Healthy Communities

Housing Affordability

During the October 31 Housing Affordability working group meeting, the group heard a presentation from Karen Clay, founder of I Love to Glean and co-chair of the Healthy Communities working group, about the effort to supply those displaced by the January floods with healthy foods. Community Spotlight: Renato Paiva

Renato Paiva's journey into youth development began while coaching squash at Harvard University, where he realized that many talented young people lacked access to opportunities. Inspired by his belief that "a life is only worth living if it is a life of service," Renato committed himself to empowering underrepresented youth.

In 2006, Renato founded Access Youth Academy (AYA) in San Diego, initially operating in a small, rented space in Mira Mesa. Seeing the transformative potential of squash for underserved youth, he set out to expand the program. By 2020, after a decade of hard work and a \$12 million fundraising effort, AYA opened a 22,000-squarefoot Squash & Educational Facility in Southeastern San Diego, an area with high need. Today, this state-of-the-art facility serves 21 schools and offers students mentorship, leadership development, and health and wellness resources.





Through the City of San Diego's competitive Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) process, AYA was awarded Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for fiscal years 2020, 2023, 2024, and 2025. These grants not only covered essential construction costs but also supported AYA's ongoing public service programs, allowing the organization to plan sustainably, broaden its impact, and cultivate a meaningful partnership with the City.

The CDBG funding has allowed AYA to expand its reach, serve more students, and establish a strong foundation for long-term success. When asked what advice he would give to other nonprofit leaders seeking funding for similar youth development programs, Renato's message is clear: focus on the service first. "Make sure the outcomes are clear and the message is clear," he advises. "Good governance, strong organization, and clarity in mission are crucial before applying for funding."

He emphasizes that nonprofit work is about more than just financial currency; it's also about service currency. Access Youth Academy is driven by the belief that helping lowincome students succeed in both education and sports can transform their lives. Whether people want to offer financial support or simply raise awareness, Renato encourages everyone to get involved in the mission of AYA, proving that meaningful contributions don't always have to be financial.

Together, we can make a lasting impact on the next generation.

NONPROFIT FUNDING OPPORTUNITY

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GRANT

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Entitlement Grant that the City receives to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for **lowand moderate-income persons**. The City of San Diego Economic Development Department administers these funds to support projects and programs that **serve City of San Diego communities**. Interested nonprofit organizations can apply for this funding via the CDBG Annual NOFA process.

The NOFA consists of two phases: the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) phase and the Request for Proposals (RFP) phase.

Individuals may add their name and contact information to the CDBG email distribution list to receive up-to-date information about the Annual NOFA and other related programs.

GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

Community Enhancement Program

The Community Enhancement Program funds grants for cultural activities, museums, visitor and convention bureaus, economic development councils, and other similar institutions at the regional and community levels throughout San Diego County. Only nonprofit or government/public agencies operating in San Diego County may apply. Non-profit entities must use County funding for:

- Tourism or economic development
- Services which attract tourists
- Services which create jobs and/or promote a better quality of life

Grant awards are made throughout the fiscal year and there is no deadline for submitting an application. Award Amount: Dependent on Project

Deadline: Rolling

<u>Neighborhood Reinvestment Program</u>

The Neighborhood Reinvestment Program provides grant funds to County departments, public agencies, and to non-profit organizations for one-time community, social, environmental, education, cultural or recreational needs. Only non-profit or government/public agencies operating in San Diego County may apply. Non-County government entities may apply to fund projects that benefit the community and enhance the region's quality of life. A higher priority shall be given to requests for capital projects and/or one-time expenses. Non-profit entities must provide services in or more of the following areas:

- Educational/recreational projects for children and/or adults
- Local business and tourism promotional activities
- Arts and cultural programs
- Environmental awareness programs or projects, including maintaining and increasing open space holdings
- Public safety programs including fire protection
- Health and social service initiatives and programs. Grant awards are made throughout the fiscal year and there is no deadline for submitting an application. Award Amount: Dependent on Project Deadline: Rolling





<u>Community Food Projects Competitive Grant</u> <u>Program</u>

The purpose of the Community Food Projects Competitive Grants Program is to bring together stakeholders from distinct parts of the food system and to foster understanding of national food security trends and how they might improve local food systems. Projects should address food and nutrition security, particularly among the nation's historically underrepresented communities. Two types of grants are available: Community Food Projects and Planning Projects. Community Food Projects grants seek solutions over the longer term rather than focusing on short-term food relief. **Award Amount:** \$25,000 - \$400,000 **Deadline:** November 7, 2024

Prebys Sparx Challenge

The Prebys Foundation, in collaboration with Carrot, proudly announces the launch of Prebys Sparx, a groundbreaking challenge aimed at improving youth mental health and well-being across San Diego County. The Prebys Sparx challenge seeks to stimulate innovative solutions that leverage the power of arts, culture, and nature to address mental health challenges among San Diego County's youth. Nonprofit organizations based in or collaborating with local San Diego nonprofits are invited to participate.

Award Amount: 1,000,000 to Winner and \$25,000 to 4 Honorable Mentions

Deadline: November 7, 2024 to register; December 4, 2024 to submit

Ending California's Tobacco Epidemic in Every Community

Funding up to 43 local projects with three or more years of demonstrated agency experience and capabilities in tobacco prevention. The purpose of this RFA is to accelerate momentum toward ending California's tobacco epidemic through policy, system, and environmental change strategies by increasing community engagement within populations that have been disproportionately targeted by the tobacco industry. **Award Amount:** Dependent Upon Amount Requested **Deadline:** November 8, 2024

Lorrie Otto Seeds for Education Grant

The SFE program provides meaningful learning opportunities that connect youth to nature and the Wild Ones mission. For more than 25 years, this vital Wild Ones donor-funded program has provided grants ranging from \$100 to \$500 for native plant gardens and landscaping projects throughout the United States. The funds are designated for acquiring native plants and seeds for outdoor learning areas that engage youth (preschool to high school) directly in planning, planting and caring for native plant gardens. **Award Amount:** \$100 to \$500 **Deadline**: November 15, 2024



FY24 WaterSMART Water and Energy Efficient Grant

This Water and Energy Efficiency Grants Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) provides funding for projects that result in quantifiable water savings, implement renewable energy components, and support broader sustainability benefits. federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the Promise Zone initiative, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2021, the unemployment rate decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate fell from 38.3% to 22.1% (ACS, 2016-21). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 8 years since the designation, targeted efforts from the city and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; However, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
