

The History

Before it was a federal holiday, Labor Day was recognized by labor activists and states. After municipal ordinances in 1885 and 1886, a movement for state legislation began. New York introduced the first bill, but Oregon passed the first law on February 21, 1887. That year, Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York also created a Labor Day holiday. By 1894, 23 more states had adopted the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, Congress made the first Monday in September a legal holiday.

Hispanic Heritage Month

September 15 - October 15

The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402.

The day of September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September 18, respectively. Also, Columbus Day or Día de la Raza, which is October 12, falls within this 30 day period.






Featured Destination



WHY IT'S IMPORTANT?

For those who can read and write, highly skilled, and high-paying careers are within reach. For those who cannot, the options are extremely limited. Even unskilled minimum-wage jobs can be difficult to obtain.

20% of Americans read below the level needed to earn a living wage and 50% of the unemployed between the ages of 16 and 21 cannot read well enough to be considered functionally literate.

California has the lowest percentage of adults with proficient literacy skills with only 43%.

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT READING

Cognitive Development

Reading plays a crucial role in cognitive development, and <u>problem-solving skills</u>.

Not engaging with books may result in cognitive stagnation and an increased risk of cognitive decline later in life.

Language Deficiency

Lack of exposure to written language through reading can lead to deficiencies in vocabulary, and language comprehension. This may impede communication skills, academić performance, and professional advancement.

ALL ABOUT APPRENTICESHIPS: IS AN APPRENTICESHIP RIGHT FOR YOU?

What is an apprenticeship? According to Indeed, it is a "paid on-the-job workplace program relevant to a particular industry". Some careers include skilled trades like construction or carpentry, information technology, energy, banking and finance, healthcare, hospitality, sales and marketing, and more. You can learn about the differences between apprenticeships and internships here..



Benefits

- Apprentices become prepared for the needs of a specific industry because the apprenticeship program is guided by that need.
- You're getting paid as you learn! An apprenticeship is a pathway to a career that doesn't require a 4 year degree. Instead of paying for your education, you're getting paid for your education.
- You get hands-on work experience to practice the skills you need; you're not just learning in a classroom.
- Upon completion you get a professional credential like a certification or license that employers across the US will accept, showing that your skills are transferable.

- Are you concerned about the cost of higher education? An apprenticeship might be a more cost effective option.
- Do you have a specific industry in mind that you want to pursue, or are you undecided? An apprenticeship is a 3-5 year or longer commitment, so you should have a good idea of what industry you're interested in.
- Do you excel in a classroom setting, or are you a more hands-on learner?
 An apprenticeship is usually a good option if you like hands-on work.



RESOURCE DATABASE FOR YOUTH: A COMPILATION OF RESOURCES

General databases/search engines:



211 San Diego is a source for information and connections to community resources. They have a database of over 6,000 services and resources. **You can dial 211 for assistance** or search their database. Help is available everyday all day in more than 200 languages. 211 is not specific to youth, but you can find many youth-specific providers by searching "youth" in the search engine.

Just in Time (JIT) CONNECT is a database that allows you to filter by category of the services you are in need of. You can choose food, housing, finance, education, career, wellness, community, or life skills. Although the database is provided by JIT for Foster Youth, the services are not just for foster youth and can be utilized by anyone in need of them.



Organizations/Non-profits offering a variety of services:



San Diego Youth Services offers many different services including support for foster care, adoption, mental health, and LGBTQ+ youth; homeless housing and support; workforce development; domestic violence prevention; juvenile delinquency diversion and intervention; and more!

For those in need of childcare, the YMCA lets you search for childcare providers in San Diego. You can either look through their online referral database or use their enhanced referral system where a childcare consultant helps you find a provider for free. The YMCA also offers youth and family services including behavioral and mental health services, transitional housing and more.



Environmental Justice Advocacy South San Diego



What is environmental justice?

The federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) defines environmental justice as the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations and policies.



Learn more about the Environmental Justice Element, the City's plans toward a more equitable future, policies that inform City decision-making, proposed activities that build on existing programs to advance environmental justice, and a description of areas of the City most impacted and negatively affected by environmental burdens and associated health risks collectively known as Environmental Justice Communities (EJ Communities).

The History

San Diego, California, features a mix of residential, commercial, and industrial sites. Since the 1900s, diverse populations, including Chicanx, Mexican, Asian, and Black communities, settled in areas like Barrio Logan. Following World War II, rapid population growth and military investment led to significant development. The construction of Interstate 5 split the neighborhood into Logan Heights and Barrio Logan, while the San Diego-Coronado Bridge further displaced residents, increasing traffic and pollution. The rapid development resulted in poorly planned communities where residential areas and industrial zones are intertwined, leading to a dangerous mix of homes, schools, and hazardous facilities. Despite Barrio Logan's industries producing large amounts of hazardous waste, residents only recently became aware of the associated health risks. This predominantly minority community continues to live in one of San Diego's most polluted areas.


