#### Summary

#### Updates

Updates outlining changes to the project webpage were shared with participants, including:

- Calendar of EJ engagement events

A friendly reminder of where to find engagement questions was also provided.

#### **Engagement Check-In**

Activity 1 - Participants shared brief summaries of community engagement held since the previous Roundtable Meeting. All participants agreed it is helpful to have city representatives at events to support engagement activities.

#### **Review and Discussion of Policies**

Activity 2 & 3 - Information gathered from previous outreach and engagement activities related to both healthy food access and safe and healthy homes were shared with the group to facilitate discussion. This included an overview of existing policies that can be built upon to strengthen policies around each topic. The presentation of materials was followed by discussion questions that aimed at gathering further insights from the group on each topic. Key themes that emerged from the discussion are summarized below.

#### Healthy Food Access

**Discussion Questions:** 

- 1) What have you heard from your communities about Healthy Food Access?
- 2) What obstacles or barriers hinder access to fresh, healthy, and affordable food in the communities you serve?
- 3) What solutions or resources would enhance food access for these communities?

Healthy food access is reported as an important issue by all organizations. Participants expressed that addressing affordability, distance, and improving transportation options, as well as providing opportunities for more spaces to grow food can positively impact communities. The discussion focused on common reasons for emerging themes across events.

When discussing affordability, participants shared that oftentimes community members have to decide between affordability and healthy food options. In addition, while small local stores, such as mom-and-pop shops, can reduce the distance traveled, produce is often more expensive. At the same time, improving networks and conditions for walking, biking, and transit stops can expand options by making it easier to travel longer distances. Throughout the conversation, participants also expressed that community members enjoy gardening and growing their own food. As found in the <u>Outreach and Engagement Summary</u>, there is support and demand for community gardens, cooperative grow spaces, and general urban agriculture.

#### Safe and Healthy Homes

**Discussion Questions:** 

- 1) What are the key concerns or challenges that your community faces in accessing suitable housing?
- 2) What barriers are preventing the improvement of housing conditions in your community?

Opportunities to improve and maintain safe and healthy homes were discussed by participants. Affordability and limiting displacement were top priorities as more people are sharing homes to afford rent, and younger generations are delaying moving out due to a higher cost of living. It was expressed that this can lead to overcrowding, more cars, and limited parking. Support for programs incentivizing housing and affordability, along with expanding the urban tree canopy was expressed. In addition, one commonly heard reason limiting safe and healthy homes is that community members do not feel comfortable speaking out about responsibilities landlords have neglected, such as maintenance and taking action in a timely manner. It was expressed that fear of retaliation and expensive moving costs can lead to public health issues in the home. Participants suggested one way of alleviating fears is to provide more education and build awareness around tenant rights, while better enforcing "no-fault" eviction policies.

#### **Closing and Next steps:**

The next roundtable will focus on overarching topics related to civic engagement, physical activity, and programs and improvements to address the needs of disadvantaged communities.
