Meeting Activities and Input

The project team welcomed FDG members and shared the agenda for Meeting #1:

- Concept and scope of the Inclusive Public Engagement Guide
- Guide timeline
- Expectations from group members
- Getting to know each other
- Perspectives on project priorities

FDG Introductions

The project team welcomed FDG members and invited them to share something about themselves in a roundtable discussion. FDG members were also invited to share their experiences in City engagement processes, if applicable.

FDG member responses about themselves included:

- The members' amount of time living in the city of San Diego varied from two to over 15 years.
- Some members work in the mental health field, academic institutions, and higher education.
- Some group members have previously engaged with the City's Homelessness Strategies and Solutions Department, Library Department, City Planning Department, Child and Youth Success Department, previous and current Mayor's Offices, Parks and Recreation Department, previous and current Council District offices, Development Services Department, the Fire Department, and others.

Concept and Scope of the Inclusive Public Engagement Guide

The project team shared the overall purpose of the FDG and participation expectations. They also provided an overview of public engagement and its importance in City decision-making, including examples of how public input shapes City decision-making, the current City organizational structure and ways the City collects public input.

The project team shared the purpose and objectives of the Inclusive Public Engagement Guide including examples of what the Guide will and will not influence as a Citywide engagement tool. For instance, the Guide can inform how the City gets community input on programs, plans, and projects. However, the Guide will not determine courses of action on public health & safety-related issues in critical situations.

FDG Timeline and Schedule

The project team reviewed the project's anticipated engagement timeline, key milestones and what the Guide would cover, including barriers to participation, techniques to increase participation from underrepresented stakeholders, inclusive engagement principles and how to measure engagement success. The project team outlined the FDG candidate selection process, including the evaluation criteria for selecting participants.

FDG Project Priorities

During the roundtable discussions, FDG members were asked what they hoped to achieve in the group and what was most important for them to accomplish through the Inclusive Public Engagement Guide.

FDG member responses included:

- Being able to inform others about the City's work and engagement opportunities.
- Helping to improve the engagement process.
- Providing guidance and recommendations.
- Building transparency and accountability.
- Supporting efforts for more follow-up after engagement processes have concluded.

The project team also informed FDG members that the FDG roster would be shared online and confirmed that members gave their permission to share that information. FDG members were informed of the themes for the next FDG meeting and were asked to complete two take-home assignments (see Appendix) to prepare for the next FDG meeting.

Inclusive Public Engagement Principles

- **Inclusion:** Engagement strategies should account for language differences, income level, digital divide, and other barriers to participation to achieve an accurate representation of the demographics in San Diego.
- **Respect for community knowledge:** Show respect by asking about people's lived experiences. Reduce engagement fatigue by consolidating feedback and collaborating internally. Appreciate the uniqueness of each community.
- **Transparency:** Identify and communicate the level of engagement, and goals we are trying to accomplish. Develop a summary of how input was used and follow up with participants about project status and updates.
- **Clear communication:** Make sure information is accessible and understandable to non-technical experts. This will allow community members to participate effectively and build their capacity to engage.
- Build True Relationships & Partnerships: Establish a process to develop trust through communication. Cultivate respectful and long-term relationships and partnerships with community groups and stakeholders.
- **Commitment to good process:** Develop a process that provides people enough time to weigh in. Prioritize involving community members that are directly impacted by decisions. Commit to continuous improvements for our engagement practices.
