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Summary of Online Survey, Pop-Ups & Other Activities

OVERVIEW

The City asked two questions via online and in-person activities about how people described their community today and in their ideal future vision. There were several ways to provide this feedback to ensure the broadest community participation and representation:

- Online Survey
- Pop-Ups
- Youth Engagement Surveys Hoover and Crawford High School Students
- Interactive Workshop Activities In-person and virtual

The primary focus of this activity was to make it simple, short, and meaningful by offering a brief online survey (3 questions that took less than 2 minutes to complete) and setting up fun and engaging pop-up stations at community events and locations where people of all ages gather. Over 3,000 comments were generated from 1,275 community members.

DETAILS AND PARTICIPATION

A total of 1,275 people participated in this activity. There were 641 participants via online survey, 474 participants via pop-up events, 66 student participants from Hoover High School, 57 participants from Crawford High School, and 37 participants from in-person and virtual workshops. Spanish and Vietnamese speakers were available at several pop-ups to facilitate participation.

What We've Heard So Far:

5. Building Affordable Homes for All

People - People envision an abundance of affordable homes for a broad range of people, lower rental prices, more homeownership opportunities, and more homeless shelters and supportive services to create a stable and inclusive community.

6. Accessible, Diverse, Equitable & Inclusive Community - People envision community improvements to enhance accessibility, foster inclusivity, and celebrate and preserve cultural diversity.

7. Beautiful, Charming, Dynamic & Innovative Neighborhoods – People envision a neighborhood that is beautiful, authentic, and artistic, alongside a focus on innovation and advanced technology to be more sustainable and resilient.









8. Community-Oriented, Friendly, and

The emphasis is on maintaining historic elements, preventing displacement, and ensuring stability while avoiding excessive construction and large-scale developments.

10. Peaceful, Quiet, & Serene – People envision maintaining and enhancing a peaceful and serene environment with minimal noise and disturbances to foster a calm, relaxing atmosphere that provides a comfortable and calming place to live.

11. Crowded, Destroyed, & Declining -People envision a community facing overcrowding, congestion, decline and economic hardship due to neglect, lack o

Summary of Public Workshops

OVERVIEW

The City held two public workshops as part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update to allow community members to come together to share ideas and provide input on vision, priorities, and other topics. One workshop was held in-person on Saturday, May 18, 2024 and was followed by one virtual workshop held on May 22, 2024.

WORKSHOP DETAILS AND ATTENDANCE

A total of 74 people participated in the workshops.

In-Person Workshop

WORKSHOP THEMES

The following workshop themes represent key ideas and prevalent public comments that were provided during the in-person and public workshops. A summary of workshop input is also provided in a separate section, as well as records of individual comments that were provided that have been compiled in appendices.

- Provide more opportunities for homes for a variety of incomes and household types.
- Need for safe streets and mobility options for all.
- Maintain and enhance existing parks and create a new network of open spaces and trails.
- Expand tree canopy, improving landscaping, and adding other types of shade.
- Create new and improved social hearts and commercial hubs that provide new opportunities for community.







WORKSHOP FORMAT AND ACTIVITIES

The in-person public workshop for the Mid-City Communities Plan Update was organized as an open house meeting that occurred throughout the day, with facilitated breakout discussion groups scheduled at two different times during the open house. The virtual workshop adapted the format of the in-person workshop to an online setting, and included a presentation with interactive polls and breakout discussion groups using Zoom.

Open House Format for In-Person Workshop

An open house meeting is an informal meeting with multiple presentation boards and engagement activities. Participants were given an opportunity to rotate through different "stations", to view materials, and discuss specific topics with project staff one-on-one and in small groups. After registering, people that attended could choose which of the stations were of interest to them throughout the open house and engage in different activities. The in-person public workshop was organized around six stations, including:

- 1. **Welcome & Registration**: Included sign-in, welcome, and orientation to the workshop. Attendees were given a fact sheet and a comment card.
- 2. **About the Mid-City Communities Plan Update**: Display boards with background information on the Mid-City Communities Plan, including the plan area and a preview of Mid-City Atlas: Existing Conditions report. People provided feedback on these boards using sticky notes and other notes provided directly on the board.
- 3. What We've Heard So Far: Display boards sharing the results from the online survey, and an overview of youth engagement conducted as part of the update. People provided feedback on these boards using sticky notes.
- 4. **Our Mid-City**: Opportunity to provide feedback about Mid-City through a mapbased engagement activity. People provided feedback on these boards using sticky notes and using colored dots, where: red was used to show where people lived; blue was used to show where people work; green to show where people's favorite place or places that are special to them; and yellow for places that people hung out with friends.
- 5. **My Community**: Four open house stations for each of the Community Plan Areas (City Heights, Eastern Areas, Kensington-Talmadge, and Normal Heights) that allow people to provide feedback on priorities, opportunities, and challenges. The primary prompt was "What would make your community better?" Secondary prompts related to land use and development, mobility, and sustainability were also





included. People provided feedback on these boards using sticky notes for detailed comments and sticky dots to indicate support for different ideas.

6. **Provide Input and Next Steps**: Included a place to turn in comment cards, to receive a sticker, enter a raffle, and provided information about the project schedule and ways to get involved.

Public input provided on the open house boards as part of the stations are included in *Appendix A – Comments on Open House Boards*. In addition, *Appendix B – Comment Cards Received* includes a record of all the comment cards that were submitted during the inperson public workshop.

Presentation and Interactive Survey for Virtual Workshop

For the virtual workshop, the open house portion of the workshop adapted the materials used for the in-person workshop into a presentation to share content from the display boards. In addition, interactive Slido polls were used during the virtual workshop to allow interaction with virtual participants to mirror the engagement activities of the in-person workshop. All of the responses that were provided during the interactive survey as part of the virtual workshop are included in *Appendix C – Slido Poll Results*. In addition, other comments were provided through the Zoom chat, and are included in Appendix D – Zoom Chat from Virtual Workshop.

Discussion Groups for Virtual and In-Person Workshops

The in-person and virtual workshops both included small group discussions that were facilitated by staff. During the in-person workshop four discussion groups were held and six were held as part of the virtual workshop. Each group was asked a series of questions and people were given a chance to discuss, with notetakers recording key ideas on large notepads for all to see. *Appendix E – Discussion Group Notes from In-Person Public Workshop* and *Appendix F – Discussion Group Notes from Virtual Public Workshop* include a record of all notes from the discussion groups. Each discussion group was asked the following questions related to the Mid-City Communities Plan Update:

- A. Land Use and Development: What type of new housing would you like to see in the future?
- B. **Mobility**: Where is the most challenging place to get to and why?
- C. **Parks, Public Facilities, and Open Space**: How can we make the best use of the parks and open spaces in Mid-City?
- D. **Urban Design**: Are there areas that you would like to see improved with new development, facade improvements, or infill? If so, where?





E. **Sustainability and Climate Resilience**: What would make Mid-City more resilient? What actions can be included in the Community Plan to improve sustainability efforts?

Refreshments and Snacks

Light refreshments and snacks were served throughout the day as part of the in-person workshops.

Interpretation

Interpreters were available for Spanish and Vietnamese speakers to work with people, oneon-one or as a small group, for both in-person and virtual workshops. Interpreters were there to provide bidirectional interpretation so that non-English speakers could understand what is being discussed and could provide feedback in their native language.

SUMMARY OF WORKSHOP INPUT

During the in-person and virtual workshops, people provided comments and shared feedback related to the Mid-City Communities Plan Update. The responses received by the community were organized into the following categories:

- Sustainability, Equity & Climate Resilience
- Land Use and Development
- Mobility
- Parks, Public Facilities and Open Spaces

The list below includes an overall summary of comments and input provided by the public during different activities as part of the in-person and virtual workshop.

Sustainability, Equity & Climate Resilience

- Blue and green infrastructure strategies:
 - Addressing flooding issues along Chollas Creek is critical.
 - Stormwater treatment, bioswales, greenery in sidewalks, roundabouts, trees and less concrete.
 - Harvest rainwater and consider climate change impacts.
 - Use permeable concrete to prevent runoff.
 - Stormwater capture and green infrastructure (trees, bioswales) are essential.
- Clean energy and transportation:
 - Install public electric vehicle (EV) charging stations to support EV owners who rent.
 - Consider EV charging stations and E-W connections.





- A microgrid would allow the community to rely on its own local energy sources, promoting energy independence and resilience.
- Urban canopy equity study:
 - Conduct shade equity study assessing the distribution of shade in different neighborhoods.

Land Use and Development:

- Density and development strategies:
 - There was overall support for higher density and 5+ stories along the main corridors if there is thoughtful architectural design, sensibility to context, and mobility considerations.
 - Maintain the character and scale of neighborhoods, with sensitivity towards incremental heights and setbacks in upper stories.
 - Explore public-private partnerships for mixed-use development and affordable housing.
 - Maintain small corner stores in neighborhoods to increase walkability.
 - More multi-family housing is needed in neighborhoods that haven't been zoned for it.
 - Re-evaluate ADU requirements.
 - Redevelop underutilized properties. Reuse/redevelop vacant parking lots, abandoned commercial, malls, and big box retail.
 - Development that creates more jobs for residents.
- Housing types:
 - Encourage mixed-use developments with ground-floor retail, especially in cultural hubs and along main streets like El Cajon Boulevard and Adams Street.
 - Support affordable, multi-family housing without displacing residents.
 - Encourage housing opportunities for younger generations and a mix of incomes.
 - Explore municipally built and owned housing.
 - Building housing near public transportation hubs promotes sustainable living.
- Public Realm:
 - Promote community gathering places, placemaking opportunities, program cultural activities and cater to the unique needs of each neighborhood expression.





- Create pedestrian only plazas (like Little Italy) and gathering spaces with accessible services and local commercial businesses.
- \circ $\,$ Consider regular banner rotations for a fresh look in Mid-City.

Mobility

- Connectivity:
 - There is a gap in connectivity for the Mid-City area. Improving transit connectivity inside and outside of Mid-City could enhance accessibility and reduce reliance on other modes of transportation.
 - Consider bridges to connect communities further between big roads and challenging nature (like Teralta Park).
 - North/South linear parks can connect different areas and canyons.
- Transit and bus infrastructure
 - Improve bus stops in Mid-City. Add better shading, seating, planting, and lighting for a safe, welcoming and comfortable transit stop experience for all.
 - Add more transit lines, transit stops, and frequency throughout Mid-City
 - Connect better to adjacent places like Mission Valley.
 - Consider neighborhood hubs (Normal Heights and City Heights) and shuttle routes to enhance community identity and connectivity.
 - Explore ride share apps and services to be promoted and accessible in Mid-City.
 - Provide transit options for late-night workers.
- Bike infrastructure:
 - Prioritize protected bike lanes.
 - Strengthen bike connections within the community.
 - \circ $\;$ Address bike safety concerns and dangerous intersections.
- Pedestrian concerns:
 - Enhance connections between bikes and pedestrians to trolley stations.
 - Add and maintain good quality sidewalks. Wide, shaded, safe, and maintained.
 - Implement effective and welcoming wayfinding and signage.
 - Address lack of pedestrian crossings, lack of sidewalk, red lights for cars,
- Parking:
 - Address parking issues affecting visibility at intersections, enforce red zone parking regulations, and address encampments in parking areas.
 - Solve residential parking shortages.
 - Address garage conversions that impact available parking in residential areas.





- Consider neighborhood lots for parking, parking permits, and metered parking options.
- Reduce street parking and explore underground parking solutions along corridors to improve pedestrian flow.
- Suggest requiring two stories of parking for buildings over five stories.

Parks, Public Facilities, and Open Spaces:

- New and Existing Parks
 - More parks! Connected network of small/medium parks.
 - Invest in maintenance of existing parks, cleaner bathrooms, better lighting, seating, and safety.
 - Complete existing open space projects.
 - Expanding parks south of Interstate 8.
 - Kensington-Talmadge needs more parks.
 - More recreation areas like badminton courts.
 - Joint-use agreements with schools need reinforcement to ensure effective utilization of open spaces.
 - Activate Chollas Creek and make it safe for kids and the community.
 - General updating and improvement of Colina del Sol Park, which has been neglected.
 - Create a variety of parks that can host the diverse population of Mid-City.
 - Create a range of parks that are special for young people, dog owners, children, adults, and everyone that lives in Mid-City and has different interests.
 - Create more parks, playgrounds, baseball fields, and basketball courts.
 - Prioritize recreational centers for youth.
 - Focus on open spaces and parks in disadvantaged areas.
 - Funding should support the park staff and maintenance to be able to keep parks in good and safe condition.
- New Public Facilities
 - A new library or community anchor (e.g., a pool) could be beneficial.
 - Relocate fire station project that is intended to be in a canyon.
- Canyons
 - Preserve green spaces like canyons and implement trails and pathways.
 - Create urban trails connecting North and South Canyons with signage, sculptures, and cultural meaning.
- Urban greening:





- Trees along main corridors can enhance aesthetics, improve air quality, and provide shade.
- Enhance greenery by adding trees and landscaping to reduce heat.

Mid-City Communities Plan Update Summary of Office Hours, Community Interviews & Emails

OVERVIEW

Office Hours

The City held six public in-person office hours as part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update to allow community members to come together to share ideas and provide input on vision, priorities, and other topics. It was held at the Adams Recreation Center, City Heights Library, and the College Rolando Library.

Community Interviews

City staff sent invitations to forty-two community-based organizations (CBOs) and heard back from eleven CBOs. The City held eleven community interviews as part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update to allow community organizations to share their mission and community priorities and to inform them with an overview of the plan update.

Emails

The City invited the public to submit comments and suggestions via email as part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update to ensure additional community input.

ENGAGEMENT FORMAT

Office Hours

The in-person office hours for the Mid-City Communities Plan Update were organized as an open house meeting that occurred for two hours at different times in February and March 2024.



City Planning Department



Online Registration: Participants were notified about the office hour via an email blast and encouraged to register for 20-minute one-on-one sessions with project staff to learn about the Community Plan Update, discuss specific topics and share their questions.

Format: Feedback provided by participants was tracked and logged. They were also given index cards, previous Mid-City plans, and a fact sheet to refer to.

Community Interviews

The community interviews for the Mid-City Communities Plan Update were organized as virtual 30-minute sessions that could be scheduled for four dates in April and May 2024.

Online Registration: Participants were notified about the opportunity to engage in conversation via an email by the project manager and were encouraged to register for 30-minute sessions with project staff to learn about the Community Plan Update and share about their organization's mission and community priorities.

Format: Feedback provided by organization members were tracked during the interviews and later logged into a comment tracking document.

<u>Emails</u>

Community members were invited to provide comments, suggestions, and questions on the Mid-City Communities Plan Update during community events and city presentations, and through email blast.

ENGAGEMENT THEMES

Overall Summary

Key ideas and prevalent public comments:

- Focus on equitable community outreach & distribution of resources
- Fair distribution of new homes across Mid-City
- Provision of more diverse housing options, greater density & ownership opportunities
- Identify strategies for future development that minimizes displacement
- Preservation of community character, diversity, and history
- Revitalization of declining business areas & expansion of Business Improvement District(s) to better support small businesses
- Support the local food economy, small farmers, & food businesses




- New investments in transit, such as continuous dedicated bus only lanes on El Cajon Blvd, and biking & pedestrian facilities
- Identification of more traffic calming measures & roundabouts to support safer streets for all ages & abilities
- Expansion of urban trails that connect Mid-City
- Provision of new fire safety requirements & emergency access
- Environmental concern about the location of the proposed fire station on Fairmount Avenue

Office Hours

The City hosted six community office hours in February and March 2024 to provide an opportunity for community members to share ideas and provide input on vision, priorities, and other topics. The following themes represent the high-level summary of key ideas and the prevalent comments that were provided.

1. HISTORY & PLACE

• Balance historic preservation with new housing development, ensuring that historic neighborhoods retain their character while contributing to housing needs.

2. SUSTAINABILITY, EQUITY & CLIMATE RESILIENCE

- An inclusive and collaborative approach to planning, ensuring equitable attention and resources across all neighborhoods, particularly those feeling neglected.
- Ensure that new developments balance environmental preservation and protect green spaces, trees, and wildlife habitats with sustainable infrastructure and climate resilience.
- Equitable community outreach, inclusive planning processes, and support for local businesses.
- Improvements in pedestrian access, sustainable development practices, and urban green space management while addressing historical inequalities and promoting youth engagement.

3. LAND USE & DEVELOPMENT

• Balance increased housing development while preserving community character, diversity, and historic neighborhoods.





- Update land use and zoning to increase density while minimizing displacement and gentrification.
- Provide diverse housing options, including affordable housing and infrastructure improvements.
- Prioritize equitable development, promote homeownership, and maintain neighborhood culture, with careful management of short-term rentals and corporate landlords holding vacant properties.

4. URBAN DESIGN

- Enhance well-being and safety through physical improvements like fixing sidewalks and adding streetlights, which contribute to a stronger and more connected environment.
- Infrastructure upgrades should be carefully planned, considering the area's topography, culture, and character, ensuring that development projects are sustainable and supportive of the community's needs.
- Addressing stormwater management, improving public safety, and ensuring that new housing developments are supported by proper infrastructure.

5. MOBILITY

- Improve mobility options and make streets safer for all users.
- More investment in bikeways, transit, and traffic calming measures.
- More roundabouts, better bus services, and careful consideration of development along narrow streets
- Concern over poorly implemented speed limits, the potential bottleneck created by expanded transit networks, and parking difficulties, especially in areas like City Heights and El Cajon Boulevard.

6. PARKS, PUBLIC FACILITIES & OPEN SPACE

- Better services, infrastructure, and more green spaces to address both current and future demands.
- Concerns about the lack of parks and amenities, poor infrastructure maintenance, and safety issues.
- Residents are frustrated with slow progress on development projects and inconsistent planning efforts.





• More park development, expanded cultural services, improved green spaces, and infrastructure upgrades to support higher residential density.

Community Interviews

The City held eleven community interviews to allow community organizations to share about their organization's mission and community priorities and concerns. The following themes represent their key ideas and the prevalent comments that were provided.

1. HISTORY & PLACE

- Some community members are worried about the impact of increased density on older neighborhoods' character, existing and planned infrastructure, and privacy.
- There is a desire for historic preservation, with some community members advocating for protecting certain areas and buildings.

2. SUSTAINABILITY, EQUITY & CLIMATE RESILIENCE

- Various communities expressed a sense of being overlooked by city planning efforts and frustration over unfulfilled promises and a lack of impactful change.
- Develop the local food economy, support small farmers and food businesses, and facilitating access to land for food production and streamlining the process.

3. LAND USE & DEVELOPMENT

- Support for greater density and more diverse housing options, with emphasis on density being equally shared amongst all Mid-City Communities.
- Homelessness is a recurring issue, with concerns on the increased visibility, impact on community safety, and need for more supportive services and resources.
- Some community members feel that affordable housing needs are not addressed adequately and that new developments may contribute to gentrification and displacement.
- Several comments focus on the need for a more supportive business environment, including the establishment or expansion of Business Improvement Districts (BIDs), revitalizing declining areas, and addressing the displacement and uncertainty faced by small businesses.





 A significant concern is the lack of adequate parking, especially in new developments. Many community members are frustrated that new housing lacks sufficient parking, forcing people to search extensively for spaces or park far from their homes. The lack of parking is seen as a deterrent for both current residents and potential new residents.

4. MOBILITY

- Calls for safer streets for cyclists and pedestrians, advocating for a holistic approach to street design that accommodates all ages and abilities. Concerns about the safety of shared bus and bike lanes, with some advocating for dedicated cycling corridors or bike lanes on less busy side streets.
- Strong demand for improved transit connections, particularly to better connect areas like San Diego State University, Mid-City, and Uptown, via dedicated transit only lanes. Comments suggest re-envisioning transit to be more efficient and equitable, making it a viable alternative to car use.
- The community faces ongoing problems with infrastructure maintenance, including unpaved alleys, poor road conditions, outdated facilities, and inconsistent street lighting. There are also concerns about reduced urban canopy and inadequate responses to infrastructure needs.

5. PARKS, PUBLIC FACILITIES & OPEN SPACE

- Many areas lack adequate parks and recreational spaces. Existing parks are not always accessible or well-maintained, and there is a call for more green spaces, dog parks and community gardens.
- Significant need for diverse and culturally appropriate services, including health, youth programs, arts, and social services. Additionally, existing facilities like libraries, recreation centers, and schools are seen as inadequate for the community's needs.

<u>Emails</u>

The City invited the public to submit comments and suggestion via email to ensure additional community input on the Mid-City Communities Plan Update. A total of 13 community members submitted and the following represent their key ideas and comments that were provided.





- Housing suggestions ranged from a city loan program for building ADUs to offer affordable rentals, improving oversight on short-term rentals, and increasing the development of dense residential areas with businesses underneath.
- Recommendations for land use changes that allow small corner stores in residential zones and prioritize high-density housing and neighborhood-serving businesses on major streets like El Cajon Boulevard.
- Existing needs for more parks and open spaces are needed in densely populated areas, the preservation of existing tree canopies, urban trails that connect Normal Heights to Chollas Creek, and community gardens with drought-tolerant plants to enhance the environment and support local wildlife.
- To support growth and ensure safety, older communities need updated infrastructure, including wider streets, better parking, improved stormwater management, emergency access, and new fire safety requirements like defensible spaces and additional egress points.

COMBINED DETAILED SUMMARY OF COMMUNITY INPUT

The responses received by the community were organized into the following categories:

- History & Place
- Sustainable, Equity & Climate Resilience
- Land Use & Development
- Urban Design
- Mobility
- Parks, Public Facilities & Open Space

The list below includes an overall summary of comments and input provided by the public during as part of the office hours, community interviews, and emails.

1. HISTORY AND PLACE

The debate around historic preservation and housing policy highlights the tension between protecting historic districts and addressing housing needs. While some argue that preservation limits development, others believe density can be added in ways that respect the character of these neighborhoods.

TODAY:

 Historic Site Preservation: Participant(s) wanted to see more prioritization of preserving historic sites/districts and nominating individual properties, such as bungalows, for historic preservation to enhance community character, even with housing shortages.





- Historic Preservation and Housing Policy: While some argue that historic
 preservation limits housing development, others see value in maintaining historic
 districts. It is still possible to add density through Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) or
 appropriately scaled developments while protecting the character and facades of
 historic buildings.
- **Balance Historic Preservation with New Development:** Some feel that the rhetoric framing historic preservation as a threat to housing is misleading. They believe there are ways to add density in these neighborhoods that respect their historical character.

TOMORROW:

- **Historic Preservation and Housing Growth:** Seek a balanced approach that allows historic neighborhoods like Kensington-Talmadge to retain their unique cultural and architectural character while still contributing to housing needs. Explore adaptive reuse, appropriate densification, and maintaining the integrity of historic structures.
- **Collaborative Approach to Preservation and Housing:** Shift the narrative away from framing historic preservation as a barrier to housing and towards collaboration. Identify strategies to introduce density in ways that respect historical context and community character.
- Address Community Neglect: Communities like Normal Heights and neighborhoods in Eastern Area feel overlooked and neglected, with unfulfilled promises from past plans. Community members are calling for equitable resources and attention across all neighborhoods.

2. SUSTAINABILITY, EQUITY, & CLIMATE RESILIENCE

The focus on environmental preservation highlights the importance of balancing new developments with the protection of green spaces, and wildlife habits. Concerns about pedestrian access and infrastructure planning emphasize the need for thoughtful, sustainable development that considers the environmental impact.

TODAY:

• Environmental Preservation: Concerns are raised about new developments leading to the removal of decades-old trees, which are crucial for wildlife habitat, shade, and soil stability. Issues such as sinkholes in Normal Heights due to clay-rich soil highlight the need for careful environmental consideration.





- **Green Space Preservation:** To prevent environmental degradation, there is a call to balance new development with the preservation of existing green spaces.
- **Infrastructure Planning:** There are concerns about limited pedestrian access at 47th and Fairmont, where a fire station is planned. Risks such as potential toxic chemical releases into Chollas Creek are discussed, and alternative sites are explored.

- **Improved Infrastructure:** Address pedestrian access issues and potential environmental hazards. Integrate climate resilience and sustainable practices into all infrastructure projects.
- **Support CAP Initiatives**: Encourage farming practices and Climate Action Plan (CAP) initiatives that avoid the use of chemicals and promote regenerative agriculture. These efforts can help communities become more self-sufficient and contribute to climate change mitigation.
- Urban Green Spaces:
 - Emphasize the importance of planting more trees to replace those removed in the past year, addressing heat island effects, and supporting wildlife.
 - Incorporate green (e.g., parks, urban forests) and blue (e.g., water bodies, sustainable drainage) elements into all infrastructure projects.
 - Manage and increase green spaces, community gardens, and trails to enhance urban living.
- **Climate-Resilient Infrastructure:** Install rainwater catchment systems and solar panels in new developments and increase funding for flood infrastructure.
- **Equity and Inclusion:** Ensure equitable representation in planning processes and address funding and resource disparities. Learn from historical inequalities to promote fair and balanced community development.
- **Community Outreach:** Organize more community outreach events to foster community involvement.
- **Youth Engagement:** Desire for educational programs aimed at inspiring the youth to participate and connect with their communities.
- **Community Events:** Facilitate and support more community events on the east side of the El Cajon Boulevard, replicating successful models from other areas.
- Engagement Strategies and Participation:
 - Implement engagement strategies to ensure all community voices are heard in the planning process.





- Raise awareness about ongoing planning updates and provide clear information for working group applications.
- **Planning Group Representation:** Ensure planning groups like the Ken-Tal Community Planning Group are inclusive of minorities, women, and business owners, not just homeowners, is crucial for fair representation.
- **Support and Growth for Local Businesses:** Foster a supportive environment for local businesses, address redlining issues, and increase support for businesses east of the 15 freeway and along El Cajon Boulevard.

3. LAND USE & DEVELOPMENT

Land use and development discussions center around balancing the need for increased housing with preserving community character and diversity.

TODAY:

- **Property Boundary:** Discrepancies between GPS lines and historic property boundaries in older communities are causing legal issues. There is a push to align GPS records with historical lines.
- **Overdevelopment and Infrastructure:** There is concern about overdevelopment, homelessness, and the need for adequate infrastructure. These issues tie into broader discussions about the types of businesses and developments that should be prioritized on key corridors like El Cajon Boulevard.

- Housing Supply and Affordability:
 - Some support for adding housing beyond the main corridors, including support for variety of diverse housing options, including ADUs and row homes.
 - Work to meet the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) by offering housing options for all income levels.
 - Consider converting single-family zones to multi-family zones in areas with insufficient housing like Kensington.
 - Ensure affordable housing is integrated with market-rate housing, making neighborhoods inclusive and accessible.
- **Preserve Community Diversity:** Implement strategies to prevent gentrification and maintain neighborhood diversity by protecting local culture and providing affordable housing options.
- Gentrification and Historic Character:





- Develop policies to prevent displacement of long-time community members and protect historic neighborhoods.
- Address overdevelopment concerns and ensure the availability of necessary services.
- Housing Policy and Regulation:
 - Discontinue DIF waivers for new developments due to City revenue loss.
 - Stronger regulations are needed for housing development, including management of short-term rentals.
 - Some frustration over the City's local ADU regulations, rather than following the state's ADU laws.
 - Limiting short-term rental licenses could help ease the housing shortage.
- **Upzoning and Redevelopment:** El Cajon Boulevard should be the primary focus for upzoning to maximize its potential. Businesses in this area, especially East of I-15, feel they are largely neglected by the El Cajon Boulevard Business Improvement District, which is crucial as they contribute to the success and vibrancy of communities.
- Affordable ADU Development: Community members are calling for a borrowing program that allows regular homeowners to develop ADUs with the promise of renting them to community members at affordable prices. This program could be city-funded, allowing the City to reinvest interest back into the community rather than private banks.
- **Housing Density:** Support for increasing housing density through land use and zoning updates while considering the impact on communities' character and infrastructure.
- **Community and Diversity:** Continued support to maintain diversity in neighborhoods like City Heights, with community emphasis on preventing gentrification, supporting local culture, and preserving unique resources like Foodshed Coop and New Roots farm.
- Neighborhood Corner Stores: Existing concern to re-designate small neighborhood corner stores in residential zones where they are not allowed in the code to one of the allowed zones, or at least in residential areas that were developed before 1930. Continued support for corner stores is rooted in their contribution to community building, reducing car trips, and promoting local shopping options within neighborhoods.
- Access Fruits and Vegetables: Preserve unique resources like Foodshed Coop and New Roots farm.





- **Displacement:** Explore various measures to prevent the displacement of community members in ethnically diverse areas, ensuring that new development does not come at the cost of displacing long-time community members.
- **Preservation of Single-Family Home:** Explore efforts to preserve single-family homes and historic neighborhoods amidst development pressures, with proposals to maintain historic character while introducing appropriate levels of density.
- **Vacant Units**: Concerns about large corporate landlords holding vacant units are being raised.

4. URBAN DESIGN

Today, there is a need to strengthen community well-being and safety through physical enhancements, such as fixing sidewalks. Looking forward, fostering a more connected and supportive community environment involves not only addressing physical safety concerns but also ensuring that development projects are planned with consideration of the area's character and culture.

TODAY:

• **Community Well-being and Safety**: This theme emphasizes the need for improved street lighting to enhance safety and contribute to a stronger, more connected community. It addresses both physical safety concerns and the social aspects of fostering a supportive and cohesive community environment.

TOMORROW:

• **Infrastructure and Safety Enhancements**: This theme highlights the need for thoughtful consideration of topography in planning and development, along with essential infrastructure improvements. It includes fixing sidewalks, adding more streetlights, and ensuring that building projects are sustainable given the area's specific conditions.







5. MOBILITY

Community feedback highlights that while there is shared awareness of improvements in public transit and bike lanes, issues with safety, practicality, and street conditions remain. Additional concerns include the severe parking shortages made worse by new developments The community calls for a more unified approach to transportation planning that prioritizes better connectivity, safety, innovative parking solutions, and bikeways and transit improvements.

TODAY:

- **Parking Shortages and Challenges:** Many comments highlight the acute lack of parking, exacerbated by new developments and high demand. This shortage creates difficulties in finding parking spaces and impacts community members' daily lives, particularly in areas with new affordable and high-density housing.
- **Transportation and Transit:** While improvements in the bus system are recognized, concerns persist about the practicality and coverage of transit options. Similarly, there are mixed reactions to bike lanes and shared spaces, with a call for safer and more effective cycling infrastructure.
- **Street Conditions and Safety:** Street design challenges, such as narrow lanes, dangerous intersections, and construction, impact traffic flow and safety, while poor road and alleyway maintenance exacerbates these issues with long-standing problems.
- **Equity Issues:** The impact of parking and transit issues disproportionately affects lower-income community members who may rely on cars for blue-collar jobs or struggle with inadequate transportation options. This includes difficulties related to parking in affordable housing areas and the overall accessibility of jobs and services.
- **Urban Planning Tensions:** There are competing interests in urban planning, such as balancing the need for parking with the push for transit and bike infrastructure improvements. This includes conflicts over the allocation of space for different uses and the challenges of integrating new developments with existing infrastructure.

- **Connectivity:** Community desire for a unified approach to improving transportation infrastructure, including better connections between key areas (e.g., SDSU to Mid-City), complete streets, and safer street designs that accommodate all ages and abilities.
- **Faster Buses:** Explore options to create a contiguous dedicated bus lane from SDSU to Downtown along El Cajon Boulevard.





- **Bikeways and Transit Improvements:** Support for expanding bikeways, protected lanes, and safer cycling corridors, along with enhancing public transit options. This includes advocating for continuous bus-only lanes, improved bike infrastructure, and better integration of transit and cycling options.
- Safety and Traffic Management: Safety and traffic management concerns include improving narrow lanes, dangerous intersections, and high-risk areas by reducing speed limits, enhancing traffic flow, and implementing effective signage and traffic calming measures for cyclists and pedestrians. Specific issues include addressing dangerous points like freeway on- and off-ramps and implementing safety improvements at critical intersections.
- **Parking Solutions:** Community-identified innovative solutions for parking shortages included shared parking arrangements and utilizing public lots for overnight parking. The challenge is balancing parking needs with other aspects of urban planning, such as achieving the City's Climate Action Goals.

6. PARKS, PUBLIC FACILITIES & OPEN SPACE

Both current and future community needs underscore the critical importance of enhancing services, infrastructure, and green spaces. Today, community members are concerned about the lack of parks, poor maintenance, and management of open space, coupled with safety, and planning issues related to new developments. Looking forward, there is a strong call for comprehensive park development, expanded cultural services, improved green spaces, and infrastructure upgrades to support growing residential densities and meet community needs effectively.

TODAY:

- Lack of Community Services and Amenities: There is a significant concern about the shortage of parks, recreational facilities, libraries, and essential services like health, and youth services across various neighborhoods.
- Infrastructure and Maintenance Issues: Community members express frustration with inadequate infrastructure and maintenance, including poorly maintained streets, inadequate water pressure, and deferred maintenance on public facilities. Problems such as low water pressure, aging infrastructure, and inefficient use of funds are prevalent concerns.
- **Safety and Security Issues**: Safety concerns are raised about various issues, including crime in canyons, homeless encampments posing fire hazards, and inadequate street safety measures. There are calls for improved safety features and better management of public spaces to address these risks.





- **Challenges with New Developments**: Comments point to difficulties with new developments, such as inadequate parking. The negative impact of new developments on existing infrastructure and services are frequently mentioned.
- **Community Engagement and Planning Challenges**: Concerns about slow progress on recreational projects, difficulties with public financing, and the need for better planning and coordination between agencies to address community needs effectively. Some of the projects reported to be progressing slowly include the dog park in Ward Canyon, the pocket park in College Grove, tree planting along the right-of-way through a USDA grant, and the development of a Park and Recreation facility in Normal Heights as part of the remediation for the SR-15 construction.

- Need for Comprehensive Park Development and Safety: There's a strong emphasis on not just creating new parks but also ensuring their safety and proper management. This includes the integration of park safety measures, adequate maintenance, and thoughtful planning to address security concerns.
- **Cultural and Community Services**: The community expresses a need for services that cater to diverse cultural backgrounds, including arts and social services. Ensuring that different cultural groups are supported and promoting cultural understanding through various community services are key priorities.
- **Expansion and Improvement of Green Spaces**: Community members advocate for more green spaces such as community gardens, dog parks, and trails. There is a focus on utilizing existing spaces effectively such as improving facilities in Colina del Sol Park and improving connectivity to Chollas Creek through urban trails.
- Infrastructure and Development Needs: Comments highlight the necessity of aligning infrastructure improvements with increased residential density. This includes addressing issues with stormwater management, street lighting, and public amenities to effectively support higher-density housing.

- Emphasis on transit-oriented development and walkability, suggesting major transit stops in the center of neighborhoods, allowing small corner stores in residential zones, and connecting buildings to create pedestrian-friendly spaces.
- Recognition of the importance of open lines of communication and community input in successful smart growth initiatives, highlighted by opposition to certain legislative proposals and involvement in planning commission meetings.
- Concerns about preserving the unique character of Normal Heights and avoiding the negative impacts of overdevelopment, citing past experiences in other neighborhoods like Hillcrest.







Mid-City Communities Plan Update

Youth Engagement Summary

OVERVIEW

In Spring 2024, engagement with high school and middle school aged youth helped gain meaningful input toward the Mid-City Communities Plan Update.

Imagine worked with three Hoover High School 10th grade ELA classes, and three Crawford High school groups including two art classes and a Say San Diego youth services program. Seven 90-minute sessions occurred. Students were also encouraged to participate in a student survey.

MAJOR YOUTH ENGAGEMENT THEMES

During the youth engagement activities, students shared feedback related to the Mid-City Communities Plan Update. The following themes represent their key ideas and the prevalent comments that were provided.

History & Place

• Preservation of cultural diversity and the inclusive atmosphere of Mid-City by protecting key cultural sites including community centers, local family-owned businesses, the Little Saigon district, and murals. There was also a desire for more cultural festivals, block parties, and events.

Land Use & Development

- Students would like to see more cafes, diverse restaurants, small local shops, and a nearby mall to enhance their neighborhood's social scene. The commercial streets in North Park were used as a good example.
- Strong support for affordable housing and improved housing conditions. Common concerns include potential cost increases and potential displacement, and the impact on homeless individuals.
- Economic Disparities were highlighted with wealthier areas having better infrastructure and resources compared to poorer neighborhoods.
- Students expressed concern for folks experiencing homelessness.
- Desire for jobs to be created so people can continue to live in Mid-City.

Mobility

- There is a strong call for additional street lighting to improve visibility and safety, alongside better-maintained sidewalks, and roads with fewer potholes.
- Due to safety concerns such as crime, violence, drug use, and homelessness, driving is the preferred mode of transportation for students, who desire safer and cleaner streets where they can feel secure and comfortable.







Parks, Public Facilities & Open Space

- Libraries, parks, and community centers like the YMCA are important places to spend time with family and friends and there is support for additional hang out spots including public spaces, shopping areas, and recreational areas like arcades, a bowling alley, movie theatres, playgrounds, and soccer fields. Skateparks were mentioned numerous times by the students.
- Many students expressed a desire to see more trees in their neighborhoods for improved air quality, beauty and shade.

SUMMARY OF YOUTH ENGAGEMENT INPUT

The responses received by the students were organized into the following six categories:

- 1. History & Place
- 2. Sustainability, Equity & Climate Resilience
- 3. Land Use & Development
- 4. Urban Design
- 5. Mobility
- 6. Parks, Public Facilities & Open Space

Their feedback for each category is further categorized into how they feel about their neighborhood currently, "today", and what they would like their neighborhood to be like in the future, "tomorrow".

1. HISTORY AND PLACE

Today, students describe their neighborhoods as peaceful and diverse, with a mix of tranquil spaces and busy, bustling areas, where community connections are strong, and parks, eateries, and recreational spots play important roles in daily life. Looking to the future, students aspire to enhance community cohesion, preserve cultural diversity, and protect key cultural sites and local businesses. There is a strong desire to support cultural events and the development of community centers to foster inclusivity and social interaction.

TODAY:

• **Peaceful and Pleasant:** Many describe their neighborhood as peaceful, calm, and relaxing, with pleasant weather, natural beauty, and blooming flowers. Despite some issues, they generally find moving around the neighborhood enjoyable, particularly appreciating the peaceful and spacious areas during quieter times.





- **Crowded**, **Noisy**, **and Busy:** A few neighborhoods are characterized as crowded and noisy, with bustling streets, sirens, and a lot of foot traffic especially near busy intersections and public transportation routes.
- **Diverse Communities:** Several neighborhoods are noted for their cultural and ethnic diversity, contributing to a vibrant and unique community atmosphere.
- **Friendly and Connected:** There are mentions of friendly and close-knit communities where neighbors look out for each other and engage in social activities.
- Important places:
 - Parks: Many people mention various parks like Colina Del Sol Park (within Mid-City), and Gompers Park, North Park Community Park, and the fields at SDSU (not within Mid-City), as popular spots to hang out with friends and family.
 - Restaurants and Cafes: Local and diverse eateries, including taco shops, boba shops, and fast-food chains like McDonald's and Wingstop, are frequently visited for social gatherings.
 - **Libraries and Community Centers:** Libraries and places like the YMCA provide good venues for meeting up and engaging in different activities.
 - **Malls and Shopping Areas:** Shopping centers, such as Fashion Valley, offer a variety of entertainment and dining options.
 - Recreational Spots: Local gyms as well as spots outside of Mid-City like Balboa Park, the beach, the zoo, are mentioned as enjoyable places for spending time with loved ones.

- **Community Cohesion:** Students want a more connected, peaceful, and welcoming community with opportunities for social interaction and inclusivity.
- **Prevent Impacts to Culture:** Some are worried about changes affecting community culture and inclusivity.
- **Preserve Diversity:** Celebration of cultural diversity and an inclusive atmosphere. The African, Somali, Muslim, Vietnamese, and Chicano communities where specifically mentioned.
- **Community and Activity Centers:** Suggestions include community centers, youth centers, libraries with recreational areas, and places that host community events like block parties and festivals.
- Preserve These Important Places





- Parks: Teralta Park, Colina Del Sol Park, Chollas Lake and Park, City Heights Park/Henwood Park. Other Parks not within Mid-City include Balboa Park, Chicano Park, and Torrey Pines.
- o Cultural Districts and Streets: Little Saigon, El Cajon Boulevard
- **Sites:** Rosa Parks Statue
- Community Centers and Landmarks: Various Masjids (Mosques), Colina Del Sol Park Community Facilities, Adams Elementary School, Southern Sudanese Community Center of San Diego, United Women of East African Support, Mid City CAN, and old buildings and warehouse.
- **Special Places:** Tower Bar, Candy Land Mini Mart, Jack in the Box, authentic cultural food restaurants, Haitian store, and Viendong.
- **Cultural Events:** Support cultural festivals, events, and fairs.
- **Local Businesses:** preserve family-owned businesses and traditional cultural practices.

2. SUSTAINABILITY, EQUITY, & CLIMATE RESILIENCE

Today, sustainability practices in the community are mixed, with some recycling for financial incentives, while others struggle due to a lack of knowledge or facilities. There are significant concerns about racial discrimination, homelessness, immigrant challenges, and economic disparities in the context of equity. Climate resiliency issues include a lack of air conditioning, flooding risks, and safety concerns during heavy rain, particularly in older or low-lying buildings. Looking to the future, residents desire greener, more modern, and ecofriendly communities with more trees, improved infrastructure, and job creation to support a higher quality of life.

TODAY:

- Sustainability:
 - **Mixed Practices for Recycling & Composting:** Several responses indicate a mix of recycling but not composting, with reasons related to environmental consciousness, habit, upbringing, and convenience.
 - **Financial Incentive for Recycling:** Some families recycle for the financial incentives of getting paid for recyclables.
 - Reasons for Not Recycling or Composting: Some families don't recycle or compost due to lack of knowledge, perceived effort, absence of facilities, or lack of a garden nearby.







- Equity
 - **Racial Discrimination:** Perceptions of racial discrimination and police harassment, especially against Black and Hispanic communities, are noted.
 - **Homelessness and Support:** Many feel the homeless community is ignored and lacks adequate support and resources. Some suffer from drug addiction that is a concern.
 - **Immigrant Challenges:** Difficulties for immigrants, such as finding housing and avoiding deportation, are significant inequities.
 - Economic Disparities: Economic inequalities are highlighted, with wealthier areas having better infrastructure and resources compared to poorer neighborhoods. The disparity between the lower density neighborhoods North of El Cajon Boulevard versus South of El Cajon Boulevard was specifically mentioned.
- Climate Resiliency
 - **Lack of Air Conditioning:** Some residents, particularly in older apartments or homes without AC, struggle with high temperatures. This can lead to discomfort and potential health risks such as heatstroke.
 - **Flooding Risk for Residents in Low-Lying Areas:** People living in lower houses, apartments with bottom floors, or near water ways are at risk of flooding, which can damage their homes and belongings.
 - **Heavy Rain General Safety Concerns:** Issues such as slippery roads leading to accidents, clogged drains causing localized flooding, and difficulty for elderly and disabled people to navigate during heavy rain were noted.
 - **Leaks in Buildings from Heavy Rain:** Old or unmaintained buildings suffer from leaks when it rains heavy which causes damage to interiors and belongings.

- Sustainability
 - **Modernization and Sustainability:** There is interest in modernizing the community with advanced technology, better infrastructure, and sustainable practices to combat climate change.
 - Desire for More Trees: Many students expressed a desire to see more trees in their neighborhoods, citing benefits such as improved air quality, enhanced beauty, and increased shade.
- Equity





- **Future Aspirations:** Aspirations for the future include living in diverse, ecofriendly communities, achieving financial stability, and having the ability to travel and enjoy a higher quality of life.
- **Jobs:** Desire for jobs to be created so people can continue to live in Mid City.
- Climate Resiliency
 - **Flooding Risk for Residents experiencing homelessness:** Some students highlighted their concern for the safety of the unhoused population during times of heavy rain.

3. LAND USE & DEVELOPMENT

Today, neighborhoods are recognized for their cultural and ethnic diversity, creating a vibrant community atmosphere. Looking ahead, students would like to see affordable housing prioritized, displacement prevented, spacious living conditions, expanded food options and shopping venues, and overcrowding avoided.

TODAY:

• **Diverse Communities:** Several neighborhoods are noted for their cultural and ethnic diversity, contributing to a vibrant and unique community atmosphere.

- **Housing and Affordability:** Improving housing conditions and making the community more affordable for families are important goals.
- **Affordability:** Many students expressed the need for affordable housing to ensure they can live comfortably without financial strain, whether in San Diego or other areas. Rental caps was a mentioned solution to avoid displacement.
- Address Affordability and Displacement: Common concerns include potential cost increases, affordability issues, potential displacement, and the impact on homeless individuals.
- **Comfort and Space:** There is a strong desire for spacious living conditions, such as large houses with multiple bedrooms and bathrooms, and enough space for family and personal activities.
- Avoid Neighborhood Overcrowding: Some mentioned concerns about their neighborhood becoming more crowded.





• **More Food and Shopping Venues:** Students would like to see more cafes, diverse restaurants, small local shops, and a nearby mall to enhance their neighborhood's social scene. The commercial streets in North Park were used as a good example.

4. URBAN DESIGN

Today, there is a need for better street lighting to improve visibility and safety in neighborhoods that are often noisy and busy due to high traffic. In the future, students hope for improved infrastructure, enhanced green spaces, and a stronger sense of community through well-maintained parks, public art, and safer, cleaner environments. They also emphasize the importance of expanding recreational amenities and preserving the neighborhood's cultural vibrancy.

TODAY:

- **Street lighting:** Many feel their neighborhood needs more street lighting for visibility and safety.
- **Noisy and Busy:** A few neighborhoods are characterized noisy with their highly trafficked streets, sirens, and a lot of foot traffic especially near busy intersections and public transportation routes.

- **Improved Infrastructure:** Students hope for better-maintained sidewalks and roads, fewer potholes, and enhanced street lighting for increased safety.
- **Public Art and Murals:** Maintain and encourage vibrant public art and murals, and preserve existing murals around City Heights and specifically the "City Heights" Mural
- **Green Spaces:** Expand green spaces by increasing the number of trees, plants, and grassy areas, and ensuring existing trees are healthy and well-maintained.
- **Community and Environment:** Students value a pleasant community environment, with mentions of trees, plants, parks, and community gardens, as well as a sense of belonging and neighborliness.
- **Safety and Cleanliness:** Students frequently mentioned the importance of living in a safe and clean neighborhood where they can feel secure and comfortable. The need for enhanced street lighting was mentioned numerous times.
- More Parks and Community Amenities: Many students desire more parks and hangout places likes stores and recreational areas like arcades.





5. MOBILITY

Today, students brought up issues with poorly maintained roads and sidewalks. While a variety of transportation modes are used, driving is often preferred for safety reasons. Students with jobs rely on a mix of driving, public transportation, and ride-sharing to get to work. Looking forward, there's a strong desire for improved infrastructure, including better-maintained road and sidewalks.

TODAY:

- **Public Area Upkeep Issues:** Many feel their neighborhood needs better maintenance of roads and sidewalks.
- **Bumpy Roads and Sidewalks:** Many people describe the roads and sidewalks as bumpy, cracked, or uneven, leading to a less smooth experience whether driving, walking, or biking.
- **A Variety of Modes:** Students use a variety of transportation modes including the riding the bus and trolley, walking, driving, and biking.
- **Driving:** Driving is perceived as safer due to harassment that can occur on buses, trolleys, and walking in the streets.
- **Transportation for Students that Work:** A few students who have jobs mentioned using cars to get to work (driving themselves or being driven), using public transportation, or using ride-sharing services like Uber to get to work.
- **Potential Transportation Methods for Work:** For those who do not work but speculate on how they would commute, common suggestions include driving, taking the bus, walking, or being driven by family members.

Tomorrow:

- **Improved Infrastructure:** Students hope for better-maintained sidewalks and roads with fewer potholes.
- Address Road Conditions: There is a desire for improvements in road infrastructure, such as less bumpy streets, and the replacement of missing stop signs.

6. PARKS, PUBLIC FACILITIES & OPEN SPACE

Today, many neighborhoods are perceived as dirty and unsafe, with concerns about litter, inadequate lighting, and crime, though safety is seen as better during the day. In the





future, students want cleaner and safer communities with more parks, recreational areas, and amenities like gyms, entertainment centers, and places to skate. There's a strong emphasis on creating spaces that support personal well-being, community events, and a balanced lifestyle.

TODAY:

- **Dirty:** Many described their neighborhood as dirty. Issues such as litter and lack of trash cans are common complaints.
- **Mixed Feelings on Safety:** Many described their neighborhood as unsafe with concerns about inadequate street lighting, lack of security, crime, violence, drug use, and people experiencing homelessness. Some consider their neighborhood safe during the day but not at night.
- **Safety Concerns:** There are mixed feelings about safety; some feel safe and secure, while others are cautious due to issues like heavy traffic, dark areas, or undesirable activities.

- **Cleanliness and Safety:** Many students want their community to be cleaner and safer, with less trash, fewer homeless people, and more police protection.
- **Personal Well-being and Lifestyle:** A desirable living situation includes personal well-being, space for hobbies like skating, and a work-life balance, with concerns about youth drug involvement and safety.
- **More and Safer Parks:** Many respondents desire more parks, particularly those that are safe, clean, and have varied features like hills, playgrounds, and sports facilities.
- Amenities and Convenience: Proximity to amenities such as schools, gyms, hangout spots, and public facilities like soccer fields is considered ideal for a convenient lifestyle.
- Entertainment and Recreational Centers: There is a strong interest in having more entertainment options such as arcades, movie theaters, gaming centers, bowling alleys, youth clubhouses, and skate parks.
- **Community and Activity Centers:** Suggestions include community centers, youth centers, libraries with recreational areas, and places that host community events like block parties and festivals.
- **Sports and Fitness Facilities:** Requests for more sports and fitness facilities include gyms, volleyball courts, soccer fields, and places dedicated to activities like skateboarding and badminton.

Summary of City Heights Community Development Corporation Engagement Activities

OVERVIEW

As part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update, the City partnered with the City Heights Community Development Corporation (CHCDC) to share information about the Mid-City Communities Plan Update and get feedback from the community on vision, priorities, and other topics. As a trusted non-profit in Mid-City that is embedded in the community's social networks, CHCDC conducted engagements at existing hubs of community activity and provided an approachable and inclusive format to share input. In total CHCDC conducted 12 in-person engagement events between May 2024 and August 2024 and engaged over 215 people.

ENGAGEMENT DETAILS AND ATTENDANCE

More than 215 people participated in the 12 in-person engagement activities that included a mix of workshops held at different locations with community activity and pop-up engagement as part of community events. Attendance was recorded via sign in sheet, but people were not required to sign in. *Appendix A* to *Appendix L* provide photos of engagement activities and detailed records of attendance.

ENGAGEMENT FORMAT AND ACTIVITIES

Pop-up engagement activities took place at a CHCDC booth as part of larger community events. These events were held during the daytime and lasted 3-6 hours, with participants stopping by over the course of the event. Using sticker dots, event attendees voted on their top priority in each of the following topics: livability, mobility, and equity.

Mini workshops took place in the community rooms of local apartment complexes during the evening time. Residents outside the hosting apartment complex were welcome to attend, and several participants living in other areas of Mid-City did so. During workshops, participants discussed in groups of 3-4 their priorities in each of the following topics: land use & growth, transportation, and parks & open spaces. A CHCDC staffer facilitated each group discussion while recording their discussion points on poster paper. Presentations and discussions were also held as part of the City Heights Business Improvement District meeting and the TEAH Task Force Meeting.

MAY 16TH POP-UP

This pop-up was conducted at the City Heights Transit Plaza on University Avenue & SR-15, where City Heights CDC had a pit-stop for the County-wide Bike Anywhere Day Event from 7:00am to 10:00am. This event was conducted in partnership with Caltrans and Stay True Cycle Works (a City Heights bike education and repair shop on University Avenue).

Over 43 people stopped by and engaged with a sticker activity provided by Ascent to voice what would make their community better. Staff shared flyers containing information for an upcoming virtual City meeting on the plan update. Staff also gave out items for participants, such as shirts, bike gear, sport drinks, and more. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix A.

MAY 29TH MINI WORKSHOP

This mini workshop was conducted at the Metro Villas affordable housing complex adjacent to Teralta Park from 5:30pm to 7:00pm.





The workshop had thirteen participants that were separated into 4 groups, each with a staff member facilitating the engagement. Each group wrote down what they would like to see in the community for the categories of Housing, Transportation, and Parks & Open Spaces. They did this one category at a time, and after each category was done the entire room paused to share what they had written down. Lumpia was provided for the participants. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix B.

JUNE 12TH MINI WORKSHOP

This mini workshop was conducted at the Hollywood Palms affordable housing complex community room in southern City Heights from 2:00pm to 4:00pm, at the same time as a food distribution happening at the same room.

The workshop had 8 participants, far less than we had expected given the food distribution. Nonetheless we heard from a diverse set of people from various ages and races provide valuable feedback. Housing, bike lanes, and recreation were common responses. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix C.

JUNE 15TH POP-UP AT STREET FOOD FEST [BONUS EVENT FREE OF CHARGE]

This pop-up was conducted at the City Heights Street Food Fest on University Avenue between 37th and 38th streets. Over 11 people participated in the pop-up, with the main responses being Sidewalks, Trees, and Landscaping, Parks & Recreation, and

Neighborhood Serving Businesses and Other Commercial. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix D.

JUNE 30TH POP-UP AT THE NEW ROOTS COMMUNITY GARDEN

This pop-up was conducted at the New Roots Community Garden on 54th Street & Chollas Parkway, from 9:00am to 12:00pm.

The workshop had 24 participants; each was given 3 stickers to place on a poster board containing responses to the question "What Should We Build to Improve Our Community?" (translated into several languages). The top 3 responses (in descending order) were: Community Gardens, Housing, and Public Spaces. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix E.

JULY 22ND POP-UP AT OAK PARK LIBRARY

This pop-up was conducted at the Oak Park Library on 54th Street from 4:00pm to 7:00pm. The workshop had 16 participants. For the housing section, nearly every single participant selected affordable housing. For the transportation section, the vast majority of participants selected active transportation safety improvements (safe sidewalks, bike lanes, crossings). The final section had a mix of responses for parks and recreation,





civic/cultural/community spaces, and public art/signs (with special attention to a gateway sign). A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix F.

JULY 27TH MINI-WORKSHOP AT SUNSHINE BERARDINI FIELD (SBF)

The workshop was part of a Mid-City bike ride that had 15 participants. The ride began with a verbal overview of the CPU by CHCDC staff and participants were asked to observe their surroundings and think of what they would like to see in the built environment as they biked to SBF. Participants were also taken through a canyon trail and given a brief lecture on the trails and green space in City Heights. After arriving at SBF, participants used sticky notes to note down what they would like to see in the built environment. Shade (in general and for bus stops), street lighting, trails & bikeways, and improved road conditions made up most of the responses. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix G.

JULY 30TH EDUCATION AT A COMMUNITY CLEAN-UP (NO-CHARGE)

At this community clean-up, CHCDC had a table to educate folks on the CPU. This took place on University Avenue in the Corridor neighborhood. Sign-in sheet included. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix H.

AUGUST 10TH POP-UP AT BACK-TO-SCHOOL DISTRIBUTION

City Heights CDC held a pop-up at the Chicano Federation's Back-to-School Distribution in which various organizations handed out backpacks, school supplies, and other items to families. City Heights CDC handed out items and at the same time had people engage with the sticker pop-up activity to share what they'd like to see in their community. The most popular answers were affordable housing, pedestrian safety & connectivity, parks & recreation, and multi-family + missing middle housing. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix I.

AUGUST 13TH BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (BID) PRESENTATION

The City Heights BID is an official geographic district within the City of San Diego in which all its businesses pay an assessment to. The BID board determines how those assessments are spent, and they represent the business community on University Avenue in larger conversations about policy and infrastructure.

City Heights CDC presented to the BID board on the Mid-City Community Plan Update, with a focus on land use and mobility. The board was asked to share what they wanted to see, and their main items included: a site for a parking structure (similar the one by University Avenue in North Park), wider sidewalks with improved landscaping (similar to the improvements happening now between Highland and Euclid), a cohesive urban design aesthetic along University Avenue, and an acknowledgment of certain important places,





among other things. A screenshot of the minutes is included in this report. The BID plans to send a formal letter to the City with their feedback on the plan update. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix J.

AUGUST 17TH MINI-WORKSHOP AT CHOLLAS LAKE AMPHITHEATRE

The workshop was part of a movie night event held at the amphitheater. City Heights CDC educated community members on the Mid-City Community Plan Update, and then worked with them to write down what they would like to see improved with regards to the land use of the neighborhood. The main answer seen by the community here was sports centers (e.g., a sportsplex, places with soccer fields). Community gardens and affordable food options was another common response. Also shared were recognized cultural centers with signage, safe bike routes, native plants, and cleanliness + safety. A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix K.

AUGUST 28TH SR-15 TEAH TASK FORCE PRESENTATION

The State Route 15 (SR-15) Transportation Equity & Affordable Housing (TEAH) Task Force is a group of resident leaders engaged in policy & planning that was created by a California Air Resources Board grant. They have weighed in on local policies and local infrastructure investments to promote an affordable and equitable built environment by the SR-15 in City Heights. City Heights CDC presented to the Task Force on the Mid-City CPU and gave them an overview of the draft Atlas/Pre-Existing Report. The Task Force was interested and asked questions on the Atlas' mobility analysis (e.g., *"how was walkability measured?"*) and the current zoning of the Community Plan (e.g., *"why are these sites on University Avenue zoned industrial? Is that an appropriate use?"*). A complete record of comments from this event is included in Appendix L.

SUMMARY

- Emphasizing local culture through murals, events, and signage to honor community history
- Calls for increased affordable, family-oriented housing, along with better facilities for the homeless, while addressing displacement and supporting small businesses.
- Requests for improved public transit options, including more frequent buses, protected bike lanes, and better infrastructure for safer pedestrian travel and a variety of mobility devices.
- Focus on community health through eco-friendly initiatives, increased green spaces, and solar energy incentives to enhance environmental quality.
- Desire for more recreational facilities, parks, and programming to engage youth, alongside calls for better safety, cleanliness, and maintenance of these spaces.





• Suggestions for improved street lighting, road maintenance, and human-centered and cohesive design to enhance community safety and aesthetics.

Poll Results

At the pop-up events, attendees participated in a sticker dot activity to identify their top priorities across three topics: livability, mobility, and equity. This interactive exercise allowed participants to voice ideas for improving their community by voting on the issues they valued most.

MAJOR ENGAGEMENT THEMES

During the City Heights CDC led activities, community members shared feedback related to the Mid-City Communities Plan Update. The following themes represent their key ideas and the prevalent comments that were provided.

History & Place

- Honoring local people through murals, sharing community history through events, and highlighting culturally significant areas to build pride and visibility through meaningful signage and displays.
- More community gathering centers to foster social cohesion and provide services.

Sustainability, Equity, and Climate Resilience

• Overall goal of community health by emphasizing eco-friendly homes, solar energy incentives, increased green spaces, improved air quality, and access to affordable food for healthier neighborhoods.

Land Use & Development

- Calls for more affordable housing, family-oriented housing, and housing for the homeless. There's also a focus on ensuring housing options like 1-3 bedroom units and affordable apartments near transit.
- Suggestions for better homeless facilities, shelters, and programs aimed at providing housing for the homeless population.
- A desire for redevelopment of certain areas and rebuilding communities while addressing displacement by relocating displaced residents and other tenant protection strategies.
- Support for business, including loans and protections for small businesses, and interest in creating spaces for mini markets, local businesses, and shopkeeper units.





- Simplifying permitting processes, and supporting homeownership programs and community land trusts.
- Desire for non-polluting industrial uses such as maker spaces, arts & crafts facilities, and workshops.
- Reducing the amount of liquor stores and smokes shops.
- Changing the zoning to reduce car-oriented businesses (e.g., tire shops, smog shops, auto repairs).

<u>Urban Design</u>

- Prioritizing human-centered design and more and better street lighting throughout the community, such as Smart Streetlights, with a focus on dark sky-friendly and solar-powered options.
- Identify suitable locations and designs options for a gateway sign for City Heights to both celebrate the community's unique character and be a warm welcome to visitors.
- A consistent and attractive streetscape through the inclusion of wider sidewalks with improved landscaping and tree canopies, particularly along University Avenue, to encourage more foot traffic and business activity, and provide scenic paths between communities.
- A cohesive urban design across University Avenue and City Heights as a whole.

<u>Mobility</u>

- Requests for more frequent buses, new bus routes, and transit priority lanes. There is also interest in no-cost transit passes and better trolley connections.
- A focus on fixing roads, potholes, and improving street lighting for safer transportation.
- Calls for protected bike lanes, improved pedestrian crosswalks, and traffic calming measures, with accommodations for a variety of mobility devices, especially near schools and busy streets.
- Upgrading transit stations and bus stops with seating, lighting, trash bins, shading, restrooms, and water fountains, ensuring they are inclusive and not designed to deter homeless individuals.
- Suggestions for EV charging stations and making car travel time comparable to transit.
- Identification of well-located parking facilities to benefit local businesses by providing more parking options for customers.





Parks, Public Facilities, & Open Space

- A desire for more recreational options for kids, such as community centers, sports fields, programming (like yoga and rap studios), family fun centers, and improved libraries to engage youth in positive activities.
- Requests for more parks, trails, green spaces, and native trees, including community gardens, urban farms, and food forests.
- Concerns about safety in parks and around schools, emphasizing the need for better lighting, security measures, and clean, maintained facilities (like restrooms) to create safe recreational spaces.
- Suggestions for easier access to permits for using parks, more recreational programming, and awareness initiatives to activate community spaces.
- A focus on reducing illegal dumping, maintaining clean public spaces, and improving the overall cleanliness and esthetic of neighborhoods and recreational areas.

Approximately 300 people participated in the Mapping Activity, with greater than 250 being students at Monroe Clark and Horace Mann middle schools.

In the Mapping Activity, eleven specific stickers were provided to all participants. All eleven stickers can be found on the photos taken of the completed maps, which are provided in a separate file. The data from the mapping exercise is included in the tables and charts and on Google maps found in two files "Analysis of Mapping Exercise, Trip 1" and "Analysis of Mapping Exercise, Trip 2." Because of the limitations of the mapping program available via Google, the results from the eleven stickers were combined into the following nine items:

- 1. Hospital and School (combined two sticker results)
- 2. Grocery and Shopping (combined two sticker results)
- 3. Crosswalks
- 4. Lights
- 5. Safe (Related to traffic and/or to crime)
- 6. Sidewalk
- 7. Unsafe (Related to traffic and/or to crime)
- 8. Parks (and trees)
- 9. Housing

To gain a sense of what young people in Mid-City prioritized for their communities' future, the project team specifically wanted to communicate with students. At Monroe Clark and Horace Mann middle schools, the project team visited two classes at each school, as well as their lunch periods. During classes at the two middle schools (Periods 1 and 4 at Clark Middle School and Periods 2 and 6 at Mann Middle School), each Cal Poly team member worked with their own table of approximately ten students, spending at least forty

minutes with students, taking notes, and asking students the above-listed questions. During lunch periods, interactions between Cal Poly students and middle school students were brief and consisted of middle school students approaching a table of Cal Poly students and being asked the questions listed on page 9.

In addition to the eleven specific stickers, students also provided participants with pens, markers, and Postit Notes to enable them to indicate "other information" on the maps. "Other information" provided by participants can be found on the photos of maps (provided in a separate file). Cal Poly students assisted participants with placing stickers, completing and placing Postit Notes, and writing information on the maps

OVERVIEW

As part of the Mid-City Communities Plan Update, the City partnered with Hello Lamp Post (HLP) to create a digital engagement tool for community members to share ideas and provide input on vision, priorities, and other topics. HLP is an interactive online platform where users can engage in dialogue about community matters through an interactive web and text message interface. HLP provides an accessible way for people to provide feedback at their convenience through their phones. HLP was available for people to provide input on the Mid-City Communities Plan Update from July 3 through August 31, 2024.

OUTREACH AND MARKETING

Marketing for HLP was disseminated to the community both digitally and physically. Digitally, the platform was shared via email to anyone registered for the Plan Mid-City mailing list on July 3, 2024. Flyers promoting Plan Mid-City were distributed with a QR code to the online platform. Each flyer's QR code was linked to the Community Planning Area where it was posted, so data from these scans could roughly track the community where they occurred. Flyers were produced in the three most common languages in Mid-City: English, Spanish, and Vietnamese. Appendix A includes a copy of a HLP promotional flyer and provides photos of the flyer.

Flyers were strategically posted at key locations across Mid-City including hubs of community activity, parks, recreation centers, libraries, and coffee shops. In total, 87 flyers were posted at 38 sites. The table below summarizes the number of flyers shared based on geographic distribution and location type. Appendix B provides further specifics on posting locations including photos of posted flyers.

ENGAGEMENT AND PARTICIPATION

People were asked questions related to land use and development, urban design, parks & public facilities, mobility, and sustainability and climate. People were asked to share their opinion of the area's existing conditions, brainstorm ideas for future investments, and identify specific locations where improvements are needed. A list of the questions included as part of HLP is included in Appendix C.

Table 1 shows the total number of users that engaged in a conversation with HLP. Conversations were further classified into users with "low engagement" and "high engagement." Users with "low engagement" only initiated a conversation with HLP, may have selected a topic to provide input on in the first question, but did not continue with the survey. "High engagement" users continued the conversation and provided a response to one or more of the topical questions. As shown in Table 2, a total of 374 responses were provided through HLP by 74 users with "high engagement." A detailed record of all comments received from users with high engagement is included in Appendix D.

MAJOR HLP THEMES

Participants provided feedback related to the Mid-City Communities Plan Update using the interactive survey. The following themes represent their key ideas and the prevalent comments that were provided.

OVERALL SUMMARY

• Invest in blue and green infrastructure, improve stormwater management, and enhance public spaces to promote environmental resilience and water conservation.





- Develop eco-friendly housing and promote walkable neighborhoods while reducing vehicle emissions and addressing climate change impacts through thoughtful urban design solutions.
- Foster community education on sustainability, water conservation, and disaster preparedness to encourage local ownership of public spaces.
- Create diverse and accessible affordable housing options, including city-built units and mixed-use developments, while incorporating single-room occupancy structures.
- Invest in transitional and permanent housing solutions for unhoused individuals and youth to enhance community well-being.
- Promote local markets and amenities within walking distance to foster vibrant neighborhoods and support local economies.
- Prioritize well-lit streets and sidewalks and increase greenery through tree planting and public trashcans to promote safety and cleanliness.
- Implement design solutions, such as sound-blocking walls, to reduce noise pollution and improve the quality of life for residents near busy roadways.
- Develop safer facilities with protected bike lanes, wider sidewalks, and traffic calming measures like speed control and intersection improvements.
- Improve public transit options with more frequent service and better connections.
- Enhance neighborhood parks and community facilities by improving amenities and supporting diverse activities to foster community interaction and quality of life.
- Expand walking and biking trails in underserved neighborhoods while prioritizing maintenance and security to promote outdoor activities and community well-being.

KEY THEMES

Sustainability, Equity & Climate Resilience

- Blue and green infrastructure:
 - Invest in blue and green infrastructure, including the planting of trees, community gardens, and the transformation of impervious surfaces into permeable areas to enhance environmental resilience and support water conservation.
 - Better stormwater management, improved drainage systems, and the maintenance of clean public spaces, particularly on major thoroughfares like University Avenue and El Cajon Boulevard.
- Sustainable Design and Transportation:
 - Build environmentally friendly housing, utilizing green materials, and implementing energy-efficient solutions, along with promoting walkable neighborhoods.





- Reduce vehicle emissions (e.g., through drive-thru idling reduction), and investments in sustainable transportation options to enhance community mobility.
- Identify design solutions to address issues such as air quality, pollution, and climate change impacts, including heatwaves and flooding, to promote a healthier living environment for all residents.
- Community Engagement and Education:
 - Increase community educational opportunities about sustainability practices, water conservation, and disaster preparedness, along with fostering community ownership of local spaces.

Land Use & Development

- Affordable Housing:
 - Create diverse affordable housing options.
 - Explore city-built and owned units.
 - Build single-room occupancy structures.
 - Encourage mixed-use developments that cater to families and individuals.
- Support for Vulnerable Populations:
 - Invest in transitional and permanent housing for unhoused communities, along with youth-oriented housing solutions, to address homelessness and ensure community well-being.

• Walkable Neighborhoods:

 Encourage a greater variety of local markets, grocery stores, and convenient amenities (like restaurants and gyms) within walking distance to enhance community walkability and support local economies.

Urban Design

- Clean, Green and Safe Neighborhoods:
 - Emphasis on the need for properly lit streets and sidewalks to enhance safety for pedestrians and cyclists.
 - The need for new high-density developments to include adequate lighting and infrastructure improvements, such as wider, well-maintained sidewalks, to support commercial corridors and enhance public safety.
 - Importance of adding more trees and public trashcans to promote a cleaner, greener urban environment while providing shade for pedestrians.
- Noise Mitigation:
 - Identify design solutions, such as freeway sound blocking walls to reduce noise pollution and improve the quality of life for residents near busy roadways.





Mobility

- Safe Walking and Biking Infrastructure:
 - The need for better, safer walking and biking facilities, including protected bike lanes, wider sidewalks, and traffic calming measures to enhance pedestrian and cyclist safety.
 - Add shade trees and green spaces to make walking and biking more pleasant, especially in areas lacking natural cover.
- Public Transit:
 - Improve public transit options, including more frequent service, last-mile shuttles, and better connections to transit stops, especially in hilly areas.
- Traffic Management and Safety Measures:
 - Implement speed control measures (like speed humps and roundabouts) and improving intersection safety to facilitate safer crossings for pedestrians and cyclists.

Public Facilities, Parks and Open Space

• Community Spaces and Amenities:

- Identify opportunities for more neighborhood parks, community gardens, recreational facilities, and local markets to enhance community interaction and quality of life.
- Improve amenities in existing parks, including better bathrooms, play structures, shade, hydration stations, and dog parks to make them more welcoming and functional for all users.
- Support varied activities in parks, such as concerts, movie nights, and youth programs, to cater to different age groups and interests, fostering a vibrant community atmosphere.
- Emphasize the role of community gardens and parks in bringing the community together, encouraging participation, and providing spaces for activities that benefit families and individuals.

• Access to Trails and Green Spaces:

- Explore opportunities for more walking/biking trails to access open space, especially in underserved neighborhoods, to promote outdoor activities and improve community well-being.
- Highlight the importance of maintenance, such as the "cat walks" of Rolando, along with the need for security measures and litter cleanup to enhance safety and enjoyment.

- I and residents of Oak Park and Webster do not understand why there are no Business Plans in development for our Shopping Centers and Small business office spaces. We have no recreational facilities for youth or seniors.
- I think having more trees and native plants along with AC in our homes.
- Sideways need replacement the repair patches are uneven and existing sideways are cracked, probably due to trees (which we're doing an awesome job of providing)
- The buildings need support.
- wider sidewalks in commercial corridors.




- Bathrooms in all and water features (splash pad for example). But mostly upkeep is what is needed, not so much additional amenities.
- Chollas Lake: it is well maintained, beautiful, and a place to walk my dog that is relaxing and safe.
- Downtown. Both the freeways and the surface streets are jammed with traffic into the City.

- Keep building height to four stories for new housing construction along transit corridors; infill raises the cost of construction so do not use infill as a solution for affordable housing.

- Faster bus service to employment areas, and easier to cross streets with bump outs where there's street parking.
- For-sale homes.

- Have businesses around walkable.
- I work in Balboa Park no easy way to bike or bus.

While I understand the need for more housing, I would suggest a compromise to maintain at least some of the garden and decrease the size of the development. Is this something that could be explored? And to add that community gardens should be encouraged.
- Investment in permanent and transitional housing for our unhoused communities.
- It gets hotter every summer.
- Less density in the older communities and truly affordable housing where rents are based on income.
- Massive amounts of publicly owned FHA/HUD affordable housing.
- Mid-rise with parking.
- More affordable density housing with multiple bedrooms apt for families.
- On Orange Avenue where my family and I live, even though there is a school nearby and the speed limit is 25 mph, there is a steady stream of vehicles exceeding the speed limit and emergency vehicles tend to use Orange Ave as a thruway as opposed to El Cajon Blvd when responding to emergency calls. I would like to see speed humps and/or roundabouts as well as bike lanes on Orange Ave to encourage more biking (could be designed similarly to Meade).





- Parks and Green spaces, public transportation, healthcare facilities, educational institutions, affordable housing, community centers (including retirement programs) retail and commercial spaces, safety and emergency services, recreational facilities and sustainable infrastructure.
- Parks and open space are critical. We now only have tiny pocket parks that are grossly overused. Balboa Park is being loved to death. Why not build moderate density homes around an open plaza with grocery stores offering fresh food around the edges? Stay away from fads like fitness centers, entertainment venues, and other uses that are not sustainable and do not reflect the values of the neighborhood.
- Seating, chess tables, bike chaining structures, an outdoor gym.
- The corner of Adams Ave and West Mountain Dr needs a way for pedestrians to cross. My bus stops there but since I can't safely cross the street, I have to go one an extra stop in order to cross Adams safely.
- We live on a 50' wide street... we need traffic calming NOW. This is not a racetrack; this is our community.
- Would like to see encouragement of mixed-use housing among El Cajon Blvd to create walkable communities. Currently, there are many vacant/underused storefronts on El Cajon Blvd in Corridor. If mixed use buildings with relevant storefront shops for community members could be encouraged, paired with low, middle and market price housing.
- I can only speak to Colina del Sol Park. I would like to see more programs at the Recreation Center and better use of the open space. A community garden, butterfly garden, Farmers Market are some ways we can better use the space.
- Plant more trees, create community gardens, neighborhood walks with police and city officials to identify areas that at risk, address the homeless issue.
- Please build a sound blocking wall east of where I805 closes 15. This would make our community park enjoyable and improve the quality of life for the whole Azalea Park neighborhood.
- Colina Del Sol is a wonderful park, but it needs a dog park. I suggest the corner of 54th and orange. This would leave the east side of the park for families and others who want to picnic and enjoy the open space.
- Given the steep hills of El Cerrito Heights, accessing either El Cajon Boulevard or University Avenue from the center of El Cerrito Heights is most challenging. It is an exhausting walk and nearly impossible during the hot summers. The difference in elevation from University Avenue to El Cajon Boulevard is about 500 feet uphill with a steep grade.

Housing, Density, and Community Impacts

- Reassess the Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) bonus program to address its impact on neighborhoods.
- Support the concept of granny flats but reassess the bonus units.
- Evaluate the impact of multifamily rental unit redevelopment on the availability of affordable for-sale homes.
- Distinguish between affordable for-sale housing and affordable rental housing to create effective policy solutions.
- Conduct a comprehensive assessment of the cumulative impacts of high-density developments over the past four years on traffic, parking, infrastructure, parks, and libraries.
- Address concerns about high-density developments without parking, particularly in overcrowded areas like along Rochester Road and Canterbury Drive.

Data Accuracy and Mapping

- Address inaccuracies in the data on the age of homes, ensuring newer homes are accurately reflected by updating county records.
- Update the mapping of adjacent recreation centers south of El Cajon Boulevard to ensure accuracy.
- Address inaccuracies in population and housing data, including the exclusion of unpermitted flips.
- Verify and clarify the data sources for job and employee counts on the employment center map.
- Update job location markers in Kensington Talmadge.
- Clarify the number of people that work at the City of San Diego Caminito Chollas Facility.
- Concerns about including work-from-home arrangements on the jobs map.

Zoning and Land Use

- Create more flexible zoning regulations to encourage mixed-use developments.
- Allow residential-only projects in commercial or mixed-use areas.
- Euclid and Fairmount remain a point of contention, with auto businesses prohibited by footnotes despite zoning regulations allowing them.

Traffic Safety and Education

• Concerns about roundabout accidents, with some attributing the issue to a lack of understanding on how to navigate them.





Bike Safety

• Concerns about the safety of cyclists in the Monroe Ave. and Aldine Dr. area.

- A shared parking strategy was proposed to optimize parking availability.
- More angled parking spaces were suggested as a potential solution to increase parking capacity.

- Install a median island on Fairmount Avenue, which is currently underutilized.

- Provide a feasibility study and timeline for planned bike facilities and infrastructure projects.

Signage and Community Identity

• Install the City Heights flag signs on the planned roundabout at Highland Avenue.

Parks and Open Space

- Reevaluate and Update Park Rec Value points.
- Identify and repurpose vacant lots to maximize land use efficiency.
- Privately owned open space to be a different color on map because it paints a misleading picture.
- Clarification is needed on whether dedicated open space truly qualifies as open space.
- Allocate \$1 million to Henwood Park for planned improvements.
