Welcome

Welcome to San Diego!

Our City is known for its great weather and iconic scenery. We are lucky that nature offers our residents and visitors nearly year-round opportunities to enjoy the outdoors.

The City owns and maintains more than 42,000 acres of park assets across 54 communities. Nineteen percent of the City is dedicated park space, including 60 recreation centers, 15 pools, three municipal golf courses, four visitor and nature centers, 10 skate parks and 17 off-leash dog areas.

Our abundance of public parks means that about 81% of San Diegans are within a 10-minute walk of a park, which is higher than the national average of 75%.

But not everyone enjoys the same ease of access to our public, outdoor spaces. We are actively working to change that.

We are doing a better job than many cities and municipalities across the country when it comes to parks, but our work is not done until every San Diegan, especially those in our historically underserved communities, can easily walk to a park.

I am committed to helping ensure that all San Diegans have access to high-quality parks.

To get us closer to that goal, my new citywide Parks Master Plan replaced a previous park planning document crafted more than 65 years ago. The updated plan is part of my "Parks for All of Us" initiative, which is designed to make the City's park system more modern, equitable and accessible for all San Diegans. The plan addresses past inequities and creates a new system for all that prioritizes the greatest needs and allows us to plan holistically for the future.

We are also using public parks to expand access to technology by offering free Wi-Fi in two dozen park and recreation facilities across San Diego.

The City of San Diego is proud of our mission to offer great recreational spaces and healthy lifestyle opportunities for everyone. We know that access to green space results in big boosts in both physical and mental health. Parks also serve as important social gathering places that strengthen connections between people and help build community.

On behalf of the City of San Diego and the thousands of hard-working Parks and Recreation employees – everyone from the planners to the maintenance workers who make the parks as beautiful as they are – welcome to learning more about San Diego's plan to expand park access to everyone!

Overview

The City of San Diego's Parks and Recreation Department serves as proud stewards of this diverse, world famous park system beloved by millions of residents and visitors each year.

But there's so much more.

In addition to the operation and maintenance of over 42,000 acres of park assets, which includes over 27,000 acres of open space, the department offers culturally vibrant and historic parks including Balboa Park (the Crown Jewel of San Diego), Mission Bay Park (largest aquatic park on the west coast), Mission Trails Regional Park including Kumeyaay Campground; three golf complexes including world-renowned Torrey Pines, skate parks and bicycle pump track; aquatic facilities; shared use facilities with local school districts; and numerous dog off-leash areas.

The department provides inclusive, innovative recreational programming that extends from volleyball and soccer leagues to summer Teen Nights, Parks After Dark, and community activities. From the award-winning Civic Dance Arts program to the AgeWell program with accessibility-driven services for older adults to the Therapeutic Recreation Services program for those with physical and mental disabilities, the department continually strives to achieve its mission: to provide healthy, sustainable, and enriching environments for all.

In short, the San Diego Parks and Recreation Department literally has something for everyone. Come and see what we have to offer. You may be surprised what you discover!

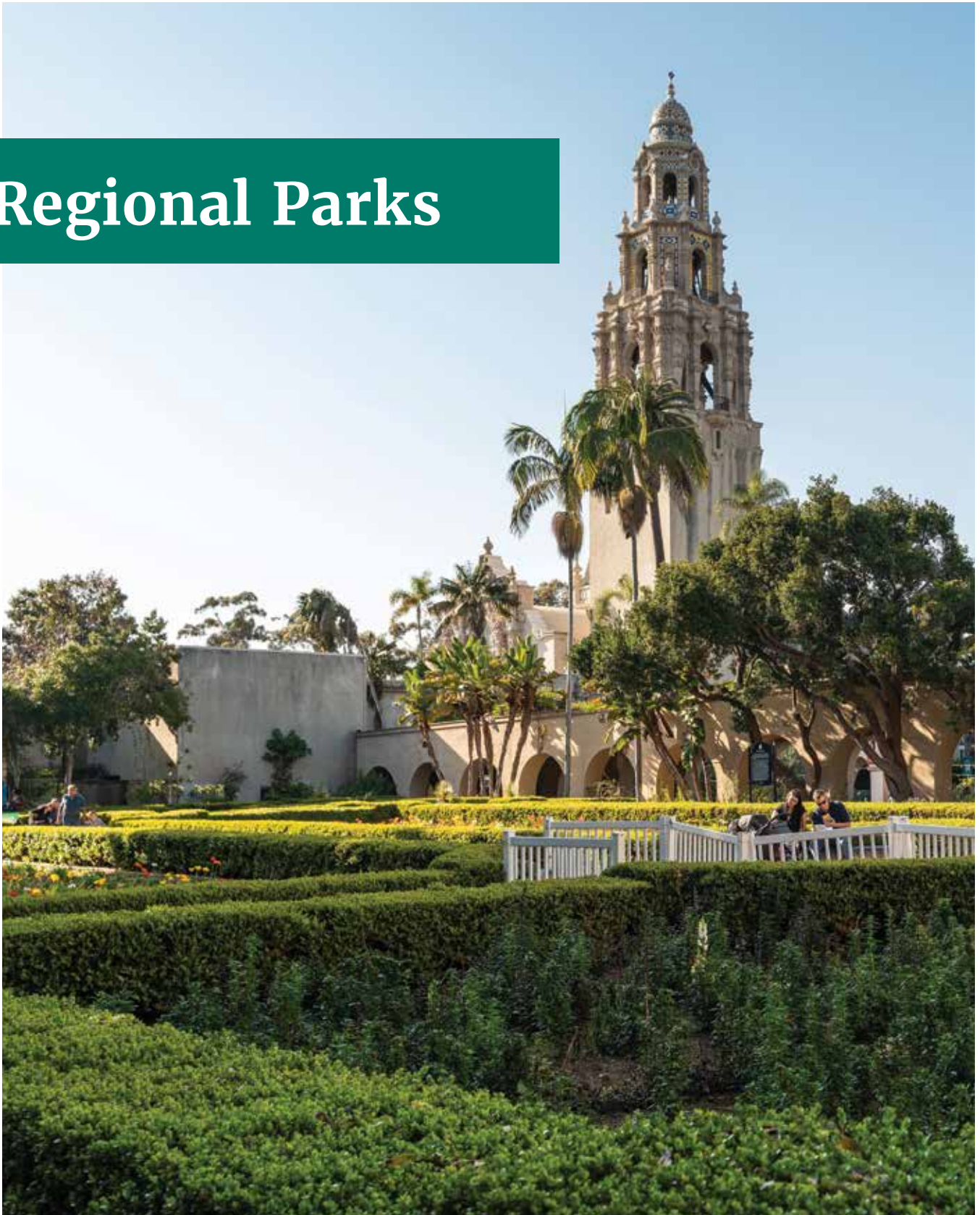

Regional Parks



Balboa Park

Balboa Park is a **1,200-acre urban cultural oasis** encompassing 16 museums, the San Diego Zoo, 16 ornamental and interpretive gardens, a botanical building, plazas, fountains, open space areas, green belts, and over 45 miles of walking paths.

Initially established as 'City Park' in 1868, the park was developed and renamed for the Spanish explorer Vasco Nunez de Balboa. The park's signature buildings and structures were built as part of the 1915 Panama California Exposition and the 1935 California Pacific International Exposition.

Today, the park serves as a vibrant cultural center offering art, music, science, history and a wealth of other unique opportunities for the public to discover, explore, and enjoy.

In addition to its cultural significance, Balboa Park serves as an essential recreation hub for the public featuring sports fields, golf courses, archery ranges, a velodrome, and running and biking trails.

Its signature event, December Nights, is the nation's premier multicultural family holiday festival attracting more than 350,000 visitors to the park over the course of two days. Since 1980, the event has played host to a variety of holiday entertainment, delicious food from around the world, unique shopping and festive holiday lighting displays. The event is free, and museums offer complimentary admission.

The park, including its historic Exposition buildings and landscapes encompassing over 15,000 trees, was designated as a **National Historic Landmark in 1977**. Many trees date back to the work of Kate Sessions, who helped fashion the horticultural splendor of the park.





Mission Bay Park

Mission Bay Park is one of the largest waterparks in the nation, offering 4,600 acres of land and water, surrounded by **27 miles of bike paths and sandy beaches**.

Mission Bay's calm waters provide a perfect venue for water sports enthusiasts of every kind, from kayaking and stand-up paddle boarding to jet skis and kite boarding. Families can play in grassy areas while still having the opportunity to frolic on the sand.

Fiesta Island features 150 acres of off-leash park for dogs to run and play on the sand and in the water (**voted "Best Dog Park in America" by 10Best.com in 2016**).

Shoreline Park

Along 13.6 miles of City coastline, Shoreline Parks extend from Torrey Pines City Park and Glider Port south to the picturesque coastal bluffs in Sunset Cliffs Natural Park. Locals and visitors explore the city's coastline along miles of oceanfront boardwalk or adventure into the water for championship swimming and surfing destinations.

Established in 1971, the **533-acre Ecological Reserve** and the La Jolla Underwater Canyon off the La Jolla coast provides endless educational opportunities north to the Marine Life Refuge and the Scripps Pier at Scripps Institution of Oceanography and academic research area. The canyon reaches depths of 600 feet within the Underwater Park. The Reserve provides shelter for numerous species of oceanic flora and fauna, including spotted leopard sharks, sea lions, dolphins, and migrating whales.





Presidio Park

Located on the site of San Diego's original Spanish presidio and mission dubbed "the birthplace of California" or "the Plymouth Rock of the West Coast," Presidio Park offers over **50 acres of beauty and history** nestled on a hill overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Bay, Mission Valley, Old Town San Diego, and the Pacific Ocean.

Built in 1929, the instantly recognizable Spanish-revival styled Serra Museum, conceived of by George Marston, educates visitors detailing the park's pre-European history and San Diego's historical origins.

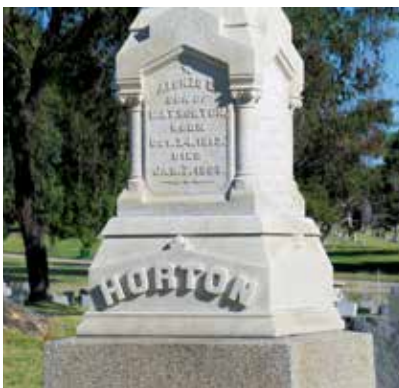
The park is also a horticultural cornucopia, flourishing with native and non-native species. Visitors can explore more than two miles of trails and learn about the history of the area by exploring the Old Presidio Historical Trail.



Chicano Park

Established in 1970 after the community of Barrio Logan came together to demand a park, Chicano Park serves as a cultural touchstone and is home to the largest collections of outdoor murals in the United States.

Located adjacent to Interstate 5 and the San Diego-Coronado Bridge, the nearly nine-acre park hosts the annual Chicano Park Day each April attracting thousands of visitors with cultural displays, dance, music, food, and presentations. **Chicano Park Day** is a symbol of community organization to preserve Chicano culture, and the neighborhood. The park was recently designated a **National Historical Landmark** by the National Park Service.



Mount Hope Cemetery

Mount Hope is the **only cemetery owned and operated** by the City. Since 1869, the cemetery has provided internment options at reasonable costs. Prominent San Diegans including Alonzo Horton and Kate Sessions are buried at this 110-acre site. Burials continue at the site, with plots purchased daily.



Open Space Facilities

The Open Space Division manages 27,000 acres of conserved land with more than 200 miles of hiking trails in multiple habitat zones ranging from the San Pasqual Valley in the north to the Otay River Valley near the City's southern border. These areas are home to hundreds of rare plant and animal species that depend on the preserved areas to thrive. 85 species native to San Diego are also protected by the Multiple Species Conservation Program, including 75 that are listed as rare, threatened, or endangered under federal or state endangered species acts.



Mission Trails Regional Park

Mission Trails Regional Park offers **7,220 acres of developed and recreational areas** with rugged hills, challenging mountains, valley and open areas as well as 60 miles of trails, and boating and camping opportunities at Lake Murray and Kumeyaay Lake. Its visitor center, located on Father Junipero Serra Trail, provides an overview of the geography, geology, and ecology of this preserved area. Old Mission Dam shows history dating back to mission times. Recent efforts to expand the park include ongoing property acquisitions in East Elliott located just north of the State Route 52 freeway.

Black Mountain Open Space

Located in Rancho Peñasquitos, Black Mountain Open Space features more than **2,300 acres of chaparral** and sage covered hills, ridges, and canyons. The centerpiece of the park is the **1,554-foot climb to the summit of Black Mountain** affording 360-degree views of the surrounding area. The Jas Arnold Trail for All People provides an accessible walk around a section of the preserve.



Chollas Lake and Chollas Creek Watershed Regional Park

Chollas Creek connects numerous neighborhoods and communities including Chollas Valley and Encanto, City Heights, Mid-City Eastern Area, and Southeastern San Diego. A key focal area is Chollas Lake, a 341-acre park located in the Oak Park neighborhood that offers numerous hiking trails, youth fishing, and a variety of outdoor activities. Planned hiking trails and other amenities are planned to connect various parks along Chollas Creek. A master planning effort for this recently created regional park is currently underway.





Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve

Located north of Mira Mesa and south of Del Mar Mesa and Torrey Highlands this **4,000-acre open space** in the Peñasquitos and Lopez canyons, Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve is jointly owned by the City and County of San Diego. The preserve is rich in biodiversity with over **500 plant species, 175 types of birds,** waterfalls, **sycamore trees, giant California oak trees,** the historic Santa Maria de Los Peñasquitos Adobe, and the El Cuervo Adobe ruins.



Otay Valley Regional Park

Otay Valley Regional Park is comprised of **2,029 acres,** has trails and staging areas and is a joint effort of the City of San Diego, City of Chula Vista, and County of San Diego. The park offers visitors a variety of scenic trails in a natural river valley. A ranger station offering park information is located at 2155 Beyer Boulevard. Plans call for additional land acquisition and improved amenities to help expand the park and connect people to its natural features.



Urban Canyonlands

The Open Space Canyons Program oversees management of over **3,000 acres of canyon areas Citywide.** Many of these preserved canyons are located in urbanized communities such as City Heights, Greater Golden Hill, and Southeastern San Diego. The program takes the lead in coordinating the multiple Friends of Canyon volunteer groups.



Tri-Canyon Parks: Marian Bear Park, Rose Canyon & Tecolote Canyon

Located in the heart of San Diego, these **open space canyons** wind through the communities of Clairemont, La Jolla, Linda Vista, Mission Valley, Pacific Beach, and University. A nature center, located at 5180 Tecolote Road, offers displays of local flora and fauna and show historic preservation efforts to keep the canyon areas undeveloped. San Diegans can enjoy numerous hiking opportunities through the canyon areas.



San Diego River Park

The park includes **376 acres along the San Diego River** in the Mission Valley area. The San Diego River Garden features easy trails through a large native plant garden. The park contains three miles of paved walking and biking trails and is **wheelchair accessible**. Regular park ranger-led interpretive walks and volunteer events are conducted throughout the San Diego River Park and tributary canyons. In 2024, the San Diego State University Mission Valley section of river park opened, and additional sections of new park along the river are planned.





Community & Neighborhood Parks

The City is home to hundreds of community and neighborhood parks and active spaces providing residents with a variety of inviting, fun, and safe spaces for adults and children alike. Community-serving parks include numerous recreation centers; senior centers; community, neighborhood, and mini parks; skate parks; dog off-leash areas; and joint-use areas with school districts. Community and neighborhood parks are managed by two divisions: Community Parks I (northern areas) and Community Parks II (southern areas).

Golf



Golf is synonymous with San Diego and the City operates three unique facilities that cater to golfers of all ages and abilities. From practicing your short game to playing a world famous professional U.S. Open course, the City's Golf Division offers something for everyone interested in this historic sport.

Mission Bay Golf Course and Practice Center



Mission Bay Golf Course and Practice Center is an **18-hole executive course** designed by former president of the American Society of Golf Course Architects, Ted Robinson. Beloved by locals, and the location where Tiger Woods won his Junior World title, Mission Bay Golf Course holds the distinction of being the only course with stadium lighting giving golfers the opportunity to play at night!

The practice center provides golfers looking to hone their game outstanding facilities featuring one of the few remaining grass driving ranges as well as a state of the art putting and chipping area for golfers looking to practice their short game.

The course also features an 18-hole foot golf course giving fans of soccer and golf an easy to learn and fun recreational opportunity.

Balboa Park Golf Course

Framed by the undulating topography of oak lined canyons and boasting one of the best views of the downtown San Diego skyline, Balboa Park Golf Course is one of the hidden gems within the boundaries of historic Balboa Park. Inaugurated in 1919 and designated as **the oldest golf course in San Diego County**, Balboa Park Golf Course features a rolling, scenic 18-hole professional course as well as a nine-hole executive course. Hall of Fame golf legend, Sam Snead holds the current course record, shooting a remarkable 60 in 1943.



Torrey Pines Golf Complex

Perched atop the seaside bluffs of the Pacific Ocean, Torrey Pines Golf Complex is **one of the most famous municipal golf courses in the world**. Home to the annual Farmers Insurance Open PGA event and host of the 2008 and 2021 U.S. Open Golf Championship, the famed Torrey Pines South Course is a “bucket list” course for golfers from around the globe.

A complete renovation of Torrey Pines North Course was completed in November 2016. The new layout provides an updated, challenging course while remaining respectful of the original design making the North an excellent and worthy complement to the famous South.



Programs

The City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department offers a comprehensive and wide variety of challenging athletic programming for people of all ages to help foster both physical and social skills. In addition, the City offers a number of unique, nationally recognized programming for people who are the economically disadvantaged, older adults, and disabled. This ensures the department is serving all of its residents responsibly.



Aquatics

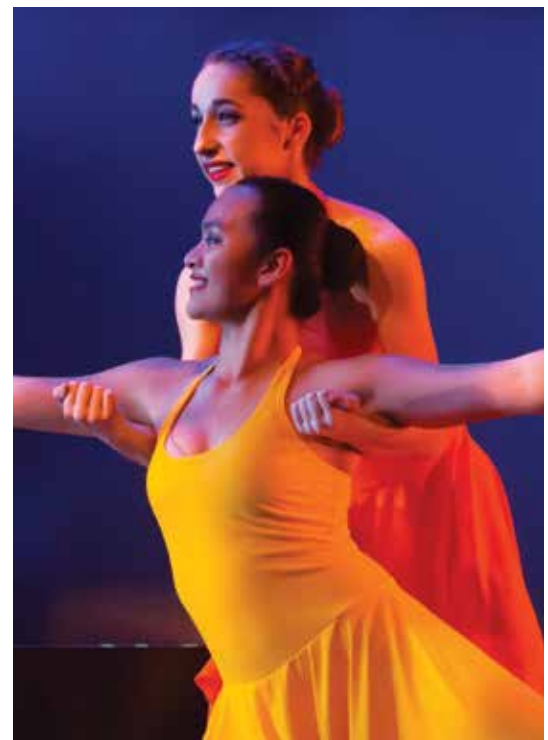
The City's Aquatics Program features **15 permanent pools offering a variety of youth and adult swimming** programming from lessons and team sports to exercise classes and adaptive lessons for individuals with disabilities. During most summer months, Aquatics facilitates a Portable Pool Program to bring recreational swimming instruction to communities with no permanent pool. The program provides quality lessons to over 1,000 participants annually at a reasonable or no cost. To help introduce the City as a viable employer, Aquatics also provides on the job certification and training and free swimming lessons to children at pools in low income areas.

Civic Dance Arts

Founded in 1942, San Diego Civic Dance Arts has introduced hundreds of thousands of citizens to the art form of dance and has been lauded as the standard for which other city-wide dance programs nationwide are measured.

San Diego Civic Dance Arts **provides affordable dance training** at numerous recreation centers throughout the City as well as in several dance facilities in Balboa Park. With several thousand students enrolled, the program provides students, ages three to senior citizen, the chance to participate in a wide variety of classes including tap, jazz, ballet, modern, musical theater, creative movement, hip hop, Hawaiian and more. The reputation of the quality of the program consistently attracts the highest caliber instructional and student talent while providing instruction at the least cost in the community via a low-income fee waiver program that ensures that anyone who wishes to dance has the opportunity.





Summer Lunch Program

The Department partners with local school districts to offer free lunch and snacks annually. Generous grants support nutrition instruction and guided physical activity for kids. Since its inception in 2003, the program has **served more than a million meals to children** of all socio-economic backgrounds.



Therapeutic Recreation Services

Therapeutic Recreation Services (TRS) provides community outings, sports, recreation and outreach services to over **50,000 people annually**. Services include therapeutic recreation programs, special events and adaptive sports opportunities, designed to meet the special needs of individuals with disabilities who have difficulty accessing and participating in recreation opportunities offered to the general public. Many TRS services are centrally housed at the recently renovated Park de la Cruz Community Center in City Heights. Park de la Cruz Community Center offers an accessible garden and state of the art sensory room.

TRS oversees unique programming designed to provide access to areas for those with mobility disabilities including the popular Beach Wheelchair Program which allows the public to enjoy the sand and surf through “independently operated” beach chairs at Mission Beach free of charge. TRS provides inclusion support to include individuals with disabilities into programs at their neighborhood recreation centers.



AgeWell Services

AgeWell Services Program provides recreation, leisure and outreach services to over **30,000 older adults (55+)** annually. Activities include dances, out of town trips, and special events (Talent Show, Photography Contest, Craft Sale Art Contest, and Volunteer Recognition celebrations). The Department offers cafes, lunch programs, educational classes, and an array of different recreational activities at multiple sites around the City of San Diego.

Come Play Outside

The **Come Play Outside** program focuses on expanded programming over the summer at 21 recreation centers and aquatic centers in San Diego's most underserved communities. It focuses on providing a variety of equitable programs and events connecting youth with the outdoors, promoting mental and physical health and wellness, and culturally relevant programs and activities.

This program is conducted in partnership with the San Diego Parks Foundation. Come Play Outside programs include:

- **Swim and lifeguard classes**
- **Recreational classes**
- **Adventure camps**
- **Teen Nite**
- **Movies in the park**
- **Fern Street Circus**
- **Parks After Dark** – community events held at select locations in the summer evenings that include music, food, kid-friendly activities, and recreation programs also in partnership with San Diego Parks Foundation and Price Philanthropies
