- **SDAccess4All** presented last month on a \$250,000 grant opportunity for a program completely in the Promise Zone. Based on the feedback submitted and organizations that reached out, they submitted a proposal that was selected to move on to the second round. **Maiten Mowreader** shared thanks and appreciation for partner support.
- **Live Well San Diego** is hosting a <u>Public Health Career Panel</u> on Thursday, May 16 from 3:30 pm 5 pm at the Southeastern Live Well Center.
- **City of San Diego-Office of Child and Youth Success** shared that there is a deadline of April 5 to look over the <u>draft of the Child and Youth Plan</u> and submit community input; they would like to present to City Council in May.
- **University of California San Diego** shared its Border Region Talent Pipeline <u>K-16</u> <u>Collaborative Undergraduate Student Work Experience Program</u>, which has summer internships of \$20-\$26 an hour in business, computer science, and engineering. Applications are open until April 12.
- **Digital Promise** talked about its organization's history, 4-5 year plan, and <u>career</u> <u>pathways</u>, working with superintendents around the county.

<u>Guest Presentation:</u> Cristina Aguirre, Chief Program Officer, <u>Barrio Logan College Institute</u> Full BLCI PowerPoint presentation <u>available as a PDF here.</u>

- Established in 1996 with 12 third graders as the Barrio Logan Elementary Institute (BLEI) following other institutes in East Los Angeles in 1992 and San Mateo in 1995.
- 460 students, 57 schools, 750 total students served, starts in 3rd grade, requires 30 hours of parent participation.
- Need in Barrio Logan based on graduation rates (38% of adults 25-plus have high school diploma, 3% of adults 25-plus have bachelor's degree), median income (\$25,000 for family of 4), and individual student attention (393-1 counselor-student ratio).
- Five programs/locations
 - Barrio Logan (1996): 3rd grade College, 96% Hispanic or Latino, 55% Female and 42% Male
 - Chula Vista (2013): 6th grade College, 17 schools, 88% Hispanic or Latino, 66%
 Female and 33% Male



- Upward Bound (2017): 9th grade College, 1 high school, 98% Hispanic or Latino, 73% Female and 25% Male
- El Cajon (2018): 3rd grade College, 26 schools, features soccer program, 49%
 Iran/Iraq/Afghanistan and 42% Hispanic or Latino, 48% Female and 52% Male
- San Digeo Promise Neighborhood (2019): 3rd grade College, 2 schools and community partners in area designation
- Five more program tracks have been introduced since, all based on the ABCs, Steps to Success: Academic support, Building skills, and College knowledge.
 - Elementary School Program (ESP), Middle School Program (MSP), High School Program (HSP), College Success Program (CSP), Parent Program
- BLCI impact: 100% of students have graduated high school with rigorous A-G college credentials, 100% enrolled in college, 96% returned for their sophomore year of college, 72% graduate college within 6 years, and students are 3x more likely to graduate college
- Call to Action Support the BLCI Endowment Fund Scholarships during the \$150,000 donation matching initiative from the San Diego Foundation's Robert and Molly Schulze.

Career Expo Debrief

- Event details: 150-200 job-seekers attended, 35-plus vendors, 112 bingo cards were completed and returned for raffle prizes, resume and interview room was a hot spot, over 60 professional headshots taken, 5 computers awarded to attendees.

April Sub-Group Tactical Plan Updates

- Subgroup 1: Ernesto, Andrew, Andrea, Liliana, Maya, Will, Daniel, Ronah, Zachary
 - o Reviewing survey questions and responses, including recommended questions from March WG meeting; How do we maintain good momentum built off of the expo? Make a better effort at teacher outreach and continued relationships between students/teachers/employers, build a coalition to help fill in the gaps; follow up with attendees in 6 weeks/6 months to assess long-term impact; Needed resources: Linkedin profile building (headshots, resumes), professional clothes available for headshots and interviews, cover letter support, further networking.
- Subgroup 2: Sylvia, Mauri, Johnny, Maiten, Tya, Bianca, Amber, Ian
 - There are organizations that bring resources and do work in the Promise Zone but technically aren't located in the Promise Zone. Not sure if invitation is reaching the organizations that are doing great work; Questioned the feasibility of judging success of group and career expo based on jobs physically located in the Promise Zone; Discussed resource guide/asset map, and whether City team would be responsible with updating a web page or if it's better to create a partner-based google document. Share with community partners for distribution. Make



sure it's advertised that the real-time updates may not be possible. *How do we get more people to know about the PZ to connect them with the resource guide?;* Check with San Diego Workforce Partnership on employee skills data. City just hired someone in HR to work with veterans and veterans' organizations (Jon Aasted).

• Subgroup 3: Sarah, Jasmine, Raquel, Kandathil, Bryan

San Diego Unified is not part of the K-16 but they are working on the application for fall 2024 (PZ schools) for \$8-16 mil grant opportunity, 5 career pathways. How do we figure out what is happening and bring PZ students to those events; After graduation, after school year is over, getting UC and CSU students from PZ and alum from PZ to tie in some of those pieces to connect former PZ students and graduates back to the PZ. Excited to see how CTE does their partnership, and making sure we're connected to that; Raquel Aparicio: Article Amber mentioned re: Logan Memorial, a convo between this WG and leadership at LMEC to clarify the needs that are currently present. Would be helpful to figure out who all is involved, what does that look like, and what we are tracking. How do we create resources, connect them, and help them meet those guidelines? What is BLCI doing that is working that we can do at Logan Memorial?; Kandathil Jacob: Help Students who fell behind because of digital divide during covid, get broadband to all members, acknowledge earning loss due to covid, turn to Al for tutoring (Convigo in Newark, NJ?). Research shows tutoring on personal bases allows kids to get caught up using A.I; Get a pilot project going to combat that? Target school population: start at low grades, elementary and go up to middle.
