Foster, Ill. Dorene Dias Pesta came with her dog Brady came to represent the issue and ask for the support from the board. Jamacha lost its identity and was illegally merged with Lomita. #### 9-23-25 CPC Meeting Notes

**Public comment:** 

**College Area resident**; requested participation at the planning commission meeting on Oct. 9<sup>th</sup>. when their community plan will be addressed. They're very concerned that density is being crammed in with no parks or infrastructure to support it. The planning group and community members proposed a 2 story zoning area in the Cerrito Square neighborhood.

**Becky Rapp**: introduced a loophole in the SD Smoke Free Multi-unit affordable housing policy. All affordable housing should be deemed smoke-free- equitable housing.

Tonight I wanted to share something that I recently shared with the Land Use and Housing committee. There's a serious public health concern with San Diego's smoke-free housing protections.

HUD requires all public housing to be 100% smoke-free, protecting children, seniors, and residents with health conditions from exposure to secondhand smoke. However, if an affordable housing project is privately or corporately owned—even when it benefits from public resources such as Section 8 vouchers or local housing funds—that rule does not apply.

Skyline Apartments in Rancho Bernardo is one such example. It is a privately owned affordable housing project that accepts housing subsidies, but because it is not owned or managed by the Housing Commission, the HUD smoke-free protections do not apply. This means that low-income families living there may still be exposed to secondhand smoke in their homes, simply because of who owns the property. Two families with the same income, living in subsidized housing, are treated unequally when it comes to health protections.

This is critical as San Diego prioritizes affordable housing across the city. We're seeing a significant uptick in projects, virtually in every planning group area. It is not fair that public dollars can support housing where children and vulnerable populations are still subjected to toxic secondhand smoke.

I bring this to your attention as affordable housing projects in your planning group areas may be at risk, as is ours, and I suggest you speak to your councilmember or representative, and urge them to acknowledge the loophole and suggest adopting a policy requiring all projects that receive affordable housing funds—public or private—to be designated smokefree.

## Item #3 – LDC Ad Hoc Committee 2025

Ad Hoc committee was created to discuss the Land Development Code 2025 as it will come before CPC at the end of the year. Voting will most likely be next year.

## Item #4 - Inclusive Public Engagement Guild

City staff presented on the updated public engagement guild. The guild can be viewed at <a href="www.sandiego.gov/engagement">www.sandiego.gov/engagement</a> - One good question raised was regarding the training of city employees. The public engagement plan appears promising on paper, but how will it be effectively implemented and enforced? The city said they're working on that with the HR department.

## Item #5 – Association for the city of La Jolla

La Jolla is in the process of creating cityhood. It's a community-driven campaign, and they've raised \$66,000 to pay for a financial analysis for staff time to determine if the community qualifies. LATCO approved. The ballot measure is to come forward in 2028. Total costs by the end of the process will total anywhere between 1 and 4 million.

## Item #6 – College Area Community Plan Update

The planning group was proactive and came up with the "7 Visions Plan". Together, they proposed a detailed community plan update to the city, in which they included increasing density by 137%.

They were ignored by the planning department. Yes, the planning department held community engagement meetings and public input was gathered, but they would not acknowledge the "7 visions plan" nor any of the community feedback. They collected the feedback but didn't integrate it into their proposal.

They proposed increasing density by over 300%. 6-7 story buildings in residential areas and no plan for infrastructure improvements. Police, fire, recreation centers, or parks.

Only 9% of College Ares's park requirement has been met. This community is considered low-resource, yet the planning department doesn't care.

This is concerning as it's a blueprint for other upcoming community plans. They pleaded for all to come to the Planning Commission in October and help support their community.

A Motion was made by CPC – they looked at this situation as an opportunity to unify and send a message that infrastructure needs must be met prior to increasing density.

# Item #7 – Digital Billboards

Digital Billboards are being proposed by the mayor, potentially changing every 4 seconds. San Diego's original signage policy was the strongest in the nation, and billboards weren't allowed. Over the years, the ordinance has been weakened. John Flynn, former city Planner, is a concerned resident and would like to push back on the mayor's proposal.

Item #8 – Reports to CPC

City Planner reports – RB was awarded grant funding from SANDAG and will be moving forward with the community plan update.
