COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

David Favela & Carmen Velasco-Favela

Border X Brewing and Mujeres Brew House

When married brewmasters and entrepreneurs David Favela and Carmen Velasco-Favela opened Border X Brewing in 2013, the Barrio Logan community flocked to their space, and they quickly expanded to meet the local thirst for Mexicanstyle craft beer.

The largest contingent, Carmen said, were after her own heart: Latinx women who yearned for a space in the burgeoning San Diego craft brewing industry that was (and is) majority populated by white males.

"What should we do to celebrate the women?" Carmen asked. The answer: Open a brewery for women, by women. But Carmen's vision didn't start and stop with a brewery; it extended to become a place where women can gather.

At the height of the pandemic, in July 2020, Mujeres Brew House opened on the corner of Julian and Dewey. Craft beers are one component, and a community space where women are welcome and celebrated is another. Today, hundreds of women come to Mujeres Brew House to attend women-centered events in addition to drinking good beer.

A fearless advocate for community and small businesses, "Community is needed more than ever in 2024," Carmen stated.

Much like its parent brewery, Border X, Mujeres has become a community hub and has drawn national interest, including a Best Small Business award in the "the sixth-coolest neighborhood in the world" in 2022 (*Time Out Magazine*).

Summer Food Nutrition Program for Kids

Summer-EBT (S-EBT) is now called SUN Bucks. Starting

June 2024 families will get **\$120 per eligible** child to buy groceries.

A child is automatically eligible if they are between 6 and 18 years of age and participate in CalFresh, Medi-Cal, or CalWORKS.

Complete the school meal application or Alternate Income Form from your school. If you're not sure if you've completed this form, please ask your school.

Ensure that your mailing address is current with your child's school and with the county.

Children experiencing homelessness, living in foster care, or of a migrant family are automatically eligible for SUN Bucks.

SUN Bucks will **NOT** impact **immigration status**. For more information scan QR code.

My Creative Journey | Mi Viaje Creativo



The San Diego Made Factory (SDMade) is thrilled to present its project, *"My Creative Journey/Mi Viaje Creativo."* This collaborative program is designed to showcase the creativity, innovation, and community within the **San Diego Promise Zone** neighborhoods. By facilitating a rotating, immersive residency experience curated by the **SDMade Programming Committee**, this project aims to highlight the exceptional talent, innovation, and entrepreneurship existing within these communities.

Through this initiative, the San Diego Made Factory provides artists with valuable exposure and support, fostering a vibrant and dynamic arts and culture environment in the Promise Zone. The project will be open to the public and presented in multiple formats, aiming to inspire budding talents and inform them about the processes that shape the creative journeys of resident artists. By engaging with these facilities in their neighborhoods, community members will experience firsthand how these hubs serve as centers for creativity and innovation.

The San Diego Made Factory is offering *free workshops, speaker series, public art displays, and exciting events* that are centered around a quarterly residency for *four local artists*. An advisory committee of local community leaders helped identify and select the artists. To qualify, each artist must have had experience working in Promise Zone communities, demonstrated a model of success that can be shared with and impact the public, and incorporated traditional art practices and cultural insights into their work or history. This project highlights local expertise and sparks collaboration about community opportunities and challenges.

Through this program, emerging artists will be able to *find inspiration and mentorship*, while the resident artists will enjoy *free workspace and a living stipend*.

Enhancing Agricultural Opportunities for Military Veterans (AgVets)

The Enhancing Agricultural Opportunities for Military Veterans Program provides grants to non-profits to increase the number of military veterans gaining knowledge and skills through comprehensive, hands-on and immersive model farm and ranch programs offered regionally that lead to successful careers in the food and agricultural sector. The program encourages the development of training opportunities specifically designed for military veterans. AgVets projects will offer onsite, hands-on training and classroom education leading to a comprehensive understanding of successful farm and ranch operations and management practices. Projects may also offer workforce readiness and employment prospects for service-disabled veterans. Ensuring there are pathways for military veterans interested in pursuing careers in agriculture — regardless of age or production choice — strengthens agricultural production and rural economies across the United States. NIFA requests applications for the AgVets to provide grants to nonprofit organizations for training programs and services to establish and enhance farming and ranching opportunities for military veterans. Grant amount: \$100,000 - \$250,000 Application deadline: Thursday, July 11, 2024



Women's Business Center (WBC), Initial Phase Grants

The purpose of this Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is to provide grant funding for non-profit organizations to establish Women Business Centers (WBCs) that will provide entrepreneurial development services to women, with an emphasis on socially and economically disadvantaged entrepreneurs in locations that are outside of the geographical areas of existing WBCs within the United States and its territories.

Grant amount: \$75,000 - \$150,000 **Application deadline: J**uly 15, 2024



Biologically Integrated Farming Systems (BIFS) Grant Program

The BIFS program supports the demonstration, refinement, and outreach of SPM-based farming systems that are economically viable and protective of human health and the environment. All aspects of the farming system may be considered as they relate to pest management, including factors such as adjacent landscapes, whether they are farmed or not. For the current solicitation, California Department of Farming and Agriculture (CDFA) is prioritizing projects focusing on the following topic: Dacthal (dimethyl tetrachloroterephthalate, DCPA) alternatives in Brassica and onion crops, Neonicotinoid alternatives in tomato, Lygus management in cotton, and Fumigant alternatives. Projects will typically include all the following elements: 1. On-farm demonstration/evaluation of an innovative, biologically based farming system that employs SPM strategies; 2. A collaborative outreach effort for sharing technical information about the farming system with growers, PCAs, commodity groups, and others engaged in pest management, and; 3. An organized program for monitoring key biological and economic variables to inform on-farm decision making and evaluate project success. Grant Amount: One awardee, \$1 million

2024 Natural Community Conservation Planning

Local Assistance Grant Program

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife seeks proposals for highest priority projects associated with the implementation of a Natural Community Conservation Plan, or NCCP. Proposals must address the highest priority tasks associated with the implementation of an NCCP such as: Management Activities: Immediate management actions on newly acquired NCCP reserve lands; Restoration/ Enhancement: Restoration or enhancement of habitats or species populations on NCCP reserve lands; Monitoring: Design and implementation of biological monitoring programs identified in an NCCP, including the establishment of sampling methods, monitoring plots, data collection, management, and analysis; Reserve Management Plans: Development and implementation of individual reserve management plans; Mapping: New or updated mapping in support of NCCP management or monitoring activities, such as vegetation community mapping; Targeted Studies for Adaptive Management: Studies to evaluate management actions for covered habitats or species, and whether such actions are meeting stated goals or require adjustments through adaptive management; Other: Other non-land acquisition priority tasks, identified by the applicant and implementing partners, which are needed to ensure effective implementation of the NCCP. Grant Amount: Dependent on # of qualified applicants, \$576,000 total will be distributed Application deadline: July 23, 2024

Local Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)

The Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), codified as Section 148 of Title 23, United States Code (23 U.S.C §148), is a core federal-aid program to States for the purpose of achieving a significant reduction in fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. The Division of Local Assistance (DLA) manages California's local agency share of HSIP funds. California's Local HSIP focuses on infrastructure projects with nationally recognized crash reduction factors (CRFs). Local HSIP projects must be identified on the basis of crash experience, crash potential, crash rate, or other datasupported means. **Application Deadline:** Sept. 9, 2024

Thomas C Ackerman Foundation 2024 Q3 Grant

This foundation believes that investment in youth is fundamental to future cultural and economic prosperity. Innovative K-12 STEAM education programs are the principal springboard for youth to reach their full potential, particularly in under-served communities. In evaluating these applications, they focus on several important areas: programs with clear connections between mission, vision, and how the objectives of the organization are met, i.e., a targeted demographic, measurable results and outcomes, a strategic plan detailing goals over the next 3-to-5 years, collaboration with similar goalminded groups, and sustainability.

The specific guidelines regarding eligibility are as follows: ONE: The organization supports or operates a formal classroom K -12 program, of which the primary purpose, curriculum, or object emphasizes the teaching of mathematics or the sciences and/or the application or development of skills related to art, performing arts, and/or music.

TWO: The organization has been established and operated within San Diego County for more than 12 months and has not been funded by the Thomas C. Ackerman Foundation within the last 24 months.

YouthBuild Employment, Labor, and Training Program

Under this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA), DOL will award grants through a competitive process to organizations providing pre-apprenticeship services that support education, occupational skills training, and employment services to opportunity youth, ages 16 to 24, who are performing meaningful work and service to their communities. The YouthBuild program model prepares participants for quality jobs in a variety of careers, in diverse industry sectors, particularly in infrastructure sectors, and includes wrap-around services such as mentoring, traumainformed care, personal counseling, transportation supports, and employment preparation - all key strategies for addressing violence in communities. YouthBuild applicants must include construction skills training and may include occupational skills training in other in-demand industries. This expansion into additional in-demand industries is the Construction Plus component. Eligible applicants for these grants are public or private non-profit agencies or organizations, including consortia of such agencies or organizations. These organizations include rural, urban, or Native American/Tribal entities that have previously served opportunity youth in a YouthBuild or other similar program. DOL will fund approximately 75 projects across the country. Individual grants will range from \$700,000 to \$1.5 million and require a 25 percent match from applicants, using sources other than federal funding, with a matching waiver for Tribal entities and U.S. insular areas which allows these entities to not include a match commitment in their applications. The grant period of performance for this FOA is 40 months, including a 4-month planning and a 12-month follow-up period. ABOUT THE PROMISE ZONE

75

In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Main St.

Through the Promise Zone initiative, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2021, the unemployment rate decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate fell from 38.3% to 22.1% (ACS, 2016-21). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 8 years since the designation, targeted efforts from the city and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; However, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
