

# Inclusive Public Engagement Guide Summary of Changes

November 2025

#### Introduction

The Inclusive Public Engagement Guide (Engagement Guide) provides City staff with best practices for implementing inclusive public outreach and engagement so that more perspectives can be included in the City's decisions. The Draft Engagement Guide was published online on Sept. 10, 2025 and its public review period remained open until Oct. 19, 2025. Each webpage of the Engagement Guide included a comment form where users could share suggestions for changes to that page's content. In addition, three workshops were held during September and October 2025 (two in-person and one virtual) to share information about the Engagement Guide and gather detailed feedback on barriers to participation and effective engagement techniques.

This document summarizes the themes of the public input received and explains how that input was incorporated into the current version of the Engagement Guide.

## History and Background of Public Participation

Public input specific to the <u>History and Background of Public Participation</u> section is summarized below.

Members of the public shared feedback expressing confusion about the term "charrette," so the page's content was merged with Workshops, and references to charrettes throughout the Guide were revised to say "design-focused workshop".

Engagement events should be interesting for participants of all ages	The initial draft of the Guide included tip sheets with interactive approaches to engagement, and information on how to facilitate engagement events for participants of all ages on the following pages:  • Engaging with Children and Youth  • Game-based Approaches  • Participation Support  • Facilitation of Engagement Events
Establish a community ambassador program	The Framework for Improvement section in the Guide's <u>staff report</u> includes a recommendation to strengthen engagement with underrepresented groups by establishing a Community Connectors program. Community Connectors would serve as liaisons between the City and communities to advise on and conduct public engagement.
Provide a central location for information on public participation opportunities and project updates	The Framework for Improvement section in the Guide's <u>staff report</u> includes a recommendation to provide information on public participation opportunities in an online centralized hub. The hub could help the public stay up to date with opportunities to provide input by creating a single place to find information.
Use text messaging services to share information	The Framework for Improvement section in the Guide's <u>staff report</u> includes a recommendation to use two-way text messaging services to send community members project updates or opportunities to share input with the City. This can be an effective way to reach people because most households in the city of San Diego have access to a smartphone.

Provide civic education to understand how to engage with the City	The Framework for Improvement section in the Guide's <u>staff report</u> includes a recommendation to create additional civic education opportunities that build the public's capacity to engage effectively. Civic education can help the public understand how the City works and provide more relevant and informed input to the City.
Increase staff presence in communities	The Framework for Improvement section in the Guide's <u>staff report</u> includes a recommendation to seek funding opportunities to expand staffing and resources for public outreach and engagement.
Concern and feedback on effectiveness of past City engagement processes	Several comments were received regarding the effectiveness of past City engagement processes. In 2021, the Inclusive Public Engagement Guide was identified as an implementation action in the Parks Master Plan and Climate Resilient SD Plan, both of which called for consistent and inclusive public engagement practices across the City. The aim of developing, publishing and implementing the Guide is to enhance previous engagement processes and better serve the public by involving more voices in City decision-making.
Make public engagement guidance mandatory	Several comments were received for City policies and processes to "require" certain items for engagement. The Guide is not required by law and does not affect other applicable federal, state or local requirements. The Guide was developed as a resource to support City departments in engaging the public in effective and inclusive ways but does not require specific actions. Requirements are addressed separately through regulations.
Guide usability	Several comments were received about preferring the Guide to be formatted as a single PDF document. While the Guide was intentionally formatted as a living document on the City's website that can be updated as any needs to refine are identified, a PDF document was created for the City Council Rules Committee informational item and will be made available for download on the Guide website.
