7. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

A. Staff Reports

Chief of Airports - Jorge Rubio, A.A.E.

- The Vehicle Gate 5 operator will be installed on 6/12 to bring the gate fully operational.
- Staff has been working with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) since March 2025 on the Surface Awareness Initiative (SAI). The SAI is a \$26 million investment from the FAA to improve the Air Traffic Controller situational awareness on the runway at airports throughout the US. This is expected to be installed withing the next few months.
- There will be several items that will be discussed at the next Airports Advisory Committee, including the Brown Field Master Plan, and several leases.
- Staff is working on the preparation of the office buildings in the business park for the move of over 400 employees. There will be an expected partial move in September 2025.

Montgomery - Gibbs Executive Airport (MYF) – Mr. Charles Broadbent, MYF Airport Manager

- MYF had over 33,000 operations in May of 2025.
- The gate operator for gate 5 at Executive Airpark is scheduled for replacement on 6/13/2025.
- A conditional offer for the vacant Utility Worker II, and Airport Operations Assistant classifications were accepted. Candidates are going through background checks.
- Powerland is conducting a full mow and spray to maintain safety, and infield areas.
- Save the date for the Runway Safety Action Team (RSAT) meeting July 15, 2025, 10am– 12pm the meeting will be held virtually. An invite was sent to users. Reach out to <u>cbroadbent@sandiego.gov</u> if you did not get the zoom invite.

Brown Field Municipal Airport (SDM) – Mr. Andrew Schwartz, SDM Airport Manager

- SDM had 7,713 operations in May and is negligible 0% for this month compared to last year. Total count (Calendar/YTD) 36,395 operations are down 1% compared to the count for the same time last year 36,609.
- Precision Approach Path Indicator's (PAPI) were calibrated per a pilot report on 6-1-2025.
- The 5010 (Master Record) Airport Inspection is scheduled for the week of the 16th of June.
- Soil testing is complete at Pogo Row lots 7310 & 7335.
- Tire collection on site at 7310 & 7335 Pogo Row complete yielded 3,700 tires on site.
- Hazmat clean-up on at junkyard site at 7310 & 7335 Pogo Row has one item remaining.

<u>Airports Lease Administration – Jennifer Bearse, Program Manager</u>

- Construction of Fixed Based Operator (FBO) with San Diego Airpark is underway. Staff will continue to have discussions on development of other parcels.
- Staff is working with the City Attorney's Office (CAO) on legal action against AERO-ABRE related to environmental remediation and underpayment of rent.
- Staff is working on a Lease with San Diego Airpark (SDA) and a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to allow for CBP operations in FBO facilities.
- An MOU for San Diego Fire Station 43 at Brown Field is with the Fire Department for review and approval.
- Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) to exercise option to extend the size of the leasehold. EAA to submit a permit application to Development Services Department (DSD) for construction of additional hangars.
- Staff is working with CBP on MOU for construction of new CBP facility at Brown Field.
- A lease with 94th Aero Squadron for short-term lease renewal for patio/outdoor space is with the CAO for review.
- New lease for San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) for construction of new hangar and facilities is underway. Draft Lease is being reviewed by Airports and CAO.
- Corporate Helicopters lease commenced March 8, 2025. The tenant is still working with DSD to process plans for the proposed development. Staff has submitted the Capital Expense Improvements (CAPEX) application to FAA for the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Staff is also working with Corporate Helicopters on a lease amendment.
- Staff is working with Executive Airpark on draft lease amendment to remove triangularshaped parcel. Draft is being reviewed by tenant.
- Staff is working with Crown Air on new, longer-term agreement for transit ramp parking and an amendment to their lease to provide for financing of the Executive Airpark leasehold. Draft lease is being reviewed by Airports.
- A new lease with Advanced Aircrafts.
- Staff is continuing to draft license agreements for Lot 8A hangars, along with the tiedowns at the terminal ramp and Lot 8A.
- A new lease for Alps Hospitality Group being reviewed by Alps and a consent to Sublease for a solar project at 8110 Aero Dr. Hotel. Negotiations are progress to finalize documents.
- Engineering and Capital Projects (E&CP) will be leasing all vacant spaces at 8525 Gibbs Dr. evaluating building systems and planning the building for occupancy which is estimated for late 2025.
- Transportation and E&CP will be expanding their footprint at 8575 Gibbs and taking the remainder of vacant space in that building. Evaluating building systems and planning the building for occupancy.
- Staff is working on a Request for Proposal (RFP) for Property Management Services for the retail and office buildings. RFP is to be released in July 2025 to qualified companies in the City's pool for Real Estate Services.
- A draft amendment and new lease for existing Lessee (Clown Market) to lease an additional 2,300 sq. ft. and relocate liquor store is being reviewed by CAO. Lessee is to retain existing space for separate ice cream and water business appraisal of the fair rental value for the retail center has been completed. Airports staff is reviewing it.

Subject: Adoption of Brown Field Airport Master Plan and Environmental Impact Report

Overview:

Staff recommends City Council approval of the Brown Field Municipal Airport (SDM) Master Plan, a 20year development roadmap that outlines phased airside and landside improvements, infrastructure upgrades, historic preservation strategies, and a robust redevelopment framework. This plan ensures continued compliance with Federal Aviation Administration design standards, improves airport safety and capacity, and enables significant economic development while respecting the airport's historic character and community setting.

AIRPORTS ADVISORY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION(S) TO CITY COUNCIL:

- A. Adopt a resolution adopting the Brown Field Municipal Airport Master Plan and Preferred Alternative.
- B. Adopt a resolution to certify the Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) for the Brown Field Municipal Airport Master Plan as drafted.

Discussion:

Brown Field Airport Master Plan Overview

Originally established in 1918 as East Field, Brown Field played a critical role in military pilot training during both World Wars. It was renamed after Commander Melville S. Brown, a naval aviator who perished in a crash in 1936. Following World War II, the airport transitioned to public use and was transferred to the City of San Diego in 1962 with the condition that it remain open for public aviation purposes.

Located in the Otay Mesa region of San Diego, Brown Field is one of the two airports owned and operated by the City of San Diego, over the last few decades SDM has evolved into a major general aviation reliever airport, hosting everything from PSA and Lufthansa airline pilot training to U.S. Customs Port of Entry operations, law enforcement aviation units, corporate flights, and military flights. Its proximity to the U.S.–Mexico border and substantial land availability make it uniquely suited to support regional and binational economic and transportation goals. Per the last economic benefit Study, SDM contributed 74 jobs with a total labor income of \$4.17 million and an industry output of \$10.4 million. Brown Field currently supports over 90,000 annual aircraft operations across two runways:

- Runway 8L/26R: 7,972 ft x 150 ft accommodates larger general aviation aircraft and jets.
- Runway 8R/26L: 3,180 ft x 75 ft serves smaller piston aircraft.

The airport features an FAA contract tower, multiple aircraft hangars, apron areas, and a vintage 1960s terminal building. SDM plays a vital role in domestic and international general aviation air traffic management and helps relieve congestion at San Diego International Airport while supporting recreational and business aviation, military operations, cross-border trade, and community- based aviation businesses and non-profits.

The Brown Field Master Plan was developed in alignment with FAA guidance and shaped by community and user input. Its key objectives are to:

- *Enhance airfield safety* and increase operational capacity.
- *Modernize aging infrastructure* to meet current aviation standards.
- Accommodate future demand for general and business aviation.
- Support private redevelopment through compatible land use planning.
- *Preserve historic airport structures* and protect the site's character.
- *Maintain FAA Airport Layout Plan (ALP) compliance* to ensure continued eligibility for federal funding.

As part of the master planning process, three development scenarios were evaluated to determine the most viable path forward:

Alternative 1: No Action (Status Quo)

Maintain existing facilities with only routine maintenance.

- Pros: No capital investment; no construction impacts.
- Cons: Fails to meet FAA standards; infrastructure deterioration; no growth capacity; ineligible for future FAA grants.

Alternative 2: Limited Improvements (Rehabilitation Only)

Rehabilitate runways, taxiways, and lighting; no terminal or development investment.

- Pros: Improves safety with modest funding.
- Cons: Does not accommodate growth or private investment; lacks commercial viability; excludes Customs upgrade.

Alternative 3: Full Build-Out (Preferred Alternative)

Comprehensive upgrades including runway and taxiway improvements, new FBO terminal with U.S. Customs General Aviation Inspection facilities, expanded aircraft parking, hangars, and support infrastructure, adaptive reuse of historic terminal, integration of private development.

- Pros: Meets FAA standards, supports growth, enables private investment, and preserves airport history.
- Cons: Highest cost and requires environmental clearances.

After detailed analysis, Alternative 3 was selected as the Preferred Alternative for its ability to meet long-term operational, financial, and community needs.

Public and User Outreach

Public engagement has been crucial during the master planning process. Starting in late 2017, the City has conducted extensive outreach including hosting public workshops and open houses for Airport Planning Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings as well as providing the public with an opportunity to comment of the Brown Field Airport Master Plan Program Environmental Impact Report (EIR) which ended on April 7, 2025.

This inclusive process allowed the City to gather input from airport users, tenants, neighbors, community organizations, and regional agencies. Public feedback directly influenced the selection of the Preferred Alternative and environmental priorities.

The Master Plan and associated development efforts will be financed through a combination of funding sources. These include FAA Airport Improvement Program (AIP) grants along with private investment such as San Diego Airpark, LLC. Additional support will come from Airport Enterprise Fund revenues and potential state and regional transportation grants. Importantly, approval of the updated Airport Layout Plan (ALP) is required to maintain the airport's eligibility for continued FAA funding.

In conclusion, the Brown Field Master Plan offers a range of significant benefits. It improves overall airport safety, ensures compliance with FAA design standards, and increases operational capacity to support future aviation needs. The plan is expected to attract substantial private investment, creating long-term jobs and stimulating local economic growth. By preserving the historic character of the airport, particularly with the historic airport terminal, it balances modernization with heritage conservation. Additionally, the airport's expanded role in cross-border aviation and logistics will support international connectivity and help reduce congestion at San Diego International Airport.

This action directly supports the City of San Diego Strategic Plan's *Priority Area: Advance Mobility & Infrastructure* by optimizing maintenance, repairs, and associated processes for airport infrastructure. Reducing repair, maintenance, and installation backlogs for runways, taxiway, aprons, airport roads, and other airport infrastructure.

Additionally, this action aligns with the *Priority Area: Foster Regional Prosperity* by strengthening the airport's role as a regional economic driver. It enhances infrastructure to support business, trade, and workforce development, while investing in international trade facilities, job readiness, and economic development programs that attract, retain, and grow businesses in the San Diego region.

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Fiscal Considerations:

The Brown Field Master Plan was developed as a guiding document to implement Airport's Division Airport Capital Improvement Plan (ACIP) for the Airport. The ACIP for the Brown Field Airport consists of \$18.9 million in projects that include rehabilitation and/or reconstruction of runways, taxiways, aprons, and other critical airport infrastructure over the next five years. These projects are expected to be funded by combination of FAA Airport Improvement Grants and the Airports Enterprise Fund. The Airport Improvement Grants cover 95% of eligible expenses and the remaining 5% of expenses of projects will be covered by the Airports Enterprise Fund.

Subject: Proposed Street Parking Configuration at Montgomery – Gibbs Executive Airport.

OVERVIEW:

The City of San Diego, through its Airports Enterprise Fund owns the street system within Montgomery–Gibbs Executive Airport. The Economic Development Department's Airports Division, as the airport operator, intends to designate specific street parking areas to support the parking needs of tenants in the Airport Business Park.

DISCUSSION OF ITEM:

In 2019, the City recaptured several large office buildings and a retail center along Gibbs Drive from a previous tenant. Since then, the offices have been partially occupied. The Airports Division is now ready to fully lease the buildings located at 8525 and 8575 Gibbs Drive.

Full occupancy of these two buildings will require parking for approximately 493 vehicles; however, only 351 on-site parking spaces are currently available. While additional street parking exists along Glenn Curtiss Road, Gibbs Drive, and John J. Montgomery Drive, increased construction activity across the airport has made it more difficult for tenants to reliably find parking.

To address this shortfall and maintain compliance with federal financial sustainability requirements, the airport will begin designating street parking areas for exclusive use by airport tenants and users. Advance notice will be provided to all vehicles that the intended implementation effective date will be September 1, 2025.

Of the existing 229 street parking spaces, 146 will be allocated to support the tenants of 8525 and 8575 Gibbs Drive. The remaining 97 spaces will remain available for general airport users but will now be clearly marked for airport use only. It is worth noting that the Terminal Parking Lot has an additional 141 parking spaces available for general airport users.

Subject: Informational Update on the Airports Division Fiscal Year 2026 User Fees Effective July 1, 2025

OVERVIEW:

On March 3, 2025, the San Diego City Council approved the Citywide Proposed Fiscal Year 2026 User Fees, which include the Proposed Airports User Fees initially presented to the Airports Advisory Committee on October 9, 2024. The Airport User Fees will be implemented in two phases: April 1, 2025 (Attachment 1) and July 1, 2025 (Attachment 2). The City Council's decision also allows for annual adjustments to the User Fees to accommodate increases in the City's service-related costs.

DISCUSSION OF ITEM:

Staff first presented the Proposed Airports User Fees for Fiscal Year 2026 to the Airports Advisory Committee on October 9, 2024. The presentation outlined the regulatory framework for a Comprehensive User Fee Study aimed at benchmarking airport fees with those of other airports within a 100-mile radius.

The User Fee Policy establishes three categories of fees:

- 1. **Category I (Full Recovery):** These fees cover 100% of the cost of providing a service.
- 2. **Category II (Partial Recovery):** These fees recover less than 100% of the cost. This applies when (a) collecting the fee is not cost-effective, (b) another government agency regulates the fee amount, or (c) the fee prioritizes public benefit over full cost recovery (e.g., recreational or senior citizen programs).
- 3. **Category III (Fines, Penalties, and Use of Government Property):** These are fines and penalties intended as deterrents rather than revenue sources (e.g., parking fines or public safety disturbance fines). The cost recovery percentage for these fees may vary and is based on department recommendations.

The Proposed User Fees were reviewed by the City's Budget and Efficiency Committee on February 5, 2025. The Committee voted to approve the Category II and III fees to take effect on April 1, 2025, and the Category I fees to take effect on July 1, 2025. The full list of the Fiscal Year 2026 Airports Proposed User Fees was subsequently presented to and approved by the City
