- #M04 It is further motioned whereas Commissioner Julie Legaspi also served on the County of San Diego Human Relations Board that the City of San Diego Human Relations Commission recommends that a day be established and set-aside as Commissioner Julie Legaspi Day in the County of San Diego. Not discussed.

#### Item 6: Presentation on Immigration and Custom Enforcement Raids

Carmen Chavez, JD – San Diego La Raza – Executive Director of Casa Cornelia Law Center (CCLC). Ms. Chavez gave the Commission insight into the horror and trauma of individuals and families being faced throughout the San Diego Region by Homeland Security, and the Immigration and Custom Enforcement Agency. Ms. Chavez shared the stories of people being arrested after coming out Immigration Court, kids who parent/s were taken. People who are so scared and traumatized they don't want to leave their homes.

The Commission thanked Ms. Chavez for the work that she is presently doing, and, off to support her and families ooin as we work through this crisis together.

Item 7: Summary of State Legislative Bills being monitor by the HRC for recommendations to the Mayor and City Council and supporting letters.

Commissioners Dr. S. Brown and Vice Chair R. Brown

Commissioner Dr. Sara Brown opened the brief by talking about SB627. However, the Chair stated to his dissatisfaction with the executive director because he had told him to put Senate bill 627 on the agenda and it wasn't

there. Because he was following someone else's direction and he is the chair. The chair said, I'm going to meet with the deputy chief of staff and we're gonna get this straight oh oh he listens to.

The executive director try to intervene end the conversation to explain it to the Commissioners. The secretary was having a side conversation to explain it also to commissioners that the brown act required that that may be placed on the agenda in order to discuss it If it is not on the agenda it cannot be discussed. There were several people speaking at once. The executive director call for point of order To explain to the Commission what was happening with SB 627 and why it was not on the agenda. At that time the chair and the secretary we're talking and their voices were carried over the mic. Commissioner Duncan asked the chair and the secretary and the Commission as a whole for point of order.

Commissioner Duncan explained that he would like to hear what the executive director had to say, and he asked the chair and the secretary to stop talking so he could hear what the executive director had to say. The chair and the secretary kept talking over the executive director. Commissioner Duncan expressed his dissatisfaction with the behavior of the chair and the secretary. Commissioner Duncan said, and I quote come my time is valuable and I take out time to come here if you are not going to stop talking to allow the executive director to be heard that I'm going to leave. The chair in the secretary both kept talking. Commissioner Duncan proceeded to collect his gear and then leave the council chambers. The room became quiet. At that point commissioner Jones made a statement in regards to the behavior that have been displayed. He asked the question is this the way that we model the behavior that we wish to see. He said if I am correct, it can't be.

Commissioner S. Brown continue on to discuss or mention the other assembly bills the Senate bills for recommendation of support letters. The Commission conducted a roll call vote. The vote was 6 Yea and 2 Abstained and one commissioner recused herself. In accordance with the Senior Deputy City Attorney who worked on the Commission's Bylaws the vote would need to be 8 Yea to pass.

**(A). AB 449 (Jackson)** – Combatting Hate in California\* Creates and implements statewide and regional radio, social media, and television campaigns to discourage discrimination based upon, but not limited to, disability, gender, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation – and, ensures the advertisements are

proportional to the communities most impacted as reported under the AG's annual hate crimes report.

**AB 822 (Elhawary)** – Commission on State of Hate\* Extends the sunset repeal date of the existing Commission on State of Hate – which has undertaken significant work to analyze and address hate crimes and hate incidents in California.

**AB 785 (Sharp-Collins)** – would create the Community Violence Interdiction Grant Program and fund community-driven solutions to decrease violence in neighborhoods and schools.

**AB 413 (Fong)** – Requires the Housing and Community Development Department to translate any services and guidelines into the top five languages other than English spoken in the homes of Californians.

**SB 15 (Blakespear)** – Requires more detailed records to be kept of guns for sale and greater scrutiny of gun dealers providing high numbers of firearms for criminal activity.

Nonprofit Security Grants. Newsom's budget: \$76 million to 347 community groups and nonprofit organizations to protect them from hate-motivated violence.

**AB 715 (Zbur and Addis)** – the language is being finalized but the bill intends to strengthen protections against discrimination, including antisemitism, in K-12 education, including protections against instruction and activity that promotes discrimination.

(B). The following California Legislative Bills pertain to Gun Violence brought forth by Vice Chair Rickie Brown

**SB 704** Commencing on July 1, 2026, this bill would, except as specified, prohibit the sale or transfer of a firearm barrel, as defined, unless the transaction is completed in person by a licensed firearms dealer. The bill would require the licensed firearms dealer to conduct a background check of the purchaser or transferee and to record specified information pertaining to the transaction, including

the date of the sale or transfer. The bill would make a violation of these provisions punishable as a misdemeanor.

**SB 248** This Senate Bill focuses on informing new firearm owners about gun ownership responsibilities and resources. Specifically, it mandates the California Department of Justice to mail a letter to new firearm purchasers or those who notify the department of a firearm transaction. This letter will include information on secure storage, basic gun laws, the risks of gun ownership, how to legally transfer or relinquish a firearm, and resources related to gun violence restraining orders, suicide prevention, and domestic violence.

**AB 1316** This bill would revise the definition of “psychiatric emergency medical condition” to make that definition applicable regardless of whether the patient is voluntary, or is involuntarily detained for assessment, evaluation, and crisis intervention, or placement for evaluation and treatment, under prescribed circumstances. The bill would make conforming and clarifying changes to provisions requiring facilities to provide that treatment. By expanding the definition of a crime with respect to those facilities, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

**AB 1187** This bill would require an applicant for a firearm safety certificate, on or after July 1, 2027, to complete a training course no less than 8 hours in length.

#### Item 8: Hate Crimes Reports      Dr. G. Brown

ED Brown told them that he had met with CAHRO Board and the reason why they are keeping the board down to a minimal number of people to join was due to obtaining quorum requirements. This the reason why cities like San Diego and Los Angeles are not allowed to have multiple number of people.
