COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT



In the months since the January 22nd storm caused significant flooding in Southeast San Diego and displaced over 1,000 residents in neighborhoods including Encanto, Shelltown, and Southcrest, **Anna Arancibia** has opened the doors of the **Jackie Robinson YMCA** for flood victims. In the process, the Y has become a hub for community leaders, advocates, and non-profits like **Armon Harvey** to deliver direct support.

"It was a nice, welcoming, safe space for residents to come in and talk about what their needs are," said **Brian Pollard**, **Urban Collaborative CDC** Director, and Housing Affordability Working Group co-chair. "In the first couple of weeks, it was just us."

Arancibia, who has worked at the Jackie Robinson YMCA for 20 years, said what began in the first two weeks as simply offering showers turned into weekly community meetings on Mondays at 5:30 PM to coordinate a complete group effort to bridge the needs gap with boots on the ground.

Carmina Paz and Urban Collaborative Project undertook door-to-door assessments and data collection, the Harvey Family Foundation comprehensively fed residents and has conducted "muck-outs" to clean flooded homes, the San Diego Foundation quickly lodged 400 people whose homes were damaged or destroyed at a hotel for two weeks and raised over \$1 million in the first month for emergency response. Additionally, Megan Thomas with Catalyst, Aaron Swanton with Together San Diego, Pillars of the Community and many, many more CBOs and community advocates have done essential work in the last four months.

Southeast Disaster Response Team (SDRT) at Jackie Robinson YMCA



As of Monday, May 23, the County of San Diego's Emergency Temporary Lodging (ETL) program was housing 1,686 people from 530 homes in hotels. The program is set to end on June 21. Many residents are concerned about not having a home when they leave the hotel, according to Arancibia.

Harvey, who is also a football coach at Lincoln High School, is helping to alleviate those concerns with fundraising efforts to clean out and repair 116 identified homes and return them to adequate and safe living conditions.

What they need now, Arancibia said, is community members who can volunteer for the ongoing organized clean-ups and door-to-door needs assessments, local contractors and specialists who can support with re-building homes of their neighbors, disaster and sustainability grants to support in the flood response, and future disaster preparedness efforts.

Economic Activity & Housing Affordability

On May 7, the Promise Zone's Economic Activity and Housing Affordability working groups hosted a Cooperative Convening at Cafe X in preparation for the California Cooperative Conference that took place at Liberty Station Conference Center on May 31 - June 1. The event established a baseline knowledge of what cooperatives are and explored existing community ownership models of co-ops in and around San Diego. Community land trusts, food co-ops, worker co-ops, housing co-ops, and funding mechanisms for co-ops were all discussed. Thank you to Urban Collaborative Project and Cal Coast Credit Union for sponsoring that event. Over 60 small business owners, community advocates, and cooperative specialists attended, and we are in the process of planning a follow-up meeting to continue to explore co-op partnership opportunities. Census and Censibility

Coming to the Promise Zone in June!



From the hearts and minds of **Asian Story Theater** comes a long-awaited performance. "**Census and Censibility**" is a series of captivating stories centered around the decennial census. The idea for this production was born out of the experience of **KL (Kent) Brisby**, who noted the lack of excitement and appreciation for this vital undertaking of our democratic nation. The production seeks to present the *census as an essential tool of empowerment, necessary for creating equal representation and unity in a diverse country.* It emphasizes the cultural stories and talents of the **United AAPI Artists**, an organization started during the pandemic to bring AAPI voices together in the face of increased discrimination.

The development of the production took unique steps to highlight talents that are typically overlooked; these included holding open auditions for all of San Diego and accepting script submissions from BIPOC artists across the country, offering a cash prize for those selected.

This production is the first in a series of shows held in collaboration with **Teatro Máscara Mágica** and **San Diego Black Ensemble**, seeking to feature stories about the census and the community. *Details on future shows with these organizations are coming soon!*

This program would not be possible without the support of the **Conrad Prebys Foundation**, who reached out to Kent with the intention of funding the performances. Asian Story Theater was also a recipient of the **City of San Diego's Commission for Arts and Culture Impact Grant.**

Asian Story Theater will be performing Census and Censibility *three times in June*, two showings of which are in the Promise Zone. The first showing times and locations are as follows:

The EEM Program is an annual program established by legislation in 1989 and amended on September 26, 2013. It offers grants to local, state, and federal governmental agencies, and nonprofit organizations for projects to mitigate the environmental impacts caused by new or modified public transportation facilities. There are three types of EEM project: Urban Forestry, Resource Lands, and Mitigation Beyond the Scope of the Lead Agency. Application Deadline: June 25, 2024

Pearl Milling Company: P.E.A.R.L. Pledge

P.E.A.R.L. Pledge is Pearl Milling Company's community funding initiative focused on championing the empowerment and success of Black women and girls across the U.S. A total of \$1 million will be provided to nonprofit organizations doing work or offering programming that serves Black women and girls in alignment with the following P.E.A.R.L. Pledge pillars: prosperity, with a focus on alleviating systemic barriers and inequities in areas such as food, housing, employment, financial support, and generational wealth; empowerment, including inspiring and encouraging Black women and girls to attain holistic wellness and success in areas such as confidence building, self-esteem, and mental and physical health; access, with a focus on enhancing equal opportunity to education and entrepreneurship in areas such as scholarships, grants, capital, and financial literacy; representation, with a focus on elevating Black women and girls in areas such as culinary arts, food innovation, science, and media; and leadership, including advancing skill development and access to resources for emerging talent in areas such as public speaking, strategic thinking, teambuilding, and mentorship. Applicants must be 501(c)(3) public charities based in the United States and align with one or more P.E.A.R.L. Pledge pillars.

Robin Hood AI Poverty Challenge

The Robin Hood AI Poverty Challenge seeks to identify breakthrough solutions using artificial intelligence to fight poverty and expand upward mobility in the United States. The aim is to showcase a range of new and existing solutions that leverage the power and capabilities of AI technology for good. Solutions, which can include, but are not limited to, products, services, technical infrastructure, and training and capacity building, must focus on one of the following categories: education, financial empowerment, and workforce. Up to nine finalists will receive \$100,000 each and then have up to a three-month acceleration period to further refine and strengthen their solution. After the acceleration period, up to three solutions will receive a \$1 million award. Nonprofit and for-profit entities located within the United States and U.S. territories are eligible to apply as lead applicants. Application deadline (for registrations): June 26, 2024

The Refugee Family Child Care Microenterprise Development Project (RFCCMED) seeks to provide refugee participants with training and technical assistance in professional childcare, microenterprise development, and financial literacy; assist refugee participants in navigating the childcare licensing process; and provide direct financial assistance as needed to enable participants to prepare their homes for childcare business operation. The three main objectives of RFCCMED are to help refugees achieve economic self-sufficiency by establishing licensed family childcare businesses, help refugee families gain access to licensed family childcare businesses which will meet the early care and developmental needs of refugee children, and assist refugees in learning how to navigate mainstream childcare services. **Application deadline:** June 28, 2024

<u>Equitable Building Decarbonization Program</u> Direct Install

The recipients will implement the program in their awarded region to install energy-efficient electric appliances and measures and related upgrades directly to low-income households living in single-family, multi-family, and manufactured homes in under resourced communities. Applications are required to (1) include community-based organizations (CBOs) for culturally appropriate outreach, education, and support for participating households and communities, and (2) include expertise in decarbonization of single-family homes, multifamily buildings, and manufactured housing.

Tobacco Grant Program FY 2024-25

The purpose of this grant offered through the Office of the Attorney General, California Department of Justice Tobacco Grant Program is to promote a healthier California by reducing illegal sales and marketing of cigarettes and tobacco products, incl. e-cigs, to minors and youth. **Application Deadline:** June 28, 2024



The Equity, Engagement, and Education (EEE) Grant Account Cycle 2 will award grants up to \$200,000 for the purposes of building CBO, Tribal, and community capacity to understand and engage with CPUC decision-making processes. This will enable CBOs and Tribes to have more influence over clean energy programs and support making these programs more accessible to their served communities. **Application Deadline:** June 30, 2024

Morgan Stanley Alliance for Children's Mental Health Innovation Awards

The Morgan Stanley Alliance for Children's Mental Health Innovation Awards provide seed funding for transformative mental healthcare solutions for children and youth across the U.S. The Awards seek new or piloted projects from directservice organizations that will help address the far-reaching challenges of stress, anxiety, depression, or other mental health issues in children and young adults in the U.S. Projects must tackle specific issues and address unmet needs, with a goal of reducing stigma, increasing access to care, improving equity in mental health, enabling early identification and prevention, or enhancing intervention, especially among disadvantaged and vulnerable populations. U.S.-based 501(c) (3) public charities are eligible, with a focus on those with an annual total revenue under \$5 million. Five winners will receive grants to scale their innovative work as well as leadership training and other opportunities, while a broader group of applicants will be invited to join a leadership learning series.

Local Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)

The Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), codified as Section 148 of Title 23, United States Code (23 U.S.C §148), is a core federal-aid program to States for the purpose of achieving a significant reduction in fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. The Division of Local Assistance (DLA) manages California's local agency share of HSIP funds. California's Local HSIP focuses on infrastructure projects with nationally recognized crash reduction factors (CRFs). Local HSIP projects must be identified on the basis of crash experience, crash potential, crash rate, or other datasupported means. **Application Deadline:** Sept. 9, 2024

In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Between 2016 and 2021, the unemployment rate decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate fell from 38.3% to 22.1% (ACS, 2016-21). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 8 years since the designation, targeted efforts from the city and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; However, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
