Purpose and Background

- When the San Diego City Council approved a 99-year lease in 2021 to rebuild San Diego High School in Balboa Park, it asked how the park and community could benefit physically and programmatically.
- Parks & Recreation Director Andy Field convened a working group, chaired by Mike Stepner, to study possibilities and report back.
- The Working Group reviewed the final report Jan. 26, 2024.



- San Diego City College Facilities Master Plan

 - New parking garages





 - Bay-Park Paseo, "John Nolen Parkway"








Park/Russ intersection









I-5 S-Curve, splitting park from neighborhoods




Construction of Interstate 5 beginning in the late 1950s further disrupted John Nolen's original vision

Story Map Education Corridor



Thinking Ahead: The Nolen Paseo - Connecting Neighbors

The Nolen Paseo is an idea - conceptually based on past ambitions, the existing reality of our city, and the desire to grow San Diego's urban core and fill it with life by creating vibrant and walkable streets, as well as incorporating recreation, arts, culture, and creativity into the public realm. It is named in respect to John Nolen and pays homage to his vision for a San Diego that is truly connected to nature.

The Nolen Paseo is not a single project, but a collection of past, present, and future projects, as well as visionary ideas with the goal to inspire future discussions regarding connecting San Diegans in the city's urban core to the many resources that surround them, just as John Nolen intended a century ago.
