Mid-City was particularly affected by the construction of freeways, most notably I-805 and SR-15. Prior to the 1980's, the urban form of City Heights was continuous between 40th and Central Avenue. Nine blocks of land were cleared in the 1980's by Caltrans to build the I-15 segment through City Heights.

- City Heights Initiatives the Price Philanthropies Foundation has directly invested or leveraged over \$212 million to support community revitalization such as City Heights Urban Village
- \$265 million+ in bike and transit infrastructures:
  - Mid-City Centerline Rapid Transit (\$65 mil) & Bikeway Investment (\$200 mil)
- \$614+ million invested in Mid-City to modernize school facilities
- \$1+ billion in capital improvement projects (current/recent):
  - streets, water, sewer, stormwater, parks, and other facilities

more trees, no trash, more safe | i'd like to see community renovations - they've been fixing the streets and replacing stop signs, which I find really useful | less homeless, less trash, better looking trees, and cheaper rent | i would like my community to look more open with nature | a little more green, more trees, better and cleaner roads, public workout gyms **for people** | in the future i hope it doesn't change because i like the way it looks like right now | more houses, more playgrounds, places for kids to hang out, and a place to explore the history of City Heights | i would like more places to hang out | quicker buses | peaceful and clean, with more greenery (no more palm trees though) and maybe a community garden and less light pollution | to have more stores near me | fields to play sports like soccer | i want other outsiders to look at what we have built here in midcity and inspire better for their community | peaceful, clean, filled with youth | plants, trees, and grass in the places that don't have much of them | clean sidewalks and roads that are good | more trees, many hangout spots like parks and stores, good transportation, less **pollution** | more trash-cans and more police protection | i would like my community to be more safe at night, have better sidewalks, and more public transportation.

I'm writing this to say thank you for actually caring about us and our community. Your presentation was very mind opening, and I appreciate how understanding you were. It was fun learning about the mid-city area, and it was nice knowing I have a say on what goes on around here. I didn't even know what a community plan was until you and your colleagues told us. You gave me information in a way I could actually fully understand, which for me is rare. I found it crazy how they haven't updated the plan in 25 years but i'm glad i get to be a part of it.

I really hope the plan takes our voices seriously, like my ideas for more community gardens and greenery in general. You've inspired me to take more action in my community, in fact you compelled me to do community service last week and clean the canyon on Thorn street. You have been an amazing person to work with, and I hope I get the chance to work with you again soon.
