# **Communication from the Public on Non-Agenda Items**

- Kathleen Lippett expressed concerns about the normalization of marijuana consumption in the
  community, citing the lack of balanced reporting on the topic and the potential risks to public
  health. She also raised issues about billboards advertising marijuana and the city's handling of
  homelessness.
- Ramon Uribe from Groundwork requested to be added to the agenda for the next meeting to present an update on the city's bike master plan.

## City, County, and State Representatives' Reports

- Robin Todd Representative for District 79, State Assembly Member Lashae Sharp-Collins introduced herself and encouraged the community to reach out to her office for assistance.
- Kate Needham-Cano Community Representative/Military and Veterans Liaison for Congresswoman Sarah Jacobs shared updates on Congresswoman Jacobs' work, including a bipartisan resolution on proxy voting for new parents and significant funding for the South Bay International wastewater treatment plant.
- Roberto Marin Community Representative for District 9, Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera gave the following updates:
  - o More robust dumpster day initiative to curb illegal dumping
  - o Potential red curbing of parts of Chollas Parkway to discourage big rig parking.
  - University Avenue bikeway project has been delayed due to high bid prices; construction is expected to start in April or May, with the latest being June. Since the updated plan still does not have any trees planned east of College to Aragon, Roberto agreed to re-engage with SANDAG.

o Potential cuts to the library and other community services, with Roberto emphasizing the need for equitable distribution of cuts.

#### **Information and Action Items**

- 1. Recommendation to approve/not approve PRJ-1126463, application for extension of time for Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for construction of phase 2 of the 48-bed Residential Care Facility for drug and alcohol rehabilitation at 4890 67<sup>th</sup> St.
  - The facility, which has been operational since 1993, has experienced project delays and funding issues and has now resolved them, but are requesting an extension to complete the project.
  - Motion to approve by Laura, seconded by Andy. Passed unanimously.
- 2. Update on Trash & Recycling Cost-of-Service Study A representative from Cook + Schmid, consultants for the City of San Diego and representatives from Environmental Services provided an update on Measure B, a cost-of-service study, and their outreach and engagement efforts.
  - Discussed the timeline for the next steps, including presenting the cost-of-service study and fee schedule to the Environment Committee and full City Council.
  - Addressed concerns about the potential impact of the fee on residents, particularly in light of the economic downturn.
  - Discussed the potential for a bulky item pickup fee and the possibility of scheduling appointments for such pickups.
  - Also considering the feasibility of having a central location for hazardous waste disposal and they are exploring satellite locations.
  - Clarified that there would be no fee for replacing damaged cans and that the fee structure would be based on the number of cans used, with a lower fee for smaller trash containers and an additional fee for each additional container.

# **Adoption of Agenda or Agenda Changes**

Lynn Edwards made a motion to add an action item. Groundwork is applying for <u>CalEPA's</u> <u>Environmental Justice Action Grant</u> to support three key initiatives:

- 1. Expansion of our resident empowerment training program
- 2. A restoration project on city-owned parcels along National Avenue in Southeastern San Diego
- 3. Micro-grants (\$5,000/year for community planning groups and \$2,000/year for neighborhood councils) to support community engagement capacity

Bettina Rausa seconded the motion. Changes were approved unanimously.

## **Communication from the Public on Non-Agenda Items**

- Cesar Javier from City Heights discussed a complaint regarding a house at 5238 Streamview Dr., not in the Eastern Area. He claims this house has a ceramics manufacturing business that has been in operation since 1994. He further claims that residents are complaining that this business is in a residential area and is creating negative health impacts on the residents.
- Sarah Hernandez Sarah lives on Streamview Dr. This past Saturday evening a car that was
  not able to properly navigate the roundabout collided into two cars on Streamview. Hernandez
  believes that there is something wrong with the roundabout due to the fact that there have been
  multiple accidents in this same location. She and many other residents would like a review of
  how the roundabout is constructed and would like to find a solution to the problem before
  someone is seriously injured.

## City, County, and State Representatives' Reports

- Bruce Williams Community Representative for Webster and Oak Park, District 4, Councilmember Henry Foster III
  - o The councilmember is making staffing changes and D4 has a new rep., Chandra Clady.

- Laura Riebau asked about the Crossroads Redevelopment account and if funding is available.
- On Thursday the 13<sup>th</sup>, there will be a town hall meeting at Porter Elementary from 6-8pm to talk about the budget.
- Fatima Maciel Community Representative, Office of the Mayor
  - o Council voted to explore long-term shelters in various locations, possibly the old library downtown. The City Council website has an option to see the presentation online.
  - o Parking meter rules are changing. The cost will increase to \$2.50 an hour, possibly to include Sundays and holidays. Meters will be active until 8pm.
  - o Budget priorities can also be view on live stream on the City Council website.
- Karen Montufar-Federico Senior Community Representative for Supervisor Montgomery-Steppe
  - o County issues, reach out to Karen
  - o New beds for outpatient patients with behavioral health conditions
  - o County is starting a development of a healthy San Diego task force
  - o Election is in April; if no decision is made, there will be a general election in June.
  - o Grant funds are available deadline for this fiscal year is April 1st. Workshop will be on zoom see the website for registration.
- Roberto Marin Community Representative for District 9, Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera
  - They removed 7.5 tons of trash from Chollas Parkway. There were 5 live propane tanks found and weed abatement was completed. Everyone who was in the camps is in a shelter right now.
  - o Looking for projects for murals and tree plantings in D9.
  - O University Bikeway is going through a rebidding phase, but the 70 trees are still intact (25 trees are in City Heights; 44 trees are between 54<sup>th</sup> to College, 0 trees between College to Aragon).
  - Chollas Triangle Park should be going in soon and that's the reason for a delay with lighting. Richard asked if Chollas Triangle Park could be expedited.
  - o Roberto will discuss with Andy Field about expediting the park.
- Sam Gonzalez Representative for 39<sup>th</sup> Senate District, State Senator Dr. Akilah Weber Pierson
  - Young Legislation programs for high school students to get them interested in legislation. Applications are due March 1st.
  - Women of the Year nominations due tomorrow.
  - Senior advisory applications open until the end of the month. If you have any questions, you can contact Sam Gonzales.
  - o Bill submissions are due at the end of the month.
  - o If you have questions about bills, you can ask.

#### **Information and Action Items**

- Information: Groundwork presented on two key Chollas Creek Watershed initiatives and wants input from members: 1) the Sunshine-Berardini Field renovation, which will enhance recreation and expand trail connections; 2) the Chollas Creek Bikeway Plan, which was reopened at Groundwork's request for more community feedback after initial input to the city was insufficient.
  - Ozzie Meneses presented a slide show about who Groundwork is and what they do. They want feedback about the Chollas Creek Bikeway Plan and Sunshine-Berardini Field Renovations. Both projects are being led by the City and there has not been a lot of connection from the City with residents that are involved or live in the areas where these projects are planned. Daniele wants to make sure that there is a traffic signal at the entrance of Sunshine-Berardini field.
- Action: Letter of support for Groundwork's application for CalEPS grant. Ozzie commented that Groundwork needs this grant to support ongoing operations of neighborhood councils. Kristen made a motion to approve the letter, Alex seconded. Approved unanimously.
- Action: Going forward after the April election hybrid meetings, maintaining the website, community engagement, etc.

What will happen after Lynn terms out? The hybrid setup will be available for the meetings. The board needs to think about a transition and who will take the lead as Chair.

Kathleen Lippitt commented on the City's changes to the zoning regulations primarily regarding the lack of infrastructure in densely developed areas. She also mentioned concerns about the City's budget deficits.

Lisa Deines asked what, if anything, is being done about the illegal dumping on Streamview Dr. She also asked if anything was being done about the drug and homelessness activity surrounding the liquor store on Redwood St.

#### City, County, and State Representatives' Reports

Mathew Gordon – Community Representative for District 79, State Assembly Member Dr.
LaShae Sharp-Collins: Mathew informed us about two pieces of legislation the Assembly
member is working on: 1) The Working for Families Legislation package consisting of 7 bills
focused on supporting families in need, and 2) AB 766 Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Access
Strategic Plans.

- Roberto Marin Community Representative for District 9, Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera:
  Roberto informed us that the District 9 office, in partnership with the Mayor's office,
  Environmental Services Department (ESD), and Open Space Division cleared Chollas
  Parkway of encampments and brush; with Urban Corp and ESD cleared 7 tons of debris and
  brush; with Parks & Rec's Volunteer Department and Aziz Church of God, 200 volunteers
  removed 2 tons of trash. In total 10 tons were cleared.
  - o Working with the Mayor's office to expedite the red curbing of Chollas Parkway and expects the installation of signs to deter campers and freight truck parking
  - o Hughes Street improvements should begin in mid-to-late March
  - o D9 Office will participate in the Rolando Street Fair
  - o Next month's El Cerrito and Rolando Village neighborhood council meetings will be attended by Molly Weber, Chief of Staff
  - High Fire Severity Zone maps previously excluded Zena Canyon and parts of Chollas
     Creek and the Fire Marshall informed Roberto that once the State reviews the new map,
     they will take a closer look at those areas that need to be included

- Becky Rapp Reported that the Mayor and Council cut the Socially Equitable Cannabis Program out of the budget, allowing money to be spent on more pressing and important community issues. Ms. Rapp also reported on a recent LA Times article entitled *How Dirty is Your Weed?* and said that the article stated that most pot products sold in permitted pot shops are not safe. After testing dozens of products at private labs the Times found that out of 42 products tested 25 had concentrations of pesticides above current state levels.

- Becky Rapp highlighted a San Diego Union Tribune article regarding support by a grand jury to crackdown on the cannabis market.
- Wesley Cooksy discussed his opposition to the proposed conversion of the Rite Aid on El Cajon Blvd in Rolando to a drive-through In and Out Burger. His concerns regard increased traffic and traffic safety in the area that the proposed drive though could bring to the area. He

- suggested the preferred option of a building complex with a diversity of businesses, and no drive-through businesses.

- Roberto Marin Community Representative for City District 9, Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera
  - Chollas Parkway cleanup occurred one week ago in collaboration with various City departments. Upcoming Council agenda item requesting \$4M dollars to repair and replace fencing including Chollas Parkway. Plan to install sturdier fencing, similar to what Caltrans uses.
  - Working with SDPD CRO Josh Cummings on various "hotspots" including 60<sup>th</sup> and Rock Pl to deter unhoused individuals from setting up encampments in the alley and near businesses in the area.
  - Continuing to work on the University Ave Tree Canopy Project with Representative Elo-Rivera and a meeting with stakeholders is forthcoming. Roberto believes that there will now be at least 40 trees planted along University between Aragon Dr and 58<sup>th</sup> St.
  - Vacating Chollas Parkway is still in the works and D9 City Council's policy team will be meeting with Andy Field, Director of Parks & Rec along with other department representatives to create a concrete plan. Storage Connect is scheduled to close near the end of September 2024.
  - In the early stages of planning a carnival on the property of Teen Challenge. The Director, Mike Conway, has offered the space for a fall festival/carnival and resource fair for residents.
- Joshua Dunn, Community Representative for Supervisor Montgomery-Steppe, attending in place of Karen Montufar-Federico, announced that the County D4 office is currently in their grant cycle, due dates for applications are October 1, 2024.
  - o The County Office of Racial Justice is also currently in their grant cycle with a deadline of August 23, 2024.
  - o Joshua also mentioned that they still need to fill remaining vacancies on various County boards and commissions.
- Bruce Williams Community Representative for Webster and Oak Park, City District 4, Councilmember Henry Foster III
  - o Councilmember Foster's office hosted a Get It Done Day on August 13, 2024
  - o Office hours are available on Fridays from 1:30pm to 4:30pm by appointment.

#### **Information and Action Items**

- 1. Action: Review and approve Operating Procedures change for virtual meetings
  - Lynn reviewed recommendations for changes to the committee's virtual meeting
    procedures provided by Marlon Pangilinan, Representative from City Planning for all
    CPC meetings. The proposed change up for review is for the EACPC to allow board
    members to attend meetings virtually, but must attend in person at least once per quarter.
  - o Lynn suggested trying this for a one-year period and then re-evaluating at that time.
  - O Sonia made a motion to approve the proposed Operating Procedures changes for virtual meeting attendance by board members, seconded by Laura. Passed unanimously.
- 2. Action: Review and approve infrastructure priorities for FY26-30
  - O Lynn emphasized the open-ended questions on the six Eastern Area community survey responses and how this information can be used to educate, conduct outreach, and engage residents. Kristen asked if we could ask for both address and email of residents taking the survey next time so that community leaders could reach out to those residents to thank them for participating in the survey, invite them to their respective community council meetings, and other needed follow-up.   - O Based on board questions and comments regarding the number of respondents in each community, Lynn suggested that the next time community CIP priorities surveys are conducted, we consider starting earlier in the planning process in order to have more time to gather responses/data.
