I am prepared to put pressure on other levels of government to properly support and coordinate their behavioral health resources. First step: Prop 1, Governor Newsom's March 2024 Ballot Measure that could help build more than 11,000 beds and nearly 27,000 treatment slots within the state. If passed, I will be pushing for San Diego to be prioritized.

## **Safer Streets**

Upgrading our street infrastructure has been one of my top priorities since I was elected. I work hard to get your streets repaved because I know how frustrating it is to drive on bumpy streets. This year, my staff and I have been successful in repaving many of the roads that needed help the most.

I've also focused on making our roads safer. It is my firm belief that all who use the road should be safe from harm. That's why I have fought hard for more Class IV (protected) bike lanes all across District 7 and San Diego. My City Council colleagues and I passed the Complete Streets policy, which prioritizes bike infrastructure improvements and traffic calming measures.

In 2024, I'll continue to fight to ensure that District 7 roads are prioritized for improvements and repaving.
