STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend to the City of San Diego (City) Commission for Arts and Culture (Commission) that Cultural Affairs approve the temporary exhibit titled *Bird Rock Monument* consisting of two sculptures by artist Carl Glowienke for temporary exhibition installed in the median on La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets.

SUMMARY:

Cultural Affairs staff has received a temporary exhibit application for an artwork from the Bird Rock Community Council (Applicant). The Applicant is proposing an artwork by Lakeside-based artist Carl Glowienke. The artwork is comprised of two colorized bronze sculptures depicting pelicans that are perched on natural boulders, that also include bronze plaques that inscribe “Bird Rock”. The artwork is proposed for a temporary, five-year exhibition, with subsequent 5-year exhibition periods at the City’s discretion, in the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets. Staff evaluated the application utilizing criteria contained in the *City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture Department Instruction – Collection Management Policy for the Civic Art Collection*. The results of the staff’s analysis include:

RE: ARTWORK CRITERIA

Public Safety: If the artwork is installed properly within the proposed locations of the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets (i.e., City approved methods and materials safe for the public) it is unlikely to pose hazards or threats to public safety or public health and/or are unlikely to pose a potential liability for the City in any other way.

Cost: The Applicant would be solely responsible for funding the exhibit. This includes, but is not limited to, insurance, permitting, site preparation, transportation,

installation, maintenance, repair, restoration, conservation, deinstallation, removal, site restoration and clean-up.

Availability of Resources: Cultural Affairs staff is available to provide administrative services to the Applicant to process the temporary exhibit application. The City's Development Services Department charges fees to issue Right Of Way permits and execute an encroachment maintenance and removal agreement.

Relevance: The artwork would provide an aesthetic and cultural experience for residents and visitors to Bird Rock and activate and enhance the surrounding areas. The placement of the artwork in the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets serves to balance urbanization and development with humanizing elements. The artwork may stimulate discussion and the exchange of ideas about art and the neighborhood due to the highly visible locations.

Excellence: The proposed installation exemplifies an acceptable level of artistic merit and high quality of workmanship.

Significance: The artwork will serve to welcome motorists and pedestrians to the central commercial corridor of the Bird Rock neighborhood at its northern and southern boundaries along La Jolla Boulevard. The pelican is the official symbol of the Bird Rock Community, as stated by the Bird Rock Community Council.

Condition: Not applicable.

Maintenance: The Applicant will be responsible for maintenance, conservation, restoration, and repair of the artwork for the duration of the exhibit period.

Security: The City is patrolled by the San Diego Police Department. Vandalism in the form of tagging occurs from time to time.

Relationship to Site: The artwork is to be sited in the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets. Because La Jolla Boulevard is the main commercial thoroughfare through the Bird Rock Neighborhood, the artwork would serve to further activate the La Jolla Boulevard, the Bird Rock neighborhood, and nearby attractions.

Legal and Ethical Considerations: If the exhibit is authorized, it will be formalized in an encroachment maintenance and removal agreement between the Applicant and the City. The artist has provided a royalty-free license to reproduce images of the artwork for non-commercial purposes and waiver of rights conferred under the Visual Artists Rights Act and California Art Preservation Act.

Timing: If the exhibit is authorized, the Applicant will be responsible for proposing a date for installation and commencing work in compliance with the agreement/permit between the Applicant and the City.

Selection Process for the Artist: The artist and site were chosen based on the bequest received by the Applicant from Bird Rock community member Pat Bender.

Community Feedback: The exhibit has been developed over several years with substantial input and support from the Bird Rock community via the Bird Rock Community Council. A significant portion of the funding for the exhibit has been provided by individual donations from Bird Rock community members.

Restrictions: Not applicable.

Commemorative Significance: Not applicable.

Fair Exchange: Not applicable.

Fair Purchase Price: Not applicable.

RE: SITE SELECTION CRITERIA

Ownership: The median in La Jolla Boulevard in Bird Rock is in the public right-of-way.

Public Safety: If the artwork is installed properly within the proposed locations of the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets (i.e., City approved methods and materials safe for the public) it is unlikely to pose hazards or threats to public safety or public health and/or are unlikely to pose a potential liability for the City in any other way.

Security: The City is patrolled by the San Diego Police Department. Vandalism in the form of tagging occurs from time to time.

Maintenance: The median in La Jolla Boulevard is maintained by the City's Steet Division. The Applicant will be responsible for maintenance, conservation, restoration, and repair of the artwork for the duration of the exhibit period.

Accessibility: Not Applicable.

Context: The artwork is to be sited in the median of La Jolla Boulevard at Camina De La Costa and Colima Streets. Because La Jolla Boulevard is the main commercial thoroughfare through the Bird Rock Neighborhood, the artwork would serve to further activate the La Jolla Boulevard, the Bird Rock neighborhood, and nearby attractions.

Support of City Departments: Cultural Affairs staff consulted with relevant City departments to confirm eligibility for the proposed site and will route the exhibit proposal with the analysis and recommendation from the Commission to relevant City departments for any additional feedback and recommendations about the proposal.

Community Support: The exhibit has been developed over several years with substantial input and support from the Bird Rock community via the Bird Rock Community Council. A significant portion of the funding for the exhibit has been provided by individual donations from Bird Rock community members.

Adherence to Relevant Plans: The City adheres to existing community plans and land use plans, such as the City's General Plan.

Evaluation criteria the Public Art Committee (PAC) will use to decide whether to recommend to the Commission authorization of the proposed exhibit may include all or some of those given in the *City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture Department Instruction - Collection Management Policy for the Civic Art Collection*.

Cultural Affairs will consider the recommendation from City staff, the Public Art Committee, the Commission, and any other pertinent stakeholders before making the final decision on whether to authorize the proposed exhibit.

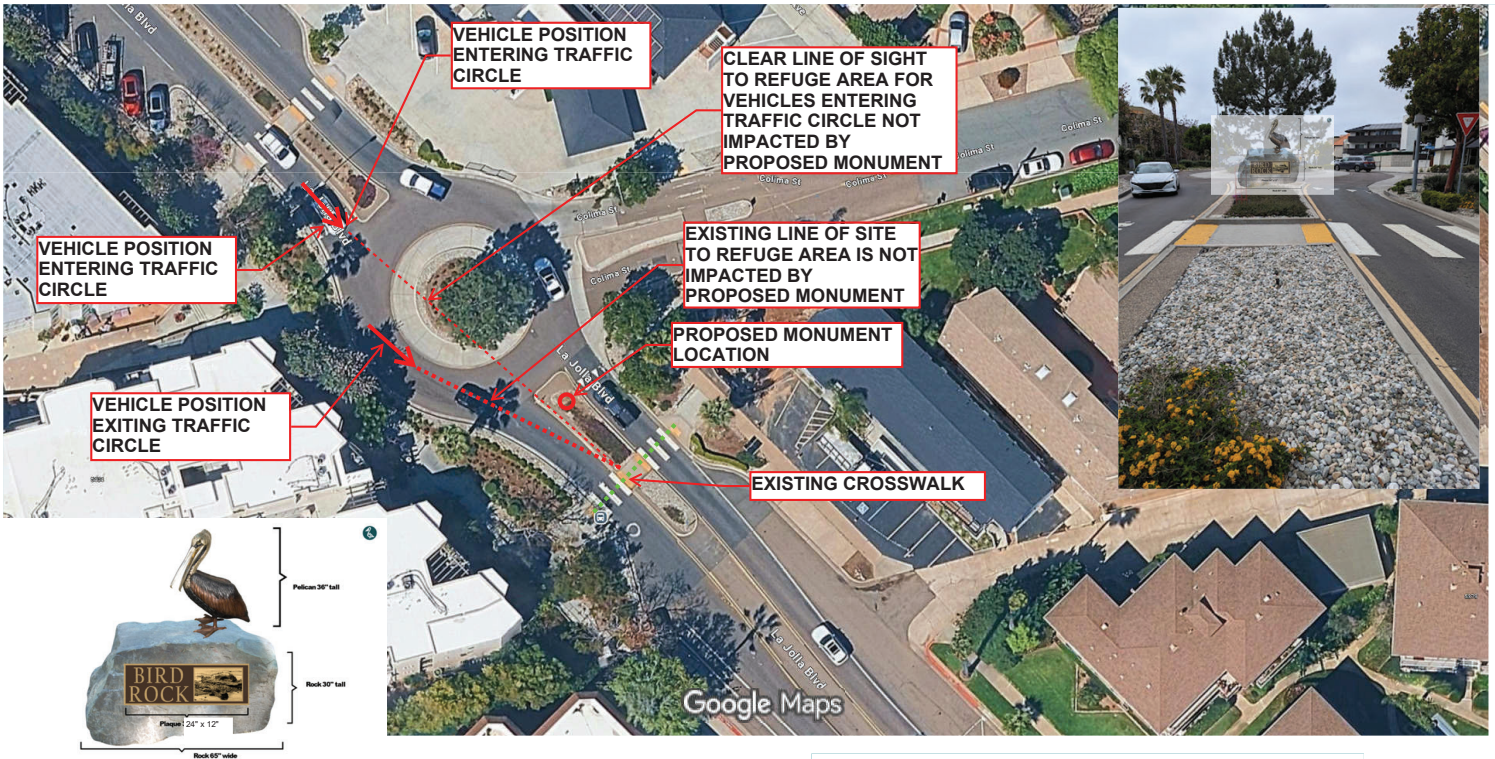
Should this exhibit be authorized for temporary installation, the Applicant will be responsible for all costs.

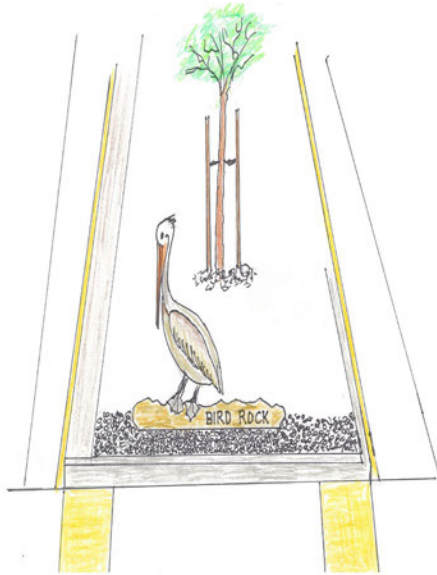
2. Description of the proposed artwork including its significance to the site and community:

A bronze statue of a California brown pelican will be on a flat rock in the median of La Jolla Blvd. at each end of the Bird Rock commercial district. Bird Rock is the name of the rock in the ocean off the end of Bird Rock Ave. and pelicans are often seen on that rock. Our community was named after that rock and the pelican has become a symbol of the Bird Rock community. Therefore, having a rock with a pelican is an appropriate monument to have at the north and south entrances to the Bird Rock commercial district.

3. Any evidence of community support for the proposal, this may include but is not limited to letters, testimonials, and/or other relevant contextual information:

The sources of the funds for the project and discussions at BRCC Board meetings, BRCC Community meetings and Bird Rock Merchants Group meetings demonstrate broad support for this project. The BRCC has included funds for this project in its Maintenance Assessment District (MAD) budgets for three fiscal years and it has supported adding a budget line item for maintenances for the monuments once they have been installed. In addition, the BRCC received \$25,000 for the statues from a donor-advised fund sponsored by Vanguard Charities.

4. Rendering of the proposed artwork, preferably in situ with images of site, including anticipated materials and dimensions:



The anticipated materials are Bronze, Stainless Steel, (in the legs) and stone. The pelican would be approximately 36" H x 24" L x 16" D and the rock would be approximately 12" H x 54" W x 24" D.

The monuments would be in the medians of La Jolla Blvd. One would be south of the Colima Street roundabout and one would north of the Camino de la Costa roundabout. At each site, the monument would be just past the ped xing shown in the following photos.
