#### **Jobs and Education**

The May Jobs and Education meeting included a presentation by Andrew Soliz centered on an overview of SDSU's Career Services and Industry Relations, emphasizing their mission to empower students, community members and industry leaders to create career pathways aligned with today's workforce needs and future possibilities. The group learned that SDSU's Industry Relations department actively builds partnerships with employers to connect them with student talent through services such as career fairs, employer consultations, mentorship and workforce development events. Andrew shared contact details and encouraged sign-ups for SDSU's industry newsletters and social media platforms for ongoing updates. In the breakout rooms, working group members further discussed how their organizations can support through collective objectives.

#### **Economic Activity**

The May Economic Activity meeting featured opportunities for small business owners. The City of San Diego's Purchasing & Contracting Department informed the group about how small businesses can become vendors with the City through its Small Local Business Enterprise (SLBE) program. Neighborhood House Association (NHA) explained how its InnoVisions program helps prepare business owners for the challenge of leading an organization. NHA also mentioned that they had procurement opportunities available for businesses. In the breakout groups, participants added relevant partner activities to the Logic Model. The group will follow up on these activities after the summer Working Group break.

#### Reminder:

No Working Group meetings will occur in June or July. Please keep an eye open for the All-Partner Meeting later this summer!

#### **Healthy Communities**

The May Healthy Communities meeting was an encapsulation of topics the group has worked on throughout the year. The group heard updates from the County of San Diego on the Food Justice Community Action Plan (FJCAP), which was of keen interest to the Healthy Foods objective. The results of the FJCAP will be incorporated into the County's FY 25-26 budget. The group also received an update on the Bike Master Plan that was approved by the City Council as part of the Mobility Master Plan. The information from these two presentations was used to inform the review of current and ongoing activities in the Logic Model. The group will follow up on these activities after the summer Working Group break.

#### **Housing Affordability**

The May Housing Affordability working group heard a presentation from Carrie Tapia regarding the San Diego Housing Commission's First-Time Homebuyer Programs for low- and middle- income families and individuals. They have programs specifically for the City of San Diego but also offer County-wide programs. The breakout groups continued to discuss and add items to the Logic Model. Conversations in the breakout rooms consisted of brainstorming ways to provide housing information such as the First-Time Homebuyer Programs to residents of the Promise Zone. The group also discussed a potential town hall in the fall to provide more resources to the Promise Zone.

#### **Adria Fox**

Adria Fox was born in Chicago but came to San Diego when she was 5 years old. Though she has traveled far and wide, Adria considers San Diego to be "the soil where her purpose took root." Adria attended Kearny and Mt. Carmel High Schools and later went on to earn her BA in Nonprofit Leadership from Springfield College. In her free time Adria enjoys binge watching her favorite TV shows, unwinding at the beach and exploring cultures all around the world.

Currently, Adria is the CEO of <u>C4GS-</u> <u>Zedlife</u>, an organization that seeks to create sustainable, affordable housing



that empowers communities through innovative green technologies. Her organization's efforts have been recognized and supported by significant grants and investments. In addition to being a CEO, Adria also serves as the Promise Zone Housing Affordability working group co-chair, a role that exemplifies her life's work in equity, empowerment and service. In the Promise Zone she saw a disconnect: housing was being treated in isolation, separate from the lived realities and interconnected needs of the residents. But Adria believes in the true meaning of home—a place where futures are not only imagined but operationalized through unity.





#### Who is San Diego Community Power?


If you're enrolled half-time or more, you must also meet at least ONE of the following condit

- Work 20+ hours per week
- · Participate in a federal or state work-study program
- Have a physical or mental disability or condition that prevents you from working
- Care for a young dependent child
- Receive Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
- · Enrolled in college through certain employment & training programs, such as SNAP E&T, Workforce and Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA), and others
- · Participate in an on-the-job training program
- · Be under age 18 or over 49

#### FY25 School Violence Prevention Program



The FY25 School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) provides funding directly to states, units of local government, Indian tribes, and their public agencies to improve security at schools and on school grounds in the recipient's jurisdiction through evidence-based school safety programs. 

# CITY SPOTLIGHT: Community Youth Services Division, SDPD

# During National Safety Month, we're highlighting the San Diego Police Department's Community Youth Services Division.

The Community Youth Services Division works closely with neighborhoods within the Promise Zone to build trust and reduce violence through community events and outreach.

"We view it as building relationships. It's not a one-day thing. We're consistently creating a network of community members, leaders and organizations who want to support the vision of a safer, better community." - Omar Luzuriaga

The Community Youth Services Division is building trust and reducing violence across the Promise Zone through culturally responsive outreach. One of its most impactful initiatives is the Spanish Civilian Academy, held weekly at Bridge Church. Each Tuesday, more than 60 Spanish-speaking residents gather to learn about topics like emergency versus non-emergency calls, narcotics, juvenile law, immigration and the role of law enforcement. The academy does more than educate; it creates space for connection, allowing residents from the Central and Southeastern Divisions to engage with officers in a non-enforcement setting. This helps break down barriers, build relationships and promote safer neighborhoods from within.

Looking ahead, the division is preparing for a summer of proactive safety measures. On June 21, they will host a Gun Buyback Event, offering gift cards in exchange for firearms. Last year, around 150 gift cards were distributed. The goal is to reduce the risk of violence and offer residents a safe way to take preventive action. Through programs like these, the Community Youth Services Division is sending a clear message: they are not just here to respond to calls, they are here to work alongside the community, build trust, and keep neighborhoods safe.

## SAN DIEGO PROMISE ZONE

**OVERVIEW** 



In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the <u>Promise Zone initiative</u>, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2023, the unemployment rate decreased from 14% to 10%, and the poverty rate fell from 35% to 20% (ACS, 2016-22). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the eight years since the designation, targeted efforts from the City and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; however, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.

- Increase access to healthy foods
- Improve access to healthcare
- Support opportunities for active transportation and active living
- Dialogue with residents
- Create environments conducive to learning and working
- Improve infrastructure
- Increase and improve access to capital



- Create and preserve affordable housing
- Support renters, firsttime homebuyers and people without housing
- Cultivate opportunities for career exploration, applied learning and youth leadership
- Create meaningful summer employment experiences for teenagers
- Increase the number of students meeting school readiness and grade-level expectations
- Increase educational and career supports for Opportunity Youth
