# <u>Presentation: San Diego Promise Zone – 2025 Youth-led Career Expo (Donika Moreno)</u>

- → **Call to action:** Consider sharing your experience and any observations or reflections from this year's career expo.
- On Tuesday, March 18, the SDPZ hosted our 3rd annual Youth-Led Career Expo. With nearly 200 youth in attendance, 57 vendors (a 43% increase in employer participation), and 44 volunteers. This year's expo provided hands-on career prep, professional headshots, resume reviews, and more. Huge thank you to our sponsors, volunteers, and working group members for making it all possible!
- Tara Ryan shared about how she witnessed the young adult's confidence grow during the mock interviews and expressed interest in offering a similar event to students citywide.
- Amber Weber shared her emotional experience in the Recital Hall, where students tried
  on professional attire for their headshots. She observed a boost in their confidence as
  they felt good about how they looked.

## **Logic Models & Breakout Rooms**

- → **Call to action:** How can your organization support our collective objectives? **Subgroup 1 Objectives:** *Mobilize community partners to develop strategies that increase educational and career support for Opportunity Youth* 
  - **Attendance:** Raquel Aparicio, Donika Moreno, Oscar Silva Andrew Soliz, Ernesto Rivera, Jeff Noyes, Maria Khalifa, Tara Ryan, Ashley Morgan, Alyssa Abellar
  - Raquel emphasized the importance of sharing career fair events across
    organizations/networks to better connect students. She noted the groups ongoing
    challenge in building relationships with school district counselors, which limits our ability
    to share such information widely. She suggested inviting counselors to future working
    group meetings and encouraged members to consider who else should be brought into
    these conversations, as well as how we can better market events to Promise Zone
    students.
  - Raquel also asked the group to consider what resources they can contribute to a toolkit designed to help industries/employers connect with youth in the Promise Zone.
  - As a strategy to highlight opportunities for the youth in the Promise Zone, Donika suggested creating a "Job Board Submission" form for employers to submit job openings, which could be featured in the Promise Zone newsletter. She also reminded the group that about the Promise Zone's "Event Submission" form for partners to share upcoming events in the newsletter.
  - Ernesto (SDCOE) share that they are working to strengthen school-partner relationships by organizing events where educators can visit apprenticeship program sites. This led to the discussion about maintaining sustainable connections with employers who



participate in the career expo. Donika emphasized the importance of following up with these employers post-expo to stay informed about job opportunities. Ernesto added that it would be valuable to have these organizations to present about any opportunities during working group meetings.

**Subgroup 2 Objectives:** Build an infrastructure to help increase the number of students meeting school readiness and grade-level expectations

- Attendance: Sarah Tuakli Cooper, Roosevelt Williams III, Daniel Hamilton, Oscar Silva, Domanic Riley, Vicki Meadows, Giselle Rocha, Juliane Douds, Michael Angelo Camacho, Shayla James, Roberta Sutton
- Vicki shared that starting educational programs in North County is easier compared to the Promise Zone due to less bureaucracy. She emphasized the challenge of getting resources to youth and questioned how to increase buy-in.
- J Douds shared that California now requires financial literacy as a graduation requirement for high school seniors starting in 2030. She represents Junior Achievement, an organization that serves schools where at least 51% qualify for free/reduced lunch, connecting students with mentors to provide hands-on learning and career support. J shared that Junior Achievement works with both large and small partners and helps working students balance school and jobs. Micheal Angelo suggested that J speak at an Economic Activity working group meeting and Domanic offered to coordinate the invitation. Vicki from XplorStem, expressed interest in reconnecting with Junior Achievement, having participated in their programs as a student.
- Michael highlighted that arts often exist in after-school spaces and referenced Elementary Institute of Science as an example. The group then discussed the inclusion of arts in the logic model. Amber mentioned Art Bus Express and Classics4Kids as potential partners.
- Michael also pointed out the lack of educators or education organizations at the meetings.
