It made me feel inspired to continue as a VISTA Leader on the West Coast to empower and build capacity for non-profit organizations with the San Diego Promise Zone.

COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

Abdur-Rahim Hameed

Nominated by Brian (Barry) Pollard, Urban Collaborative Project CEO

Abdur-Rahim Hameed is the founder of the Black Contractors Association of San Diego, Inc (BCA), and a force of community activism since the 1970s. Established in 1982, BCA has present membership of 350 business owners.

Mr. Hameed helped launch the <u>Inner-City</u> <u>Community Unilateral Apprenticeship</u> <u>Committee</u>, the first state-certified apprenticeship program for African Americans in the United States designed for inner-city youth.

Under Mr. Hameed's leadership, BCA was awarded a \$1.5 million grant from San Diego's Community Development Block Grant Program to complete construction on a 10,000-square-foot Apprentice Center and over \$2.1 million in YouthBuild USA training grants to build capacity in leading 120 apprentices to construct nine homes from the ground up, one of which was for homeless youths.

Under the work of the YouthBuild USA, Mr. Hameed provides a safe place for homeless in need of low-income housing, teaches Independent Living Skills, and



assists opportunity youth, ages 16-24, who are in a transitional stage to become responsible, employed, and successful young adults.

Mr. Hameed also contributes to creating opportunity and transition for youth who may be aging out of foster care by teaching them independent living skills and helping them with a "fresh start." Jack Pellegrino, San Diego County Director of Purchasing and Contracting, described Mr. Hameed as "a straight shooter, very direct and not afraid to talk about tough issues...I give him my highest respect. He speaks what's on his mind, which I really appreciate."

Mr. Pellegrino said he worked with Mr. Hameed in lining up minority contractors to work on the \$74 million Southwestern Live Well Center, 5101 Market St. "We're both very proud of it," Mr. Pellegrino said. "It's been a real pleasure to work with him as a collaborator on this project."

In 2008, Mr. Hameed went national, forming the National Black Contractors Association that has set up 17 chapters in five states.

Black Contractors Association, as a non-profit organization, is an affordable infill housing developer working with public agencies and private investors to develop and sustain small business contractor development, youth apprenticeship training opportunity, and affordable housing for inner-city youth, many of which reside in the Promise Zone.

Equal access to housing for all is a right protected by law. Fair Housing laws allow you to obtain the housing of your choice, free from illegal discrimination.

The City of

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YOU ARE PROTECTED BY FEDERAL, STATE AND CITY LAW.

FEDERAL LAW prohibits discrimination based on:

- Race
- Color
- Religion
- National Origin
- Sex (Gender)
- Disability
- Familial Status (Households with one or more children under age 18)

STATE LAW

adds protections against discrimination based on:

- ncestry
- Citizenship, Immigration Status
- Primary Language
 Marital Status
- Sexual Orientation
- Age
- Medical Condition
- Genetic Information
- Gender Identity, Expression
- Military or Veteran Status
- Other Arbitrary Status

CITY LAW also prohibits discrimination based on: Source of Income (including rental assistance) The City of San Diego's Municipal Code protects tenants from being denied housing solely because they receive rental assistance, such as Section 8 Housing Vouchers, paid directly to the renter, landlord or representative of either.

COMMON VIOLATIONS OF FAIR HOUSING LAW

- Refusal to rent, lease, or sell housing
- Sexual harassment involving unwanted sexual advances or requiring sexual favors for housing rights or privileges
- Discriminatory policies, practices, terms or conditions that result in unequal access to housing or housing-related services
- Refusal to permit reasonable modifications to a dwelling space or common use area, at the tenant's expense, when necessary to accommodate a disability
- Refusal to make reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices or services, when necessary to accommodate a disability
- Denial of homeowner's insurance or home loan

GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

The 1619 Project Education Impact Grants

The 1619 Project illuminates the legacy of slavery in the contemporary United States, and highlights the contributions of Black Americans to every aspect of American society. The 1619 Project Education Impact Grants, an initiative of the Pulitzer Center (an official education partner of The 1619 Project), provide support to educational professionals working with students and educators in K-12 learning environments for projects that utilize at least one resource from The 1619 Project to 1) improve the awareness and critical thinking of students and educators about the legacies of slavery in the contemporary United States and the contributions of Black Americans to every aspect of U.S. society, and 2) equip students and educators to take action and make change that advances racial justice. The grants are meant for projects that go beyond the individual classroom level to engage large groups of learners on the school, district, or community level. Grants of \$1,000 to \$3,000 will fund individual schools, programs, or collaborative projects engaging multiple schools/programs, while grants of \$3,000 to \$5,000 will fund district, multi-site, or multi-organizational projects. Application deadline: April 15, 2024



<u>After School Education and Safety (ASES)</u> <u>FY 2024-25</u>

These ASES programs are created through partnerships between schools and local community resources to provide literacy, academic enrichment and safe, constructive alternatives for students in kindergarten through ninth grade. Funding is designed to: (1) maintain existing before and after school program funding; and (2) provide eligibility to all elementary and middle schools that submit quality applications throughout California. **Application Deadline: April 16, 2024**

New York Foundation for the Arts: Anonymous Was A Woman Environmental Art Grants

The Anonymous Was A Woman Environmental Art Grants, administered by New York Foundation for the Arts and funded by Anonymous Was A Woman, will distribute a total of \$300,000 in funding to support environmental art projects led by women-identifying artists in the United States, including U.S. Territories. Support is provided for environmental art projects that inspire thought, action, and ethical engagement. Projects should not only point at problems, but aim to engage an environmental issue at some scale. Projects that explore interdependence, relationships, and systems through Indigenous and ancestral practices are encouraged. Selected projects must benefit the public in some way, and are required to have a free, open public engagement component by August 31, 2025. Support is available to artists from every background and at all stages in their creative careers, and artists of color, artists with disabilities, and LGBTQ+ artists are strongly encouraged to apply. Application deadline: April 16, 2024



NEA Challenge America

Challenge America offers support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to groups/communities with rich and dynamic artistic and cultural contributions to share that are underserved. The program is rooted in principles that include, but are not limited to, the recognition that some groups/ communities and some geographic areas with rich cultural identities have limited grant funding opportunities, and/or have been historically underserved by national arts funding. **Application Deadline: April 25, 2024**

In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most underresourced communities. Through the Promise Zone initiative, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Since 2016, the unemployment rate has decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate has fallen from 38.3% to now 22.1% (ACS, 2016, 2021). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 7 years since the designation, targeted efforts based organizations have supported some improvement in these areas, however, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue improving the lives of our Promise Zone residents.
