

This report summarizes the January through December 2023 National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) crimes, as well as domestic violence cases, gang, and hate crimes statistics. NIBRS crimes include crimes against persons, property, and society. The United States Department of Justice collects information on these crime types from law enforcement agencies throughout the United States and uses the data to measure crime nationwide.

Crime Overview

The table below shows a decrease of 2.7% for overall crime in 2023 compared to 2022, with decreases in over half of the categories, with the exception of aggravated assaults, vehicle theft, and a slight increase in kidnapping and other sex offenses. Both crimes against persons and property have remained relatively consistent with 2022 overall. Finally, NIBRS' addition of the crimes against society category offers a well-rounded perspective on crime in San Diego. While an increase in overall crimes against society is shown, most categories, such as prostitution and weapon law violations, show a decrease compared to last year.

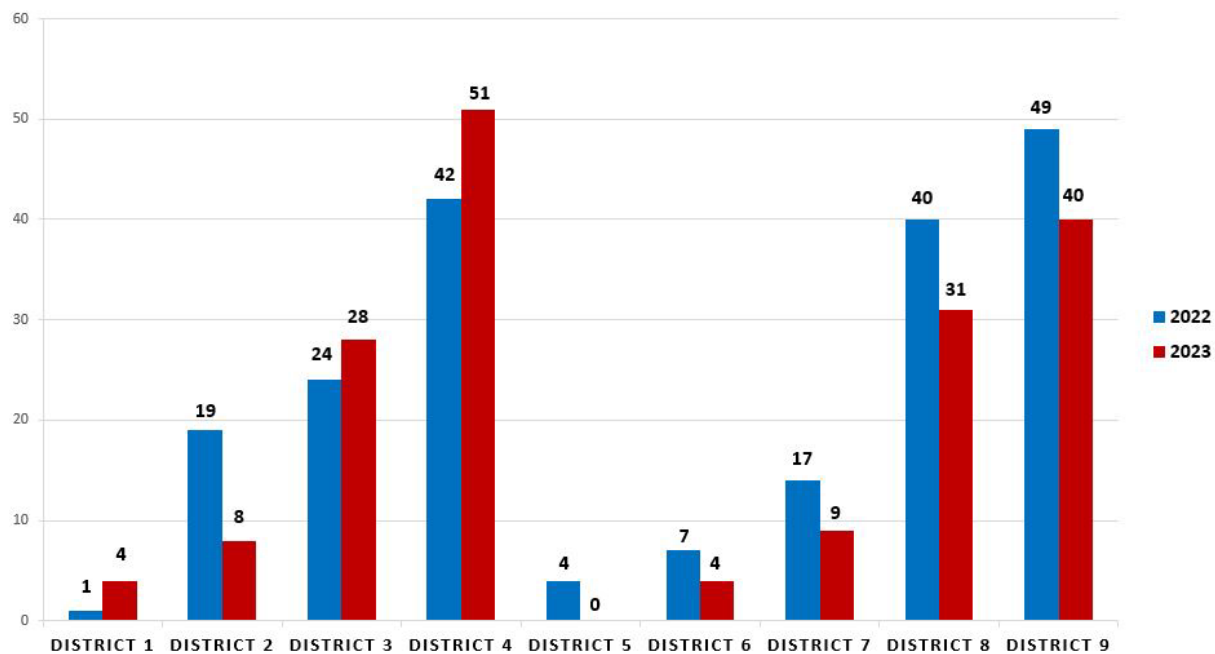

Crimes Against Persons

Overall, crimes against persons slightly decreased by 0.10% in 2023 compared to 2022, although aggravated assaults have increased by 5.6%. Conversely, sexual assault cases decreased by 16.2%, and the number of murders in 2023 decreased by 7 cases - 6 being associated with gang activity and 5 associated with family or domestic violence. The number of non-fatal shootings decreased by 23, a difference of 12% compared to 2022.

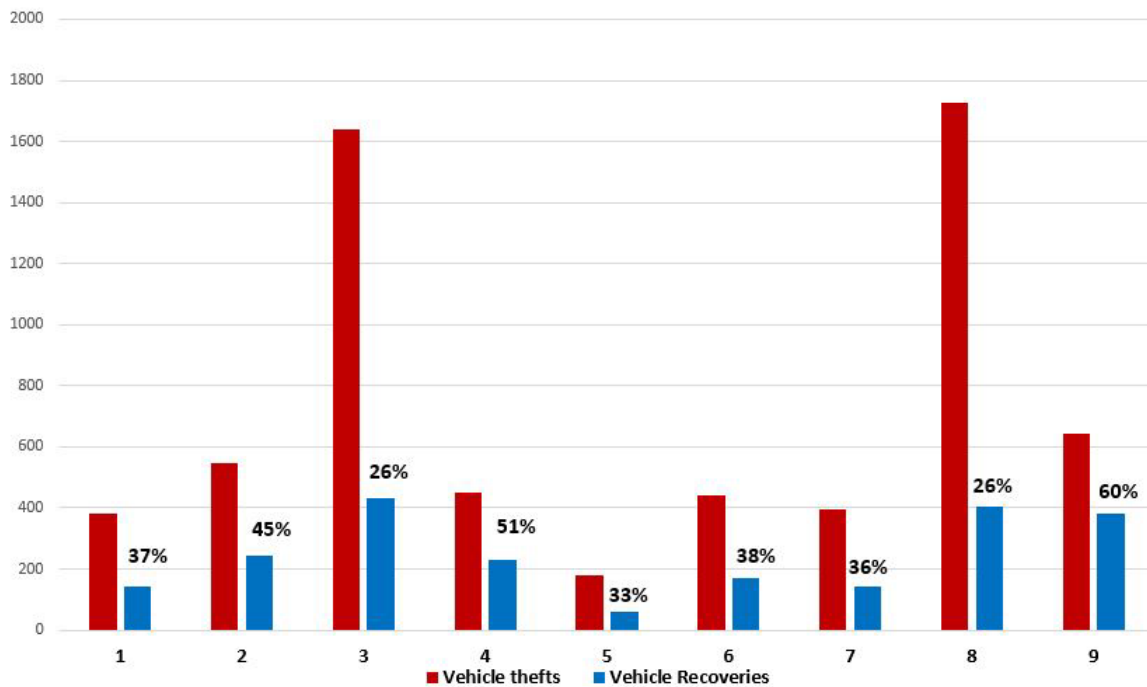
Non-Fatal Shootings by Council District 2022 vs 2023



Crimes Against Property

In 2023, property crime decreased by 5.7%. Burglary decreased by 16% with residential burglaries making up 44.7% of the total, while commercial burglaries accounted for 54.7% of the total. Robberies decreased by 83 cases or 6.5% compared to last year, and car jackings made up approximately 5.9% of all robberies in 2023. Furthermore, the number of thefts decreased by 5.2%, and vehicle break-ins decreased by 6.95%. The number of vehicle thefts increased by 3.4% from 2022 to 2023, similar to the number of vehicle thefts reported in the mid-2010's.

Stolen Vehicles vs Recoveries by Council District - 2023



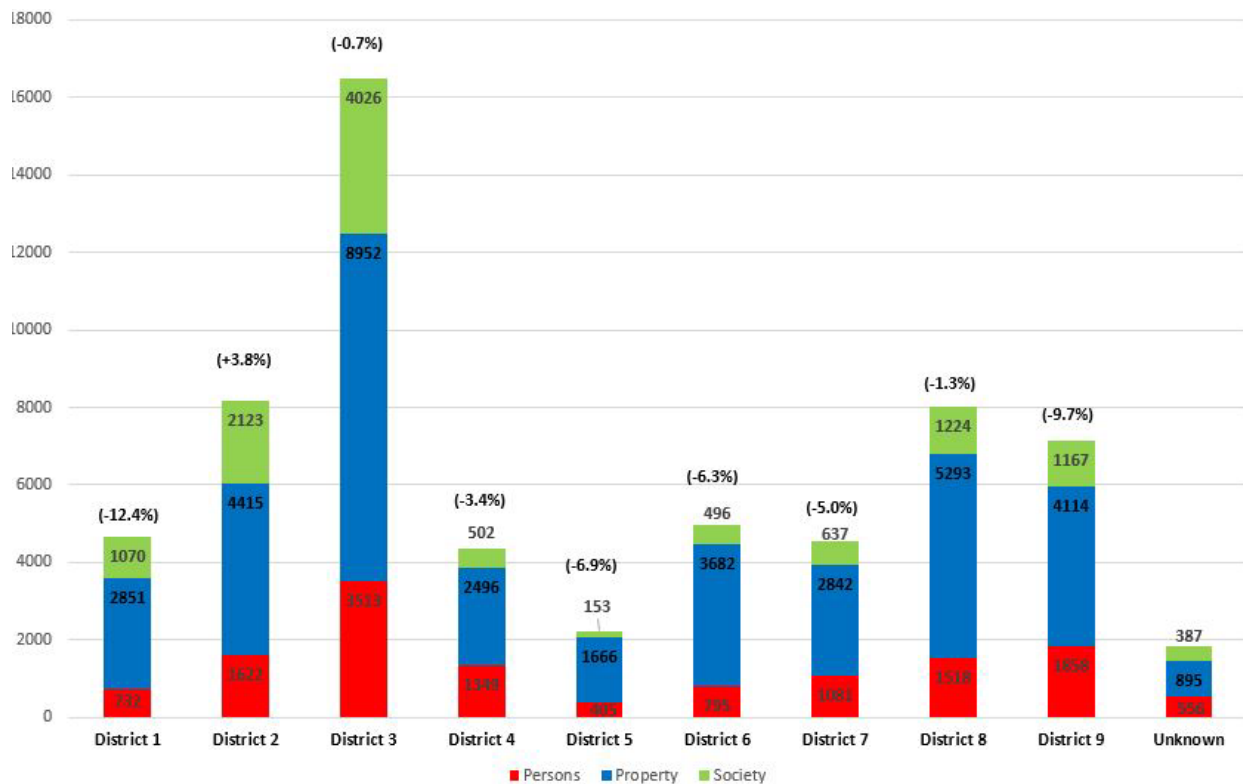

Overall recovery rates of stolen vehicles citywide remained the same as last year – 35%.

Crimes Against Society

Crimes against society violations are up slightly from 2022 by 4.6%. There has been a slight uptick in animal cruelty cases – a 20 case increase from last year. However, there have been decreases in other significant categories. Prostitution is down from last year by 28.6% and weapon law violations have decreased by 11.1%. Alcohol violations show a 13.7% decrease compared to 2022.

Crime Categories by Council District 2023

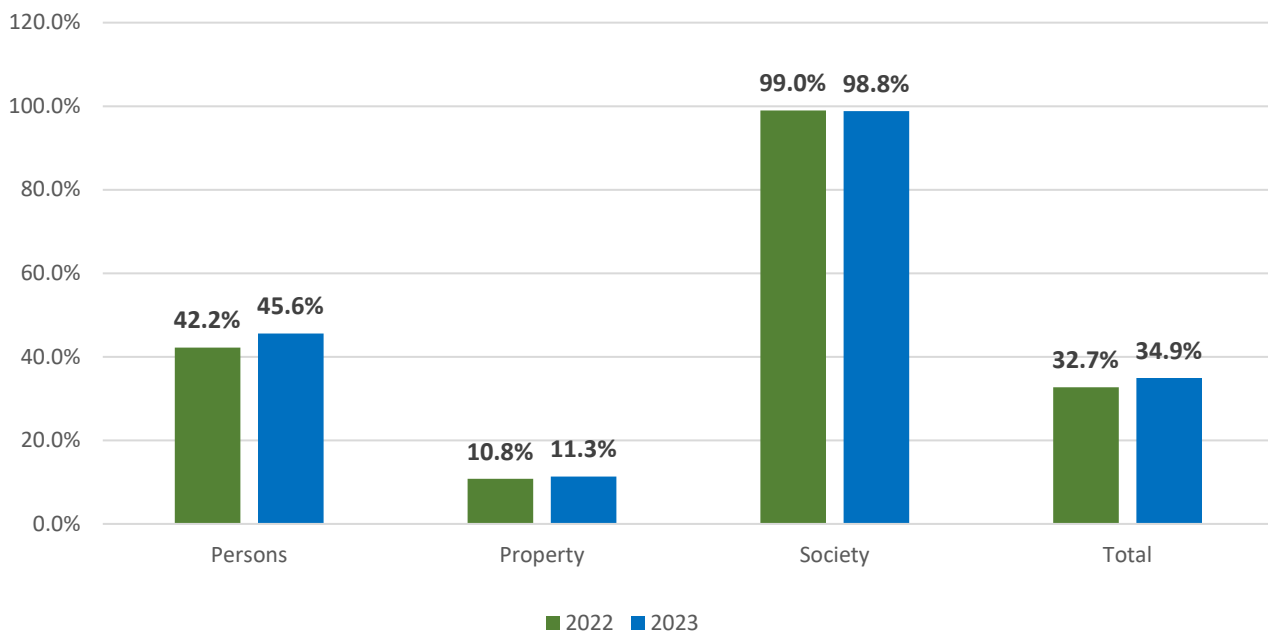


The above chart illustrates a breakdown of all three NIBRS categories per council district. All districts with the exception of district 2 show a decrease in overall crime in 2023.

Crime Clearances

Overall crime clearance rates increased in 2023 compared to 2022. In 2023, 45.6% of crimes against persons and 11.3% of crimes against property crimes were cleared. Generally, crimes against society involve situations where a suspect is arrested at the scene and therefore result in high clearance rates. Across all categories, 34.9% of all NIBRS crimes were cleared in 2023.

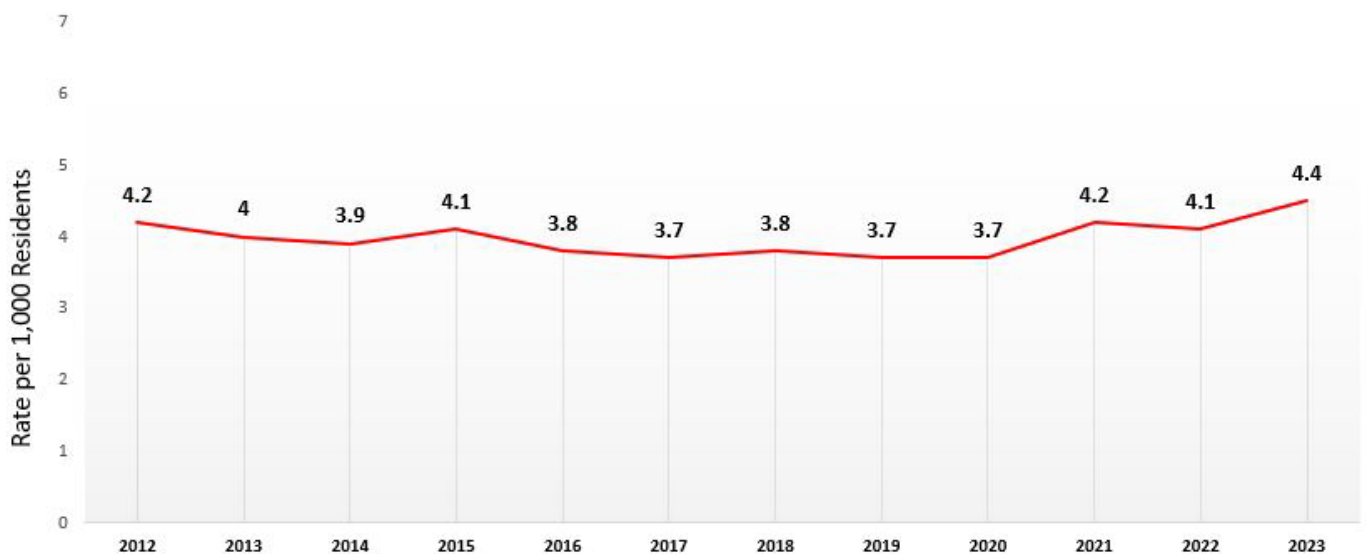
Crime Clearances by NIBRS Category 2022-2023



UCR Summary Crime Rate and Major City Comparison

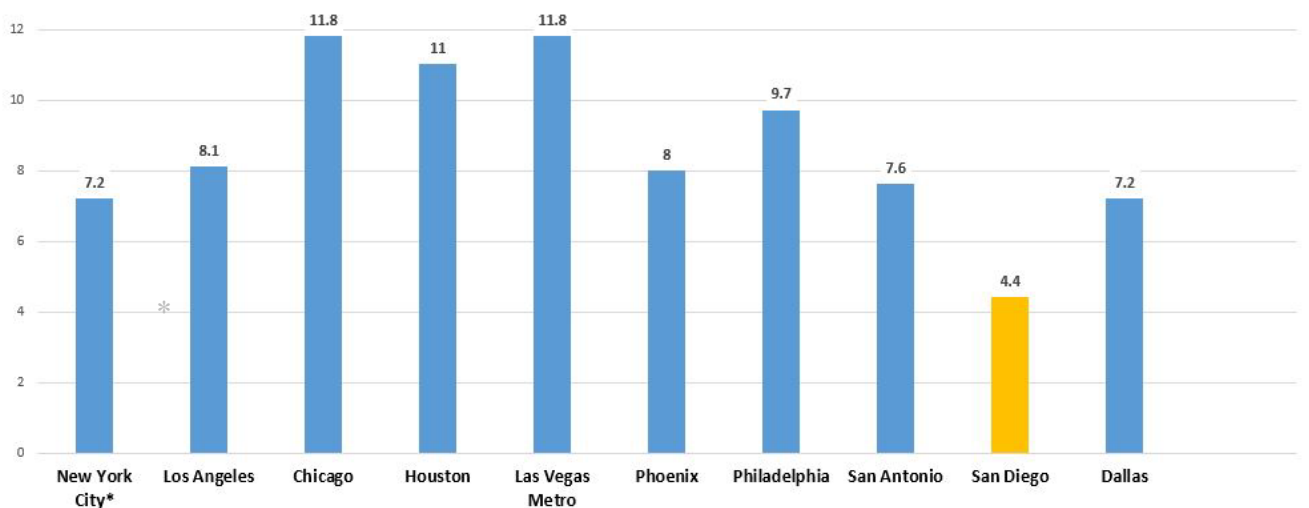
While NIBRS crimes do not offer a direct comparison with UCR Summary crimes, SDPD will continue to calculate the UCR Summary violent crime rate for historical comparison purposes. The violent crime rate of 4.4 per thousand residents in 2023 is comparable to rates in the mid-1970s and early 2000s. San Diego continues to maintain one of the lowest violent crime rates annually when compared to some of the largest U.S. cities by population.

Hate Crimes

There were 66 hate crimes in 2023, an increase of 73%. Hate crimes based on ethnicity, sexual orientation, and religion increased. Race accounted for 38% of the hate crimes, or 25 cases. Of these, anti-African American bias accounted for 56% of cases, followed by bias against multiple races, and anti-Hispanic cases at 16% and 12% respectively. Additionally, there was an uptick in hate crimes with a religious bias, with nearly half of those crimes having an anti-Jewish nexus.

Domestic Violence

The total number of domestic violence cases decreased by 3.1% in 2023 when compared to 2022. Domestic violence incidents involving firearms decreased 3.2%, however incidents involving knives/cutting instruments increased 15.9%.

Gang Crimes

Overall, the number of crimes committed by gang members decreased 12% in 2023. The number of documented gang members decreased by 20%. All categories of gang-related violent crime decreased when comparing 2023 with 2022.
