In the event that any planning group meeting is willfully interrupted by a person or group of persons, so as to make the orderly conduct of the meeting infeasible, the planning group may first cause removal of the individual or individuals. If that is unsuccessful then the planning group may order the meeting room cleared and continue in session on scheduled agenda items without an audience, except that representatives of the media shall be allowed to remain. Public workshops and outreach have occurred; project life-cycle includes public hearings and environmental review. Community members should monitor project pages and upcoming public comment opportunities.

Pending policies, legislation and regulatory changes (summary)

Below are selected statewide and local policies (2025) that either have recently changed or are pending and could affect housing, urban development, environment, and public safety in our community. This is not exhaustive but highlights items of immediate relevance to residents and stakeholders.

• California Statewide Special Election (Nov 4, 2025) — while this election is primarily for a redistricting ballot measure, redistricting outcomes can indirectly affect representation and policy priorities. Key dates: ballots mailed beginning Oct 6, 2025; ballot drop-off locations open Oct 7, 2025; last day to register Oct 20, 2025. (Source: CA Secretary of State)

CA Secretary of State — Nov 4, 2025 Statewide Special Election

• State housing reforms — Governor Newsom signed a set of housing reforms and budget actions in mid-2025 intended to accelerate housing production (including targeted CEQA exemptions and incentives for housing near infrastructure). These reforms may change review timelines and increase state-level pressure to allow higher-density housing near transit. Local implementation and specific effects vary by city.

Governor Newsom — housing reforms (June 30, 2025)

SB 79 (2025) — 'Abundant and Affordable Homes Near Transit Act' (author: Sen. Scott Wiener)
a state-level bill aiming to ease construction of multi-family housing near major transit hubs.

Provisions and implementation details could influence zoning and density allowances in transit-adjacent parts of the city. Monitor City/County responses for local implementation rules.

Coverage: SB 79 (reporting)

• Local ADU policy changes (San Diego City Council): In 2025 the City Council began revisiting/rolling back an ADU bonus program that allowed multiple accessory dwelling units on larger lots. Changes at the city level could affect homeowners' ability to add granny flats or rental units on single-family lots.

Axios coverage — San Diego ADU policy changes (Mar 2025)

 California housing bills under consideration (examples): SB 838 (housing accountability definition changes), AB 130 / SB 131 (updates to major housing statutes). These bills can alter procedural rules and timelines for housing projects — affecting how the City and County process developments in our communities.

SB 838 analysis (Assembly Housing & Community Development)

BB&K summary — AB 130 & SB 131 (July 2025)

Public safety & environmental topics affecting our area

- Stormwater and flood risk / Jamacha Waterway Revitalization improvements to stormwater infrastructure reduce neighborhood flooding risk and improve water quality; public input phases and environmental review are key opportunities for community influence. (See project coverage link above.)
- Fire safety & emergency preparedness proximity to brush and hills suggests continued emphasis on vegetation management, defensible space, evacuation planning and coordination with San Diego Fire-Rescue. Monitor City and County public safety budget hearings for staffing and equipment allocations.
- Infrastructure funding (water/sewer rates): City budget deliberations and proposed water/sewer rate changes can affect household costs and municipal investment priorities. Example: City Council discussion/delay on water rates in late October 2025.

Axios — City Council delays water rate vote (Oct 2025)

How policy changes affect homeowners and renters (brief)

• Homeowners: zoning/density changes, ADU policy adjustments, and infrastructure fees can affect property values, tax burdens, and opportunities to create rental units. CEQA exemptions and state incentives may make it easier for developers to propose nearby multi-family projects.

• Renters: increased housing production can relieve pressure on rents long term but may also bring short-term construction impacts. Tenant protections in state bills (and local ordinances) are important — watch for any county or city tenant protection measures proposed in 2025.

Calls to action (what residents can do now)

- 1) Attend the Skyline-Paradise Hills CPG meeting (2nd Tuesday, 6:00 PM) bring concerns about specific projects, ask for agenda items, and sign up for meeting updates. City posting of the agenda is a courtesy, so please check the CPG Facebook page and our legal posting at the meeting location.
- 2) Monitor and testify at City Planning Commission and City Council hearings for projects that affect our neighborhoods (development proposals, street changes, zoning adjustments). Use eComment or attend in person. Link to Planning Commission calendar above.
- 3) Register to vote and watch the Nov 4, 2025 Special Election schedule important for representation and broader state-level policy. Last day to register: Oct 20, 2025. See CA SOS link above.
- 4) Subscribe to agendas and ask staff to notify the CPG of major project filings: contact the City Community Planner (Natalie Koski-Karell) and Program Manager (Coby Tomlins).
- 5) Engage on local projects like the Jamacha Waterway project submit public comments during CEQA and design review windows. Citizens' input shapes project outcomes and mitigations.
- 6) Citywide Public Engagement Guide
 This guide provides City staff with resources for implementing inclusive public outreach and engagement so that more perspectives can be included in the City's decisions: https://www.sandiego.gov/engagement/overview. It is being made public so that you can understand how the City invites public input and how to actively participate in shaping City decisions. Share your feedback by using the "Provide feedback" form on the top right of each page or email engagement@sandiego.gov.

This public review period will remain open until Oct. 19, 2025. The City Planning Department anticipates presenting the Guide as an informational item to the City Council Rules Committee this fall 2025. https://www.sandiego.gov/engagement

Call to Order

Vice Chair Martin called the meeting to order at 18:00 hours.

Approval of Agenda and Minutes

- Member Preuss made a motion to approve the agenda with the addition of an agenda item from Member Houston to the Voting Members Report regarding Land Development Code updates. Member Tomaras seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- Member Tomaras motioned to approve minutes from the August 12, 2025 meeting. Member Houston seconded. Members Tomaras, Houston, Jenkins, Martin, and Montoya approved. Members Preuss and English abstained.

Non-Agenda Public Comment

• Community member Larry Young discussed an annual community clean-up event being held on September 20 from 8:00-noon that meets at the Skyline Hills Library.

Representative Reports

- Bruce Williams (City Council District 4) provided the following information:
 - Use Get It Done to inform City staff of issues.
 - Member English noted that the app only allows 1 pothole per address. He also brought up a Get It Done issue that he submitted recently regarding a delay in the traffic lights to get on the freeway at Parkside.
 - o Councilmember Foster meets with constituents on Fridays from 1:30-4:30 p.m. Stephanie Sanchez can set up the meeting and can be reached at 619-236-6644.
 - o Encanto Southern Baptist Church is having a dumpster day on September 20 from 9:00noon.
 - Community members can earn money by driving for Southeastern Connect/SANDAG.
 - o The protest form for water rate increases is due by September 30.
 - o A Hispanic Heritage Social Mixer is occurring on September 17 from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at Festival Park.

- o Budget wins in District 4 include funding for Marie Widman Memorial Park, Oak Park Library, infrastructure improvements, and others.
- Mariah Jameson (County District 4) provided information about a virtual grant workshop that will be held on Thursday, September 11. Community and neighborhood grant applications are due on September 30.
 - O Member Houston asked about the Board of Supervisors connection to the San Diego County Water Authority (SDCWA) regarding the City water rate increases. Ms. Jameson did not know about the connection to the SDCWA, but said that Supervisor Montgomery Steppe would look into the water rate increases if she gets complaints from the public.
- Representative for Senator Weber Pierson (Senate District 39) provided the following information:
 - Breaking the Sickle Cell Silence webinar will be held virtually on September 16 from 5:30-7:00 p.m.
 - Community Town Hall will be held on October 16 from 6:00-7:30 p.m. at Crawford High School.
 - o The Young Legislators Program for 2025-2026 is starting up in October.

Community Planners Committee Report

• The August meeting was cancelled.

Chair's Report

- Chair Jenkins put together a report with live links to a number of relevant items. The report will be included with the meeting minutes. She will try to finish this report in time to send out with the agenda every month going forward.
- The City Parks and Recreation Department has launched a Community Recreation Needs Assessment. Phase 1 includes District 4. The survey is due by February 28, 2026.
- Chair Jenkins reached out to the City about the Jamacha Drainage Channel Upgrade Project (PRJ-1138503) and said there is no action for the CPG right now. The City will be engaging the public early next year.
 - Member Houston requested a site visit to prepare for the CPG's recommendation. Chair Jenkins will make this request to the City.

Voting Member's Report

- Member Houston received an email from the City on August 5 regarding 142 land development code changes. He believes that the CPG should look at these changes and provide feedback to the Community Planners Committee (CPC). Member Preuss said he can push the feedback through the CPC once he gets a copy of the changes. Member Houston will provide Member Preuss with a hard-copy of the changes. Public workshops will be scheduled in the fall.
 - Member Houston recommended a subcommittee to review the changes. He asked that Chair Jenkins check with Marlon Pangilinan about whether one can be formed as there have been questions brought up by community members about their validity.
 - Member Houston made a motion for a subcommittee to be formed to review the proposed changes and provide input to the CPC once a response is received from Marlon Pangilinan. Member Preuss seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

- Member Houston made a motion to revisit this topic at the next meeting. Member Preuss seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- Member Preuss will push his agenda item recapping the ULI UrbanPlan Workshop to later this fall.

Informational Items

• None were received.

Action Items

Review and submit protest letter to the City regarding water rate increases

It was discussed that the increase is made up of pass-through costs from SDWCA and costs for the Pure Water Project (i.e., sewer water recycling). It was noted that energy requirements for recycling water are high. If energy prices increase, then the cost to recycle water will increase, leading to more increases in water rates.

Member Houston noted that the City's cost of service report was deficient and inconsistent but could not find a hook in the report that could be added to the protest letter. It was noted that there are questions about the City's use of water. Chair Jenkins will reach out to the City to have the Water Department make a presentation.

Member Preuss made a motion to approve the letter as written, but cc' Supervisor Montgomery Steppe. Member Montoya seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Determine date for next subcommittee meeting to reconcile CPG By-laws and Operating Procedures

Chair Jenkins will reach out to subcommittee members to schedule the next meeting. No action was taken.

Urban Planning & Land Use

• **Coastal Resilience Master Plan (CRMP):** Provides a roadmap for adapting to sea-level rise, flooding, and erosion. While focused on coastal areas, it informs citywide planning priorities, including emergency preparedness and infrastructure funding that could indirectly affect Skyline–Paradise Hills

• Land Development Code (LDC) 2025 Update: City released new drafts that include zoning, permitting, and community input changes. These rules shape how developments in Skyline–Paradise Hills proceed, especially regarding density, design, and community review.

Housing – ADUs and Density

• Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs): Small, independent housing units built on the same lot as a primary residence. Ordinance *O-21989* aligns city law with *AB 1033*, allowing condo sales of ADUs. For Skyline–Paradise Hills, this may create opportunities for multigenerational families or small-scale affordable housing.

Impact on Community Members: Homeowners gain new housing options (ADUs); Neighborhoods and communities will likely see higher rates of residential density that may impact quality of life or community character as well as create additional strains on public infrastructure and municipal resources. renters may see increased availability of units; builders face new compliance costs; and residents benefit from stronger fire and flood protections.

Environment & Resilience

• **Fire Hazard Severity Zones (FHSZ):** *0-21992* adopts updated state wildfire risk maps. While Skyline–Paradise Hills is more urbanized, nearby canyons and green spaces could see stricter building codes and vegetation management rules.

• **Stormwater Compliance**: From Oct 1, builders must implement erosion control. This reduces neighborhood flooding, sediment buildup, and pollution downstream.

Public Safety

• Updated fire hazard designations affect access/egress standards for developments and may influence insurance costs for homeowners.

Planning Department 2026 Work Program Available

The work program includes ongoing work and new planning initiatives that provide an actionable roadmap toward an equitable and sustainable future with affordable homes, good jobs, infrastructure and public spaces.

• New Residential Waste Policy

The Environmental Services Department (ESD) will soon implement a series of updates to trash services, including transitioning eligible households to City-provided trash collection. Additionally, ESD will work with property owners whose current eligibility status does not align with the requirements outlined in the Waste Management Regulation and the municipal code following the passage of Measure B.

Select your new trash and recycling containers, and confirm or update your organics containers by Sept. 30, 2025. Log into the portal.

County of San Diego — Key Updates

• Board of Supervisors (BOS)

Meeting: Sept 9 (General) and Sept 10 (Land Use) at 9:00 AM. Policies on housing, transportation, and land use may shape funding for community projects. Details: https://www.sdcounty.ca.gov/bos/calendar.html

• **Wildfire & Hazard Mitigation**: County implementing updated Fire Hazard Severity Zones. For Skyline–Paradise Hills, wildfire evacuation planning and county support services may expand.

Impact on Community Members: Residents could face stricter construction standards for additions or remodels. Countywide hazard planning also improves emergency preparedness.

State of California — Key Updates

Prop 50 - Special Election

California's Proposition 50, a legislatively referred constitutional amendment, will be on the ballot during a statewide special election on November 4, 2025. The proposition would authorize the use of new congressional district maps passed by the state legislature, in response to what is described as partisan redistricting in other states.

About Proposition 50

- **Purpose**: The measure, also referred to as the "Election Rigging Response Act," was proposed in response to new congressional district maps passed in Texas in August 2025. The new Texas maps were seen by supporters of Prop 50 as a "power grab" by Republicans.
- Redistricting authority:
 - Current law: The California Citizens Redistricting Commission is responsible for redrawing district boundaries every 10 years following the national census.
 - Proposed change: Proposition 50 would temporarily override the commission's authority regarding congressional districts. If passed, it would require the state to use the district boundaries adopted in Assembly Bill 604 for congressional elections from 2026 through 2030. The Citizens Redistricting Commission would resume its duties in 2031.
- **Special election**: The special election was officially called on August 21, 2025, when Governor Gavin Newsom signed the legislation.

Key election dates

- **Election Day**: November 4, 2025
- **Voter registration deadline**: October 20, 2025
- Vote-by-mail ballot mailing: Begins October 6, 2025
- **Vote center early in-person voting**: Begins October 25, 2025
- **SB 35 and SB 423**: State laws that streamline housing approval if cities fail to meet housing goals. *SB* **423** extends *SB* **35** with additional requirements. For San Diego, if housing goals aren't met, new housing projects in Skyline–Paradise Hills may be eligible for faster approval, reducing community oversight but accelerating housing supply.

• **AB 1033**: Authorizes local governments to allow separate sale of ADUs. San Diego adopted this locally, opening new opportunities for homeownership.

• State law requires cities to adopt and enforce updated wildfire risk maps. Even urban communities may see stricter codes due to proximity to open space.

- Community Planning Group (CPG): Advisory input for community members attend meetings and subcommittees.
- Brown Act: Ensures transparency and public participation in all CPG meetings.
