Partner Updates

 e3 Civic High - Pathways to Possibilities Career Fair (April 30 from 8:30 am -1:15 pm): e3 Civic High is hosting the Pathways to Possibilities Career Fair, providing high school students the opportunity to explore career options, learn about



- educational pathways, and connect with professionals from multiple industries. Email mwoods@e3civichigh.com for more details.
- Barrio Logan College Institute (BLCI) Opportunity for Impact Fundraiser (April 23 from 6 9 pm): Held at Farmer & Seahorse, this event will raise funds for student scholarships. More information available at blci.org/opportunity-for-impact.
- Youth Will Summer Fellowship (June 14 July 26): This 6-week in-person summer fellowship is open to San Diego residents aged 18-24. 10 fellows will meet every Saturday and receive a \$1,500 stipend. The focus will be on campaigns around post-secondary alternative opportunities. Applications are due April 27.
- **Greater Than Tech San Diego Fundraiser (April 27):** Fundraiser to support students prototyping a space shoe in partnership with e3 Civic High and Equity Space Alliance Association. Funds raised will help students board a zero-gravity flight in Kansas. Event includes wine tours. Purchase tickets here.
- **Urban League of San Diego County Golden Pyramid Scholars Program:** In partnership with Doors of Change, the Urban League is supporting houseless youth through advocacy and services. The Golden Pyramid Scholars Program is also accepting high school applicants.
- California Department of Rehabilitation Youth Leadership Forum (August 4 6): A 3-day program for youth with disabilities aged 16 21 hosted at SDSU. The YLF forum seeks to engage 50 students in leadership and development.
- Workshops for Warriors Gala (May 31 from 5:30 8:30 pm): Join WFW aboard the USS Midway for an evening of celebration and support for veteran training in advanced manufacturing.
- San Diego State University Summer Career Fair (May 28): SDSU's final career fair of the fiscal year. Open to students seeking summer employment and internship opportunities.
- **STEM in Your Neighborhood Initiative:** In collaboration with Fleet Science Center, several organizations are using a National Science Foundation grant to collect stories of STEM in their neighborhood. Promise Zone Updates

- We're Hiring! AmeriCorps VISTA Grants & Research Associate: The Promise Zone has an opening for a full-time Grants & Research Associate VISTA with a projected 1-year term of service beginning on 06/02/2025. Upon completion, the member will be eligible for a Segal AmeriCorps Education Award (up to \$6,895) or a \$1,800 cash stipend. An Operations Associate VISTA position will also open later this month.

<u>Presentation: Goodwill Industries of San Diego (Aron Pritchard, Employment Services Manager)</u>

- → **Call to action:** How can your organization support our collective objectives? Use the insights from the presentation to guide breakout discussions.
- Aron Pritchard, Employment Services Manager from Goodwill Industries of San Diego presented on the employment and training services offered through Goodwill's community employment centers and mobile employment centers.
- Community Employment Centers: Goodwill operates several centers through San Deigo County, including Rosecrans, La Mesa, and Escondido. These centers are open Monday to Friday, mostly from 9 am 4 pm. They offer walk-in and online appointments, job boards with employer postings, and internal job opportunities.
- Job Readiness and Training Programs: Goodwill offers a job readiness program that includes virtual and in-person workshops on conflict management, financial readiness, and resume writing. Participants who complete five classes receive a job readiness



- certificate and a 50% discount on interview attire. Goodwill also offers a 3-month paid training program in retail, transportation, and e-commerce.
- Mobile Employment Centers (RVs): Goodwill uses refurbished RVs to reach remote areas, offering on-site job applications, resume printing, and employer-specific hiring events. There are no eligibility requirements to use the RVs, but space is limited.
- Specialized Support Programs: Goodwill provides targeted services through programs like the Veterans Program. These initiatives focus on individuals with disabilities or barriers to employment, with 58% of Goodwill's 14,000 employees having a disability or similar challenge.
- Goodwill's operations are funded through store revenue, grants, and donations. The
 organization is dedicated to creating employment opportunities for individuals with
 disabilities and those facing other barriers, aiming to help people secure and retain jobs.
- Aron emphasized Goodwill's willingness to partner with community organizations to expand outreach and support. He encouraged collaboration to better address community needs and leverage available resources.

Logic Models & Breakout Rooms

→ **Call to action:** How can your organization support our collective objectives? **Subgroup 1 Objectives:** *Mobilize community partners to develop strategies that increase educational and career support for Opportunity Youth*

- **Attendance:** Raquel Aparicio, Donika Moreno, Domanic Riley, Robert Becerra, Roshawn Brady, Andrew Soliz, Wanda Rogers
- Raquel expressed appreciation for the collaboration seen at the recent Career Expo and emphasized the importance of continued partnership efforts.
- The group discussed best practices for resume building and review. Robert shared his experience with guiding students on writing cover letters, highlighting the challenge of encouraging students to use their own words rather than relying on Al tools. Robert raised concerns about students becoming dependent on Al-generated content.
- The group acknowledged the challenge of preparing students for both academic success and career readiness, emphasizing the need for students to develop critical thinking skills.
- The discussion also covered the current state of remote work. Andrew noted that while remote jobs are available, they are limited. Raquel pointed out that Gen Z values worklife balance, which makes remote work appealing despite its limited availability.

Subgroup 2 Objectives: Build an infrastructure to help increase the number of students meeting school readiness and grade-level expectations

- **Attendance:** Sarah Tuakli Cooper, Roosevelt Williams III, Oscar Silva, Domanic Riley, Vicki Meadows, Giselle Rocha, Melissa Woods, Charles Myers
- The group agreed to broaden the focus beyond Lincoln High School to include all
 Promise Zone high schools. Instead of just inviting schools to participate, they proposed
 offering resources to address the challenges faced by school administrators when
 attending Jobs and Education meetings.
- There was a discussion about the term "school readiness" within the objectives.

 Members pointed out that the term "school readiness" within the objectives lacks clarity



- and suggested replacing it with "social-emotional learning", as this concept better captures the holistic support needed, including housing, emotional, and social wellness.
- Giselle Rocha highlighted the work of SDCYDN in connecting youth with resources, however, she noted that the system remains difficult to navigate and emphasized the importance of collaboration among organizations to reduce the number of youth falling through the gaps.
- The group discussed how to improve partnerships with schools, emphasizing the need to not only invite but actively engage schools by offering tangible resources and support. They acknowledged that expanding the focus to include other Promise Zone schools would better address the needs of a larger youth population.
