

#### In her words:

#### Reflection

This internship has meant a lot to me. It exposed me to working in local government and a professional office environment. I learned so much from my talented colleagues, both about technical processes like RFPs, procurement, grants, and more – but also about what being a good worker means: practicing professional etiquette, the rules of communicating, and what critical thinking and problem–solving collaboratively really looks like. I'm so grateful to have had this opportunity that will be a stepping stone into my future career. I'm even more grateful to have worked alongside some amazing people who made this experience the best I could have asked for.

#### **Favorite Project**

My favorite project was something I just finished: analyzing the results of our Municipal Childcare Benefit Pilot Program satisfaction survey. I love analyzing surveys because you get to learn what people think about something, kind of like an interview but in a more structured format. I also love crunching the numbers and learning what they reveal about trends, and then creating graphs to display the results. It's a mix of hearing people's perspectives and displaying them in a satisfying way.

#### **Future Plans**

I'm headed back to Denver, Colorado where I'm from to be with my family, spend time outside, and build a meaningful life both in and outside my work. For my career, I love working with data – summarizing it, analyzing it, visualizing it. REALITY CHANGERS gh school seniors, now that school and academics are in full swing, we hope you all have already begun working on your college essays and PIQ's - personal insight questions. Getting an early start on your college essay writing is essential in making sure you submit your college applications in a timely manner.

#### **UC Application (University of California)**

- Where it's used: All 9 UC undergraduate campuses (UC SC, UCLA, UCSD, e.g.)
- **Deadline:** Submit October 1-November 30 (no extensions/exceptions).
- Essays: Personal Insight Questions (PIQs) 8 prompts, answer four (350 words
- **Letters of Recommendation:** Not required (except some special programs).
- **Activities & Awards:** List up to 20 activities, so choose ones with the most impact.

#### **UC Tips & Tricks**

- Start PIQs early; reflect on experiences, don't just list achievements.
- Show depth over breadth -quality of activities matters more than how many.
- Be accurate with grades; UC will verify with your transcript later.
- Use the UC GPA calculator to understand your GPA the way UC counts it (10th-11th grade "a-g"

#### CSU Application (California State University)

- Where it's used: All 23 CSU campuses (e.g., SDSU, Cal State Fullerton, SFSU).
- **Deadline:** Opens October 1, deadline November 30 (some campuses extend).
- Essays: None.
- Letters of Recommendation: None.
- Activities & Awards: Not required.
- Admissions Factors: Primarily GPA (10th–11th grade "a–g" courses). Some campuses are test optional, meaning that SAT/ACT scores are not used.

#### **CSU Tips & Tricks**

- Double-check your campus deadlines—some fill up early (e.g., impacted campuses like SDSU or Long Beach).
- No essays = less time-consuming, but accuracy in coursework entry is critical.
- Use <u>CSU Application Progress</u> or <u>Cal State Apply tutorials</u> for help with the application portal. <u>CSU GPA</u> Calculator | CSU Impacted majors matrix 25-26
- Apply broadly; impacted campuses are highly competitive.

#### <u>Common Application (Common App)</u>

- Where it's used: Over 1,000 colleges nationwide (private and out-of-state schools like Stanford, USC, NYU, Harvard).
- **Deadline:** Varies by school (often November 1 for Early Action/Early Decision, January 1 for Regular Decision)
- Essays: Requires 1 main personal essay (650 words max). Some colleges also have supplemental essays.
- Letters of Recommendation: Most Common App schools require at least 1-2 teacher recommendations + counselor recommendation.
- **Activities & Awards:** Space for 10 activities you can describe role, impact, and achievements.

#### **Common App Tips & Tricks**

- Choose an essay topic that shows your growth, resilience, or unique perspective.
- Manage your recommenders early ask teachers by September/October.
- Track deadlines carefully; each school can have different ones.
- Use the "Activities" section wisely highlight leadership, impact, and commitment.
  - Check for hidden supplemental essays; some schools add them only after you select your major.

## OLD TOWN

Office of Child and Youth Success

Old Town is known as the Birthplace of California and the City of San Diego.
Long ago, the Kumeyaay people lived here in the village of Kosaii, and in 1769 it became home to California's first mission and Presidio. Over time, Old Town grew into a lively community where Mexican Californios, African-American entrepreneurs, Jewish settlers, and Chinese fishing families all left their mark.



Today, Old Town is a fun place to explore history with its colorful shops, museums, and cultural celebrations keeping San Diego's story alive for future generations. A couple of local attractions include the Whaley House (the spookiest home in San Diego), and the African Diaspora Museum and Research Center.



#### Old Town San Diego State Historic Park


This park is on the ancestral land of the First People, the Kumeyaay. Old Town San Diego State Historic Park offers visitors a glimpse at the converging cultures that transformed San Diego from a Kumeyaay village to a Mexican pueblo to an American Settlement.

Free public walking tours are provided daily at 11 a.m & 2 p.m

Museums are open from 10 a.m - 5 p.m



Old Town Trolley Tours offers a fun experience of San Diego's history. Kids ride free the month of October and free admission is provided for SD residents the first two weeks of January.









Located next to Old Town San Diego State Historic Park, the Old Town Transit Center connects buses, trolleys, the Coaster, and Amtrak. Thanks to the Youth Opportunity Pass, riders 18 and under can travel free on MTS and NCTD with a PRONTO card or app.



The Fiesta de Reyes stage provides free musical entertainment every weekend in Old Town!

# FILIPINO AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

Filipino American History Month in October commemorates the first recorded presence of Filipinos in the continental United States in October 18, 1587. Filipinos arrived aboard on the Spanish galleon Nuestra Senora de Esperanza and arrived on Chumash and Obispeño lands (Morro Bay, California). The Filipino American National **Historical Society introduced October as Filipino** American History Month back in 1992. Today, many people in our community celebrate this month by organizing events to raise awareness about the role of Filipino Americans in U.S. history.









San Diego Filipino Cinema is hosting their annual film festival Oct 9th - 12th.

SDCF was founded in 2017, dedicated to highlighting and nurturing Filipino voices and stories. CinEskwela and Cine Libre are two of their programs that aim to initiate storytelling, cinema exposure, appreciation, and education to high school and college-age students to watch films and engage in dialogue with filmmakers. These programs are free for participating students and faculty members to attend.

#### **IF YOU INTERACT WITH ICE AGENTS AT WORK**

- 1. Ask if you are free to leave. If so, you may calmly walk out.
- 2. You have the right to refuse consent to a search.
- 3. You have the right to remain silent. You do not have to discuss your immigration status with anyone, such as about where you were born, whether you are a citizen, or how you entered the country.
- 4. If you have valid immigration documents, you should show them. Never provide fake documents.
- 5. If you are arrested, say that you wish to remain silent until speaking with a lawyer.
- 6. You have the right to record your interaction with immigration agents as long as you do not interfere.

#### IF ICE AGENTS SHOW UP AT YOUR DOOR

- 1. You do not have to open the door. If you do, stay calm-you have rights.
- 2. Ask what they are there for (and ask for an interpreter if you need one).
- 3. If they ask to enter, ask if they have a warrant signed by a judge and if so, ask to see it (through a window or slipped under the door).
- 4. If they do not have a warrant signed by a judge, you may refuse to let them in. Ask them to leave any information at your door.
- 5. If they force their way in, do not resist. Tell everyone in the residence to remain silent.
- 6. If you are arrested, you have the right to remain silent. Do not sign anything until you speak with a lawyer.

#### SI AGENTES DEL ICE LLEGAN A SU LUGAR DE TRABAJO

- 1. Pregunte si se puedemarchar. Deserasí, váyase tranquilamente.
- 2. Tiene derecho a no permitir ser registrado. Diga en voz alta que no permite a que registren sus pertenencias.
- 3. Tiene derecho a permanecer callado. No tiene que compartir su estatus migratorio con nadie, incluyendo dónde nació, si es ciudadano, ni cómo entró el país.
- 4. Si tiene documentos de inmigración válidos, debería mostrarlos. Nunca presente documentos falsos.
- 5. Si es arrestado, puede decir que quiere permanecer en silencio hasta que hable con un abogado.
- 6. Tiene el derecho a grabar su interacción con los agentes de inmigración siempre y cuando no interfiera.

#### SI AGENTES DEL ICE LLEGAN A SU PUERTA

- 1. No abra la puerta, pero mantengalacalma. Tienederechos.
- 2. Tiene derecho a no permitir ser registrado. Diga en voz alta que no permite a que registren sus pertenencias.
- 3. Si piden entrar a su casa, pregúnteles si tienen una orden firmada por un juez y si la tienen, dígales que se la muestren (por la ventana o que la pasen por debajo de la puerta).
- 4. Si ellos no tienen una orden firmada por un juez, puede negarse dejarlos entrar. Pídales que dejen cualquier información en su puerta.
- 5. Si entran a la fuerza, no se resista. Dígale a todos que estén en la casa que permanezcan en silencio.
- 6. Si es arrestado, permanezca en silencio y no firme nada hasta que hable con un abogado.
