## Fiscal Year 2027 Draft Annual Action Plan

### Public Comments

The City will consider all comments and views expressed by residents, public agencies, and other interested parties, whether submitted in writing or provided orally during public meetings. For each Five-Year Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plan, CAPER, substantial amendment, or Citizen Participation Plan submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the City will provide an attachment containing all written communications received and a summary of each oral comment made during the applicable 30-day public review period. This attachment will also include the City's responses and any reasons for non-action when applicable. All information will be made available to the public as part of the final document.

The following questions and comments were received during the 30-day public review period for the Draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 Annual Action Plan. Where appropriate, staff responses have been provided. The Draft FY 2027 Annual Action Plan was available through the City's website, City library locations, and the following publications: *Daily Transcript*, *Voice and Viewpoint*, and *El Latino*. The public was invited to submit comments via email to [cdbg@sandiego.gov](mailto:cdbg@sandiego.gov), or to provide oral comments during one of three public meetings: the April 8, 2026 Consolidated Plan Advisory Board (CPAB) Meeting, the April 16, 2026 Economic Development & Intergovernmental Relations Committee Meeting, and the April 21, 2026 San Diego City Council Hearing.

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**ORAL COMMENTS**

The following are the oral comments provided during the Consolidated Plan Advisory Board meeting, the Economic Development & Intergovernmental Relations Meeting and the San Diego City Council meeting, for the Draft FY 2027 Annual Action Plan. Where warranted, staff responses are included.

**APRIL 8, 2026 – CONSOLIDATED PLAN ADVISORY BOARD MEETING (CPAB)**

**CPAB Member Dr. Abena Bradford**

- Bradford inquired about the start of the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) and its alignment with the CDBG NOFA timeline.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Collin Miller, Senior Vice President, Real Estate Development, explained that SDHC uses PlanetBids to solicit developer proposals. SDHC aims to align its NOFA process with the CDBG timeline. Applications are reviewed by an internal panel. NOFAs are typically released between August and October, with application deadlines occurring approximately one to three months after the release.
- Bradford asked if CPAB board members could participate in the NOFA review panel.
  - *Staff Response:* Michele Marano, Assistant Deputy Director, shared that the City has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the SD Housing Commission to administer the HOME and ESG funds.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Miller noted that the participation of CPAB members

would require SDHC Board authorization, given that the review process is internal to the agency.

**CPAB Member Nick Gulino**

- Gulino asked about the source of program income referenced in the presentation.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Liliana Caracoza, Housing Program Analyst explained that program income is generated from loan repayments associated with single-family loan programs. These funds supplement HOME program allocations and may be used for eligible activities, including single-family and multifamily development, rental assistance, and first-time homebuyer down payment assistance.
- Gulino asked whether administrative funds were capped at 20% and requested additional clarification on the NOFA cycle.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Miller confirmed that administrative funds administered by the SDHC were capped for HOME, ESG, and CDBG projects. Additionally, Miller described the developer hiring process under the HOME program, including the PlanetBids posting and subsequent application scoring. Miller shared that after the submission period closes, applications are reviewed and scored by evaluation panels, like the Economic Development Department's CDBG NOFA process. Applications must meet baseline requirements and include all requested documentation; incomplete applications are deemed ineligible. Projects are ranked by score (200 points total), and funding is awarded to the highest-ranked proposals until available funds are exhausted.
  - *Staff Response:* Hassoun confirmed that administrative costs are capped at 20% of the total CDBG allocation and include the cost of administering projects.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Caracoza added that administrative costs for the HOME program are capped at 10% of the total allocation, of which 60% is used by the San Diego Housing Commission for program administration, and the remaining 40% is allocated to the City's administration costs
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Miller confirmed that no administrative fees were used for the developers contracted for these projects.
- Gulino asked how many homeowners are expected to benefit from the HOME, First-Time Homebuyer program allocation of \$378,000.
  - *SDHC Staff Response:* Sujata Raman, Vice President of Single-Family Housing Finance, noted that five (5) households are projected to be served with the \$378,000 allocation. Raman shared that the average loan for first-time buyers is estimated at \$70,000 - \$80,000. The program is also expected to provide down payment assistance of up to

19% of the home purchase price.

*The CPAB voted to approve the Draft FY 2027 Action Plan (6-0-1).*

**APRIL 16, 2026 – ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE**

**Stephanie Ortega, CEO of Promises2Kids**

- Ortega shared that Promises2Kids annually provides vital services to current and former foster youth throughout San Diego. This request supports the renovation of its Mission Valley facility, which will expand access to comprehensive supportive services. These include case management, educational assistance, employment services, childcare, basic needs pantry, therapeutic counseling, and space for community meetings. The new campus will allow Promises2Kids to serve additional foster youth across the region, increasing accessibility to essential resources. By offering a centralized, supportive environment, the organization provides critical community support for young people who have experienced abuse and neglect, creating a place for healing, stability, and a pathway toward self-sufficiency.

**Rhody Soria, CEO of Urban Corps of San Diego**

- Soria shared that Urban Corps of San Diego County is a certified local conservation corps whose mission is to provide young adults with the tools to expand their career opportunities through education, life skills training and paid work experience on projects that benefit our communities. The program serves approximately 200 resilient, disadvantaged youth each year, offering a second chance to earn a high school diploma and receive vocational training. Participants also contribute directly to the community through efforts such as cleaning homeless encampments, supporting recycling programs, and helping improve the City's infrastructure. Critical campus improvements are needed to sustain this mission. This includes replacing approximately 165,000 square feet of damaged roof and ensuring classrooms provide a safe, secure learning environment. These upgrades are essential to maintaining a safe place where young people can grow, learn, and transform their futures. Lastly, Soria thanked the Committee for its support.

**Angie Mascena, Engagement Dev., Logan Heights CDC**

- Mascena shared that she is a resident and representative of Logan Heights CDC. She highlighted the organization's long-standing commitment of over 30 years to strengthening individuals, families, and businesses in the Logan Heights community. Mascena shared that CDBG funding plays a critical role in supporting small, emerging entrepreneurs through the organization's Micro-Enterprise and entrepreneurship programs. These initiatives help participants turn business ideas into reality while also providing stability for participants' families. Mascena noted that La Toya, a recipient of the program, is expected to share her personal testimony about her experience in the Logan Heights

CDC Micro-Enterprise program during today's meeting. Additionally, Mascena noted that participants benefit from business training, access to capital, and grant opportunities that are otherwise difficult to obtain. CDBG funding is essential for communities like Logan Heights, where underserved residents depend on community-based programs to achieve economic success. Lastly, Mascena urged continued support for CDBG funding and the maintenance of economic development investments in the Annual Action Plan.

**Jennifer Gilmore, CEO of Kitchens for Good**

- Gilmore shared that the proposed funding would support economic mobility for low- to moderate-income entrepreneurs. The organization is dedicated to transforming lives, particularly for apprentices who have experienced hardship and face barriers to employment, by providing technical training and essential workplace skills for careers in the hospitality industry. Additionally, the project would establish the first Culinary Impact Center, offering affordable kitchen space and an accelerator program for entrepreneurs. With one in six jobs in San Diego tied to the food industry, the need for accessible kitchen space is significant, as rates typically start at approximately \$40 per hour. This program would provide subsidized kitchen access for income-qualified entrepreneurs, align with HUD priorities, and strengthen the local community.

**Hassan Abdirahman, Director of Economic Development, Somali Family Services**

- Abdirahman shared that, for 25 years, Somali Family Services has empowered immigrants, refugees, and underserved communities in San Diego through programs that advance health, education, economic opportunity, and leadership. He expressed strong support for the proposed FY 2027 Annual Action Plan, which recommends organizations and projects for CDBG funding. Additionally, Abdirahman emphasized that small businesses benefit from microenterprise programs funded by CDBG, which provide technical assistance and one-on-one support that lead to job creation. He also noted that CDBG funds are often leveraged with matching resources, increasing their impact and investment in San Diego's workforce. These programs serve unemployed and underemployed individuals, helping them achieve self-sufficiency. Abdirahman urged continued support for CDBG funding in FY 2027 and thanked the Committee for its time.

**La Toya McCalvin, founder of Movement Matters Collective**

- McCalvin shared that five years ago, she participated in the LEAP Microenterprise Program at Logan Heights CDC, where she gained access to capital, mentorship, training, and ongoing support. Through this experience, she built a successful health and wellness business that now gives back to the community. McCalvin reported that in 2025, Movement Matters Collective provided over 30,000 free services, including Pilates, yoga, meditation, and other wellness services. In 2025, the business employed four instructors at above minimum wage, and many of its vendors are fellow LEAP program alumni. It also attracts clients from outside San Diego, contributing to the local

economy. McCalvin expressed support for continued CDBG funding and investment in underserved communities.

**Joyce Sunyata (Virtual attendance)**

- Sunyata mentioned that she reviewed the EOC (Equal Opportunity Contracting) Program Evaluation, which indicates compliance with Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) requirements. However, she noted that it is unclear whether this compliance is currently in effect and which agency is responsible for monitoring and enforcement. She also requested clarification on the City's role in monitoring EOC activities, including the reported \$16 Million in Compliance and Field Reviews and \$16 Million in Capacity Building and Regional Programs. Additionally, Sunyata asked for information on when the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program is set to expire. With respect to the Draft FY 2027 Annual Action Plan (AAP), Sunyata recommended the following for transparency and completeness. She noted that page 14 should include a detailed funding matrix, as it currently does not specify the amount of CDBG set-aside funding or the required match for prevention activities. She also observed that page 18, which references 59 HOME-assisted households, does not include the associated funding amounts. Sunyata recommended that the City provide a comprehensive matrix aligned with HUD reporting standards that includes detailed funding allocations and supporting information.
  - *Written Staff Response for AAP Inclusion: The City confirms that Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) compliance is currently in effect and actively enforced for contracts. The City's Purchasing & Contracting Department, specifically the Equal Opportunity Contracting (EOC) unit, is the primary entity responsible for this oversight. Regarding the figures referenced, the approximately \$16 million represents the total estimated cost of the specific actions and programs identified within the AAP. These funds are subject to the monitoring and enforcement standards set forth in the City's EEO Outreach Program (San Diego Ordinance No. 18173, Municipal Code Sections 22.2701 through 22.2708) and the Non-Discrimination in Contracting Ordinance (San Diego Municipal Code Sections 22.3501 through 22.3517) Additionally, the ESG allocation for FY 2027 is allocated for use in the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2027. Finally, the City acknowledges the request for a more detailed funding matrix within the FY 2027 Annual Action Plan (AAP). The current format of the AAP follows the standardized templates required for HUD submission.*

**Marcy Roke, CEO of Traveler's Aid Society of San Diego (Virtual attendance)**

- Roke shared that she represented Traveler's Aid Society of San Diego, has been a federally recognized nonprofit since March 1942. The program Senior Solutions has served over 2,000 extremely low-income older adults to receive regular rides for necessary medical appointments, cancer treatments, dialysis, radiation, grocery shopping and social outings. The program also provides transportation to survivors of domestic violence. So far, the program has provided 2,700 one-way trips to seniors.

**Blair Beekman (Virtual attendance)**

- Beekman thanked EDD staff and the individuals who provided public comments. Beekman expressed support for continued collaboration with HUD in the coming years to better serve the community and acknowledged the importance of strong partnerships with federal agencies, wishing the EDD staff success in their efforts.

**Becky Wrappe (Virtual attendance)**

- Wrappe commented that the AAP was an opportunity for the City to include programs that protect residents from secondhand smoke exposure. She stated that HUD requires smoke-free policies in public housing and emphasized that secondhand smoke contributes to asthma and heart disease. While the AAP includes funding for affordable housing and related projects, she noted it does not specifically address smoke-free policies or secondhand smoke. Wrappe stated that protections in multi-unit housing projects funded through HOME, ESG, or Bridge to Home programs are very much needed. Lastly, Wrappe urged the City to include these basic health protections for low-income housing residents in the plan.
  - *Written Staff Response for AAP Inclusion: While HUD mandates smoke-free policies for Public Housing Authorities, these federal requirements currently apply specifically to public housing units. They do not automatically extend to projects assisted through other HUD entitlement programs, such as CDBG, HOME or ESG. At this time, the City does not mandate the adoption of smoke-free housing policies, but will continue to monitor HUD's guidance on this.*

**Councilmembers' Comments****Chair Raul Campillo, District 7**

- Councilmember Campillo thanked members of the public for their comments and EDD staff for their presentation and work. He emphasized that funding is vital for underserved and vulnerable communities and noted that the AAP, submitted annually to HUD, highlights programs funded with federal CDBG dollars that help San Diego communities.

**Jennifer Campbell, District 2**

- Campbell noted that although the CDBG grants are relatively small compared to the community needs, staff maximized their impact by stretching the funds to address multiple priorities.

*The motion to forward the Draft FY 2027 Annual Action Plan to the City Council with staff's recommendations was made by Chair Campillo and seconded by Councilmember Campbell.*

**APRIL 21, 2026 – CITY OF SAN DIEGO COUNCIL MEETING**

**Vanessa Ruiz, representing Promises2Kids**

- Ruiz noted that the proposed Mission Valley facility is dedicated to serving foster youth. She explained that the campus would support both current and former foster youth by providing essential case management and supportive services. Lastly, Ruiz emphasized that the project addresses a critical need and described the facility as a space designed to offer stability, hope, and a more efficient pathway toward a successful future for the youth it serves. Lastly, Ruiz thanked EDD staff for their support.

**Blair Beekman**

- Beekman referenced the housing crisis in Oakland to emphasize the need for extremely low-income housing to be a consistent component of the Annual Action Plan. He noted that funding from HUD remains limited and expressed hope for improved mediation and collaboration between local communities and the federal government under the current administration. He also pointed out that, compared to San Francisco, San Diego has relatively lower construction costs and presents an opportunity to pursue practical, scalable housing solutions.

**Hassan Abdirahman, Director of Economic Development, Somali Family Services**

- Abdirahman representing Somali Family Service, described the organization's 26 years of service to low-income families and expressed support for CDBG funding. He thanked EDD staff and City Council for their diligence and guidance, particularly during challenging economic times. He emphasized the importance of programs that assist small businesses through technical support and promote job creation, noting that many individuals are unemployed or underemployed as they work toward self-sufficiency. He reiterated his support for continued investment in CDBG-funded projects.

**Tony** (*virtual attendance*)

- Tony spoke in favor of the HOME and ESG projects, expressing support for efforts that address homelessness while also contributing to crime prevention. He commented that programs that focus on getting the homeless off the streets represent a more effective community investment compared to increased spending on police enforcement. He emphasized the value of service-based approaches that directly assist individuals in need and expressed gratitude to EDD staff and HUD for their work and presentation.

**Joyce Sunyata** (*Virtual attendance*)

- Sunyata thanked EDD staff for the presentation and congratulated the team on their work. She noted that HUD has tightened its oversight, particularly regarding collaboration on housing support programs. Sunyata referenced the EOC (Equal Opportunity Contracting) Program Evaluation funding of approximately \$16 million for equal employment and outreach efforts and raised questions about how race and equity considerations are being tracked and implemented.

- *Written Staff Response for AAP Inclusion: Regarding the funding referenced, the approximately \$16 million identified in the EOC Program Evaluation represents the total estimated cost of the actions and programs within the FY 2027 Annual Action Plan, rather than a separate funding source for equal employment and outreach efforts. These programs are subject to the City's rigorous Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) monitoring framework.*

### **Councilmembers' Comments**

#### **Councilmember Raul Campillo, District 7**

- Councilmember Campillo thanked EDD staff for their presentation and acknowledged their work in administering HUD entitlement funds.

#### **Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera, District 9**

- Councilmember Elo-Rivera thanked staff for the presentation and noted that the funding allocations will provide much needed support to communities, emphasizing that the resources are being well spent. He also questioned how changes under the current federal administration might affect the process moving forward and asked what those updates might look like.
- *Staff Response: Christina Bibler, Director of the Economic Development Department, clarified that administrative waivers were previously utilized due to delays in federal budget appropriations, however, no waivers are being issued as the process is adhering to the required timeline. She noted that recommendations were advanced last year in alignment with funding deadlines and that this approach has been consistently applied.*

#### **Councilmember Henry Foster III, District 4**

- Councilmember Foster thanked staff for the presentation. He confirmed understanding of the competitive process within categories awarded. Additionally, Foster asked if there was a debrief process for those applicants that did not make the award list.
- *Staff Response: Melissa Villalpando, Community Development Coordinator, clarified that for organizations not invited to submit an RFP, staff provide technical assistance by offering one-on-one meetings. During these sessions, staff discuss the reasons for the decision and answer specific questions. Also, for organizations that complete an RFP but do not move forward to CPAB review, these organizations are also invited to meet with staff to discuss the decision, and staff offer feedback and flag issues for future years. Organizations are encouraged to utilize this technical assistance throughout both the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) and Request for Proposals (RFP) phases of the NOFA process.*

Councilmember Foster asked if feedback from the RFQ and RFP responses

are available for applicants to review after the NOFA process.

- *Staff Response: Villalpando responded that the scoring criteria, application materials, and related documents are available for review during the NOFA process. Additionally, once the AAP is approved, applicants may request their scoring sheets to review written feedback from CPAB members and to see how they scored in specific areas of the application.*
- *Staff Response: Michele Marano, Assistant Deputy Director, shared that during the RFQ process, organizations that may have missed a required document are offered a grace period to provide the necessary documentation and cure the disqualification.*

### **Councilmember Joe LaCava, District 1**

- Councilmember LaCava thanked EDD staff for their good work, noting the importance of the effort to distinguish strong applications given limited funding. He inquired whether funding levels may change.
  - *Staff Response: Villalpando shared that funds have decreased by approximately 2-3% for all grants compared to the previous fiscal year.*

Councilmember LaCava noted that while community needs are increasing, available funding is decreasing. Additionally, he commented on affordable housing, emphasizing that truly affordable housing for the most vulnerable is constrained by limited funding. He cautioned against misunderstandings regarding EDD's efforts and reiterated that the department is working hard to support vulnerable communities. He concluded by thanking staff again for their work.

**The motion to approve EDD staff's recommendations for the Draft Fiscal Year 2027 Annual Action Plan was made by Councilmember Campillo and seconded by Councilmember Moreno. The motion passed unanimously, (9-0).**

The comments below were received in the Agenda Comment Form for the Draft Fiscal Year 2027 Annual Action Plan.

### **Written Comments**

#### **Zhenxi Zoong (In favor)**

- We are requesting CDBG funding for building roof replacement purposes. For years, CDBG has been crucial in addressing pressing infrastructure improvement needs of our non-profit organizations. The grant funding allowed us to install ADA compliant elevators and 14 new HVAC units in the buildings on campus, helping us create a safer, healthier environment for 200 underserved young adults who work hard to improve their own lives through

our paid job training and high school education programs. Thank you so much!

**Jennifer Gilmore, CEO of Kitchens for Good** *(In favor)*

- Kitchens for Good is deeply grateful to the City of San Diego City Council and Economic Development Department for the longstanding partnership and continued investment in our mission to advance economic opportunity through culinary workforce training and food entrepreneurship. We are honored to be recommended for FY 2027 CDBG and NCIP funding. This support comes at a pivotal moment as we expand our impact with the development of the region's Culinary Workforce and Entrepreneur Center in District 3. This new hub will significantly increase access to job training, small business incubation, and economic empowerment for San Diegans facing barriers to opportunity. At the same time, we are proud of the progress made over the past five years at our Training Center in District 7, where City support has helped hundreds of individuals gain skills, secure employment, and build financial stability. These programs are transforming lives while strengthening our local economy and food ecosystem. Together, these investments reflect a shared commitment to inclusive economic development, workforce equity, and small business growth. We are excited to continue our work becoming an economic engine in partnership with the City and look forward to deepening our impact in the years ahead. Thank you for your leadership and support.

**Karynne Anderson, Institutional Giving Manager, Voices for Children** *(In favor)*

- Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council, on behalf of Voices for Children, thank you for your support of Agenda Item S511 and for the City of San Diego's continued investment in Community Development Block Grant funding. As a nonprofit recipient of CDBG funding, we are deeply grateful for the City's partnership and its commitment to supporting children and families facing the greatest barriers. Through this funding, Voices for Children is able to recruit, train, and supervise Court Appointed Special Advocate volunteers who provide one-on-one advocacy to children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect. These children are among San Diego's most vulnerable residents, and CDBG support allows us to ensure they have a consistent, caring adult advocating for their education, health, housing stability, and overall well-being. This individualized advocacy fills a critical gap in the child welfare system and helps put children on a path toward safety, permanency, and long-term stability. We deeply appreciate the City Council's leadership and its recognition of the vital role community-based nonprofits play in advancing equity and strengthening neighborhoods. **Rhody Soria, CEO of Urban Corps of San Diego** *(In favor)*

- We respectfully request City Council approval of our CDBG application, as recommended by the ED&IR Committee, to replace the damaged roofs on two

buildings at the Urban Corps main campus. This critical investment will directly improve facility safety, protect vital infrastructure, and ensure continuity of services for the young people we serve. Upgrading these roofs will strengthen our capacity to deliver job training and second-chance high school education to economically disadvantaged youth across San Diego. A safe and stable environment is essential to maintaining consistent programming and supporting positive outcomes for our Corpsmembers. We are grateful for the City's longstanding partnership and commitment to advancing opportunity for our community's youth. With your support, we can continue providing pathways to education, employment, and long-term success. Thank you for your consideration.

**May 7, 2026 – FY 2027 CDBG Written Public Comments via Survey**

*Applicants who submitted an RFQ or RFP during the FY 2027 NOFA cycle were invited to participate in a survey and submit a public comment on the FY 2027 Annual Action Plan: The following are public comments from the survey respondents:*

- “Any support for public health and affordable healthcare is always helpful.”
- “The City has been doing a great job managing CDBGs. We appreciate the support from the City that has allowed us to address the infrastructure improvement needs for better safety.”
- “Please provide details about how CDBG funds are allocated for City projects (e.g., the City facilities allocation of \$3,106,882). Is this a carve-out prior to the CDBG competitive process, a reallocation of rollover or unawarded funds, or does it follow some other process? Is CPAB involved in the decision-making process for City funds, or are these decisions made by City staff?”
  - *Written Staff Response for AAP Inclusion: : The allocation of \$3,106,882 for City facilities is a designated portion of the annual budget for City Projects/Capital Improvement Projects/Non-profit Facility Improvements. This funding is identified during the budget planning phase and based on several factors, including the City’s Consolidated Plan Goals, project readiness, and the ability to meet HUD’s national objective of benefiting low-to-moderate income residents.*

City staff identifies these projects based on the factors listed above, while the City Council holds the final authority to approve the allocations as part of the whole FY 2027 CDBG budget.*

CDBG-funded programs. We strongly support Goal 5's focus on improving citywide community services by addressing critical needs and promoting equity through improved or increased access to community programming.
