


# ANNUAL EVALUATION FOR FY25 CITYWIDE GRANT ACTIVITIES

## **BACKGROUND**


In 2019, the City implemented recommendations from a performance audit of its grant management practices. Since that time, the grants division has built out the Citywide grant management function by developing streamlined processes to strengthen strategic alignment, provide training, facilitate robust internal reviews, share resources and funding opportunities Citywide and improve fiscal accountability.

The FY25 Citywide Grants Report is the City's seventh annual report containing an inventory and analysis of all grant activity from the previous fiscal year. The report serves to provide a comprehensive overview of all Citywide grant activity, with the goal of documenting the City of San Diego's overall grants performance.

## **DIVISION ROLE**

The Government Affairs team works closely with the City's grant-active departments to ensure that submitted grant applications are reviewed and approved by our Deputy Chief Operating Officers, the Department of Finance, and the Mayor. Since the division's creation, it has implemented the following process enhancements:

- Developed an automated approval system for grant applications, which has enhanced interdepartmental coordination and internal controls.
- Streamlined communication with city staff, funders, and stakeholders regarding federal, state, local, and private funding opportunities.
- Designated primary points of contact among departments to provide technical assistance, training, and partnership opportunities with external regional agencies and communitybased organizations.
- Established a grant working group led by the Government Affairs grants division and attended by designees from grant-active departments as a resource for training, best practices, problem-solving and process improvement.



As the City continues building on its grant successes, the City Council approved two additional grant coordinator positions in the FY2022 budget to support operational departments in their pursuit of funding opportunities. These positions were filled in early 2023 and reported to the Office of the Chief Operating Officer. In FY25, these positions were reorganized to fall under the Government Affairs team in the Office of the Mayor, bringing the grants staff to three full-time employees. These roles have proven to be valuable resources to departments as they assist in identifying funding opportunities, selecting competitive projects for submittal and developing and submitting grant applications.

## **OVERVIEW**

The annual Citywide Grants Report tracks grant funding applied by, and awarded to, the City each fiscal year. The City defines grant funding as "monetary funding, equipment, in-kind goods or services, or other assets provided by a granting agency to the City. Grants awarded to the City are funds or products to fund a specific project, activity or program that requires some level of compliance and reporting."

The FY25 report illustrates a departure from the multi-year upward trend in the City's grant awards. The two most evident reasons for this decrease from last year are a reduction in the amount of federal and state community project allocations that the City received, and the end of federal COVID-19 era relief funding. In FY23, the City received nearly \$129 million in community project funding, as compared to FY24 when it received just over \$42 million. In FY25, the City received no direct budget allocations due to the poor fiscal environment reflected in the State's FY 2024-2025 budget and the lack of inclusion of community projects in the federal appropriations process. However, the City's performance on grant applications continues to improve, showing a steep incline with an 80% increase in grant applications over FY24.

While not traditional application-based grant funds, these competitive allocations are secured through Government Affairs' continued advocacy and partnership with our state and federal elected delegations. Their availability is subject to changes in policy, political climate, budgetary conditions and leadership changes in Sacramento and Washington D.C. They are entitled "Community Project Funding" and "State General Fund Specified Grants" and marked in dark blue at the bottom of Attachments 1 and 2.

In addition to the work that Government Affairs does to advocate for direct state and federal grants, the team also coordinates with regional agencies on federal funding opportunities created under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA). The \$1.2 trillion IIJA and \$783 billion IRA represent an unprecedented and historical investment in local infrastructure and climate resiliency through a variety of competitive grant programs for local governments. In their third year of the five-year grant program, the City continues to aggressively pursue the grant opportunities under these programs before their planned expiration in 2026.

To ensure that our region is prepared and well-positioned to compete for these dollars, the Government Affairs team leads a strategic working group consisting of SANDAG, the Port of San Diego, San Diego International Airport, Caltrans, local utility and transit operators, San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce and organized labor to coordinate and support each other's grant applications.

## REORGANIZATION

In 2025, to operationalize efficiencies and create immediate budget savings, the Mayor led efforts to reorganize and consolidate various City functions and departments. As part of this reorganization effort, two grant coordinator positions were re-organized from the Deputy Chief Operating Officer's office to Government Affairs, and Government Affairs was consolidated under the Office of the Mayor. The grants team is comprised of a program manager and two program coordinators who manage the grant review team process, assist departments in finding eligible grant opportunities and assist with the development of their applications.

## PERFORMANCE AUDIT

In FY25, the City Auditor concluded their second performance audit of the grants program to determine if the City of San Diego is competitive in their planning and pursuit of grant funding, and if the City's grant policies and procedures align with industry best practices. The City Auditor noted significant improvements and increased success of the Citywide Grant Program since their first audit in FY18. The City Auditor concluded that since Mayor Gloria has taken office, the Citywide Grant Program has increased its funding awards by 81%, with over a billion dollars received in awards since taking office. However, the City Auditor also concluded that the grant program would benefit from additional budget investment and process improvements.

As part of the City Auditor's recommendations, the Grants Team is developing a Grants Library to store previous grant applications, materials and funder debrief notes, which will be made available Citywide. This will help create a bank of institutional knowledge, promote cross-pollination of project and program opportunities and offer wider access and experience to staff seeking to learn from previous City efforts. Additionally, the Grants Team is developing a framework and protocols for a Citywide Grants Strategic Plan, which will be composed of department-identified goals, priorities, opportunities and capacity. As of September 2025, implementation of the auditor's recommendations is fully underway and is expected to be completed by Q3 2026.

## TRUMP ADMINISTRATION IMPACTS

The change in presidential administration mid-FY25 has resulted in several changes and disruptions to federal grant programs. The changes have included reversals in policy to no longer fund green and sustainable infrastructure, the pause and/or elimination of federal funding opportunities that the City would normally have applied for, the ineligibility of entities with "DEI" policies and issuing executive orders that conflict with existing federal law.

While the City's priority projects and programs have not changed, in response to drastic policy actions by the Trump Administration, the City has adapted to the new administration by developing an informal "Translation Guide" which instructs staff to shift application language to adapt to the change in the federal administration. Additionally, the Government Affairs team is working closely with the City Attorney on navigating the changing ecosystem and maintaining compliance with federal policies and regulations.

## **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

From 2018 to 2024, the vetting and approval of grant applications was managed through a Microsoft SharePoint website, which allowed the creation of staff reports ("GRTs") that were sent to the Grants Review Team, comprised of Department of Finance, Government Affairs, Deputy Chief Operation Officers and the Chief Operating Officer, for review prior to the application's submittal.

To take advantage of operational efficiencies and reporting capabilities, Grants staff lead implementation of conversion of the GRT process from SharePoint to OnBase in FY25. The conversion to OnBase resulted in a net positive experience for grants-active staff, who benefit from the consolidation of systems processes by not having to route items through multiple software applications. The transition was seamless, as grants-active staff already had pre-existing proficiency in the OnBase system, and routing documentation through OnBase allowed originators to route GRTs to other internal department staff and department directors for the first time. For compliance tracking and reporting, the Grants Team now generates weekly status reports for City leadership that outline each grant application at various stages of its development.

Each year, the Grants Team hosts a quarterly meeting for grants-active staff called the Grants Working Group (GWG). This year, staff led four GWG meetings with 21 different grants-active departments and an average of around 60 attendees. The GWG covered a variety of topics, such as training on grants application requirements, grants compliance issues, annual report numbers, the FY25 performance audit and subsequent actions, and hosted the City Attorney to discuss changing grant requirements in light of Trump Administration executive orders.

In addition to letters of support for the City's own grant applications, the Grants Team also produced letters of support from the Mayor to over a dozen external agency grant applications. Utilizing the City's support for other governmental agencies and community-based organization's grant applications is one way that we leverage our collective efforts to bring more grant dollars and investments to the San Diego region.



## LOOKING AHEAD

As part of the audit recommendations, the Grants Team would benefit from additional resources to support Citywide grant efforts. Currently, the Grants Team allocates approximately 50% of staff time toward the research and vetting of grant Notices of Funding Opportunity to match available funding with existing or planned City projects and programs. This year, over 200 different grants were vetted. Other department staff also perform their own research and vetting of opportunities, resulting in duplicative efforts and significant amounts of City resources spent finding appropriate and eligible grants. If the City were to subscribe to a grant-research service (e.g., Euna Grants) at an estimated \$150,000 per year, it would free up staff time that could be better spent on application development and managing active grants, resulting in savings of staff time.

Further, the City Auditor recommended, and the Grants Team agrees, that the City would benefit from having an as-needed grant writing contract to supplement staff in preparing grant applications. A budget allocation of \$250,000 for a grant writing contract could provide more capacity and supplement staff expertise. This funding is estimated to support the development of five to seven additional grant applications.

The need for additional revenues to support application matching fund requirements remains the biggest inhibitor to long-term growth and success in the City's grants program. For the City to develop competitive projects to put forward in the current landscape, significantly more work will need to be done with departments to build a pipeline of competitive capital projects that have been vetted, developed and paired with matching funds that can compete with other municipalities at the State and Federal levels.

## FY25 CITYWIDE GRANT ACTIVITY

It is important to note that many awards contained in this report were applied for in or before FY 2025, and we include multi-year grant disbursements every year until the end of their grant terms.


#### **APPLICATIONS**

In FY 2025, the City submitted a total of **111 grant applications valued at \$ 598,953,201**, compared with 120 applications valued at \$332,773,853 in FY 2024.

#### **AWARDS**

In FY 2024, the City received a total **of 36 awards valued at \$164,168,103**, compared to 82 awards valued at \$204,049,437 in FY 2024.

FY21 - FY25 CITYWIDE GRANTS




#### **AWARDS BY TYPE**

51% of the FY 2025 awards were noncompetitive (formula-based) awards, while the remaining 49% came from competitive grant programs.

#### AWARDS BY SOURCE

The City's FY 2025 grant awards consisted of 78% State funding, 21% Federal funding, and only .07% came from local and private sources.
