### Jobs and Education

During the March Jobs & Education Working Group meeting, Donika Moreno, SDPZ AmeriCorps VISTA Operations Associate, gave a recap of the Promise Zone's 2025 Youth-Led Career Expo. With nearly 200 youth in attendance, 57 vendors (a 43% increase in employer participation), and 44 volunteers, this year's expo provided hands-on career prep, professional headshots, resume reviews, and more. Partners engaged in meaningful discussions in our breakout rooms about strengthening partnerships, expanding student opportunities, and integrating arts and financial literacy to support youth success in the Promise Zone. ### Economic Activity

The March Economic Activity meeting further dove into the CA Jobs First program, but took this opportunity to explore it from the State's point of view. The Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (Go-Biz) presented on the State Economic Blueprint for the Southern Border Region and the industries and endeavors they were looking to invest in. The Working Group also took a moment to further work on its objectives and sub-objectives to better tie them into the overall goal of Increasing Economic Activity. During the upcoming April meeting the working group will finalize their newly redefined objectives.

### Healthy Communities

The March Healthy Communities meeting looked into recent California mandates surrounding combating climate change and how that could be leveraged to meet the working group's goals. The City of San Diego Environmental Services Department presented on how they are implementing California Senate Bill 1383 (SB1383) and its requirement to reduce the amount of organic waste sent to local landfills. One method of reducing organic waste was by establishing an edible food recovery program, which could assist with the Healthy Communities working group's objective to increase access to healthy foods. A second method was composting it. Following the presentation, further discussion was had on how to work organic waste reduction into our current logic model activities, and how it could support our partners involved in food production and tree planting.

### Housing Affordability

The Housing Affordability working group met on March 6 and featured a presentation from Stephanie Murphy, VP of Economic & Workforce development with the San Diego Housing Commission's Achievement Academy. This program offers various resources for career development and financial literacy. The group continued to work on moving forward with the logic model. Topics discussed during the logic model break out rooms included creating an outreach plan and resource guide and providing both to different collaboratives that work within the Promise Zone, as well as continued conversations about eviction prevention resources and ways to make these resources accessible.

## Megan Emme



Advocating for affordable housing has always been a priority for Megan. She started her career in high school as a crisis counselor for the California Youth Crisis Line, and hearing stories of young people facing homelessness helped her understand the critical need for low-barrier affordable housing for all. She carried this passion throughout her higher education efforts, as she studied Urban Studies and Planning at San Francisco State and earned her Master's degree in Public Policy at USC.

During her time as the San Diego Promise Zone's federal liaison, Megan assisted the Promise Zone in navigating federal funding opportunities that could support projects and offered useful feedback related to various Promise Zone activities and measurement of impact. Megan also organized Quarterly Roundtable convenings with the Southern California Promise Zones and local representatives from various federal agencies, creating space for the Promise Zone to share updates on their work and for federal partners to share funding opportunities that may support those goals. Megan played a strong supportive role, helping out where needed and uplifting the voices of others. She was present at many working group meetings and in-person events.

Megan believes the Promise Zone represents the very best of community development, bringing together stakeholders from a wide swath of invested organizations to work together to solve some of the most complex challenges.

At the heart of Megan's work, her mission remains to create change in small communities. She attests that the biggest changes happen at the neighborhood level.

# Fair Housing



## Fair Housing Month

April is National Fair Housing Month! The City of San Diego's Economic Development Department (EDD) administers the City's **"Practice Fair Housing Program"** with U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant funds. The program's goal is to educate San Diegans about their rights to attain housing of their choice, free from discrimination based on race, color, religion, national origin, disability, gender, and other protected classifications.

The Fair Housing Center of the Legal Aid Society of San Diego, Inc. and the City of San Diego are excited to announce **two free virtual educational opportunities** in April to commemorate Fair Housing Month. These workshops will provide an opportunity to explore topics regarding fair housing basics, disability-related protections, source of income protections, new regulations, and more!

The City of San Diego recognizes the vital role that fair housing plays in building strong, thriving communities—as fair housing is not just a legal obligation, it's a cornerstone of community revitalization and a pathway for all residents to create more sustainable neighborhoods. This month is a reminder of the challenges that remain and how communities can continue the effort to break down barriers to economic mobility.

### What is Fair Housing?

Fair housing can be defined as a condition in which individuals of similar income levels in the same housing market have a like range of housing choice available to them regardless of race, color, ancestry, religion, national origin, age, gender, marital status, familial status, source of income, sexual orientation or disability.

### What is Housing Discrimination?

Housing discrimination is unjust or prejudicial treatment of individuals, in the area of housing and real estate, based on the individual's protected class.

# City Spotlight: Bridge to Home

## **BRIDGE TO HOME**

Three new affordable housing projects aimed at helping seniors, veterans and households earning 80% or less of the area median income are moving forward thanks to the City of San Diego's Bridge to Home program--and one of them is located in the Promise Zone!

On March 25, 2025, City Council approved three loans for affordable housing projects that will create a total of 408 affordable homes. **Bridge to Home** provides gap financing to qualified developers to make affordable housing projects a reality. Since 2021, when **Mayor Gloria** launched the Bridge to Home program, it has helped **finance 20 projects with a total of 1,761 affordable homes.**

## **Mercado Apartments**

The loan agreement with the City and the **Metropolitan Area Advisory Committee on Anti-Poverty of San Diego County, Inc. (MAAC)** will support the acquisition and rehabilitation of this existing affordable housing community. Mercado Apartments is located at 2001 Newton Avenue in the Barrio Logan Community Plan Area in Council District 8, within the San Diego Promise Zone, a **Transit Priority Area** and a **San Diego Opportunity Zone**. These apartments are located less than one-quarter mile from transit stops and the Barrio Logan trolley station, with nearby retail, restaurants, grocery, clinic, pharmacy, schools, and park facilities.

The existing Mercado Apartments was constructed in 1994 and includes 24 two-story buildings with 144 one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments available for households earning 30% to 60% of the area median income. MAAC will acquire the

property and improvements from the current financing partnership, demolish two buildings containing 12 units, provide relocation assistance to the tenants, and construct one new four-story building with **92 new affordable one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments**. The existing 132 units in the remaining 22 buildings will be substantially rehabilitated with new interior finishes, appliances, cabinets, fixtures, lighting, doors and windows, as well as new exterior and site improvements. Once completed, Mercado Apartments will have a total of **224 apartments** consisting of 60 one-bedroom units, 80 two-bedroom units, and 84 three-bedroom units for small to large families.

The renovated and refreshed Mercado Apartments will include private balconies, an open courtyard, laundry facilities, bicycle parking and repair shop, a fitness course and play areas, 95 parking spaces, and free app-based local transportation. The existing onsite childcare center, managed by Neighborhood House, will be expanded with a secure outdoor play area and new classrooms. The construction and rehabilitation efforts may be completed **as early as 2028!**

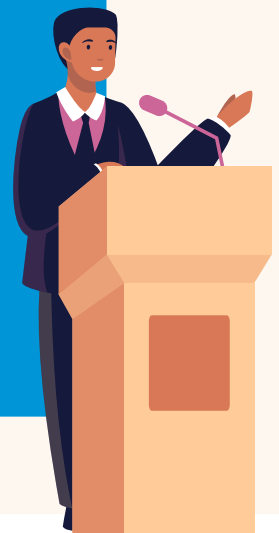

### ABOUT THE PROMISE ZONE

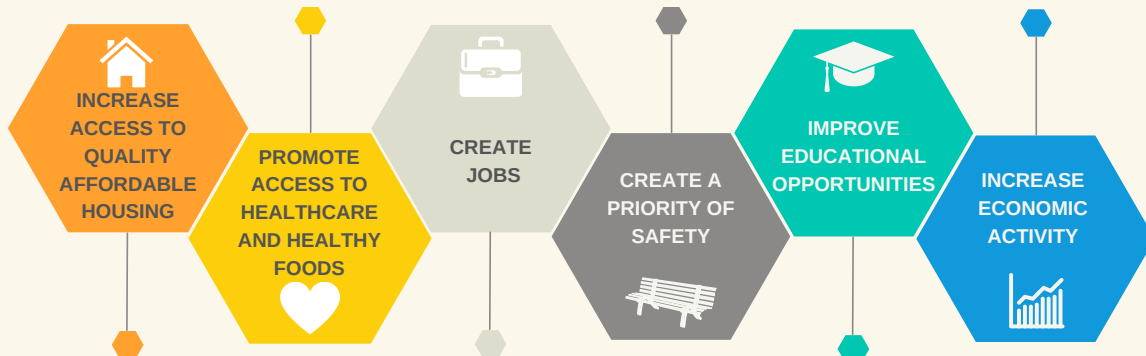
In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the Promise Zone initiative, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2022, the unemployment rate decreased from 14% to 10%, and the poverty rate fell from 35% to 20% (ACS, 2016-22). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the eight years since the designation, targeted efforts from the City and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; however, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
